Cleanup Work Continues On Community Center

Work commences each and every Saturday at the Community Center in Groom.

So far, truck loads of debris have been hauled away and cleanup and remodeling of the facility is well underway. Space has been cleared for a 40' x 60' area which will be the Community Center. The area is on the north side of the building centered around the kitchen area and two other smaller meeting room areas. The larger room could easily accommodate a banquet and smaller rooms could be used for meetings and for a game area. The area also includes the kitchen and two rest-rooms.

Work has been concentrat-

ed so far on the east wing according to GEDC President, Bill Homer. This will be the location of the clinic which will be moved from a rent house near the school. The clinic area will include a reception area, waiting room and four examination rooms.

Work to bring water to the separately heated wing of the building was nearing completion on Monday. The new water line will be connected into the water supply and be tested for leaks. Leaking was a major cause of problems at the building requiring ceiling and floor tiles to sustain heavy damage. Painting in the clinic area has also been completed and workmen

hope to begin replacing floor tiles this week.

When this work is complete, the Clinic will be moved and the opening of the first portion of the building will be complete.

This project is a huge undertaking that once again proves what small towns are made of. With volunteer workers, from three to 15 at any given time, the project is well underway. Though it perhaps will not be completed this year or even next, a people with vision have led the way for progress in the Community of Groom.

Agricultural income may increase slightly in 1987 from the depressed level of recent years, says a Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist.

Thornton Named To Super Team

Brent Thornton was the only Tiger football player to be named to the Super Team recently selected by Amarillo Globe News.

Thornton is described by his coach as, "the best linebacker I've ever coached." The 6-2, 198-pound defensive player averaged 19 tackles a game as Groom went 8-2 missing out on the playoffs by two one-point losses.

Thornton was named all-district twice in a row as well as being first-team all-district running back. He carried 146 times for 1010 yards with 16 tackles. He averaged 6.9 yards per carry.

reduced production expenses and large government payments are expected to support a moderate rise in farm and ranch incomes," points out Dr. Carl Anderson. "Export levels during the new year will be a key factor in determining the final outcome."

Farm exports should increase considerably due to the sharp drop in the dollar, much lower crop prices and the Export Enhancement Program. Prospects for more trade and improved global economic conditions, slow rates of inflation and increased economic activity in developing countries. Softening the demand, however, are debt problems in several countries, insulation of many importers from changes in world prices, and increased productive capacity in key markets.

"Abundant crop supplies continue to dampen the likelihood for any sustained rally in prices," notes Anderson. "Feed grain and soybean harvests will probably increase world crop supplies

even though wheat, rice and cotton stocks may decline slightly. In the U.S., the crop harvest is expected to be almost a tenth smaller than the year before.

"Livestock producers are expected to fare a little better in 1987," says the economist. "The outlook is for sharply lower beef output and slightly more pork. Total meat production in the U.S., however, may remain large as poultry output expands."

Livestock producers should experience increased returns in the first half of 1987 as supplies tighten, demand strengthens and feed costs decline. The U.S. cattle inventory and breeding hog numbers in 1986 are at the lowest level in more than 20 years, Anderson points out.

For 1987, cattle and hog prices should average above '86 levels despite continued increases in poultry product output. Crop prices likely will remain at reduced levels during the first half of 1987, with prices in the second half depending on crop produc-

tion and trade activity. However, prospects for abundant agricultural supplies suggest continued pressure on farm incomes, according to the economist.

"Managing the farm and ranch business to reduce financial exposure while realizing maximum income remains central to maintaining an economically viable business," says Anderson.

"Success depends largely on careful management of capital by spending money where returns are highest and using marketing skills to benefit from price rallies. Stretching operating expenses, evaluating farm program options for

maximum benefits, and taking a close look at highest returns from alternative enterprises are critical to protecting the financial position of agricultural operations." County Extension agents can provide further information on managing for profitability.



Walker Assumes Manager's Job

Gary L. Walker of White Deer assumed the duties of manager of the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 on January 2, 1987. He is replacing

Richard S. Bowers who began his job as manager of the North Plains Water Conservation District No. 2 on that same date. Bowers replaced Orval Allen who began his retirement in 1987.

Walker was hired by the Board of Directors of the

Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District at a meeting that began Monday night, December 15. All other items on the agenda were discussed, and then the Board went into executive session and chose six of the 24 applicants to be interviewed the following night at 6:00 p.m. After interviewing the six applicants and discussing the interviews, the Board decided to reconvene at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday Night. At that time there was a motion and a second to hire Gary Walker as Manager of the Water District. Vote on the motion was unanimous. Walker was invited to come to the meeting, and he accepted the position.

Walker is a 1969 graduate of Texas A&M University. He served as an aviator in the U.S. Navy for 1 year. Walker and his family came to White Deer in 1970 as an employee of Locke Cattle Company. The last few years, he has had his own cattle business. His wife, Frankie, is a bookkeeper for Wheeler-Evans Elevator Co. They have two children—a daughter, Lorri, a Junior in White Deer High School and a son, Dare, in the eighth grade in White Deer Junior High School.

