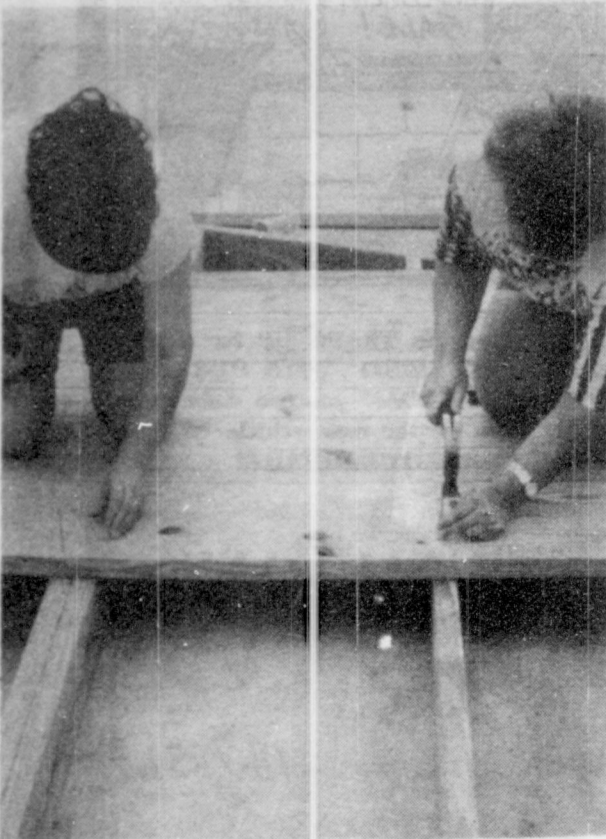

Company's coming! The whole town of Groom is putting their best foot forward to get the city cleaned-up and fixed-up as they prepare for Groom Day.

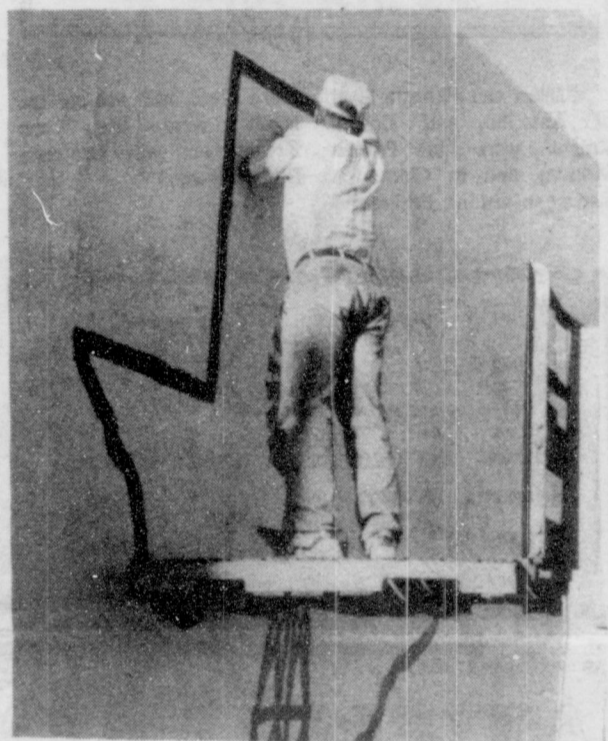

This year's latest additions are the Flat Rock Hunt; the Punt, Pass & Kick competition; a Night of Music; a Fun Walk; Bingo; Teen's Dance; and a Chili Cook-Off.

The "Flat Rock Hunt" is designed to satisfy the child in all of us. Special rocks have been hidden around the Groom Day activity sites. They are marked with special symbols and/or phrases. Finders will need to bring them to the Cow Patty Bingo site at the school beginning at 4:00 pm to redeem their prizes.

The Punt, Pass & Kick contest will follow the little kids Track Meet on the football field, Friday night. The event is for boys and girls from 6th to 9th grade. Ribbons will be awarded.

