Floats To Be Entered In Frontier Parade Should Be Listed At C. Of C.

Entry blanks are available now at the Chamber of Commerce office to anyone or any business wanting to enter a float in the parade which will inaugurate the Frontier Celebration the morning of June 16. Floats entered in the parade will be judged on originality, beauty, and time spent in preparation. Prizes of \$75, \$50, and \$25 will be awarded the winners of the three best floats according to the above named qualifications. The parade is scheduled to assemble in front of West Ward

School and west on Lubbock St. The band will lead the parade down Lubbock to South 8th, north on 8th to Texas Avenue, going one block on Texas, turning west on Lynn and going to 9th street, turning back south on 9th to Garza, where it will turn west and back opposite the West Ward. School where it will break up. Anyone wanting to enter a float in the parade is urged to get your entry blank right away and list it with the committee at the city hall.

High School Nine Wins District Goes To Regional

The Slaton High School Tigers picked up the district 4-A crown, for the second consecutive year and are all set to enter the regional play-offs.

Ralls and Dalhart are the other two teams in the three-way play-off for the regional title. Ralls and Dalhart tangle today (Friday) at 3 p.m. in Dalhart with the winner meeting the Tigers in the championship game. Slaton drew a bye.

After winning the district title last year Slaton dropped the regional tilt with Spur. The Tigers will be shooting for their first regional title this year.

In district 4-A the teams advance only to the regional play-offs. By drawing the bye for the play-offs Slaton lost the opportunity to perform in the title game before a home crowd. The championship match will be played at the Tigers' opponents, either Ralls or Dalhart, home field.

The Tigers advanced to the regionals with a team made up, mostly, of freshmen and sophomores. Under the guidance of Coach Zac Henderson the Tigers played Roosevelt and Southland in non-district games and competed with Levelland in district play.

Methodist Annual Conference Will Begin Next Week

Mr. Jackson said that he would take over active management of the Slaton Upholstery, adjoining, and that the two businesses would be known under the combined name of Slaton Mattress and Upholstery Co. Jackson invites all his friends and customers to see him in his new location.

Bell System Now Has One Million Co. Stockholders

A landmark in the history of American business has been set by a Saginaw, Michigan, couple who purchased seven shares of American Telephone and Telegraph stock recently and became the millionth shareholders in the business, according to C. H. Cale, manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company here.

The company, parent of Southwestern Bell, is the first business in the United States to reach the million mark in the number of owners.

The Brady Dentons, the millionth stockholders, are typically American. Denton, 33, and a veteran, is an automobile salesman. The couple live in a modest frame house, have three sons, six years, three years, and four months old, respectively. The Dentons bought the stock as an investment to ward a college education for their sons.

Cale pointed out that one family out of every 45 in the country now owns part of the Bell System. No other company has half as many stockholders, he stated. In Texas about 15,000 shareholders own 485,000 shares of stock and receive more than \$4,365,000 in dividends from the company annually.

"The investment of the Dentons in the telephone company, like that of 15,000 Texans helps make it possible for Southwestern Bell to carry on its big post-war expansion program in Texas," Cale said. "The company has spent \$96,005 in Slaton since the end of the war, and its expansion program in Texas has cost \$336,000,000."

RODGERS AND GEORGE ETZ, the postoffice address of whom is Lubbock, Texas, on the 25th day of April, A.D., 1951, filed their application in the office of the Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas, in which they apply for a permit to appropriate of the unappropriated waters of the State of Texas, from Double Mountain Fork, a tributary of the Brazos River, in Lubbock County, Texas, not to exceed 364 acre-feet of water per annum, by impounding in a reservoir created by the construction of a dam under Permit No. 1246 and issued to W. H. Rodgers on February 28, 1938, containing 640 acre-feet of water, for the irrigation of not to exceed 364 acres of land in any one year, out of larger tracts of land containing 372.27 acres, situated in Block I, Lubbock County, Texas, fully described in said application; water to be diverted by means of pumping plants. Rodgers on February 28, 1938, is located at a point which bears East 310 feet from the southwest corner of Block I, Survey No. 7, on the north bank of Double Mountain Fork, in Lubbock County, Texas, and is distant in a southeasterly direction from Lubbock, Texas, about 11 miles.

