



Of that number 81 per cent were able to identify the program turned on but 71 percent could not name any sponsor or product or type of product being advertised on that program. Most of us appreciate our good fortune in living in Slaton Community, which offers us so many advantages over less fortunate locations.

We have a good climate, good farm lands, a well run hospital, fine churches of almost all faiths, well run accredited schools, a steady payroll from the Santa Fe Railroad, progressive merchants and numerous recreation facilities, such as picnic grounds, swimming pool, tennis courts and several ball parks for youngsters.

We are located almost on the outskirts of one of the countries most modern and progressive cities, which furnishes employment for literally hundreds of our citizens. This same proximity also makes available to us all the facilities of the city, such as wholesale distributors, commodity markets, their fine parks and shopping centers, a large university, Southwest Conference Sports and water sports at Buffalo.

Our town is known as a high salaried town, due no doubt to standards set by the Railroad, as compared to other small towns, and yet our merchants sell as a whole below the prices in other smal towns, this due to necessity in combating competetive prices offered in the nearby city.

However, our most important asset is the quality of our people. We have the very highest type of farmers, the steadiest and best quality salaried people, a good solid Bank, progressive merchants and professional men and the ideal location for both retired couples and young people raising families.

We also have a truly democractic form of government, the kind that has been in effect in our since 1776, and for which we have successfully fought several wars.

OUR DUTY

We have been, or should have been, elected to temporarily handle the business of this community by the majority of the citizens. We consider this a trust and, as has been done by most of our predecessors, intend to do what we think is best for the majority of the people. This is our duty.

There is only a certain amount of income, for which there are more demands than supply. There are certain bond obligations, some voted back forty years ago, that have to be met. We must allocate the funds, first to meet these obligations and then to pay for current services which are necessary to the safety and convenience of our citizens. This is our duty.

We do not think we know all the answers, nor do we think we are infallible. But, we are the ones charged with this responsibility, and must use our own judgement. This is our duty.

We hold regular meetings to transact your business, and you not only have every right to attend these meetings when you have either advice or complaints, but are urged to do so. However, there is usually a lot of business to attend to in a short time and we must of necessity operate on some sort of schedule.

Therefore, we will ask that if a group calls, you appoint a spokesman before calling and call ahead of time for a place on the schedule. Our secretaries will be instructed to make these arrangements. We agree to consider suggestions, and investigate complaints. This is our duty.

We realize there are several major problems inc-ing us. One of them is the need of a re-appraisal of property valuations for taxes in order to keep them al-located equitably. This will be a never ending job, as values constantly change. Another is some arrangement for a long term water supply. This is a major problem, and one which the voters will have to decide, but we have to furnish the information. Another is the constantly growing demand for classroom space, in order to meet the State specifications. We are working on these and others. This is our duty.

It is your duty as a citizen to vote in every election, both local and national. In this way, the men charged with handling business will be chosen by the majority. This is your duty.

10 After you have chosen some one to handle your af-fairs, you should give them a chance to do so. You thought they were capable, or you would not have elected them. Do not listen to or belive false rumors, come and ask, either at regular meetings or to any one of us privately. This is your duty.

Do not sign crippling petitions, or petitions which you do not understand, just to be a good fellow or to get rid of the one passing it. Investigate thoroughly first, ask the ones you elected to explain. A lot of noise can be made by a loud and irresponsible minority. Allowing them to run your business against the wishes of the ones you elected is government by minority and not by majority. This is your duty.

If they do not handle your business satisfactorily, there is an election every year for replacement of these officials. In the case of the City you can change the entire group in two years, and in the school you can do the same thing in three years. Change them up as provided by law, and put in people you think are better qualified. This is your duty.

As citizens, we beg you to realize that you have every right to your opinions and beliefs, but that the other fellow does also. In an election, you should vote as you feel, and so should the other fellow. There have been rumors of more petitions and even of boycotts. An unfounded rumor is bad, but a boycott is vicious. An organized boycott is illegal. But the worst result is hard feeling between our citizens and detrimental effects on our community. Let us give the other fellow the same right that we want, to think and vote as he sees. This is your duty.

The men who are charged with running the business affairs of our community are elected by the citizens every year, elections in which every man or woman who is of age, has lived here the proper time and paid the poll tax is not only allowed to vote, but is urged to vote

We do not agree to have our meetings broken up by haranguing and bickering, which accomplishes no purpose but only causes hard feelings. This is not our duty.




