Carson County Voters To Elect Tax Collector

Tension mounts as candidates for public offices begin their last hard push to gain votes in this year's general election scheduled for Tuesday, November 6. It seems to have been a record year for mud slinging as candidates for the office of Governor set the tone for the campaign early in the race. Voters have been saturated by negative T.V. commercials, newspaper advertisements and radio spots. Most voters are very familiar with what

candidates have done wrong, but do we know what they did right?

Luckily this kind of yellow campaigning hasn't filtered down to our local candidates. Voters must choose between Democratic candidate, Donita Herber and write in candidate Roselyn Watson, for Carson County Tax Assessor-Collector, unexpired term. All other local offices are either uncontested or were decided in preliminary races.

Many state wide decisions will be made on Tuesday. The race for Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller, State Treasurer, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, many other judges for supreme court and court of criminal appeals in different precincts.

For offices of the United States we will be voting for a politician for United States Senator, and U.S. Representative.

Local elections will be held at the various location. Precinct Number 1-Panhandle (Carson Co. Library), Prec. No. 2-Liberty (Jimmy Labus residence), Prec. 2-Panhandle (High School), Prec. 4 White Deer (High School), Prec. 5 Conway (Community Club-house), Prec. 6 Groom (Catholic School), Prec. 7 Skellytown (School) and Prec. 8 (Alwin Jones residence) Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

Warning Goes Out To Unlicensed Drivers

Local Department of Public Safety Officer Greg Eatmon issues a warning to unlicensed drivers. Due to enormous amount of complaints levied by citizens of Groom concerning

underaged drivers, strict enforcement of the drivers licencing laws by the Carson County Sheriffs Department and local DPS Officers will be upheld from this point forward.

Penalties under the law include (a) Drivers under the age of 14 will be taken immediately before magistrate and held under juvenile laws until released to parent or guardian at which time parent and guardian will be cited for permitting a minor

to drive. A class C misdemeanor is punishable by a \$200.00 fine. (b) Ages 14-15 will be cited at the scene for not holding a valid drivers license which is a class C misdemeanor which is punishable by a \$200.00 fine. (c) Violation of a drivers license restriction (driving on a instruction permit with no licensed driver age 18 or above) will result in automatic suspension of their permit and driver will not be eligible for a drivers license until he or she is 18 years old.

Local law enforcement officers remind young drivers and parents that you are warned. These laws are for the driver and pedestrian safety.

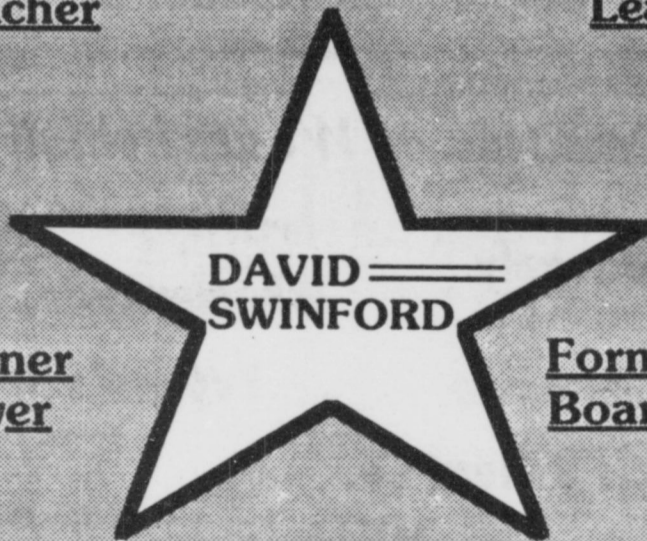

Six Man 1-1A Standings

McLean stands on top at this time with a 3-0 district standing. The team has scored 136 points and have allowed opponents to score 28. Overall this season the Tigers have a 8-0 record and have scored 354 points and opponents have been kept to a low 121 points.

Higgins comes in second with a 2-1 district standing. Higgins has scored 132 points in district play and opponents have scored 129. In all season Higgins has a record of 3-4 and has scored 243 points and opponents have scored 303.

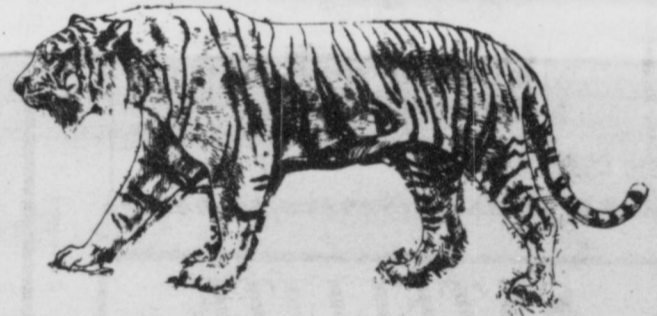

County Commissioners Approved Resolution

Carson County Commissioners approved a resolution concerning the purchase of items of \$15,000 or less during their Monday, October 22, meeting. House Bill 1434 and House Bill 1671 add to and amend provision in Chapter 262 and

262.011 (a) of the local code. This gives the County authority to purchase items with a value of \$15,000 or less without entering into the bidding process otherwise required by law, if it is the best interest of the County.

