Groom swept the Elementary and Junior High UIL Contest last week. Groom Elementary placed first with 372 points, Samnorwood placed second with 269, followed by Grandview-Hopkins with 228, McLean 193, Lefors 130 and Kelton 74.

The Junior High won with 410 points, Samnorwood 285, McLean 209, Lefors 130 and Kelton 62.

The News was unable to get a report on how each individual contestant did,

but we hope to have it next week.

Groom UIL contestants swept the District match last week, at Clarendon College, with 308 points. Samnorwood was second with 171 points.

Greg Lamb moved to accept the bid from E.D. Baker Corp.; R.E. Cornett seconded.

streets where needed.

City Engineer Dwight Brandt recommended the city employees spray the streets for weeds around the end of May and again before work begins on the seal coating.

The Groom News Awarded 3 Honors At PPA Convention

The Panhandle Press Association held their annual convention last week at the Harvey Hotel in Amarillo.

The Groom News, represented by Phillip Miller and Donna Burton, was awarded three honors in their annual newspaper contest.

"This was our first effort in my 15 years ownership of the paper," said Miller, "It takes a lot of time to enter this type of contest. Scrutinizing a year's worth of issues and articles and trying to pick your best is very difficult."

Competition is fierce with over 50 newspapers from the Texas Panhandle participating.

The Groom News placed third in the "Best Spot Photograph" category, behind the Tulia Herald and Castro County News; third in "Front Page Layout," behind the Tulia Herald and Abernathy Weekly; and honorable mention in "Advertising Initiative" with the Tulia Herald, The Eagle Press and Castro County News winning. The Groom News tied with the Canadian Record.

"We were very surprised," said Burton, "we work hard to put out what we hope is a good paper each week. It's nice to have your peers recognize your efforts!"

Other highlights of the convention included the keynote speaker, Texas Education Commissions, Lionel "Skip" Meno, a very interesting panel discussion on ethics and the installation of the four members to the Hall of Fame.

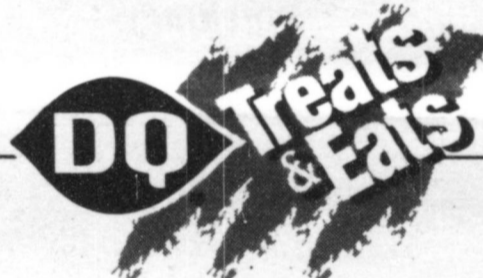

Carson County Sheriff's Report

During the past week, the Carson County Sheriff's Department has had persons booked into our facility for the following offenses: DPS Warrants (1), Possession of Controlled Substances (4), Traffic Charges (6), DWI (1), Domestic Violence (1), Arson (1), and Possession of Stolen Property (1).

As of this date we have fourteen persons confined in the Carson County Jail. These persons are confined under the following charges: Indecency with a Child (1), Arson (1), Stolen Vehicle (1), DWI Committal (2), Parole Violation (2), DPS Warrants (2), Child Endangerment/Abandonment (1), Possession of Cocaine (2).

Possession of Marijuana (1), and Credit Card Abuse (1). Our officers responded to a variety of assistance calls dealing with stranded motorists, cattle on roadways and medical emergencies. We returned a suspect from New Mexico to Carson County who was wanted on Arson charges stemming from a grand jury indictment.

Two members of the Carson County Sheriff's Department, Lee Tice and Doug Muir, were recently given certificates of commendation as the result of their excellent performance in dealing with emergency situations. Our Dispatch/Corrections officers are the backbone of our organization. These officers are responsible for handling

all activities regarding inmates in the jail which include feeding, booking, providing for medications/care and overall supervision of the jail population. In addition, these officers maintain the 9-1-1 Emergency system for

all cities in the county, dispatch personnel for the various fire departments, city police, city marshals, state patrol officers, ambulance services and officers from our department. We ask a great deal of these officers and all too often, we take such valuable personnel for granted.

Our Dispatch/Corrections staff is headed by Sandra Rogers, Jail Administrator, and includes, Steve Lewis, Doug Muir, Steve Hardin, Fred Herrick and Lee Tice. Lee is our secretary and is also responsible for handling radio and telephone communications.

D. P. S. Report As The Interstate Turns...

Postmaster Advises Public To Mail Tax Returns Early

Groom Postmaster Doris Kuehler encourages the public to mail their Federal Internal Revenue Service tax returns before the Thursday, April 15, deadline and avoid the last minute rush to the Post Office.

Kuehler reminds postal customers to use adequate postage (29¢ for the first

ounce and 23¢ for each additional ounce up to 11 ounces) and have a legible return address when mailing tax returns. "The Internal Revenue Service will not accept Postage Due mail and this mail will be returned to sender," the postmaster advised. "Because local postal

authorities are prohibited from opening First-Class mail, all local Postage Due mail without a return address must be sent to the U.S. Postal Service's regional Dead Letter Office in Atlanta, Ga. to be opened." She added that mail sent to the Dead

Letter Office may take several weeks to be processed and returned to the sender.

"If you have any questions about amount of postage required for your tax return, call or come in to the local post office so we can assist you in getting those tax forms in on time," Kuehler said.

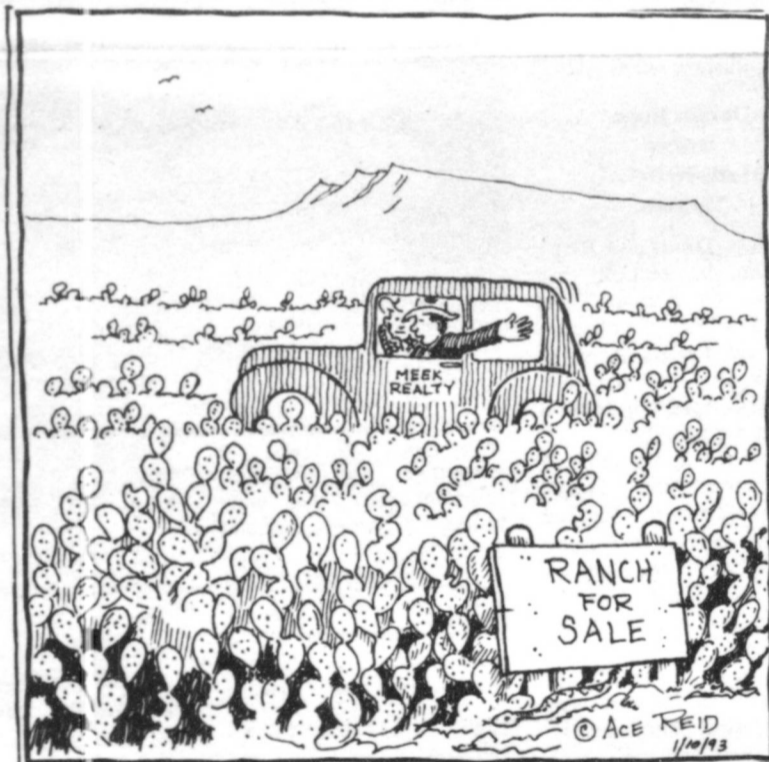
