THC To Recognize Historical Cemeteries

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) has created a new medallion marker to recognize designated Historic Texas Cemeteries. The medallion is a 10-inch cast aluminum marker with the words "Historic Texas Cemetery - Texas Historical Commission" encircling a central star, a rose and a cypress branch. It is available only to cemeteries with the Historic Texas Cemetery designation, which requires that they be at least 50 years old and deemed worthy of preservation for historical associations. An application process is

used to determine eligibility for the designation. "The designation and the medallion are tools that will increase public awareness of these important cultural resources," said Larry Oaks, executive director of the THC. "Awareness and education are among the best ways to guarantee the preservation of a cemetery." The Historic Texas Cemetery Program was developed to address the destruction of historic cemeteries and the illegal removal of cemetery fixtures. Threats to historic cemeteries include

urban expansion and development, vandalism, grazing animals and long-term deterioration from forces of nature, such as weathering and

The McLean Tigers gave Groom a run for their money last week in Groom.

"I have to hand it to McLean," commented a senior Groom Tiger, "they (McLean) made us play tough football throughout the entire game."

The game saw the Tigers gaining 185 yards on 37 carries. McLean earned 11 first downs to Groom's 12. Three passes were completed of eight thrown for a total of 61 yards.

Groom got the jump on the game, doing all the scoring the first half. The Tigers had trouble stopping Groom's passing game, with the "Red and Black" completing a 59 yard pass, a 25 yard pass and a 9 yard pass.

McLean really came alive in the second half with the offense putting Brad Sawyer in scoring position on a 4 yard run. Adam Johnson kicked the point after to get McLean on the scoreboard with 8 points.

Groom came back with an T.D. from the 18 yard

line. Gabriel Vega scored a touchdown from the 12 yard line and Adam Johnson was successful on the point after attempt to bring the score to 28-16.

Groom got lucky twice in the fourth quarter and scored on two rushes, from the 12 and 42 yard lines.

Gabriel Vega came through again on an 8 yard run late in the fourth quarter.

The final score was 44-22. Personal stats are as follows:

Chris Sparling passed for 2 and 23 yards on 4 attempts. He had 24 yards rushing on 4 carries.

Brad Sawyer gained 38 yards passing on 1 of 4 completions. He had an impressive 110 yards rushing on 16 carries and 1 touchdown.

Gabriel Vega carried the ball 16 times for and awesome 96 yards and 2 touchdowns.

Randy Floyd carried the ball for 3 yards and gained 17 yards

receiving.

Adam Johnson gained 38 yards receiving and kicked two successful P.A.T.'s for 4 points.

"We need to cut down on mistakes and play four complete quarters. Turnovers have been killing us this season," stated Coach Burch, "With district starting this week, we need to be more focused. The line blocked well."

McLean will open district competition this coming Friday by playing Lefors, there, October 13 at 7:30 p.m. Get out and support the Tigers as they begin their bid for the District Championship.

Wildfires Destroy Hundreds Of Homes

Your home could be in the line of fire! The following precautions will help to protect your home.

Use only fire resistant materials on the exterior of your home, whether roof, siding, decking or trim.

Protect interiors from sparks and embers by boxing in eaves, screening vents, and underpinning or screening beneath porches, decks and the house itself. Do not use fiberglass screening. Chimneys should

extend above the roof line and be topped with a 1/2 inch mesh spark arrester.

Keep roofs free of debris. Leaves, pine straw, moss and twigs that collect on the roof and in gutters invite disaster.

Safely dispose of stove, fireplace and grill ashes. First, place them in a metal bucket, soak with water, and then bury them in mineral soil.

Never soak flammable material like firewood or lumber under or near your home. Keep it at least 100 feet away from the house, but never uphill because burning material will roll.

Faucets should be located on each side of your home and near any outbuildings. Install them, too, in areas of the yard where fire hazards exist, or where wildfire could enter your yard. Have a coiled hose attached to faucets on

opposite sides of your home.

Narrow, steep or winding roads and driveways can obstruct the movement of firefighting equipment.

Make sure firefighters can identify the entrance to your home by marking the drive with a sturdy, easy to read sign that gives your name and address.

For your personal safety, plan an alternate escape route in case primary access is blocked by fire or smoke.

Protecting your home from wildfire starts with the trees around it. Pay particular attention to the trees within 100 feet of your house:

The wider the spacing between trees, the better.

Hardwood trees tend to be less flammable than conifers.

Rid trees of moss, abandoned nests, dead limbs and other flammable material.

Remove limbs within 15-20 feet of the ground.

Remove limbs that extend over your roof, or those directly above or within 15 feet laterally of a chimney.

Your yard should serve as a firebreak:

If you have a grass lawn that is dormant in winter, mow it closely after all growth has stopped and bag the cuttings.

Rake all leaves or needles that are within 30 feet of a structure.

Use bedding mulch or straw sparingly close to buildings.

Certain popular shrubs are highly flammable. Select the least flammable shrubs that will achieve the desired effect in your landscaping.