Commissioners also gave permission for Precinct 3 to advertise for bids to purchase a motorgrader.

Another resolution was approved concerning the purchase of products and services produced and offered by the blind and handicapped citizens of

Texas. The resolution says that Carson County is authorized to purchase from TIBH's published catalog when items meet County specifications and the price does not exceed current established prices.

A discussion was held on

the Texas Local Government Records Act which requires each elective County office to establish a records

Employed As Sheriff's Deputy

Parmer County's four school systems will participate in the D.A.R.E. project, a joint project of local law enforcement agencies and local school districts and communities to prevent substance abuse in children and youth.

Karen Britten has been employed as a sheriff's deputy for Parmer County, and will be the instructor for Project D.A.R.E. in Parmer County schools.

The program emphasis for Project D.A.R.E. is to help students recognize and resist the many subtle pressures that influence them to experiment with alcohol and drugs. In addition, program strategies are planned to focus on feelings relating to self-esteem, interpersonal and communicative skills, decision making, and positive altern-

atives to drug abuse.

In order to teach the D.A.R.E. Course, a person has to be a licensed, certified police officer. Ms. Britten, a native of Groom, attended Texas Tech University and Amarillo College, and then enrolled in the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy, graduating in May of 1988.

She was serving as assistant director of security at the Excel Corp. plant at Friona prior to accepting the county's D.A.R.E. assignment.

The program is designed for grades five and six, and has had many positive results in those schools in which it has been implemented.

Teachers and principals report fewer in-classroom disciplinary problems, decreased absenteeism and

tardiness, and a higher respect for authority. Also, there has been a marked decrease in school vandalism in may of the participating schools.

Ms. Britten's instruction also will focus on resisting peer pressure, building self-esteem, managing stress without taking drugs, alternatives to drug abuse, and taking a strand.

The classes will be 45 minutes in length, and will be part of the school curriculum. Various classes will devote their class time to the D.A.R.E. project.

The project is to be funded through a joint effort of Parmer County, the City of Friona, and the school districts of Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie.

In addition, a grant for the program has been received from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC).

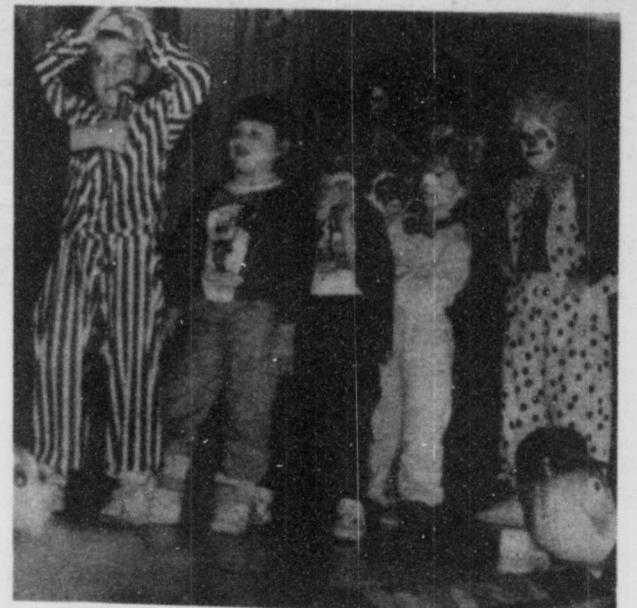

The Tigers will travel to Follett Friday night for another district battle, and will conclude the regular season the following Friday night here against Higgins.