Other Friday night entertainment will include "A Night of Music" sponsored by the Sorority. Alpha Mu Xi is accepting donations to pay for the

Saturday morning will hold a special event for walking enthusiasts. A two mile Fun Walk has been scheduled. The course is designed as a casual stroll around Groom. Fields Awarded Scholarship

Thirty-four West Texas A&M University students will receive Mesa Scholarships for Academic Excellence. The awards for the 1996-97 school year total \$25,500.

Established from funds provided by Mesa Limited Partnership, the scholarships were first awarded in 1987 and are given to reward and recognize freshmen and continuing undergraduate students who promote and exemplify high academic standards.

A composite score of 23 or higher on the ACT or a combined verbal and math score of 950 or higher on the SAT and a top-quarter class ranking are required for all entering freshmen selected as scholarship

recipients. A minimum grade point average of 3.40 on all college work attempted is required of continuing students.

Each applicant must also submit two letters of reference and a formal application.

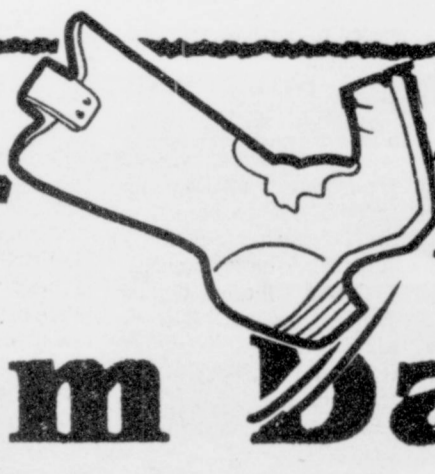

Groom Ambulance Service Wins Prudential Grant

Groom Ambulance Service was honored, along with White Deer's Service, Saturday during the annual Panhandle Emergency Medical Services picnic.

Each of the services received a heart defibrillator thanks to a matching grant from the Prudential Helping Hearts Program.

The Ambulance Service raised \$2,500. to qualify for the nationwide grant program. Jay Lamb, president of the service, accepted for the team of Emergency Technicians.

According to the

American Heart Association, over 250,000 Americans who suffer cardiac arrest each year die before reaching a hospital. Use of a defibrillator by rescue workers in the field can more than double the chance of survival for a victim. Defibrillators revive victims of cardiac arrest. Thousands of Texas residents, especially those located in suburban and rural areas, do not have access to this equipment because volunteer EMS units do not have the funds

needed to purchase this vital equipment.

The Prudential started the Helping Hearts Program to help volunteer emergency

squads across the country purchase this equipment and has pledged \$2 million to volunteers across the country.

Carmen Thurston

MIDLAND - Carmen Thurston, 86, of Midland, a former Pampa resident, died Wednesday, July 17, 1996. Services were in St. Mark's United Methodist Church in Midland with the Rev. William McReynolds officiating. Burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park under the direction of Ellis Funeral Home of Midland.

Mrs. Thurston was born September 27, 1909, at Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico, to Frederick and Maria Libby. She was raised in Melrose, Mass., Puerto Rico and Panama. She received a degree in nursing from Deaconess Hospital School of Nursing at Melrose in 1929 and worked as a registered nurse for Deaconess Hospital, moving to Lubbock in 1932. She then moved from Lubbock to Pampa. She married Paul Thurston on February 18, 1942, at Groom; he died October 18, 1995. During World War II, she returned to Lubbock and worked at St. Mary's Hospital. Following the war, the family reunited in Pampa. The couple lived in Villie Platte and Franklin, La., returning to San Angelo in 1961. They moved to Midland in 1966. She worked for Midland Memorial Hospital for several years and was an active member and volunteer at St. Mark's United Methodist Church.

She was preceded in death by an infant son, Bill John Thurston; two sisters, Mercedes Collins and Beatrice Stehli; and three brothers, Raymond Libby, Charlie Libby and Edwin Libby.

