

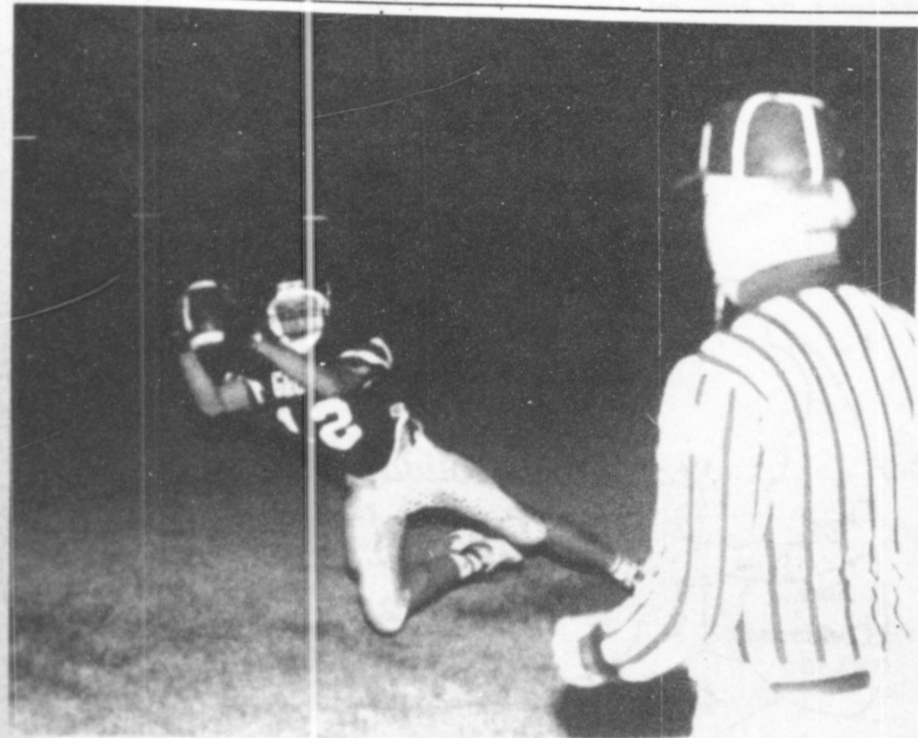

## Board Reviews Findings On Proposed School Finance

The Board of Trustees of the Groom Independent School District met in regular monthly session on November 10, 1992 in their usual meeting place in the school administration offices with the following members present: President Dennis Babcock, presiding; Vice-President Don Lyles; Secretary Adela Kotara; and Members Gary Friemel, Ken Burger, David Britten and Tony Treadwell.

Superintendent Kenneth Sweatt, Principal Judy Babcock, Clerk Joyce Hutsell, and the following visitors were present: Annette Childress, Georgann Hinson, and Susan Burgin.

All motions were unanimous

Minutes of the regular meeting of October 13, 1992 were read and approved as read.

Upon opening the closed bid received following the advertising for sale of the north one-half of Lot 11 and all of Lot 12 in Block 41 of the original town of Groom, Mr. Burger moved and Mr. Friemel seconded to accept the bid submitted by Debra Addy and Anetta Childress in the net amount of \$1,200.00 to the district, with buyers to furnish any costs of closing and recording.

The board voted to adjust the 1992-93 salaries of Nancy Patterson, LaVeda Wood, and Betty Rae Brown to take into account the altered schedule of ten minutes daily increase in the

cafeteria work day.

Judy Babcock was appointed as the district's Title IX, Section 504 Coordinator for students identified with certain handicaps.

Superintendent Sweatt and Board President Babcock reviewed findings on proposed 1992-93 school finance from various state legislative and executive projections. No action resulted from the report.

Superintendent Sweatt reported into the feasibility of converting the breezeway at the east door of the building into a concession stand without recommending any construction at this time. No action resulted from the report.

## Bi-District Battle Ends Tiger Season

Groom Tiger football ended last Friday night for the season in Chillicothe after the bi-district play off game between Groom and the Chillicothe Eagles. The Eagles won the flip gaining the home field advantage. Little hope was given to the Tigers' chances of winning prior to the game with the 8-1 Eagles but for the fans traveling the 135 miles to Chillicothe they witnessed for themselves how this game could have just as easily gone the other way. So the 1992 Tigers football season is in the record books with the 35-37 loss.

"Everyone can be proud of the way the boys played, we were clearly picked to be the underdog," said head Coach Terry O'Dell.

