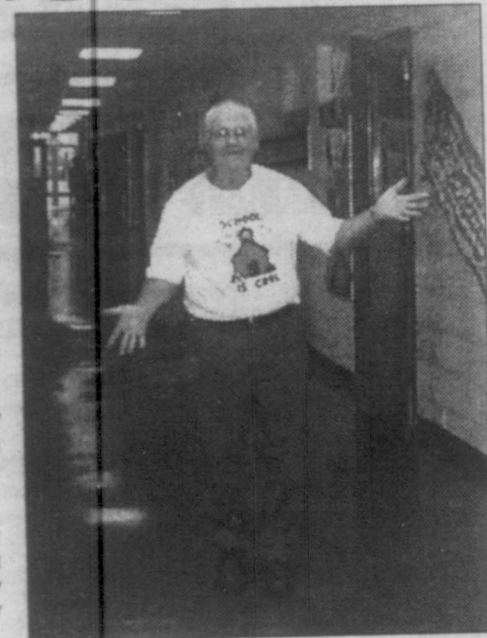

Have Your Children Immunized

With children back in school, be sure to keep your children current in the immunizations in order to maintain your children's health and to protect them from deadly, but preventable diseases. Many diseases that

used to kill or cripple children have all but disappeared in America thanks to immunization. According to Dr. Louise Z. Cooper, MD, of the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), there are

three key points that parents need to know about immunizing their children.

First, by keeping your children up-to-date on their shots, you protect them, your family and the community against infectious diseases.

Next, vaccines are safe. Although some children may experience slight reactions, they are usually mild. Third, because youngest children are the most vulnerable, immunizations should begin before the age of two with booster shots given throughout childhood.

Flag Etiquette Important To Show Proper Respect

We are nearing the one year anniversary of the attack on America on Sept. 11. A new surge of patriotism has swept across our nation following the attacks. Last year it was nearly impossible to find a flag to purchase.

People flew flags from windows cars even a windmill of the highway. In anticipation of the many flags we will see on Sept. 11 here are some guidelines for flying your flags.

When raising a flag on a pole the flag should be raised briskly with the blue field or

union on the top. An upside down flag is a sign of distress. As a sign of mourning the flag is flown at half mast. First hoist the flag to the peak then lower it to half mast. On Memorial Day the flag should fly at half mast until noon and then raised to peak until sunset. It is the universal custom to fly the flag from sunrise to sunset unless it is properly lit at night. No other flag should fly higher than the US flag on American soil. When two or more flags are flown at the

Flag

same time the American flag should be flown first. When the flag is carried in a procession of flags it should be on the right in front of the center of the processional line. It should always fly aloft and free. When crossed on a wall with another flag the US flag should be on the outside on the observers left. The union is always on the top and on the observer's left. In a group it should be center or at the highest point. When flown vertically the Union faces north on east west

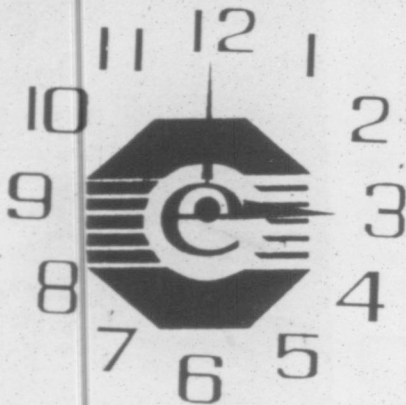


streets or east on north south streets. On a platform the flag should be above and behind the speaker to his right. The flag should be treated with honor and respect. When lowered don't let the flag touch the ground.

Lower it slowly folding it as it comes down before it is completely detached. A flag should never be used as a decoration use bunting instead with blue on the top, then white and then red. the flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding or drapery, no part of the flag should be used as a costume

Show College Pride On License Plates

The Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) and colleges across Texas have teamed up to provide students with an interesting way to show their school pride and provide money for scholarships. Forty-eight colleges and universities participate in the Collegiate License Plate Program. The license plate designs vary among several different logos with the names of each school.

Mike Behrens, of TXDOT, says, "The sales of the plates fund scholarships that have benefited thousands of students for several years." The cost of the plates is \$30.00 annually in addition to the regular cost of the vehicle registration fee. The chosen college or university receives \$25.00 of the money for their scholarship programs. Since 1990, Texas A&M has raised more than \$1.5 million.

Assistance Available For Low Income Electricity Customers

New Benefits are available for Low-Income Texas. Here are a few facts about what you

need to know concerning assistance programs for electricity customers.

HOW DOES A CUSTOMER RECEIVE LOW-INCOME ASSISTANCE?

1. If customers currently receive food stamps, Medicaid, Aid for Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) or Supplemental Security Income (SSI), they should have been automatically enrolled in the low-income discount program.

2. Customers can check their most recent electric bill. If they are enrolled, there will be a savings on the bill, labeled "LITE-UP discount."

3. If customers are not receiving the discount, but feel they may qualify, they may visit the PUCT's Web site at www.puc.state.tx.us/ocp/lowincast.cfm. Additional information can be obtained by calling 1-866-4-LITE-UP (1-866-454-8387).