Survivors include two daughters and sons-in-law, Carmen Estela and J. Stewart Martin of Midland and Jo Ann and Tom Oren of San Angelo; a son and daughter-in-law, Edwin Kenneth and Phyllis Thurston of San Angelo; two sisters, Maria Clarisa Carter of Escondido, Calif., and Stella Irene Pickens of

Weslaco; two brothers, Henry Cestero Libby of Midland and Frederick E. Libby Jr. of Mexico; eight grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

Sheriff's Report

 Chief Deputy Lovell Kennard received his Advanced Certificate from the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education last week. Chief Kennard has been a member of the Carson County Sheriff's Department for the past sixteen years. He was previously employed as a police officer in Spearman.

Our deputies were called to assist the Panhandle Police Department after a suspect escaped from their custody. Sgt. Ray "You can run, but you can't hide" Davis apprehended the subject in Panhandle and he was incarcerated without further incident.

Deputy Jeff Oldham is investigating apparent arson damage to a motor vehicle. The vehicle was east of Panhandle on Highway 293 and was declared as a total loss due to the fire damage. Deputy Oldham had to pursue the "victim" in Pampa to get him to answer questions relating to the incident. The man was finally stopped with the

assistance of the Pampa Police Department. Information received by Deputy Oldham from the owner indicates that the vehicle was reported as stolen in Pampa in late June. The vehicle was found in Carson County on July 14. Deputy Oldham is pursuing information on two suspects in this case.

Deputy Fred Herrick is also investigating a possible vehicle arson which was reported in White Deer. This vehicle was parked in a yard in a residential area and was not in operating condition.

Our officers and White Deer City Marshal Tam Terry assisted the Groom Ambulance when a child was reported to have been injured at the Groom baseball field Friday evening.

A shotgun stolen in a residential burglary in the Panhandle area back in 1988 was recovered this week at a pawn shop in Missouri. We are working with Missouri authorities to trace the person who pawned or sold the weapon.

The stolen weapon had been entered into the NCIC system (National Crime Information Center) and it showed that the weapon was stolen when the serial number was checked. If a weapon is stolen from your home or vehicle we can enter the information and, hopefully, locate your weapon if you have the make, model and serial number recorded. This

applies not only to weapons, but any other item that can be traced with a serial number. Without specific information to identify your property, we are unable to make the computer entries and limited in our ability to return your property to you. The NCIC computer is nationwide and is accessible by nearly every law enforcement agency in the United States.

Chief Deputy Lovell Kennard secured a written confession from a Pampa man who is alleged to have stolen a pickup from the Skellytown area. The vehicle was recovered in Pampa when it was found abandoned by the Pampa Police Department. The thief had attempted to disguise the vehicle by painting it, but a computer check of the license plates verified that it was stolen.

Our department was called to check on a vehicle which was travelling toward Panhandle on U.S. 60 Saturday morning. An out-of-county peace officer had been following the vehicle while it had been swerving in and out of lanes while the male and female inside were engaged in a physical altercation. Our officers caught up with the vehicle between White Deer and Panhandle. Neither person

wished to prosecute the other so both were released to continue their childish behavior for the rest of their trip.

Our officers were also called to investigate a report in Panhandle which involved a dog attempting to bite a boy who was mowing a lawn. The dog had ran from the complainant's yard and was run over by another resident. We located the dog in a yard about half a block away from the complainant's residence and turned the animal over to Panhandle's Animal Control officer Ben Estep. The dog had suffered injuries to a back leg when it was run over. The boy in the yard suffered no injuries from the dog. The dog's owner was determined and attempts were made to contact him and make him aware of the injury to his pet.

Income Schedule Set For Reduced Meals For McLean Schools

The McLean School Cafeteria will serve nutritious meals each day. Students in grades K-5 may buy lunch for \$1.75 and grades 6-12 for \$2.00. Breakfast is 50 cents for all grades. Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on

the income scale are eligible for either free or reduced price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. Meals may be paid for in advance. Charges will not be allowed without the consent of the parents and all charges must be paid weekly.

Household size and income criteria to be used in determining eligibility are included in the chart.

Application forms are being sent home with a letter to parents and guardians. To apply for free or reduced meals, households should fill out

the application and return it to the school at the earliest date possible.

This could be developed into an improvement over the highly advertised Club device.

