

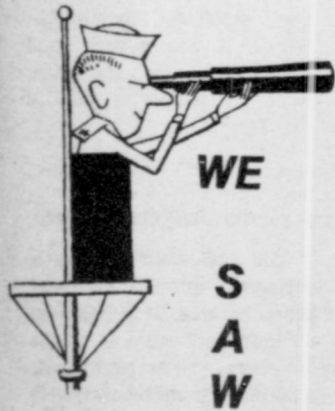

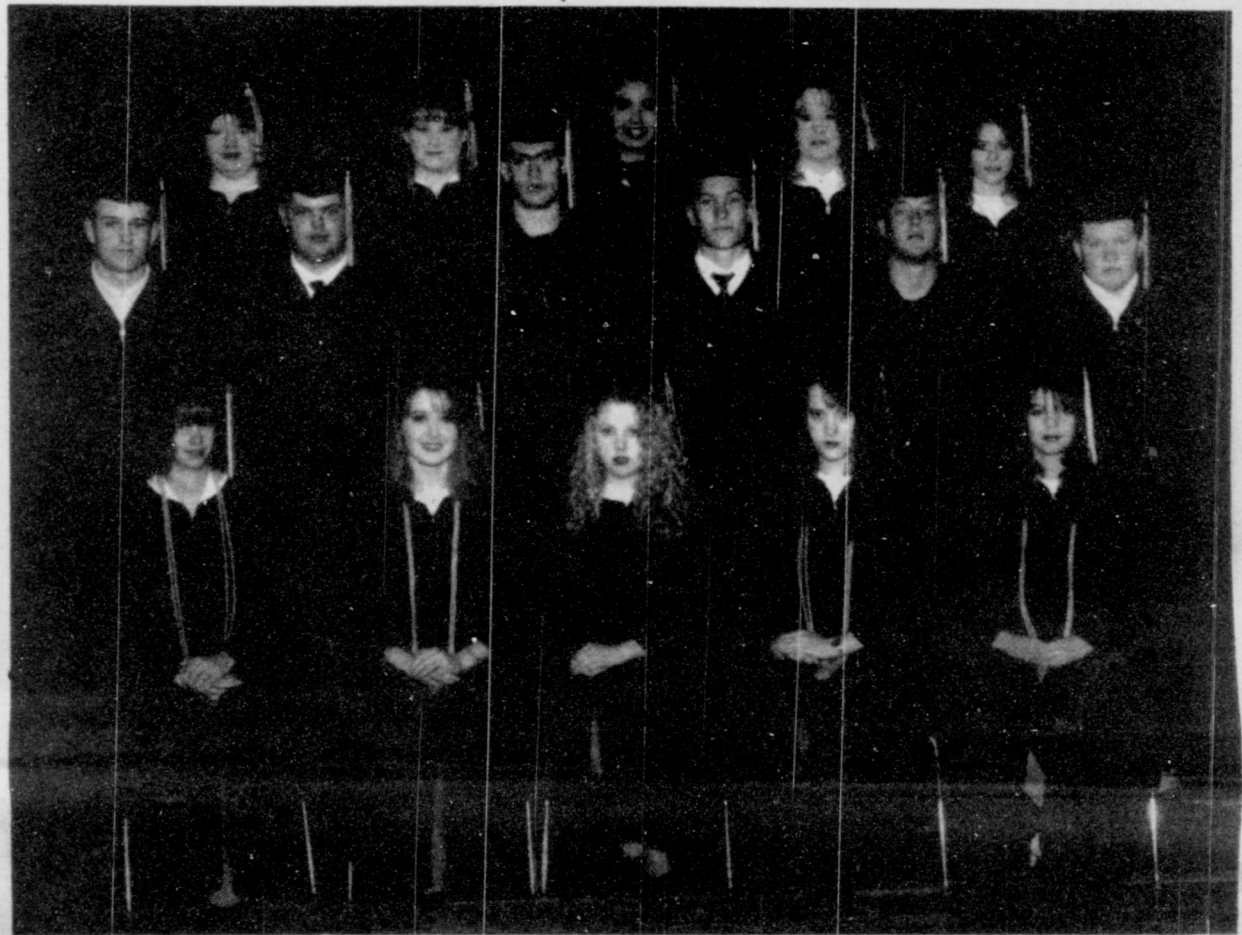

Rancher Named To American Angus Assoc.