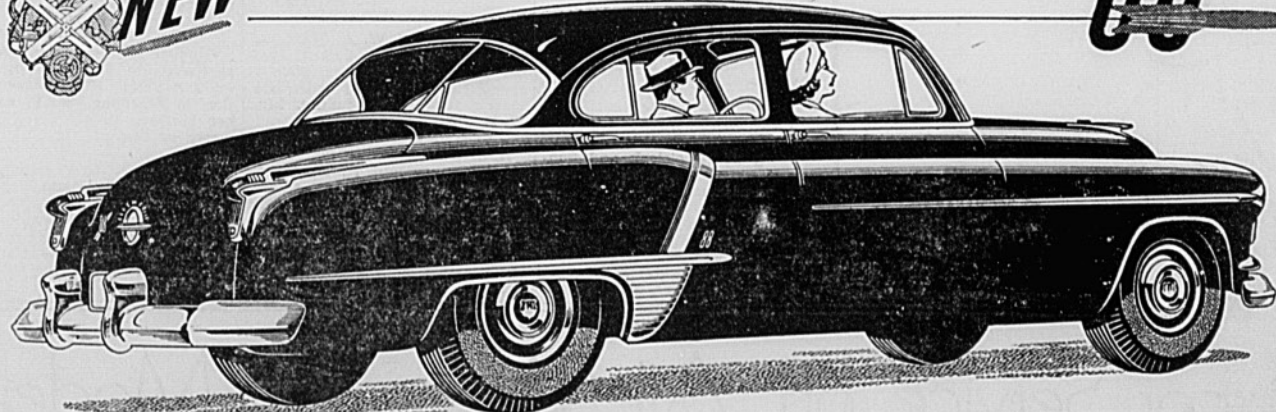

Texas Employees Due Half Million In Back Wages

FORT WORTH, May 16—Texas employers under-paid their employees by slightly more than half a million dollars out of \$9,559,628 found due all American workers under the provisions of the Federal Wage and Hour Law during the fiscal year 1950, according to the 38th annual report to Congress by the U. S. Secretary of Labor.

P. D. Riley, field office supervisor of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Pub-

lic Contracts Division here, said today that the report had just been made public in Washington by Secretary Marcus J. Tobin. Texas figures, according to the report, show that \$526,686 was found due to 7,309 workers in the Lone Star state during the year. Of those Texas workers illegally under-paid, 6,558 did not receive proper overtime pay and 751 did not receive the minimum wage of 75 cents an hour set by the Federal Law.

Voluntary payment of back wages found due was made by the bulk of Texas employers, Mr. Riley said. However, some cases still are pending in court since the law provides that employees may sue for back wages illegally withheld plus an equal amount as li-

quidation damages. The law also gives the Secretary of Labor the right to bring suit, on the written request of the affected employees, but employees requesting such suits waive their rights to liquidated damages.

Texas figures included in the national report show that in the 853 establishments investigated in Texas during the fiscal year, 570 were found to be in violation of one or more of the basic provisions of the law. Those included 534 overtime pay violations, 58 minimum wage violations, and 69 child labor violations.

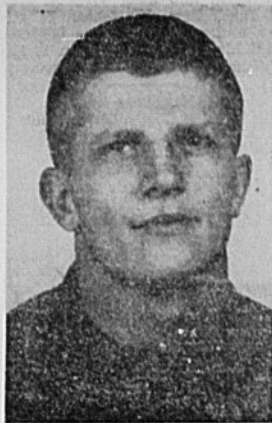

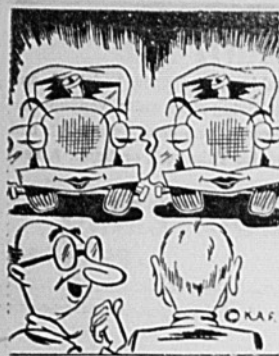
Tours Planned For WT Summer Students

Word Blindness
Just as some people are color blind, or unable to distinguish colors, so others are unable to distinguish printed words. This strange affliction has been called "word blindness." It is a serious handicap, for the victim may never learn to read, or to read well. Specifically, reading difficulty shows itself in inability to distinguish between letters which look something alike, such as b and d, p and q, i and l. Or the pupil may reverse the first and final letters of words and syllables. He may misname vowel sounds, or introduce sounds not in the word.

