## **Appraiser Says Taxpayers Can Expect Doubling Or Even Tripling Of Taxes**

Carson County Appraisal
District will be represented
at the Feb. 18 meeting of the
Texas Railroad Commission
(RRC) in Austin. The Board
of Directors made that decision during an emergency
session last Thursday.
Chief Appraiser, Diane
Lavake explained that the
CCAD is not trying to take

Chief Appraiser, Diane Lavake explained that the CCAD is not trying to take issue with either the major or independent oil producers, but is rather trying to protect the interest of the taxpayer.

"Rulings thus far approved by the RRC have already done away with half of the values taxed on minerals in the district," she said. By going to Austin, we hope to

the district," she said. By going to Austin, we hope to protect the taxpayers who can already expect their tax bills to double, "if they're lucky" and the cost could even triple.

The CCAD plans to have evidence presented to the RRC concerning the effects of recent rulings on the tax base in the District. The County of Carson and the

school districts in Groom, Panhandle and White Deer are joined in the effort to make the RRC aware of the situation in the District.

According to figures from Mrs. Lavake's office, \$793 million dollars on the tax role come from mineral and industrial values and \$202 million in real estate. Of the 1793 million, \$352 million are related to oil and casing head gas values. This value is directly related to decisions made by the RRC.

Mrs. Lavake said that on the 18th, the RRC will be discussing two issues that directly affect producers in the District. Currently for every barrel of oil produced, some 500 MCF casing head gas is allowed. The RRC proposes to change that to 2,000 MCF per barrel of oil. Carson County wells are by and large marginal wells, she explained. "This move on the part of the RRC will close 95% of the producing wells in the District as it will make

## **Consumers Beware** Of Mail Fraud

"Congrtulations!" have your choice of one of the following of one of our promotional items: 1. TV Set; 2. Refrigerator; 3. AM/FM Stereo; 4. Motor Boat.

We must give you your choice, however, you must pay insurance, freight and processing fees. These costs processing fees. These costs are minimal—always under \$125.00, and if you are not 100 percent satisfied with your item, you may exchange it for any one of the other three."

How can you turn down an offer like that? Many people don't and each year those who just can't let a good deal that's too good to be true slip through their fingers, are bilked out of millions of dollars.

The offer mentioned abo is an excerpt from one of the most recent mail fraud schemes aimed at small business customers. Postal Inspectors in Los Angeles, CA, have initiated an investigation of a company operat-ing out of the Los Angeles area which is sending small business customers a card to complete with their choice of one of the above promotion-al items. The company then sends an envelope with a \$124.00 COD charge to the customer. The envelope is supposed to contain a certififor the promotional

If the customer decides not to pay the COD fee, the company sends letters stating the original card signed was a binding legal contract

to pay the fees, and if they are not paid, they will be charged an additional \$124.00, the matter will be turned over to the collections department, and the incident could result in legal proceedings and seriously affect the customer's credit

According to Inspector in charge E.C. Strader in Fort Worth, postal customers in Texas and Oklahoma, worried about having their credit rating ruined, have contacted his office to find out if they have to accept these COD items. They are advised that if they want to refuse the item, they can do so prior to paying the Posso prior to paying the Pos-tal Service for the package or tal Service for the package or letter. Once the customer pays the Postal Service for the article and opens it, no refund can be made. He added, customers should not feel intimidated into paying for items they do not want.

Over the years, the Postal Inspection Service has conducted extensive media campaigns to expose mail

campaigns to expose mail fraud and to alert people to its dangers; however, as consumers become more aware, fraudulent companies disguise their schemes to fit the more informed customer. Inspector Strader says the best defense is to learn to say No. He added, "If there is any question in your mind about a solicitation that sounds fraudulent, then check it out. It's an old saving but the truth is, that if it sounds too good to be true, then it probably is."




