## District Showtime Friday For Tigers Of Groom, McLean

Groom Tigers travel to McLean Friday night for what will be the district championship for District 1-1A. The two teams' rankings are just where both sides wanted them when November rolled around. Groom is undefeated on the season at 7-0. McLean is 4-4 overall, but undefeated in district.

Groom has had a little easier road to this point with wins over Meadow and Follett being the tougher contests while McLean has come through games with state ranked opponents losing to Lazbuddie, Chillicothe, Silvertown and Valley. The closest comparison in opponents, Groom defeated Follett two weeks ago 32-30 and last week McLean defeated Follett 77-76.

Christian Looney, senior quarterback for McLean has been the key to the Tiger offensive attack with his running and passing while Paul McLaughlin, senior running back for Groom, has led the Tiger attack with his rushing on offense and consistency on defense. Groom's all-district center and noseguard from a year ago, Matt Fields, has also

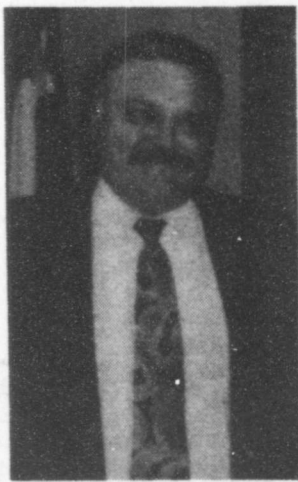
been a stable force in the middle for Groom's successful 7-0 season thus far.

Coach O'Dell says his Groom Tigers are healthy going into the McLean game, that they are ready to play because his teams have never defeated McLean. The primary focus for Groom, if they are to defeat McLean, will be to slow Christian Looney down.

Coach Lamb said, "Christian is a great athlete and we must slow his running down."

Coach Miller believes if his Tigers are to be successful Friday night they must work very hard and be ready for Groom. "Groom is tougher than a boot... big, physical and very good," said Coach Miller.

## Loren Brand Named Carson County Sheriff

Loren Brand, a 17 year veteran of law enforcement, civil investigation and criminal investigation, was appointed Monday as the next Carson County Sheriff succeeding Terry Timmons. Timmons resigned last week due to what he described as "burnout."

Brand is a nine year

resident of Panhandle, where he lives with his wife Carolyn, three children; Tammy, age 17; Chris, age 15; and Melissa, age 14. He attended college at the University of South Dakota and West Texas State with his major emphasis of study being Criminal Justice and

## Election Day Is Finally Here On Tuesday

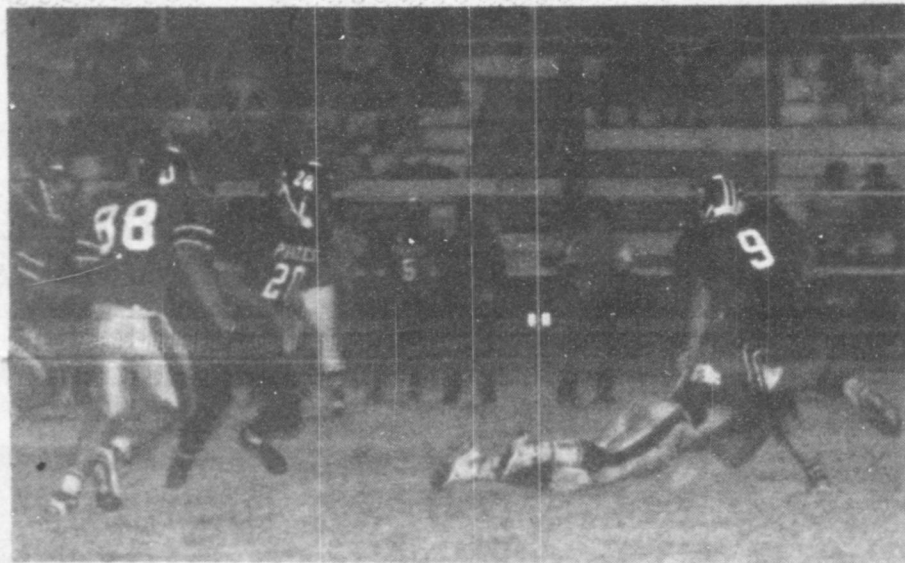
Voters will go to the polls this coming Tuesday to decide who will be the next president of the United States.

