Waterfield Joins Conservatives In Budget Fight

The balanced budget proposal of the Texas Conservative Coalition, which would provide for a surplus of \$37.7 million without additional revenue, has the support of Rep. Dick Waterfield, R-Canadian.

Waterfield said that the Coalition, which is made up of 60 members of the House and Senate, clearly shows that the budget dilemma can be solved if the Legislature is willing to make the difficult choices demanded by the current deficit.

"The proposal is a list of 35 options to save the state money, which if approved would save \$3.2 billion over the next two years," Waterfield said. "This taken with a projected deficit of \$3.1 billion would result in a \$37.7 million surplus."

The savings plans would require statutory changes and appropriations bill riders. It also takes into account the extended sales and gas tax, and elimination of motor fuels and vehicle sales tax transfers. Both measures passed the House and are still pending in the Senate.

Included in the recommendations are use of revenue bonding for prison construction, \$100 million increase over 1987 levels for

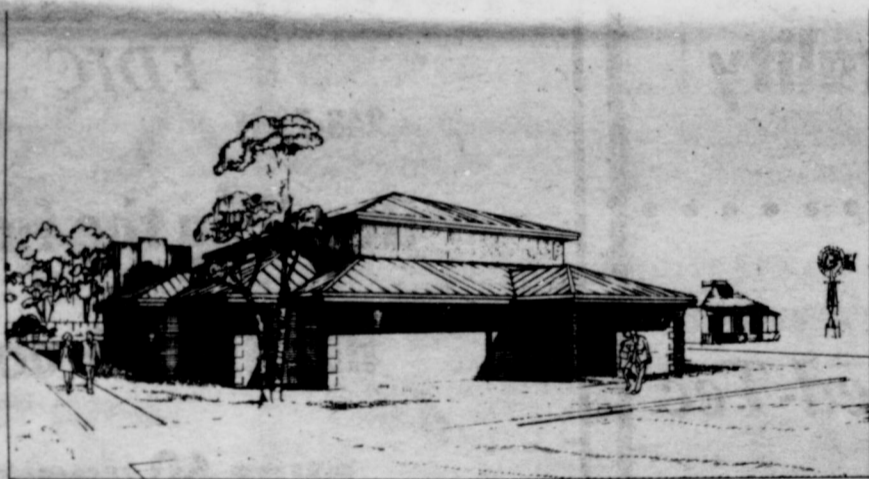
Education Center At Museum To Open Sunday

Dedication of the Carson County Square House Museum Educational Center will be held in Panhandle Sunday, May 31 at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The center, completed at a cost of \$420,000 including site purchase, landscaping, exhibits furnishing and paving completes the nine structure complex of the Museum.

The building is named for long time State Senator, Grady and Andrine Hazlewood of Canyon and Austin. The 200 capacity auditorium is named for the late M.K. Brown of Pampa.

Ribbon cutting by Senator Hazlewood and Museum Founder, Jo Stewart Randel will be at 3 o'clock followed by the dedicatory program. The dedicatory address will be by Carson County native son, Bill Waters of Pampa, chairman of the M.K. Brown Foundation.

Building Committee Chairman Eugene Phillips will be master of ceremonies with Mrs. Harold V. O'Neal, chairman of the Board of



Trustees welcoming guests. Invocation will be given by the Rev. Ivan Allen of United Methodist Church, White Deer and the dedicatory prayer by the Rev. Richard Neyer of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Catholic church in Groom.

Special guests, representing the major foundations contributing to the center will be recognized by Carson County Judge Jay R. Roselius. Individuals and

business and corporate donors will also be introduced, including major donors Grady Hazlewood, T. Boone Pickens and Mesa Limited Partnership, Lawrence Hagy, Mr. and Mrs. A.D. Weatherly, First National Bank of Panhandle, L.P. Gilvin and Mrs. Minor Sims of Panhandle.

No public campaign was ever launched for the building fund. Letters and grant proposals were sent to Founda-

tions but response from individuals was voluntary. In addition to the 51 major donors, and additional 32 gifts of equipment was made. Plaques in the foyer recognize these contributions.

