We hold regular meetings to transact your business, and you not only have every right to attend these meeungs when you have either advice or complaints, but are ursed to do so. However, there is usually a lot of business to attend to in a short time and we must of necessity operate on some sort of schedule
Therefore, we will ask that if a group calls, you appoint a spokesman before calling and call ahead of time for a place on the schedule. our secretaries will be instruc
ted to make those arrangements. We abree to consider suggestions, and investigate complaints. This is our duty.

We realize there are several major problems a a ing us. One of them is the need of a re-appraisal of property valuations for taxes in order to keep them al located equitably. This will be a never ending job, as values constantly change. Another is some arrangement and one which the voters will have to decide, but we have to furnish the information. Another is the cons tantly growing demand for classroom space, in orde to meet the State specifications. We are working on these and others. This is our duty

There have been rumors of more petitions and even of boycotts. An unfounded rumor is bad, but a boycott is vicious. An organized boycott is illegal.