Jim Whitlock, Groom, is a new member of the American Angus Association, reports Dick Spader, executive vice president of the national organization with headquarters in St. Joseph, Mo.

The American Angus Association, with over 24,000 active adult and junior members, is the largest beef cattle registry association in the world. Its computerized records include detailed information on more than 12 million registered Angus.

The association records ancestral information and keeps records of production on individual animals for its members. These permanent records help members select and mate the best animals in their herds to produce high quality, efficient breeding cattle which are then recorded with the American Angus Association.

Most of these registered Angus are used by the U.S. farmers and ranchers who raise high quality beef for U.S. consumption.

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Carson County Sheriff's Report

A twenty-three year old Oklahoma woman who had been under investigation by the Carson County Sheriff's Department for fraud, died in a car accident in Louisiana early Saturday morning. The woman had been the primary suspect in a fraud investigation which victimized persons in 42 states, the District of Columbia and the Virgin Islands. The suspect would notify potential victims that they had won a large prize or cash award. The only thing necessary was to prepay the taxes on the prize before it could be sent out. Some of the bogus prepayment demands were for several thousand dollars. Two persons in Carson County were among those victimized by this operation.

A vehicle stolen from Amarillo was recovered in Groom after two other Groom vehicles were stolen. The suspect apparently decided to switch vehicles in Groom and dumped the original vehicle to steal the local vehicle. When that vehicle didn't meet the suspect's needs, another vehicle was stolen in its place. All vehicle information has been entered into the National Crime Information Center computer to alert law enforcement agencies nationwide.

Our department is investigating reports of telephone harassment and obscene telephone calls in Groom, Panhandle, and Fritch. We have been working with the complainants to record the "conversations" for later voice comparisons and analysis of background sounds. In addition, we make the tapes available for review by parents when a juvenile is responsible for making the calls.

We currently have eleven people incarcerated in the Carson County Jail. All of the prisoners are being held on felony offenses and six of the eleven are being held pending vacancies at the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville. One person is being held on felony warrants from Randall County and one for auto theft from another state.

4-Her's Headed To State

High Plains 4-H'ers from 16 of the 21 counties in Texas Agricultural Extension Service Panhandle District 1 qualified on May 14 to compete in the State 4-H Roundup at College Station June 6-10 by taking top honors in district competition.

About 250 boys and girls competed in the event, which included 28 counties. Winners received their awards in ceremonies at the Mary Moody Northern Hall auditorium at West Texas A&M University in Canyon.

Randall County 4-H'ers captured the most qualifying wins of any county with 13 teams and/or individual senior wins. Gray County had 12 wins; Deaf Smith, nine; Carson, six; Potter five; Briscoe, Dallam and Oldham, three; Hutchinson, Moore and Wheeler, two; and Armstrong, Hansford, Lipscomb, Ochiltree and Sherman, one.

To qualify for the state contests, a team or individual must have a first- or second-place win in the senior division, which is for 14 year-olds and older. Juniors do not compete beyond the district level.

In the Livestock Judging Contest, Carson County's

team, Jeff Millican, Kerri Howell, Brent Burrell, and Groom's C.J. Whatley placed 3rd.

In the Rifle Contest, Senior Individuals: Michael Lewis, Groom placed first. The Junior Team from Groom: Jeremy Lewis, Todd Gray, Dwayne Gray, and Caleb Pool placed 3rd.

For Junior Individuals in the Rifle Contest, Jeremy Lewis of Groom placed 1st.

From Groom (Carson County) the junior team of Brooke Britten, Lainie Britten, Macie Britten and Wyatt Britten, Nicholas Anthony, Brin Burgin, Lauren Crowell, Stephanie Frazier, and Sarah Looten placed 2nd in the Share The Fun Contest.

In the Fashion Show Dressy Daywear junior division Macie Britten, Groom, placed 4th.

In the Casual Daywear junior division, also in the Fashion Show Brooke Britten, Groom, placed 1st. Brooke also placed 1st in the junior division of the Accessory Show.

Macie Britten, Groom, placed 1st in the junior Garment division, and Sarah Looten, Groom, placed 1st in the Textile junior division of the Fashion Show.