The auditorium-art gallery features a frieze of hand blocked linen with the schools, banks, depot and County Courthouse of the twenties. Each section of the See Center, Page 4

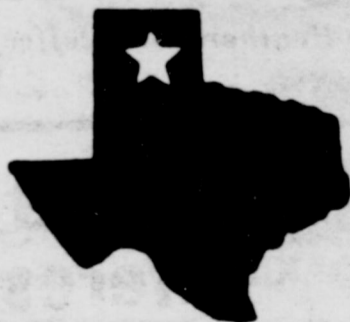

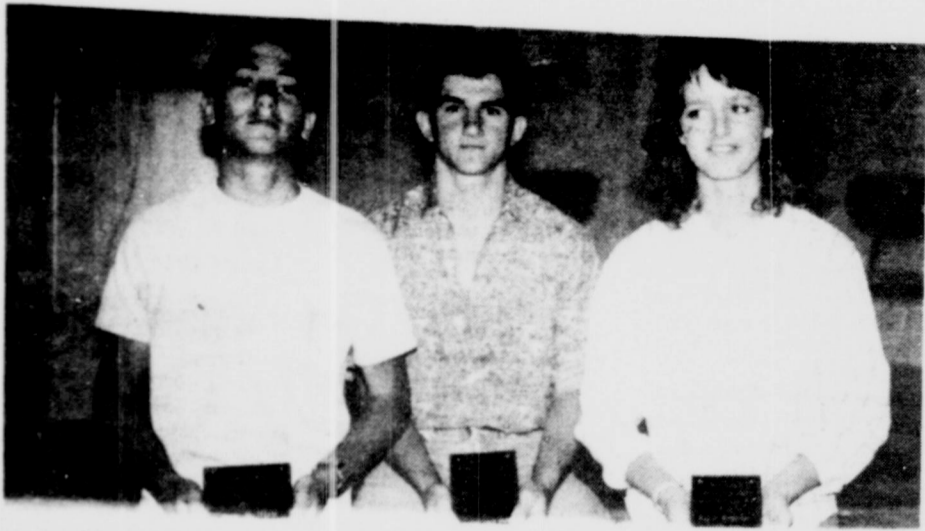

higher education, freezing teacher career ladder allotments at 1987 levels, and transferring \$400 million from the Highway Fund.

"What I like is the fact that we did not surrender when confronted with a budget deficit," Waterfield said. "Instead of automatically turning to the taxpayers for another increase, we took the responsibility to find ways of saving money."

Waterfield said that though every member of the Legislature will not support the plan, it does present an alternative to those who want to spend more, rather than stand up for taxpayers.

"Like every private citizen, I am interested in saving money," Waterfield said. "And since we are really talking about taxing the citizens more or drawing the line and saying 'enough', I believe the responsible thing to do is to support this plan."

Current Department of Labor standards will not allow youth under age 16 to accept farm employment that includes tractor and or machinery operation. However, if 14 and 15 year olds satisfactorily complete a tractor safety shortcourse they can receive an exemption certificate which will allow them to legally accept farm employment. If there is sufficient interest the Vocational Agriculture departments in the county and the County Extension Service will try to implement the shortcourse.

Boys and girls, ages 14 and 15, should contact one of the Voc Ag teachers or the county agent as soon as possible if they are interested in participating in a safety shortcourse. In White Deer contact Conda Maze, in Groom contact Carlton Turvaille and in Panhandle contact J.G. Watson. Or you can contact John Fields at the County Extension Office in Panhandle, 537-3882.

If the courses are organized, Fields stated that he would like to see them completed prior to wheat harvest.

Wheat Producers Election Has Local Candidates

The Texas Wheat Producers Board mail election which began April 9 by notifying producers of the election and how to place names on the ballot reached a milestone. It was assumed that all requests for names to be placed on the ballot was ended by having received all such requests post-marked prior to midnight, May 8, according to Cagle, Kendrick, Producer board chairman of Stratford. Kendrick indicated that any producer subject to paying the half-cent self assessment at country elevators, feed lots and ASCS offices were eligible to have their names placed on the ballot when supported by ten other producers in their district. All incumbents were eligible for re-nomination by the same manner and that all are seeking re-nomination.

In District I, the area north of the Canadian river, seeking to unseat incumbent Vice Chairman Kenneth Kesling of Dumas, are V.B.

Morris of Gruver and Lanny Benzner, Dalhart. District II, the remainder of the Panhandle, asking to replace Treasurer C.L. Edwards of Panhandle is Gary L. Vance of Panhandle. District III, the Rolling Plains incumbent W.R. Moore, Jr. of Munday has no opposition. District IV, the Blacklands, Edwards Plateau and all other counties in Texas, incumbents Randy Justiss of Lancaster and Dennis Rabbe of Crawford, will compete for the two seats available in that area with Foy Gibson of Lometa, Larry Mitchell of Arlington and Bob Thornton of Anna.