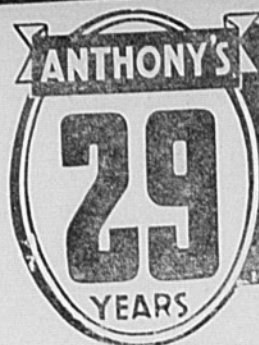

Senator Corbin Supports Natural Gas Pipeline Tax

AUSTIN, May 18— Sen. Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock and La-mesa today took a flat-footed stand against a one-cent gasoline tax increase as proposed in the omnibus tax bill voted out of State Affairs Committee in the Senate.

At the same time, Corbin repeated his support for a tax on natural gas going into pipelines. He emphasized that 62 per cent of the natural gas tax would be paid by out-of-state users of Texas gas, leaving only 38 per cent for Texas citizens to pay.

As a member of the State Affairs Committee, Corbin was one of only three Senators voting against the one-cent gasoline sales tax increase.

"I will vote against it again on the floor of the Senate and from now on out every time they try to put this extra sales tax on the people of Texas", Corbin declared.

The tax issue in the Legislature now has come to the point where the legislators must choose between a natural gas pipeline tax (which will be paid largely by people in other states) and a higher gasoline tax (which will be paid almost entirely by Texans), Corbin continued.

Corbin is supporting the natural gas pipeline tax which it is estimated would raise about \$30,000,000 a year. The money would be divided as follows: one-fourth, or \$7,500,000 to the available school fund for support of the public schools; one-fourth to the cities and towns of Texas for street construction; one-fourth to the counties for rural road construction.

"This is a fair and just tax," the Senator said. "It is a tax which will solve the State's financial predicament without hurting the people of Texas. It would raise more money than the gasoline tax, but it would cost the people of Texas many times less."

WHEN TO SEPARATE PULLETS AND MALES

When chicks are 5 to 6 weeks old, or whenever you can easily distinguish the cockerels, it is time to separate the sexes. Remove the male birds and place them in a separate enclosure, finishing them off as broilers. Retain only those cockerels needed for breeding purposes.

Removal of the males gives pullets additional room and eliminates crowding at the feed troughs. They will do better as a result. And the poultry raiser realizes a saving in feed costs.

Keep in your flocks of medium and heavy breeds only one male to every 15 females. For Leghorns and other light breeds the ratio should be about one rooster to every 20 hens.

Retain Good Breeders
Keep the best cockerels for breeding stock. To pick the best males, here are some guide rules to follow:

- (1) High quality chicks are the cheapest in the long run. If you haven't already purchased your chicks, plan to get the best available at your hatchery.
 - (2) Look for good feathering. Mark all chicks which have long pin feathers in their wings at hatching time or tail feathers at 10 days of age.
 - (3) Keep for later selection the largest cockerels at 8 to 12 weeks of age.
 - (4) Retain all cockerels that are free of standard disqualifications and have no body deformities. Look for points on the sides of the comb and feathers on shanks, toes and between the toes. Get rid of any with these disqualifications. Eliminate the runts and slow-feathering birds.
- When your pullet flock begins laying, do not house males and females together until the production of hatching eggs is started. It is best to produce market eggs which are infertile.

Anti-Inflation Policy

Many public works projects planned by states, counties and cities may have to be postponed because of the defense emergency. Charles E. Wilson, director of mobilization, has called on state and local officials to curb spending and to delay all projects except those needed for health, safety or defense. His request, which appears to be a plea rather than an edict, is made in the interest of checking inflation. It would have all bond issues of more than a million dollars passed on by a clearance committee.

Response to this plea would be prompt and wholehearted if the federal agencies were put under the same restriction. Yet the federal bureaus continue to throw billions of tax dollars into projects that have no connection with defense and that easily could be postponed or even dropped. President Truman, while calling on business and local government for anti-inflation steps, continues to ask Congress for more inflationary federal spending.

This is a case in which consistency would be a saving virtue. Inflation can not be checked by closing one door while another remains wide open. When the federal agencies set an example for checking or postponing nonemergency spending, the state and local governments will follow without any grumbling. Until the new Wilson rule is applied to federal, as well as local, spending, it is not likely to have much effect as a brake on inflation. —Dallas News.

