Tigers Open Gridiron Action Against Valley

The Groom Tigers are looking forward to facing off, perhaps, one of the most evenly matched teams they will play this year in their season opener this Friday night.

Valley and Groom have one major factor in common. Both are returning to 11-man play after many years as 6-man teams. Where speed and agility are important issues in both 6-man and 11-man football, hitting hard and taking hits will be skills that, while not new to the teams, has a new added importance.

Team captain, Bart Britten said "We can handle them. They are a good team but we are ready to meet the challenge."

Groom is returning with ten lettermen from last year while Valley comes back with only six. Their last years records are similar. Valley 10-2 while Groom's was 8-2. Both teams 45-ed McLean last year and both beat Vernon Northside, Samnorwood, Chillicothe and Higgins.

Senior running back, Seth Ritter is very positive about the outcome. "We have been working very hard and I feel we can play against anyone. Valley should be an equal match," stated Ritter.

The Groom Varsity and Jr. Varsity Tigers scrimmaged Highland Park

last week in preparation for their opening game to be held on September 2.

Many of the injured players were back. Although a few still remain on the sideline.

Head Coach Steve Lott was pleased with their performance and had these comments.

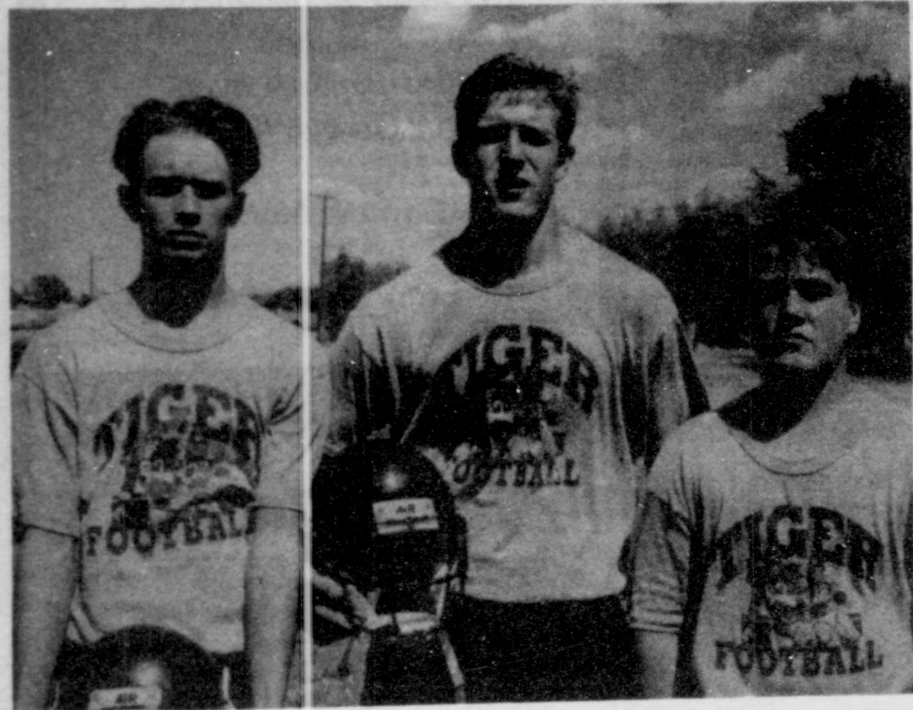
"I thought the scrimmage went very well. The varsity executed well on offense and completely shut down Highland Park J.V. It was good for our varsity to get the snaps they needed and play some defense against another team. Our passing game is steadily improving and we are getting better reading the option.

The J.V. was able to get a lot of playing time. We scored one touchdown and gave up one."

Coach Lott is just as positive as the boys that the Tigers can handle everything the Patriots throw at them.

"We are ready to prepare for Valley. They are like us in a number of ways. They have good skill people, good speed, and tall receivers. Their main man is 6'6", 240 pound, Josh Scoggins. Their quarterback is decent but their line is still pretty shaky. Out players are looking forward to going head to head with them," said Coach Lott.

FIELDS STUDENT TRAINER FOR TIGERS

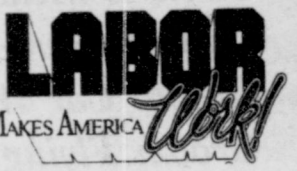

GROOM YOUTH COMPETE IN 4-H RODEO

Four Groom youth competed in a two day Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo in Shamrock. On Friday in the 5 and Under Stick Horse Age Group Chantel Longway placed 5th in Barrels, Flags, and Goat Ribbon Race and took a 6th in Poles. In the 6-9 Age Group Brent Longway placed 5th in Barrels and Poles, 6th in Flags and 2nd in the Goat Ribbon Race. Magan Bivens competing in her first rodeo placed 8th in Barrels, 10th in Poles, 11th in Flags and 12th in the Goat Ribbon Race. In the toughest Age Group (10-13) Cody Bivens placed 17th in Poles, 18th in Barrels and 20th in Flags. 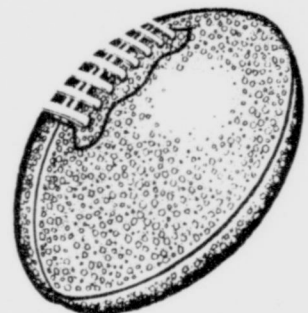

Pulverize the Patriots!

Carson County Sheriff's Report

Like many neighboring sheriff's departments, we have had an ever-increasing workload with cases of violent behavior and contact with persons who have a lengthy criminal history. I've written before to caution residents against having contact with these transients who solicit rides and money along Interstate 40 and U.S. 60. Our contacts with these transients have been increasing by quite a margin. We check into the criminal background of these people whenever we have contact with them and we've found a large number of persons who have been previously convicted of homicides, sexual assaults and other violent acts. If a stranger comes to your door, call our department and we'll send someone out to check on them. Don't risk your safety and that of your family.