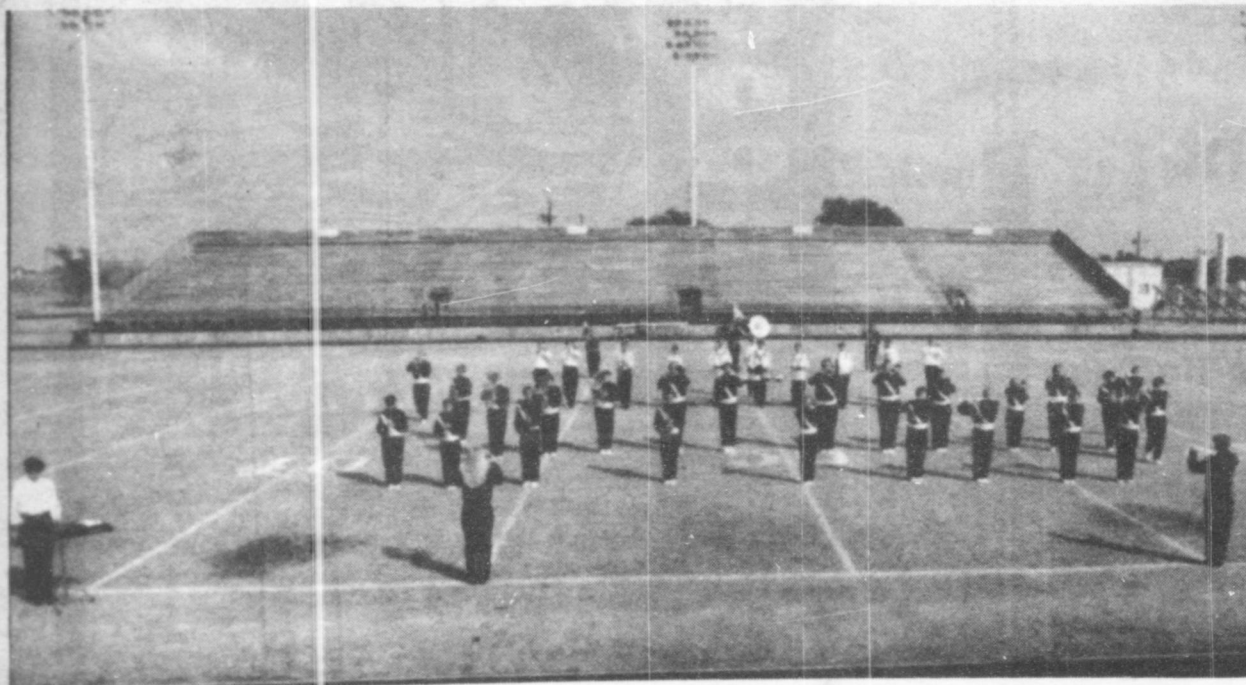

The Groom Cubs played here Thursday night and were defeated by the Samnorwood Eagles 33-25.

The Cubs played a very good game but had trouble getting started as they scored only once in the first half. The lone touchdown came on a pass to Justin Ritter from Toby Burgin.

The second half proved to be more productive for the Cubs. The Cubs moved the ball well and scored three touchdowns. The Cubs scored on runs from Justin Ritter, Michael Lewis and on a fine kick-off return by Toby Burgin. Toby also converted a one point conversion for an extra point.

"Good blocking helped us move the ball better this week," said Coach Reid. "I feel we have really improved in that area," he said.

Providing good blocks for the night were Scott Weinheimer, Sean Crowell, Michael Lewis, and Jason Prather.

several touchdowns on passes. The Tigers defense was having its problems containing the Eagle runners. The half ended with the eagles ahead 30-7.

The Tigers opened up

the second half with a rejuvenated defensive surge as they repeatedly stopped the Eagle offense. The defense kept turning the ball over to the Groom offense, who in turn put together nice drives to put points on the board. Second half touchdowns by the Tigers were made on runs from Brandon Crump of 2 and 5 yards. One PaT on the Crump run was made by Scott McLaughlin on a fine run. The final touchdown for the Tigers was made on a perfectly executed option play by Craig Baker to Josh Gray for 45 yards. Gray added the PAT. This last touchdown put the Tigers within nine of the Eagles.

However, time was now the Tiger's opponent! Only that kept the Tigers out of the endzone once again.