Walker has been a Deacon of the First Baptist Church for eight years and has held various offices in the church including vice chairman of the Board of Deacons, Treasurer for seven years, and a member of the Building and Grounds Committee for four years. He is a member of the Lions Club and has served as Lion Tamer, Tail Twister, Vice-President, and President. One year he received the Outstanding Lions Member Award. He was also a member of the White Deer-Skellytown Independent School District Board for six years and the president elect of the Panhandle Association of Area School Boards. He is a member of the White Deer FFA Advisory Committee and President of the Carson County Livestock Association.

Friemel Operation Recognized In Progressive Farmer

Area agribusinessman Roman Friemel had his shop located west of Groom featured in an article of the January issue of Progressive Farmer. Title of the article by Kim Allen, "He Built This Shop From the Ashes Up", is reprinted below.

Roman Friemel's farm shop was destroyed by fire in 1970, but he waited six years to rebuild. This gave Friemel plenty of time to think about what he wanted to include.

"First, I wanted a separate office that was part of the shop building," says the Groom, Tex., farmer. "Then in the shop, I wanted a hydraulic lift and a good overhead crane system. Outside, I wanted a wash bay."

The main shop measures 50 x 75 feet, with an enclosed lean-to adding another 30-foot-wide storage area. Friemel's office and reception area occupy 20 feet.

On one end of the building is a 26-14-foot sliding door. At a side entrance he has a 20-x14-foot overhead door with electric opener.

Outside the large end doors is a 20-foot concrete pad, complete with a wash bay. "That's a great feature," says Friemel's son Mike. "We do most of our own overhauling work, and we like to clean everything as we work on it."

It's those "great features" that make the Friemels proud of their shop. Best of all, they say, those features help make farming easier.



Gray County Officials Sworn Into Office



Ceremonies to install Gray County officials were held last Wednesday, Dec. 31 at the Gray County Courthouse in Pampa. District Judge Don Cain presided. Among those who were sworn in to office were Ted Simmons, who was re-elected for another four year term as County Commissioner, Precinct 4, and Justice of the Peace R.C. Parker, who was re-elected for a second term in office.

Ready for his new term to begin, Commissioner Simmons said this about the future, "I plan to approach the next several years conservatively because of the dwindling tax base in the county. I always vote to spend money carefully but it's more important now

than it ever was."

Simmons said he foresees two issues which will probably require a lot of attention in the next two years. First is the proposed golf course for Gray County. He said, "The commission will probably reconsider the golf course situation but it's not going to be considered as far as I am concerned. Because of the poor state of the economy, I don't believe we are in a position to even think about constructing the course."

The second issue will be the construction of a new county jail. According to Simmons, "State regulations may require building a new jail because the old one can't be renovated to meet new state requirements coming out of Austin."

Besides these two matters, Simmons says his goal is simply to "continue the maintenance of a good road system and hold the line on the budget."

Justice of the Peace R.C. Parker, in summing up his goals, said, "I expect to continue to give the best possible service I can and to do the job to the best of my ability."

Other county officials sworn in that day were County Clerk Wanda Carter, and two new officers, County Treasurer Scott Hahn and District Clerk Vickie Walls.

Care Center Problems Corrected Says Director

According to McLean Care Center Director Bill Thomas, certain "deficiencies" mentioned by Texas Department of Health inspectors during a recent visit have been corrected. Thomas said that during the December inspection, which is one of two annual reviews done by state officials, several incontinent patients had "red bottoms" because of diarrhea problems. He said that these problems occasionally occur and are always treated promptly. He added that the residents are in good health with no bed sores or other major problems. He said the residents have been, and are continuing to receive, good care and that the Department of Health has been notified that the "deficiencies" have been rectified.

In a conversation with the McLean News, Ralph Harmon, Program Administrator of the Long Term Care Unit for TDH, said that the problem identified was one which "did not affect the health and safety of the patients." But, he added, according to regulations, the facility had to be notified of the problem and had 30 days to take corrective action. Harmon said the Care Center had notified his office that corrections have already been made. All that remains is for TDH to send out inspectors to verify that fact. The date for the return visit has not been set.

Harmon said that if a facility does not respond after an inspection, its Medicaid certification can be revoked and patients would have to turn to other sources of support. However, he added that the McLean Care Center did respond with a corrective action plan within the specified 30 day period.

If, after the second inspection by TDH, it is determined that the corrective measures are adequate, the contract will be renewed as usual.

The Department of Health contract with McLean Care Center covers Medicaid, not Medicare as was reported by another newspaper.

decision was made by me for personal reasons only.




Motorists Warned About School Walkway



Present investment decisions should be influenced by our future needs.

There's a direct relationship between the amount of money we wish to accumulate and the number of years we have to accumulate it.

To illustrate, let's assume you wish to accumulate a \$12,000 college education fund for your newborn child. You believe the child will enter college in 20 years, and you're expecting an annual rate of return of 12 percent. To reach this goal you'll have

to invest \$12.13 per month. If you wait five years—now you have only 15 years to meet your goal—you'll have to invest \$24.02 per month, and if you procrastinate another 10 years, you'll have to invest \$146.93 per month to achieve the same dollar goal.

So you see, time can be a real asset in planning for our children's education or our retirement—if we don't let it slip away! The more time we have, the fewer dollars we need.

Advice we receive on investments should be weighed in relation to the source. I'm reminded of the cartoon—two hobos sitting on a park bench discussing their investment strategy. I tend to discount advice from the never-do-wells or one stands to benefit strongly on the advice he or she distributes.

Investing, as we've mentioned before, should not be based on hot tips or hunches. 



