Chevrolet Dealers

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 22-Continuing the upward trend evident since Dr. E. A. Boles To ate in July, Chevrolet dealers reported an increase of more than ten per cent in sale of new cars and trucks in the first ten days of September over the same period in August, H. J Klingler, vice-president and general sales manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company, announced here today.

This marks the fourth consecutive ten-day reporting period to score a gain in Chevrolet business over the corresponding period of the previous month, and is a direct reversal of previous experiences of the company, whose dullest summer season normal ly is in August and early September, Mr. Klingler said.

Actual reported sales were 8,529 new cars and trucks in the first ten days of September as against 7,688 in the same August period, and 6,541 in the first ten days of July. The September sdowing was regarded here as particularly favorable because it went above average expectations.

The encouraging upward climb of the sales curve has necessitated building and rushing several thousand more new cars into the field than the late summer projection called for to replenish dealer stocks, according, to the Chevrolet executive. Stock of new and used cars have been consistently lowered during the summer period and are now at an absolute minimum, he

General improvement in sales was evident in the reports from nearly every one of the company's nine sales regions in the Uited States, Mr. Kilngler declared. Particularly encouraging showings came from the regions centering at Dallas and Atlanta, where the improved outlook for cotton is proving a decided stimulant to automobile sales.

THE COST OF LIVING

The cost of living has steadily declied in the United States for ten years. Today is nearer to what it was before the war than it has reached since 1913, according to government statistics which have just been

The war sent the prices of all commodities up until, in 1920 ,it cost the average city dweller just about twice as much in rents, fuel, food, clothing and the other essentials of life, to say nothing of luxuries, as it had cost for the same things seven years before. In ten years two-thirds of this increased cost has been lopped off, so that today the general average of living costs is only about a third greater than it was in 1913,

The period of high commodity costs was, however, the period of our highest national prosperity, From 1922 to 1929 prices maintained a fairly even level of about 70 percent more than in 1913. Everybody was busy, everybody was earning more money than we had ever earned before, more goods were being produced and sold at profitable prices than ever before, and the people of the United States were in a happy and contented frame of mind. Then the sudden drop in commodity prices began and we have had hard times, business depression and unemployment ever since.

It seems to us that here is conclusive proof that prosperity is dependent upon high prices. All of the statesmen, economists and financiers of the world agreed that is true. An intensive and widespread effort is being made to find a way of restoring and increasing commodity prices. An international committee is to meet shortly in Geneva to prepare the plans and program for a world- wide confrence of governments in the effort to find some way to solve this probSpecial music and preaching by the