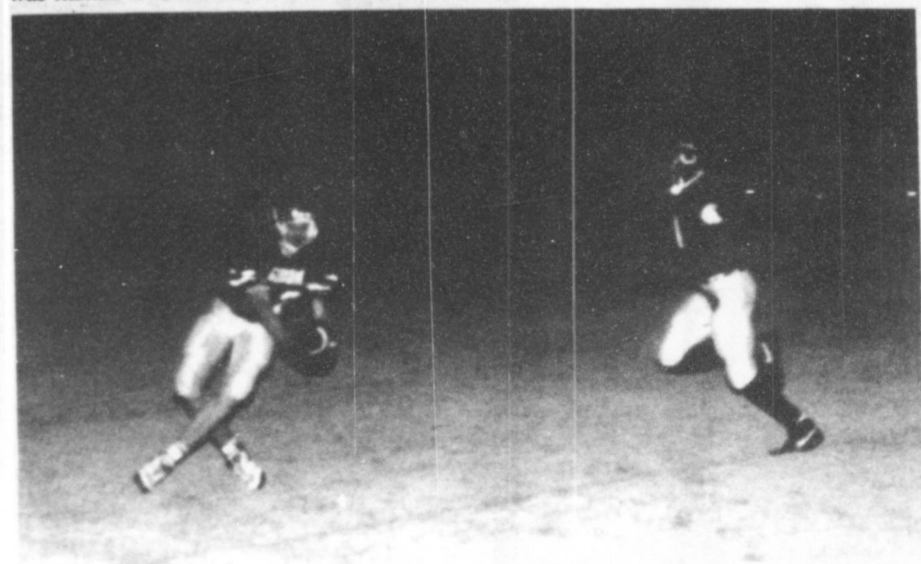
Although both the 1991 and 1992 teams were defeated in the Bi-District playoffs Coach O'Dell said, "We were more mad and embarrassed last year. We worked hard from the beginning of the season to help us get to this point this year. I feel that next year we won't have to be so hard on ourselves."

Chillicothe jumped out scoring first on a 42 yard touchdown pass. Groom blocked the PAT kick, and Wes Hall scooped the ball up and raced 75 yards for the point. Chillicothe scored again, giving the Eagles a 13-1 lead. Corkey Hickey added a touchdown on a 28 yard run to bring Groom within a touchdown at the end of the first

So Groom not only was able to score before halftime cutting the Eagles lead to 25-15 but took the very important momentum away from Chillicothe which they enjoyed throughout the first two quarters.

As the second half began, momentum was just what Groom gained back by scoring that late TD in the first half because the Tigers scored twice in the third quarter.

The third quarter scoring was a 21 yard pass from Bo Burgin to Wes Hall and a five yard pass to Bo Burgin from Wes Hall.

The Tiger defense held Chillicothe scoreless in the

third quarter, gaining the lead 29-25.

In the fourth quarter Chillicothe scored twice on runs of 32 and 29 yards giving the Eagles a 37-29 lead. Hickey scored on a five yard run with 46 seconds to go in the game. The two point conversion kick was blocked and Chillicothe was able to run out the clock, winning 37-35. The Eagles had a 9-6 penetration lead to advance them in the playoffs had the kick been good and the score ended in a tie.

Groom had 9 first downs and Chillicothe 10 on the night. Rushing yards were 290 for Groom and 252 for the Eagles. Groom had 35 yards passing while Chillicothe had 148 yards for total yards gained for Groom of 325 and the Eagles 400 yards. Groom completed 5 out of 9 passes and Chillicothe completed 7 out of nine. Neither team gave up an interception. The Tigers had four fumbles and one lost while the Eagles fumbled only once and were able to maintain possession. Groom had five penalties for 35 yards while Chillicothe had 3 penalties for 30 yards.

five yard line with time running out. The Miami defense held the Cubs on two running plays and the clock ran out ending the game.