Our department was contacted by the Amarillo Department of Public Safety with a report of a vehicle travelling west on U.S. 60 from White Deer. Several witnesses had seen the passenger of the car firing a handgun out the window. A Carson County Sheriff's Department officer was just returning from Amarillo after taking a transient to the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center for mental evaluation and he encountered the suspect vehicle at the east city limits of Amarillo. The vehicle contained four suspects and was followed into the north Amarillo area until additional officers from the Amarillo Police Department arrived to assist in checking the vehicle. One handgun was found and charges are pending against the shooter. All four suspects were on parole. The driver was taken into custody on outstanding warrants.

Our deputies responded to several calls of domestic violence this week. In one case, a subject was arrested

who had been previously indicted for Aggravated Assault and who was in violation of a protective order.

The Sheriff's Department is assisting the San Antonio Police Department with an investigation alleging parental kidnapping. Our officers assisted the Panhandle Police Department with a report of an open door at a residence where the owners were on vacation and at a local convenience store where two out-of-town subjects had been causing a disturbance.

We responded to a report of persons stealing the contents from a disabled vehicle parked along U.S. 60 and a disturbance in Conway where a person was refusing to pay for food or services at a local business.

Our officers recovered several items of stolen merchandise from a local business and investigated a burglary of a residence in Fritch. We are currently investigating the misappropriation of funds by an employee at a business place in the county. Also included in this investigation are several hundred dollars worth of telephone calls made by the employee to a "phone sex" number.

Carson County deputies arrested a man wanted by Louisiana authorities. We are holding this subject until he can be picked up and returned to Louisiana to face charges.

The Armstrong County Sheriff's Department called for our assistance to deal with a hostage situation involving a man with a shotgun. The subject was taken into custody and jailed in Armstrong County, but later started a fire in the jail. Our officers assisted Armstrong County in the matter. The suspect was taken to Amarillo for treatment of smoke inhalation.

Our officers assisted the Texas Highway Patrol and the White Deer City

Marshal at the scene of a one vehicle rollover west of White Deer. The White Deer EMS took one person to the hospital.

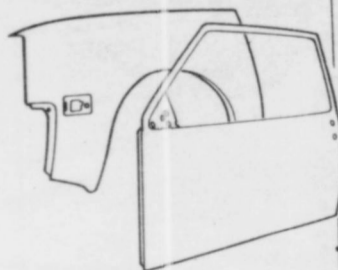

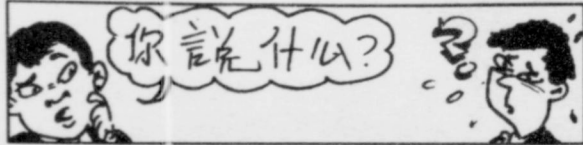

Handbook Final Authority For School Policies And Procedures

McLean High School and Junior High students received an updated copy of the McLean ISD student handbook last week, according to Rick Reeser, principal. The 36-page handbook contains the latest version of rules and regulations governing the school.

"We hope parents will go through the handbook with their students to be sure each understands the policies that we operate under," Reeser said.

The handbook details information about attendance, discipline, fundraising, graduation requirements, student complaints, code of conduct and other policies of the school district.

"When there is a question about our decisions on certain subjects, we use the handbook as the final authority," Stanley Lamb, superintendent of schools, explained. "These are policies that the Board of

Trustees have discussed and approved."

One policy that has been re-emphasized this year is student's use of vehicles during the lunch hour. "Because of the safety factor, we do not allow students to drive their vehicles during the lunch hour," Lamb said. "This is a change from last year, but it really was a long standing policy for McLean schools. Once a student drives a vehicle to school, that vehicle should remain parked until the student leaves for home. That applies to vehicles that are parked off campus also."

Lamb explained that the close proximity of the high school parking lot and the elementary school is one of the reasons for the rule. "The safety of the children is our most important priority," he said.

100 Elementary Students Evacuated During Blaze

Repeated fire drills at the schools paid off last Friday when about 100 elementary students were safely and quickly evacuated from the building. paper, and prayed for in the churches. None of us smoked, it was a dry area so none of us drank, there were street lights close and we kept the music quiet. "It is a sign of the times, and these young people will never amount to a hill of beans," the papers said.

Us delinquents didn't quit, we just moved out on Uncle Sam's Highway one mile east of town. There was an intersection that had been re-topped and was slick enough to dance on, so at 10:45 after we left the movie, we stopped by the Ranger Drive-In and got a big coke to go. Then we

parked our cars around the intersection, leaving our parking lights on. I had a good radio in my car and at 11:00 sharp, Johnnie Lee Wills and all the boys came on the air from the Trianon Ballroom from Tulsa, Oklahoma. For a full hour we danced to the best music in the world, but did have to stop and let a car by once in a while.

I don't remember any of us ever getting into trouble, and all of that bunch grew up and are good citizens. But, at one time, we were considered delinquents. Guess things don't change much in life after all.

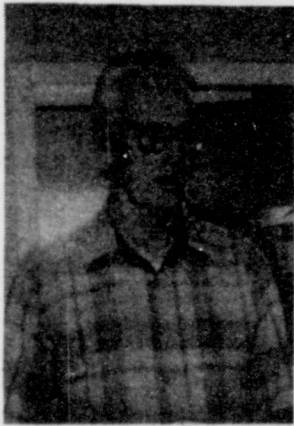