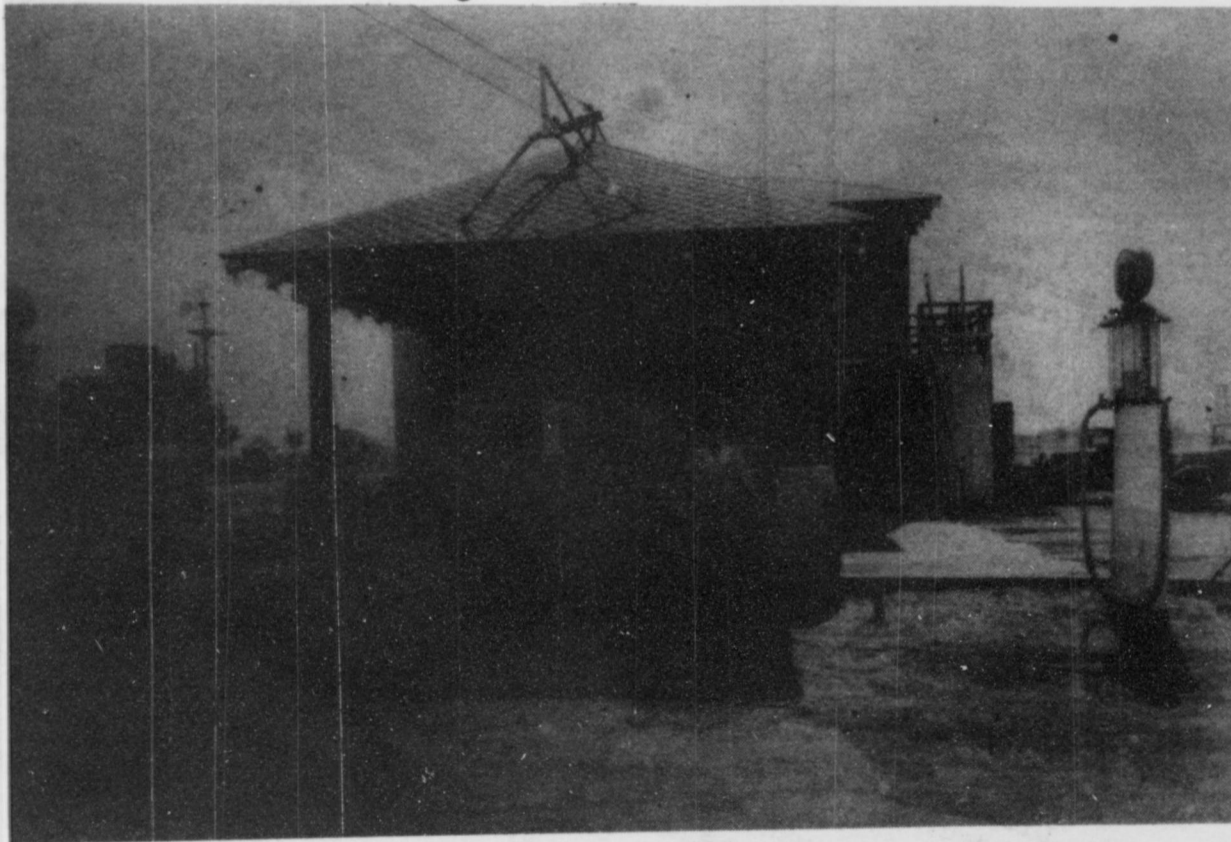
McLean To Be Home Of Barbed Wire Museum

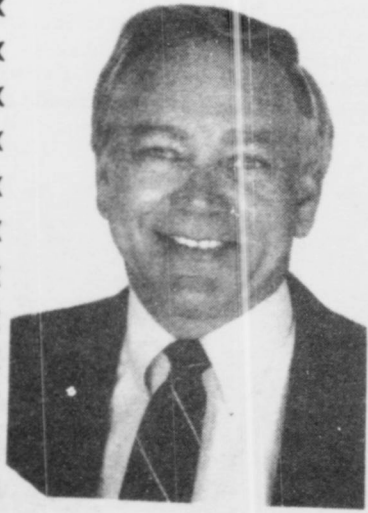

Letter To Editor

I was raised in McLean, Texas most of my life and remember in 1950, my father, Sherman Crockett owned the Gulf service station on old Highway 66 across from the land that was later to be the brassiere factory. One day I was working in the station, I was only 14 years old at the time. Dad was in the back room, where no one could tell he was there, doing the books. I could see a 1949 Chevrolet coming from the East at a real slow pace. It would go for about a block real slow then pull over and the driver would look at his watch, then he would slowly drive a little farther. I wondered what he was doing so I would look at the clock in the station every time he stopped and looked at his watch. Dad said he could change it but it would take all he had. Why didn't I run up to the bank two blocks away, and see if Clifford (Clifford Allison) would let me in and change it for me.

When I came out and started out the door the man said "Where are you going with my money, if you cannot change it give it back and I will go on."

I told him I was going to the bank to get some change. Well the man

almost had a fit. He said "It's after three and all the banks are closed." About that time dad came out and told him that the banker knew me and would let me in. The man started trying to say maybe he did have something a little smaller but dad said go on. I ran to the bank and sure enough Clifford was still there and let me in.

When I told what had happened he gave one hundred, one dollar bills. When I got back to the station and counted the man ninety-eight one dollar bills, I thought he was going to have a heart attach he was so mad.