"Our defense came out the second half and really gave us a chance to put some points on the board," stated Coach Reid. "Once they settled down and concentrated on their responsibilities they were

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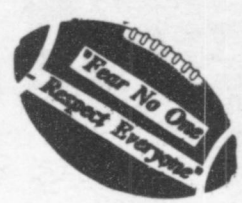

### White Deer Polish Sausage Festival

The Sacred Heart Parish of White Deer has scheduled its annual Polish Sausage Festival for Sunday, November 1, 1992, at the Parish Hall, one block east of Main Street and the town of White Deer, according to Carolyn Rapstine, publicity chairman. Serving time will be 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Tickets are \$6.00 for adults and \$3.50 for children.

The 1992 festival notes its 54th anniversary. This annual affair dates back to the summer of 1938, when the Rev. Jerome Zienta, a Polish priest, was pastor. The first sausage dinner was held in a open pasture north of White Deer and large black iron cauldrons were used to steam the sausage. The rest of the food was prepared by the women in their homes. The meal was served on plank tables. Approximately 150 people were served. Today more than 2,000 persons are served in a modern parish hall equipped with a modern kitchen and barbecue pit.

Some 5,000 pounds of Polish links will be made and served barbecued or steamed in the traditional Polish way. It will be accompanied by crisp slaw, red beans, potato salad and apricots. Take-out dinners, as well as, sausage-to-go will be available.

The proceeds from the festival are used for parish needs and charitable purposes.

A video, "A Place Called Home - Polish Settlement On The Plains," will premiere at the Polish sausage dinner on Sunday, November 1, 1992. The Meadows Foundation of Dallas awarded a grant of \$20,000 to the Square House Museum of Carson County to produce a video documenting the history of Polish settlement in the Texas Panhandle. Technical production is being provided by Berneta Communications of Amarillo; Jo Stewart Randal is Executive Producer and Bill Rhew is the photographer. This is the 23rd video produced by the Square House Museum dealing with the history and

economic development of the Texas Panhandle.

The video begins with the arrival of the Poles in Texas in 1854, the establishment of Panna Maria near San Antonio and the settlement of the Polish families in White Deer in 1909. The South Texans were soon joined by Poles from Nebraska, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Washington. The video uses old photographs to supplement interviews with nine descendants of the original settlers. The Polish community has not only kept its history alive, but has retained many of the old customs.

# Brand Selected Sheriff Monday

Business Administration. He has served the city of Panhandle as City Judge and as a city policeman before serving in the legal research department with a law firm in Amarillo prior to assuming a position in the Carson County Sheriff's Department.

He will be paid an annual salary of \$26,795.

The newly appointed sheriff says he wants to bring the department together in order to take care of the people throughout Carson County. Brand said, "I want the people of Carson County to feel secure living here and for them to know we are here to serve them so they

will have confidence in us."

As far as the departments' personnel is concerned, no changes will be made until the new administration has had a chance to adapt to the change. "I want to analyze

each town's need from the people and to allocate our resources of cars and deputies to best serve the county. At this time, we have four deputies plus the sheriff."

Brand feels Carson County is in a centralized location for drug trafficking, lying between Gray County and Potter County and

located on I-40 and Highway 60. Also, because of I-40 and Highway 60 he feels Carson County sees more than its share of transients moving through the county. Sheriff Brand says his department will be patrolling rural areas in an attempt to cut down on rural thefts. Again, people from outside the county are

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the largest concerns for the sheriff's department.

When asked if he intended to run for sheriff in the next election in two years, Brand said, "I would not have asked for this special appointment if I did not intend to run for election."

Any student who fails to comply with that code or established rules of conduct while on school transportation may be denied transportation services and shall be subject to disciplinary action.

The following rules shall apply to student conduct on school transportation:

1. Passengers shall follow the driver's directions at all times.
2. Passengers shall board and leave the bus in an orderly manner at the

designated bus stop nearest their home.

3. Passengers shall not stand if there is a seat available. If a passenger must ride standing, the passenger shall face the front and hold on to the seat rails.

4. Passengers shall keep books, band instrument cases, feet, and other objects out of the aisle of the bus.

5. Passengers shall not deface the bus and/or its equipment.

6. Passengers shall not extend head, hands, arms, or legs out of the window nor hold any object out of the window now throw

objects within or out of the bus.

7. Passengers shall not smoke or use any form of tobacco.

8. Usual classroom conduct shall be observed. Unruly conduct, including the use of obscene language, will subject the passenger to disciplinary action.