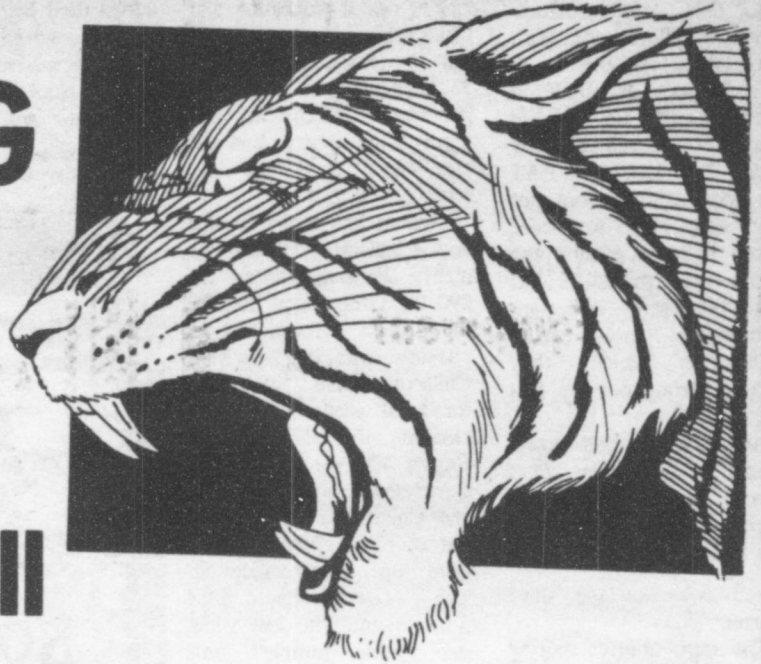

## Carson Co. Sheriff's Report

Nine persons were incarcerated in the Carson County Jail. Six were arrested for Possession of Marijuana Under 2 Oz., one for DPS Warrants, one for Arson and one for Aggravated Assault under the Family Violence Code.

Deputies are currently investigating incidences of criminal mischief at an oil lease site in rural Carson County and in Groom. The incidents are not related and deputies are pursuing leads in both cases.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department is also investigating a report of unauthorized dumping near White Deer and a burglary also in the White Deer area.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department is working with law enforcement agencies in Arizona in attempt to locate

a woman who disappeared from a motel in Carson County last month. The subject left a number of personal possessions at the motel and did not contact the management regarding when they would be picked up or where they could be

forwarded to. At that point, the motel owners contacted the Sheriff's Department and an investigation was begun into the suspicious circumstances. It has not been determined

whether the subject gave a fictitious name when registering at the motel, but officers are hoping to have some success in identifying the subject with the assistance of Arizona law enforcement.

The Sheriff's Department and Carson County

Attorney are reviewing investigation reports regarding a report of Cruelty to Animals. After reviewing the facts it will be determined whether the animals will be seized and charges filed against the owners.

Officers from the Carson County Sheriff's Department, Texas Highway Patrol and Amarillo law enforcement agencies investigated three subjects who were observed acting in a suspicious manner in the Groom area. The three were located in Amarillo and later released after being checked for outstanding warrants.

A report of Assault regarding the Family Violence Code is being investigated by the Carson County Sheriff and Department of Human Services. The incident involves an alleged assault on one spouse by the other and the matter will be reviewed with the County Attorney for consideration of prosecution.

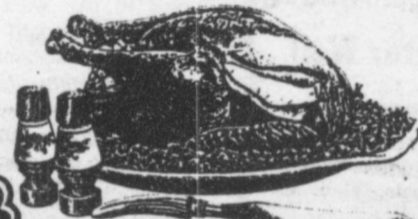

## Grandview Re-evaluates Lunches

On Tuesday, November 10, 1992, a regular meeting of the Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D. was held in the cafeteria of the school. The meeting began at 8:00 PM, with some members arriving late after finishing as much field work as possible before an anticipated storm.

Board members approved the payment of bills as presented, and then reevaluated the price of school lunches. The board voted to keep the price of

adult lunches at \$3.50, and to set the price of lunches for brothers and sisters of current Grandview-Hopkins School students who are 12 years old or younger at 35 cents.

In other action, the board voted to accept the job descriptions and appraisal forms of the School Secretary, General Maintenance person, Cafeteria Manager, and all Bus Drivers. Employee performance will be evaluated using these new standards during the 1992-93 school year.

After an executive session to discuss personnel matters, the board reconvened in open session. The board voted to pay Wanda Stone \$12.00 per month for the months of September and October in order to resolve a salary discrepancy. In a separate motion, the board voted to set the annual salary for Wanda Stone at \$2880.00 as verbally contracted by the superintendent at the

beginning of the 1992-93 school year.

Voting on the school district representative to the Gray County Appraisal District Board of Directors, the board cast all 166 of their votes for Sam Haynes of McLean. The board also voted to accept on First Reading Local Policy CPC, which directs the superintendent to set up a Records Management Plan.

The Grandview-Hopkins board also voted to terminate the agreement with attorney R. James George of Austin to represent the board in litigation concerning the Budget Balanced Schools Association. The district will continue as a member of the Budget Balanced Schools Association, but will not participate in further litigation at this time.

The next regular meeting of the Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D. Board of Trustees will be held at 7:00 PM on Tuesday, 12-8-92, in the school cafeteria.