Dad told me later that he probably had used the same bill all the was across the country like that and hadn't had to pay for gas. Because no one had the change expecially when there were

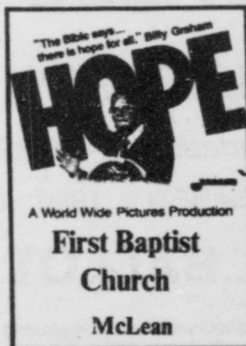

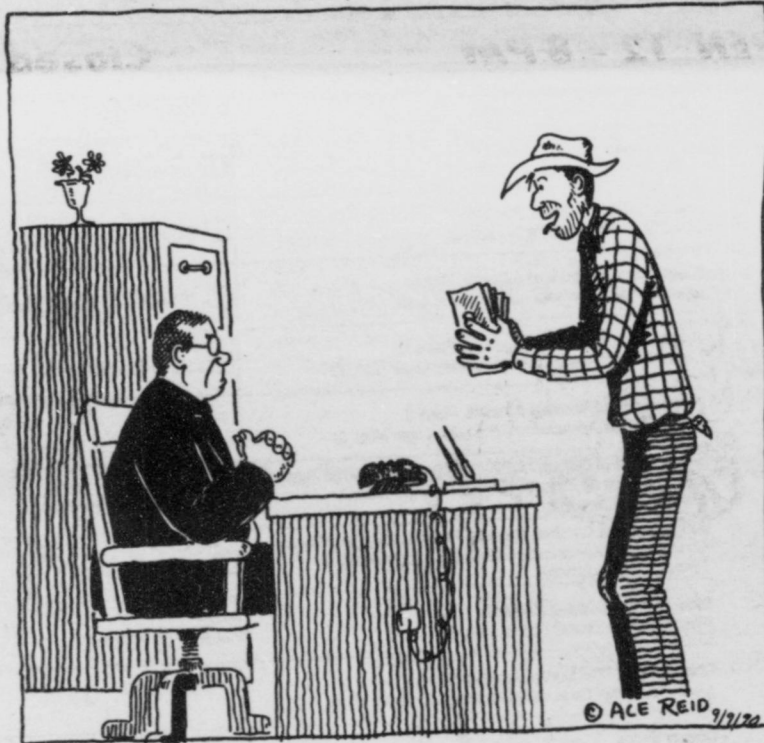

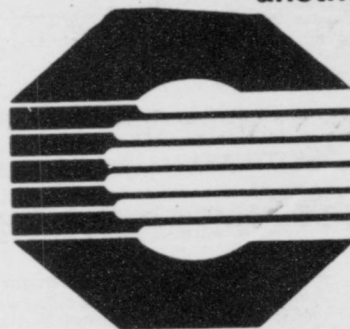

A Treasure Trove Of Information
By Claire Kuehn, Archivist/Librarian

Housed in the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum's Research Center, a very special library and archive, are collections of books, manuscripts, interviews, maps, photographs, periodicals and much more. Researchers requiring historical documentation discover here a virtual treasure trove of information on the development of the Texas Panhandle and the Southwest from prehistoric times to the present. These researchers range in age from grade school children to senior citizens and in levels of interest from class assignment to scholarly research. Inquiries come from the far corners of the globe, from Europe, Asia, Africa, (would you believe Zimbabwe?) and, of course, from all over the United States.

Of ever increasing public interest are the collections of photographs and film footage in the center. With the development of the videotape recording industry comes requests for early ranching and oil related scenes, from both still photographs and motion pictures. Centennial celebrations in the Panhandle, such as those in Potter, Randall, and Swisher Counties generated the need for early images, useful for reproduction in special editions of newspapers, exhibits, county and church histories and school projects. Copies of photographs, selected from over 250,000 on file, have appeared as illustrations in books and magazine articles, others decorate the walls of homes and businesses. Artists have secured working copies in order to achieve desired images for painting and illustrations.

Of great value to historic preservationists are early photographs of homes and buildings in the Panhandle found in the Guy A. Carlander and John E. Hill Collections, for example. These are, at times, supplemented by holding of architectural drawings in the Carlander and E.F. Rittenberry collections.

The center is currently seeking photographs of people and places along old U.S. Route 66 in the Texas Panhandle for a proposed museum exhibit in 1991. Anyone having photos along the route from the late 1920's through the early 1960's is encouraged to call (806) 656-2261 or write to the Research Center, Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, Box 967, W.T. Station, Canyon, Tx. 79016. Needed are scenes from Shamrock, McLean, Alanreed, Groom, Conway, Bushland, Wildorado, Vega, and Adrian. Amarillo is well-represented in the archive, however, there may still be photos in private hands that would be invaluable in the interpretation of "America's Main Street" through the Panhandle. If the owners of the photos are unwilling to part with them, the center would like to borrow them and have copies made.