Kendrick indicated that ballots will be mailed to some 64,000 Texas wheat producers by May 25 and that the election will be in progress from that date through June 8. Ballots will be presumed to have been received and will be canvassed to determine the winning board members on June 12. In keeping with the

Texas Agricultural Commodity Referendum Law the canvassing committee will be composed of a representative from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a County Judge within the District where canvassed, a representative of the Texas Wheat Producer Association and supervised by the Texas Department of Agriculture. The first meeting involving the newly elected Board will be the regularly scheduled quarterly board meeting August 4 and 5, 1987.

The responsibility of the new Board members will be to join with the current ten other Board members in directing the receipt and expenditure of the research, market development and service program designed to enhance wheat producer income through a statewide self-assessment program, Kendrick pointed out.

Important legislative liaison on state and federal issues dealing with farm policy are not allowed to be conducted by the Producers Board, but are conducted by the Texas Wheat Producers Association, a voluntary membership state-wide organization of interested wheat producers.

Rep. Dick Waterfield, R-Canadian, was named Wednesday as runner-up for Outstanding Freshman Legislator of the Texas House of Representatives. Waterfield received the

"I am honored that the members felt my work here

out as the top Republican in a class of 22 freshmen from both parties. His major accomplishment was the passage of grain warehouse legislation, which assured producers of having properly

licensed elevators by easing the bonding requirements.

"I wanted to give agriculture better representation in Austin, simply because it is so important to my district's economy," he said. "And I am proud to have been able to get this bill passed and signed by Governor Clements, so that our

Agency Offers Services to Elderly Citizens

EDITORS NOTE: This article originally appeared in the Amarillo Sunday News-Globe on May 3, 1987. Because of the large number of senior citizens in the McLean area, we are taking this opportunity to reprint it. It was written by Nevada O'Pry, Senior Citizens Director with Panhandle Community Services:

Panhandle Community Services is a private non-profit corporation that serves as an advocate for those in need, whether young or aged. PCS serves the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle and provides needed services to the communities as a whole. Programs are extended where services are needed but not available. The major services of the agency are:

Primary Home Care Services: The PHC program is funded by the Department of Human Services. Recipients of this service must be current Medicaid card holders. Recipients must also have functional limitations due to medical need. Services include personal care such as bathing, dressing, grooming, transfer/ambulation, feeding, toileting, meal preparation, and cleaning. Attendants are supervised by licensed R.N.s.

The Family Care Program: This program is also funded by DHS. Recipients of this service must meet the income criteria which are set by DHS. Services available are house cleaning, meal preparation, personal care, laundry, transfer/ambulation, and escort.

Title III Homemaker Service: This program is funded by the Panhandle Area Agency on Aging. This service is for the elderly, 60 years of age or older, who exceed the Department of Human Resources guidelines, yet still have inadequate funds to pay for needed services. There is no charge for services, but donations are accepted when and if available. This program helps the elderly who "fall through the cracks" because they are a few dollars over income guidelines. Funding is small in this program, but many elderly are helped each month.

Private Pay Services: This program is a customized service for the aged or disabled. It provides supervised, bonded workers in each home. All workers are covered by Worker's Compensation. There is no minimum or maximum number of hours of service in this program. Supervisors have five or more years experience in this field. Hourly rates are reasonable and may be paid bi-monthly or monthly.

Home Health Care: Home Health Care is that part of a medical care plan providing needed health care and supportive services intermittently to a sick or disabled person at home. It is an alternative to hospital or nursing home care. To qualify, a person must have an injury or illness keeping them at home. They must need skilled nursing care or therapy on an intermittent basis or on a daily basis for a short period of time. They must also be under the care of a physician. Medicare, Medicaid, private insurance or private pay may be arranged.

Rural Transportation: This program is offered for the general public in rural areas of the Panhandle. There are no eligibility requirements. Cost for services are as follows: low income individuals may be certified as eligible for services. Others may receive services for payment of fee. Current fee is 50 cents for in-town areas covered in the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle.

Information and Referral: This program is designed to provide information to senior citizens, their families and persons concerned with senior citizens about those services which are available to assist them. Referrals and advocacy are made on behalf of senior citizens along with resource development to obtain services for senior citizens when no service is available for the 26-county area of the Texas Panhandle. Call Katie Boward at 373-0392 for more information.

Retired Senior Volunteer Program: Recruiting and placing senior citizens for volunteer work is the service of this program. All senior volunteers are covered by insurance when they do volunteer work, from the time they leave home, during the work period and until they return home. A meal is furnished at most worksites where they are assigned to do volunteer work. Transportation and mileage reimbursement is provided for the volunteer. To be eligible, a person must be 60 years of age or older. There is no cost for this program. Call Pat Cathcart at (806)373-8389.