Writer Club Announces Contest

Panhandle Professional Writers (PPW) announces June 15 as the deadline for its annual writing contests, which include a new category this year, according to Lou Ann Garrett, PPW vice-president for contests.

"Amarillo Observer Feature Article" is the new category and will be sponsored and judged by the local magazine, she added. "Entrants in this category will need to write an article suitable to be published in the Amarillo Observer."

Other contest categories include children's stories, poetry, short stories, book-length manuscripts and non-fiction articles (other than those for the Observer).

Contests are open to all writers, except that first-place winners from 1993 are not eligible to enter the

same category this year, Garrett said. They may, however, enter other categories. Each contest will be judged by a competent authority in that field.

Winners will be announced and prizes awarded August 6 at the Frontiers in Writing (FTW) Conference luncheon at Amarillo College. Prizes for book-length manuscripts are first place, \$50; second place, \$25, and third place, \$15. Prizes for winners in each of the other categories are \$25, \$20 and \$15.

Grandview Hopkins Receives Award For Loss Control

The Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) Worker's Compensation Self-Insurance Fund (WCSIF) Wednesday presented Grandview-Hopkins ISD with an award recognizing the district for its outstanding loss control record.

The annual award is presented to districts with low workers' compensation losses compared to districts of similar size. As a result of their success in controlling losses, Grandview-Hopkins ISD will receive a rate decrease in 1994-95 for their workers' compensation coverage with TASB WCSIF.

"We are fortunate to be able to provide workers' comp services to organizations with such outstanding records," said Jean Rostron, WCSIF division director. "And we want to return to these exemplary members a valuable benefit that we feel

they have earned - lower rates."

The TASB WCSIF is a pooled fund that provides workers' compensation coverage to over half of the school districts in Texas. The pool minimizes the effects of catastrophic workers' compensation losses on districts, tax payers, and students by spreading the risk among its members. Districts were evaluated for the award based on eight categories, which allowed for comparisons of loss rates among districts of similar size and makeup.

TASB is a voluntary, nonprofit association established more than 40 years ago to serve local Texas school districts. It is composed of 1,055 school districts and county school boards, 43 junior colleges, 62 tax appraisal districts, 58 cooperatives and the 20 education service centers.

"This Texas Panhandle town has a lot to be proud of, especially our cowboy and rodeo heritage and the fact that we remain one of the best centers of hospitality along the entire length of Route 66," said

Smith. "On June 17 and 18, we will host road warriors galore on parade in their vintage cars and enough rodeo cowpokes to keep a herd of bucking broncs and snorting bulls busy."

Flag Of The United States To Celebrate 217th Birthday

Flag Day, June 14, 1994, marks the 217th birthday of our national flag. The following information invites your readers to remember our flag and the great nation over which it waves.

Catholic Life Insurance, a member of the National Fraternal Congress of America (NFCA), is glad to raise awareness of this national holiday. Fraternal benefit societies, like Catholic Life, are also

celebrating National Fraternal Week to raise awareness of fraternal benefit societies or fraternalism, a unique mixture of business and volunteerism. Catholic Life Insurance, a not-for-profit, member-owned society offers financial services and fraternal benefits since 1901 to members in Texas, Louisiana, and Oklahoma.

The flag of the United States of America is a living thing that calls to our spirit, reminding us of the greatness of our America. It signifies a people dedicated to liberty, justice and freedom for all.

Since its birth over 200 years ago, this emblem of our great nation has led a stirring life, rich in history. The Continental Congress resolved on June 14, 1777, "that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen alternating red and white stripes; that the union be thirteen stars on a blue field, representing a new constellation." With this grand declaration, the Stars and Stripes were born.

Unfortunately, the

Congress did not specify an arrangement for the stars in the union, and as a result there were many variations in the flags that followed. Betsy Ross, a Philadelphia seamstress, is often credited with making the first flag. While many historians feel that there is not enough evidence to support this story, the legend lives on.

The star-spangled banner flew above Baltimore's Fort McHenry when the British attacked on September 13, 1814. Francis Scott Key, a Washington lawyer, was so moved by the sight of the American flag still flying over the fortress the next morning that he wrote what later became our National Anthem.