"Historic cemeteries serve as directories of early residents and reflect the cultural influences that helped shape our state's communities," Oaks said. "This program brings attention to these communities and

recognizes the importance of their preservation."

Previously, cemeteries of historical importance were recognized with Official Texas Historical Subject Markers. In the future, the THC will honor these cemeteries with the new Historic Texas Cemetery medallion and optional interpretive plaques in place of a subject marker.

2000 Homecoming Royalty Selected By GHS Student Body

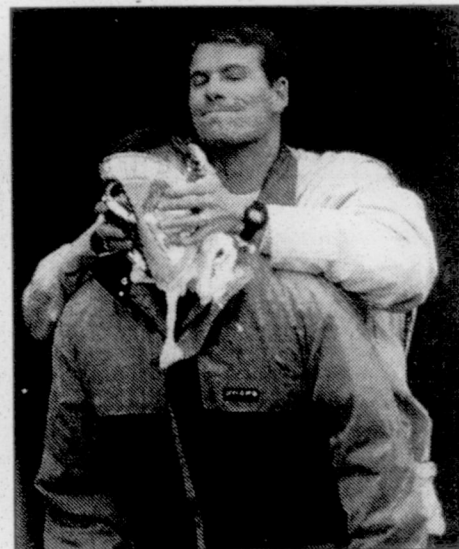
In special ceremonies held on Thursday evening, the homecoming queen and king were crowned for the new millennium.

West Texas Gas Warns Of Winter Gas Price Increase

West Texas Gas is warning customers of dramatic increases in natural gas prices over last year in a letter mailed to all their accounts last month.

The letter cites the upturn in the cost of gas supply to the increase in demand of natural gas used for electrical generation and lower anticipated gas storage inventories across the country.

According to the letter WTG's residential and small commercial customers are charged according to rate schedules that have been approved by state regulatory agencies or municipal authorities (e.g. Texas Railroad Commission, Oklahoma Corporation Commission, or city councils). These rate schedules include a price adjustment clause that fluctuates with WTG's cost of gas supplied to its customers. This adjustment clause, which is routinely audited by regulators, insures that

WTG collects no more than its cost of gas and the approved cost of service from its customers.

According to the letter "WTG is doing everything it can to control the cost of gas that is supplied to its customers. Some gas future hedges have been put in place to lessen the effect of severe price spikes, and term agreements will be negotiated to insure gas supply to WTG pipeline systems."

This notice is not intended to alarm their customers, however they do feel responsible to inform their customers that natural gas costs for this upcoming winter could be more than \$2 dollars per Mcf higher than last year. This could result in bills from WTG being one-third higher than what customers have been accustomed to paying.

The Carson County
 Square House Museum in

The Groom Tigers celebrated their homecoming victory against McLean after winning 44 to 22 last week.

Dewayne Gray, Clay Ritter and Grant Weinheimer led Groom's offense to victory with 181 yards rushing and 168 yards passing for the team totals. Groom earned 12 first downs to McLean's 11, 25 carries for the 181 yards to McLean's 38 for 169 yards.

McLean connected on only 3 of 8 passes for 59 yards and two interceptions. The Groom Tigers completed 8 of 14 passes for 168 yards. McLean fumbled the ball six times, recovering 3 while

Groom fumbled twice and recovered once.

Clay Ritter scored the first touchdown in the first quarter on a 59 yard pass from Grant Weinheimer.

Clay Britten gained 21 yards for Groom on a kickoff return and recovered two fumbles. He completed 7 unassisted tackles.

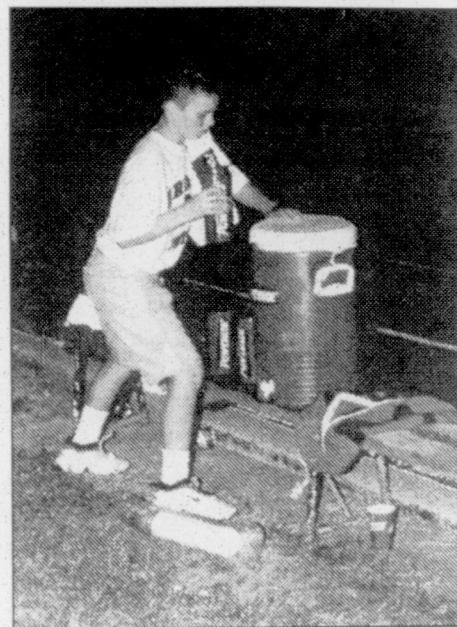
Doug Fields earned defensive kudos with a quarterback sack and 6 unassisted tackles.

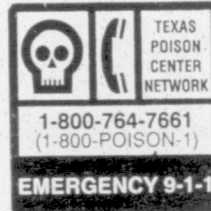

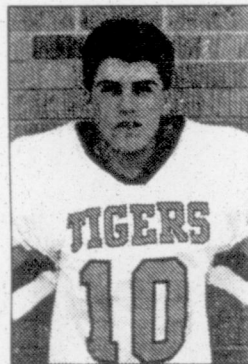