Insanity Plea Abused

The theory that a person who is shown to be insane is irresponsible and should not be punished for committing a crime, but should be hospitalized for treatment, is now generally accepted by society, and the fact is strong evidence of the progress of enlightenment.

Unfortunately, in Texas, at any rate, our criminal laws, rules of court procedure, and penal institutions and hospitals have not been adjusted to the application of this fine principle of justice. Because of this, the finding of a jury is not proof of either sanity or insanity. It is only a rough guess in most instances.

It is an established principle of criminology in this country that punishment is for the protection of society. In view of this, even those persons who are found irresponsible because of mental derangement should be handled in a way that will prevent their mental illness from being a menace to the public.

Since there are varying degrees and many types of mental disease, juries composed mainly of laymen cannot be expected to diagnose correctly the case of the person on trial. And, as a rule, the real "experts" that testify flatly disagree among themselves. Because of this, the finding of a jury is not proof of either sanity or insanity. It is only a rough guess in most instances.

Texas has no institution for the criminally insane, that is, a hospital in which to place persons who have committed heinous felonies and who may be justly regarded as too dangerous to remain at large. It is not unusual for persons who are saved by the insanity plea to be released in a few months after they are found to be insane.

Every now and then we have a case in Texas of a person who is held to have been insane only at the time of his committing a crime. And temporary insanity is recognized under Texas law. Some reformers go so far as to suggest that all criminals are insane, which is the same thing as to say that no normal person violates any law. The plea of temporary insanity is somewhat akin to this theory of the extreme reformers.

As matters stand the public in Texas is not being given adequate protection by the laws that permit the insanity plea. It is futile and unjust merely to punish an irresponsible person, but, when the conduct of an individual is a threat to the safety of others, he should not be at large, regardless of what may be the cause of his anti-social behavior. Society has a more enlightened attitude toward crime and punishment, but it is not equipped to protect itself from abuses. —Dallas Times-Herald.

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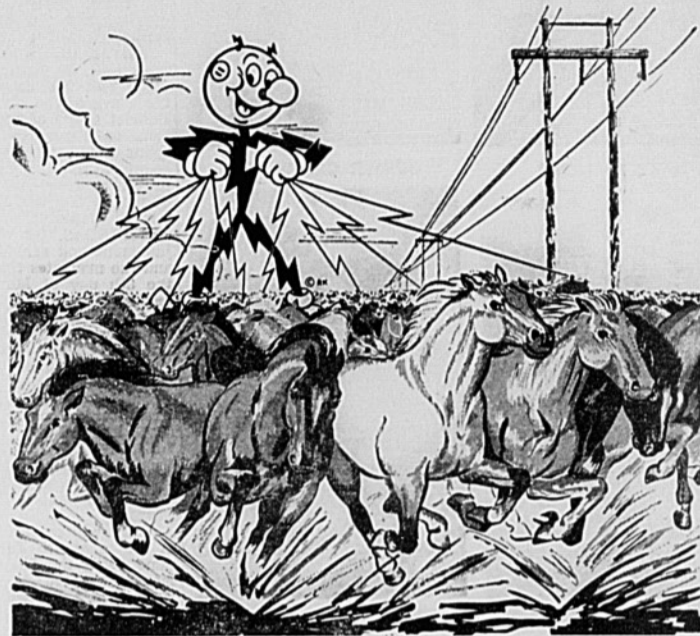

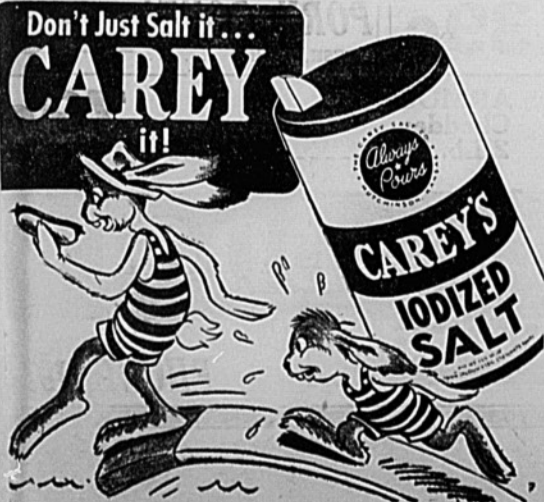