President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation in 1916 setting aside June 14 as a special day to honor the flag. "When we observe Flag Day, we help our children to better understand the principles of liberty and justice which made our nation great. We show the world that we are a nation of responsible citizens dedicated to preserving these precepts for future generations. Finally, as individuals, we renew our own belief in America and in freedom and justice for all." Despite Wilson's plea, it was not until 1949 that Congress made this day a permanent observance.

Nearly 70 years later, the National Flag Foundation inaugurated a new tradition of honoring the flag by instituting a nationwide recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance. Called the "Pause for the Pledge," this Flag Day activity urges all Americans to recite the Pledge in unison at 7 p.m., on Tuesday, June 14. The effect of this simple ceremony, which transcends age, race, religion, national origin, political and geographic differences, is a stimulating patriotic experience at home and a sign of unity abroad.

Wheeler County To Hold Celebration

The first Wheeler County Heritage Day will be held June 18, 1994, at the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum grounds in Old Mobeetie, Texas from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. A full day of activities is planned to tell the story of Fort Elliott established June 5, 1875. Fort Elliott served the Panhandle of Texas until 1890 when the need for it no longer existed.

Courageous African American soldiers of the United States Army's 10th Cavalry, who won the name "Buffalo Soldiers," were stationed at Fort Elliott during its 15 years of providing protection for the Texas Panhandle from the Plains Indian raids.

The United States Postal Service issued a stamp April 22, 1994, honoring the Buffalo Soldiers. The stamp will be available on Heritage Day with a Special Pictorial Cancellation drawing of the officer's quarters building and the original cedar flag pole that stood on the parade grounds at Fort Elliott. The flag pole now stands in front of the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum.

The 4th Cavalry Re-enactment group will be the

main attraction during the day, presenting mounted cavalry drills, telling the story of the cavalry men, camping out on the museum grounds and giving artillery demonstrations with guns and cannons.

Come to Old Mobeetie, Texas, on June 18, 1994 and relive Wheeler County heritage and learn about the great beginning of Wheeler County and the Texas Panhandle.

Monday was Memorial Day. Remember the day set aside to honor those who have given the ultimate sacrifice for their country. "Lest We Forget" is the slogan.

If you ask me and nobody did... we have forgotten someone. We have Civil War Memorials, World War I and II Memorials and Viet Nam War Memorials. Heck, we have paid tribute to just about every ethnic group that ever fought or was caught in battle in the name of the United States. I understand that there is now a movement to build a War Memorial in Viet Nam to honor the Vietnamese by some Americans. I just want to know when are we going to honor the Korean War Veterans.

The angriest I ever saw my dad was once when I was a teenager, you know, back when I knew everything. Some well meaning textbook author had called the Korean War a "police action". Given to trying to impress my parents with my knowledge about events that had occurred before I was born I parroted the authors phrase and told my father that "he had not been in a real war... it was more of a Police Action."

I know it must have taken all his strength to *restrain himself from slapping my smart mouth.* But I will never forget what he said in a tight quiet

voice, that told me he was speaking through clenched teeth.

"A hundred thousand men dying thousands of miles from home is not a police action.... my good buddy getting blown to bits lying in a fox hole right next to me is not a police action...not knowing if you were walking into an ambush or a friendly village is not a Police Action"

Right then and there, I decided that perhaps, police action was vastly under-descriptive of the event.

Growing up in the 60's and 70's we became familiar with the terminology even more so. History books may, to this day, describe any undeclared war in which a third party intervenes as a police action. Remember what happened when the Nam Vets organized and demanded our recognition and respect. They got it.

"The Frozen Chosen", as my dad calls them, deserve the same respect and recognition. Stop and think about this. The world was still licking her wounds from WW II, when this crisis occurred. Like their fathers and brothers, the next generation of Americans didn't stop to question why. They knew that it was their duty and they went.

Forty years later, they do not even have a memorial to validate the sacrifices they made.

I'm not saying that their sacrifices were more or less than that of the men from WW I through Desert Storm. I am saying that it's a crying shame that we live in this "Squeaky wheel gets the grease society" where only those who whine on a massive scale get thanked for what they have done. What has happened to recognizing the deserving.

Nobody asked me but... It's way past due!