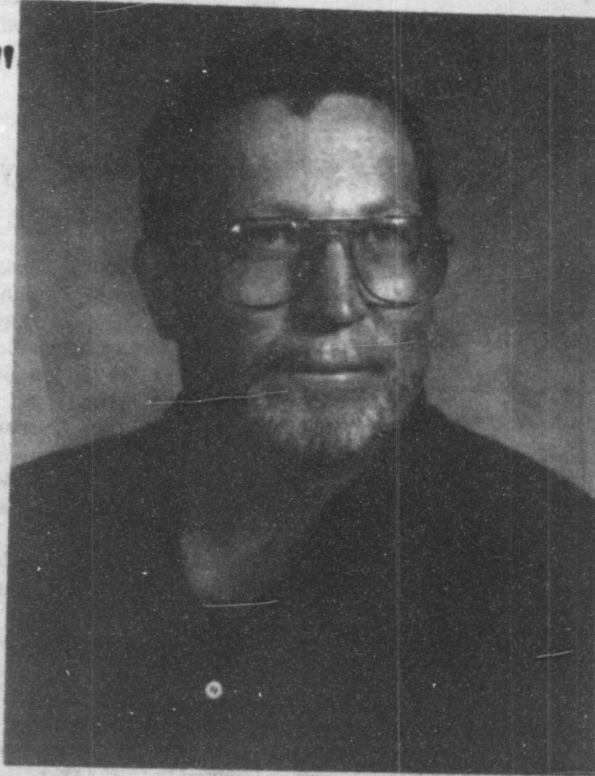

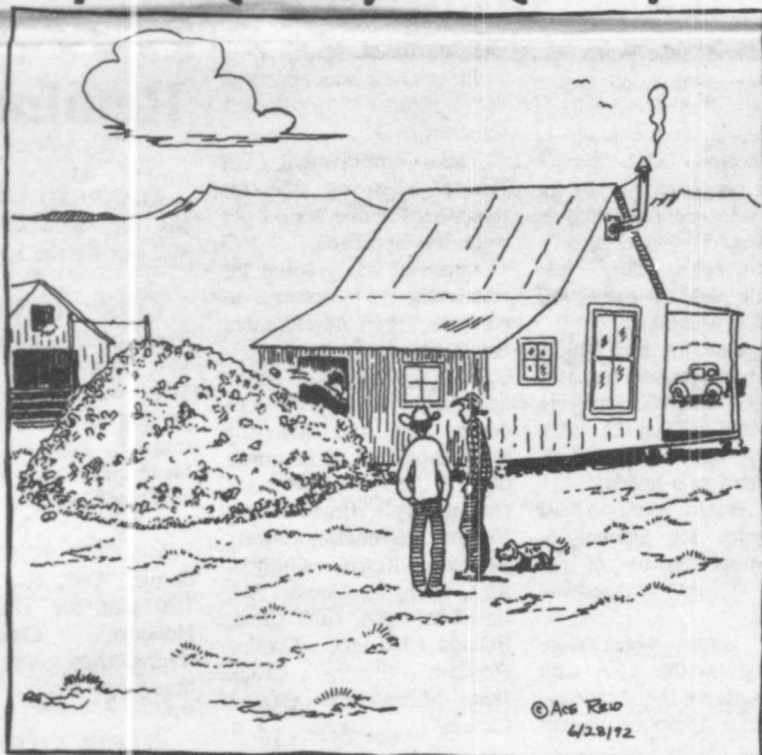

## PUBLIC NOTICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated (GTE-SW) and Contel of Texas Inc. (Contel) have filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to seek approval to provide two new private line services and to change rates for existing services. GTE's intraexchange DS1 Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through concurrence with GTE's interLATA access tariff rates which are lower. Contel's intraexchange DS1/DDS Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through Contel's current private line tariff rates. Existing customers with DS1/DDS Services will not be affected by these rate changes. DS1 1.544 Megabits per second (Mbps) Service and Digital Data Service (DDS) will normally be used for the transmission of data communications or large volumes of voice communications between two locations. These services are optional and will not affect the existing rates of customers who do not order these services. The estimated annual effect on GTE-SW's revenues in the first year is \$1,080,567. The estimated annual effect on Contel's revenues in the first year is \$42,383.

#### DS1 Service

DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

#### DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

#### DS1 Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

#### DS1 Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DS1 Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DS1 Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the DS1 Transport.

#### Digital Data Service

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

DDS Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DDS Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two CDLs or between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider.

IntraLATA DDS Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DDS Local Loop, DDS Transport and DDS Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

#### DDS Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer may establish and disconnect DDS Local Loops without penalty other than the minimum service interval of one month's service, as his/her needs demand.

#### DDS Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DDS signal between SWCs. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

#### DDS Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DDS Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DDS Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the service.