9. Upon leaving the bus, the passenger will wait for the driver's signal before crossing in front of the bus.

## Carson Co Sheriff's Report

Seven persons were booked into the Carson County Jail during the past week. Four were arrested for D.W.I., one for Theft of Gasoline, one for Burglary (Warrants) and one for Warrants (Potter County).

An Amarillo man was sentenced to twenty years in the Texas Department of Corrections on a charge of Burglary of a Habitation. This stemmed from his arrest in Potter County when he was found to be in possession of a number of firearms which had been stolen from a residence in the Carson County portion of Fritch. Another Amarillo man was previously sentenced in this matter and is currently confined in a TDC unit.

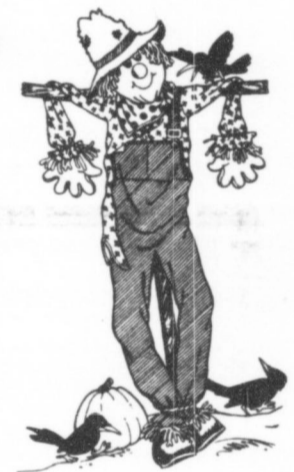

In the other, a television news van was asked to move from a prohibited area. All parties complied and no other problems were reported.

Deputies investigated a report of a suspicious person in the vicinity of I-40 and Highway 207. The subject was checked for any outstanding warrants and instructed to leave the area.

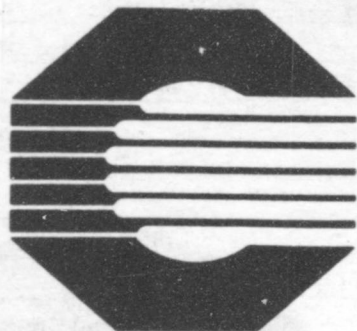
These teams are transporting a commemorative plaque in relay fashion across the nation on Route 66 from its origin in Chicago to its end in Santa Monica. At each state the plaque is transferred to a vehicle driven by a member of that states association. Each state association is responsible for informative stops, entertainment and leading the team across the state on as much of the original highway as is still in existence.

When this effort was planned, it was thought that this was the first such plaque relay involving Route 66. However, it was learned from the Oklahoma Historic Route 66 Association that from October 11, 1952 to November 11, 1952 there was another relay which was held by the National Route 66 Association. This relay was co-sponsored by Warner Brothers Studios, Ford Motor Company and the Will Rogers Foundation. At that time a bronze plaque was placed in each of the seven states that this highway crosses: Illinois, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California. There are only two of these plaques known to exist today. One in the Will Rogers Museum in Claremore, Oklahoma and the one that is in Santa Monica, California. An effort is underway to find the remaining plaques.

The team was met in Shamrock and escorted to Amarillo by six cars of the Texas Association. While in Amarillo the team was treated to a reception given by George and Melba Rook who own Route 66 Antiques at 3808 West Sixty Street in Amarillo. The team will stay in the Amarillo Area till they leave at 9:00 a.m. on October 26 to arrive in Tucumcari, New Mexico later that day to visit historic sights and businesses located in that city.

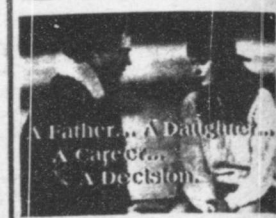

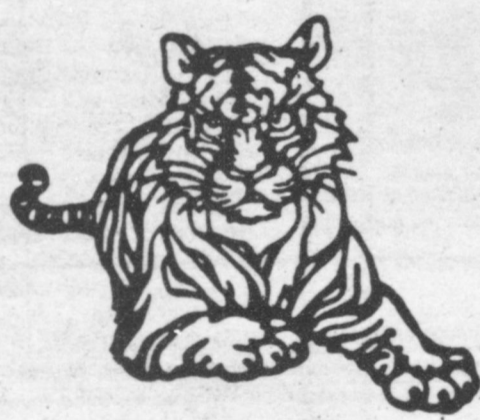

Thus, during these political debates, I suggest we keep a sense of humor, not pay heed to the doomsday journalists, for the sun will rise tomorrow and one day we will again have challenging goals such as settling the ocean floor and colonizing Mars.

"It is always a surprise to some people to learn that it is a Class C misdemeanor under state law for an employer to deny an employee time off to vote," Nabers said. "Likewise, it is against the law to dock an employee's pay or threaten to reduce wages for taking time off to vote."