HUD: Services provide assistance with eligible households in paying rental costs for approved standard rental housing units. Low or moderately low income as determined by established income guidelines. Priorities for placement are: Elderly (age 62 or over), handicapped or disabled and large low income families. Tenants pay no more than 30 percent of net adjusted income toward housing rent, utility allowances are taken into consideration in computing the amount of rental subsidy.

Weatherization: This program is designed to reduce energy costs for low income households, particularly the elderly, through weather stripping, caulking, insulation of attics, installation of storm windows and doors, or repair to existing doors and windows to prevent air infiltration. There is no cost to eligible persons for this service.

Energy Crisis Program: Services provided assist the elderly, handicapped, disabled and low income families within the 26 counties of the Panhandle. There is no cost to eligible persons for this service.

Target: Better Readers

Billy Bob Adams

Better reading begins at home with parent's help.

Fostering good reading skills, attitudes and habits at home will benefit your children their entire lifetimes. Parents establish the foundation for their young children's future success in reading when they first begin to teach them names of familiar objects and people.

By modeling good language, speaking in complete sentences, questioning children about what they know, and praising them when they respond correctly, parents enhance children's language development. By reading aloud to their children, parents create a feeling of warmth which communicates the idea that reading is good and enjoyable.

As children begin to read, parents should take the time to listen, to gently correct, and to praise their children's efforts. A pleasant way to do this is for the parent to read one page of a story and the child the next page. Once children have learned to read, parents should support their growth as readers by encouraging independent reading, by taking trips to the library, and by supporting and monitoring homework assignments.

How parents can get into the

act.

*Be a reader yourself. Children who grow up in homes where books, magazines and newspapers are a part of family life are likely to want to follow their parents' example and read for pleasure.

*Read to, and with, your child. Bedtime stories are a ritual in most households with preschoolers but don't stop reading aloud to your child just because he's old enough to read for himself.

*Use the library. If your child is old enough to sign his own name, he's old enough to have a library card. Public libraries usually have special services for youngsters.

*Make sure your child has plenty of reading material of his own. Children take pride in owning their own books, so wrap up a few appealing ones along with the Cabbage Patch Kids for your child's next birthday.

*Make reading convenient and enticing. Provide a bookshelf in your child's room. It doesn't have to be fancy. Add a lamp next to the bed to provide good light for reading.

*Turn television to your advantage. Too much television is the enemy of reading, but you can make it work for you by limiting the number of hours the set is turned on and having your child read the TV schedule with you to select what shows to watch.

*Recognize that reading and writing are interrelated. Most teachers have children compose their own stories as a way of introducing them to reading and you can do the same at home. Other good writing activities include drawing up itineraries for family trips, making shopping lists, writing letters, keeping a diary and reading and writing greeting cards.

It depends on you, too.

Your child, like most children, will learn how to read. Whether the child will read and read fluently depends partly on you.

If you want your child to read well and with understanding--to "get hooked on books"--begin early to lay the right foundation.

You need not be a professional teacher yourself. You do need to care and to take every opportunity to help your child learn about the written language. Encourage your child to read and make time for it in your home.

Capital Comments

Austin-Every legislator was aware that the 70th Texas Legislature would be the toughest session held in decades. But no one ever dreamed it would be this tough.

The Capitol post office says the volume of mail is astronomical and exceeds past volumes by huge amounts.

Every new gimmick imaginable is used in the lobbying process. For instance, Phillip Morris, some time back placed literature in each carton of cigarettes. From their responses, they sent back three or four pages of printed stationery to their smokers with a sharp message neatly typed and directed to the State Representative or Senator in their districts, saying smokers' rights were being abused. The messages were varied so all letters didn't sound the same. I have copies of the Phillip Morris correspondence. All these letters must be answered and require considerable time on

the part of the legislator and his staff. There is a bill that addresses segregated smoking in public places. It will never get out of committee.

Lawyers that try cases before district and state judges write strong letters of support for salary raises for the judges and, no doubt, send blind copies of their letter to their judges. State agencies advise the recipients of benefits that their financial and other aid is about to be terminated un-

less they contact their legislator. Although strictly prohibited by law, no doubt, much state money is spent on lobby effort. The more money and program growth, the bigger the lobby effort.

Lobbyists who work for different state worker and retiree groups send out propaganda advising their clients there could be a raid on their funds. Later, when their scare stories never come to pass, they take full credit for putting out a fire that never existed.

A best-selling book could be written on this subject.

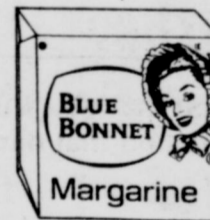