HOW DO LEVEL-PAYMENT PLANS WORK?

A level-payment plan provides customers with about the same size electric bill every month. Therefore, there is little

change in the monthly bill they pay during the summer, when electricity use goes up.

1. To sign up, customers simply need to call their electric company and ask for information on the program. The electric company should be able to provide the appropriate participation information.

2. Because level-payment plans can be initially based on historical usage of electricity, the customer's overall use will most likely be either high or lower than that amount that would be paid if invoiced on the actual usage. Customers can find out from their representative how that difference will be reconciled.

Remember these important facts

*Most Texans received a 6 percent discount off their base electric rates, adjusted for fuel when competition began.

*Eligible low income Texans can receive an additional discount of at least 10 percent off their electric bills. The low income discount is funded by the System Benefit Fund. The Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) recently increased the low-income discount based on a list maintained by the Texas

Department of Human Services (TDHS).

*Under the 1999 Texas Electric Choice Act, customers who are late with their electric bill payments may be assessed a late fee of up to 5 percent of their bill. This fee is waived for customers receiving the low-income discount.

*Electric providers are required to offer payment plans for customers who are having difficulty paying their electric bills. Customers may contact their electric provider for more information.

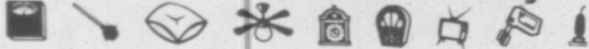

for many years. When the opportunity came to work for Carson County he felt like Groom would be the best place for his family.

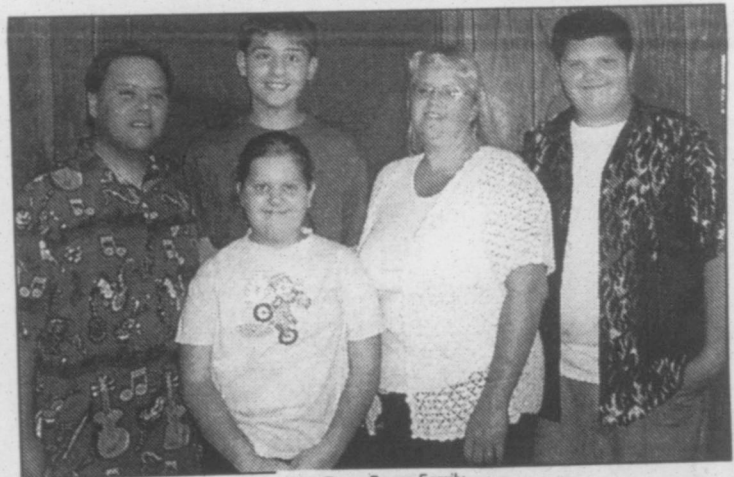
"Everyone is so friendly here!" he said.

Commissioners Meet

The Carson County Commissioners met on August 26, 2002 with the following members present: Judge Lewis Powers, commissioners Mike Britten, Kenneth Ware, Jerry Stawn, Kevin Howell.

Minutes of the August 12 meeting were read and approved.

Bills were approved for payment.

Judge Powers addressed the contact labor for lawn care at the courthouse and War Memorial building. Powers reported that the

maintenance personnel would have to assist in catching up with the requirements of the job. Powers will address the hired help to correct the concerns.

The court discussed wireless internet service for offices in the courthouse. Judge powers informed the commissioners that plans have been submitted to connect to a present line and disburse to each office and a separate plan to start from scratch and set up a new system. The court will give the companies a chance to bid both ways before a network will be installed.

Evelyn Carpenter and Michael Azeka, representatives from SeaWest Windpower Company met with the court to discuss a proposed wind farm to be located north of Panhandle. The company was seeking information concerning a tax abatement for the project titled "Caprock Canyon Winds". No action was taken other than the commissioners agreeing that the court would work with the San Diego based company to assure the progress of construction of the site. County Attorney Scott Sherwood stated that the designated sections would have to be declared a reinvestment zone before any abatement application could be heard.

The court considered the 2002-2003 budget.

Commissioner Howell made the motion to adopt the budget as presented. The motion was unanimously approved. Also considered was the 2002-2003 tax rate as

presented by Tax Assessor-Collector Barbara Cosper. The motion was approved as follows:

.065981 - Special Road & Bridge
.39431 - Total

Judge Powers presented a proposed slate of members for the Child Welfare Board. These include Commissioner Britten, War, Strawn, and Howell, Dixie Surratt, Judge Powers and Karrie Smith.

The court considered several line item transfers for the current budget year. These items were approved for transfer.

Auditor Jacqueline West presented the court with a resolution to aid in receiving financial assistance for the provision of defense attorneys for the indigent. The agreement was approved.

Judge Powers petitioned the court and was approved to pay annual dues of \$200 to the Panhandle Water

Planning Area in order to access funds for grants, loans, etc. Court was adjourned until September 9, 2002.

Strawberry Butter Crumble

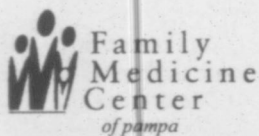