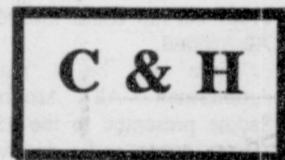

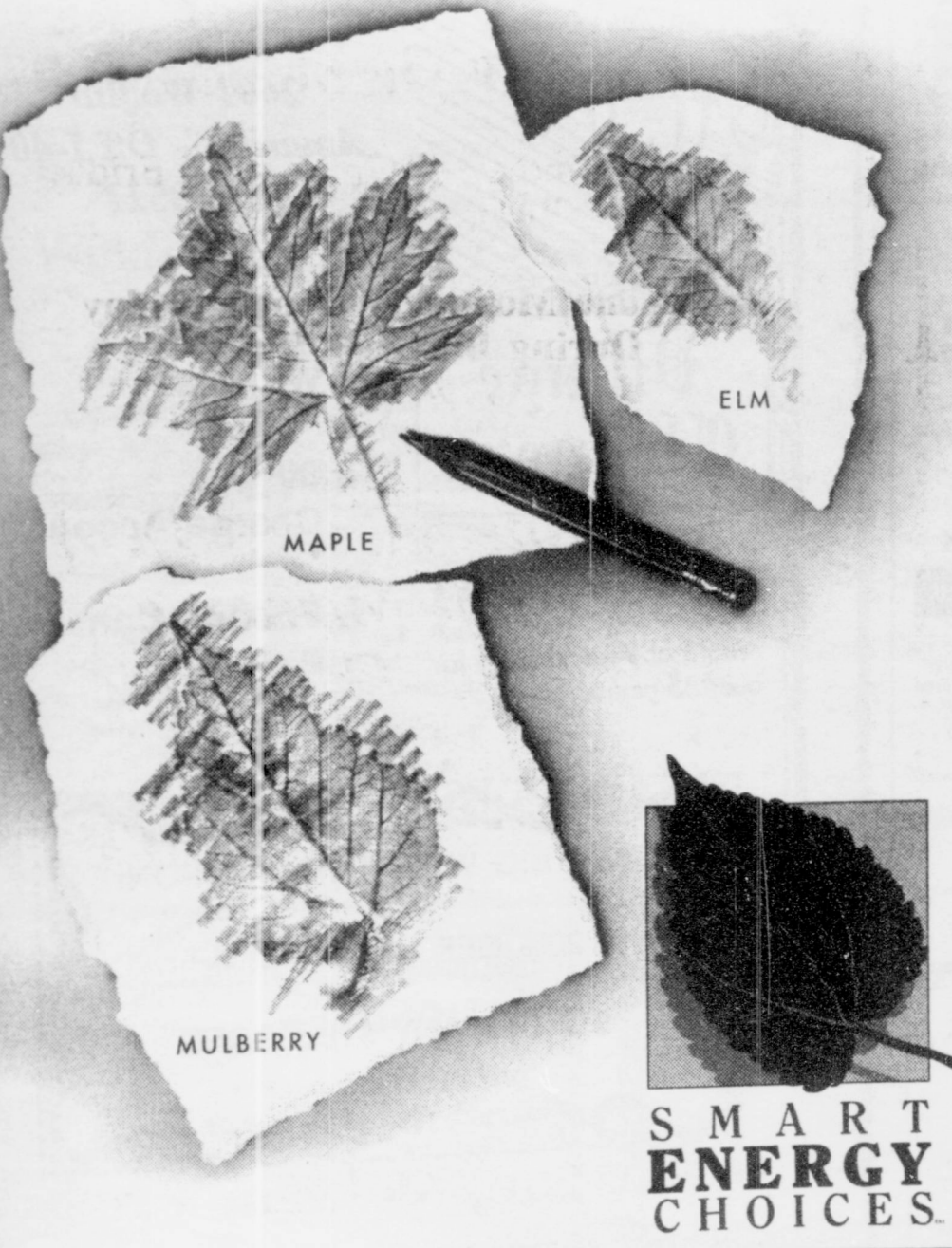


