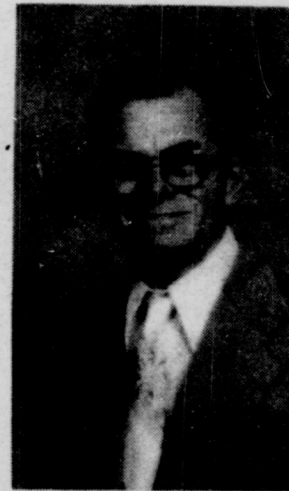
Guy Blackwell Buried June 19 In Groom

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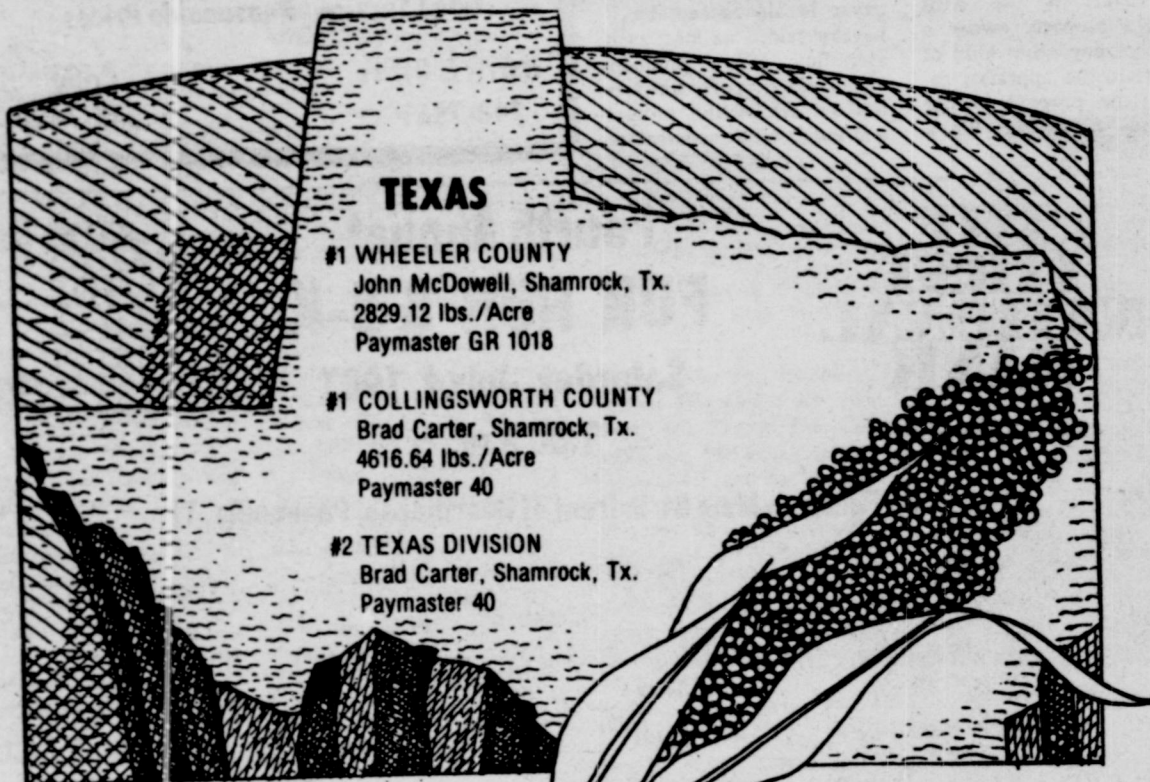
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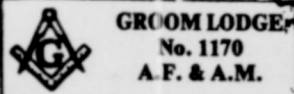

ARB To Hear Taxpayer Complaints On July 1

Taxpayers in the Carson County Appraisal District will have an opportunity on July 1 to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protests at 9:00 a.m.

After the ARB concludes its hearings and approves final property values, local governments will use these

values to assess property taxes to property owners for 1987.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and are appointed by the district's directors. Their responsibilities are outlined by the Texas Constitution, which requires that property be appraised equally and uniformly and that exemptions and productive valuation are properly granted.

Property owners appear before the ARB and may protest any of these seven specific actions of the appraisal office:

--the appraised or agricultural value of the property;

--unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to other property in the district;

--inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;

--denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption;

--denial of agricultural-use, open-space or timber productivity valuation;

--identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;

--determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property; and

--any other action of the appraisal office that adversely affects them.

Dianne Lavake, chief appraiser for the district, outlined the steps for a property owner to file a protest. First, the property owner must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB. This must be filed by June 30 or within 30 days after the taxpayer receives a notice of appraised value from the chief appraiser, whichever is later.

However, if the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records, the property owner has only 10 days to file a

McLean Exes Come Home To Reunion

To say that this past weekend was a great one would be putting it mildly. It has been a long time since McLean had so many visitors and so many activities going on at the same time.

It began with the Ex-Students Reunion and the 77th Annual McLean 66 Round-up Rodeo, both of which started on Friday night. The fun continued on Saturday as the ex-students had a BBQ lunch and general meeting in the park, held individual class meetings at 2:00 p.m., attended the rodeo parade at 4:00 p.m., went to the horse race at 5:00 p.m. and wound up the festivities with the rodeo and dances at the rodeo arena and the country club on Saturday night.

June Suggs, president of the Ex-Students Association, said that this year's reunion was the largest held during her six years as president. A total of 396 ex-students registered and 536 attended the BBQ lunch at the park. Students starting with the class of '17 and going all the way to the class of '87 were on hand to join in the fun.

Mrs. Suggs sent out over 900 letters this year to remind people of the reunion and they responded in force. People from 14 states, including Texas, Tennessee,

New Mexico, Oregon, Oklahoma, Hawaii, California, Colorado, Louisiana, Arkansas, South Carolina, Arizona, Kansas, Wyoming and Michigan, took time out from their busy schedules to return home for a visit.

At the BBQ lunch, several awards were handed out. Fred Russell, now of Clarendon, was recognized as being the oldest ex-student present. Now 89 years old, he said he started to school in McLean in 1904 when the school was only a one room building.

Kid McCoy, class of '38, came from Hawaii and won the award for being the person who had traveled the most miles to attend the reunion. Business at the general meeting concluded with the election of Casper Smith as the new president of the Ex-Students Association.

As outgoing president, Mrs. Suggs said, "It was a great experience for me and I appreciate the help that I got from everyone in making the reunion a success. It took a lot of hard work from many people to make it go."

Mrs. Suggs said she will continue to maintain the mailing lists for a while. Anyone who has a change of address before the next reunion is encouraged to notify the Ex-Students Association.

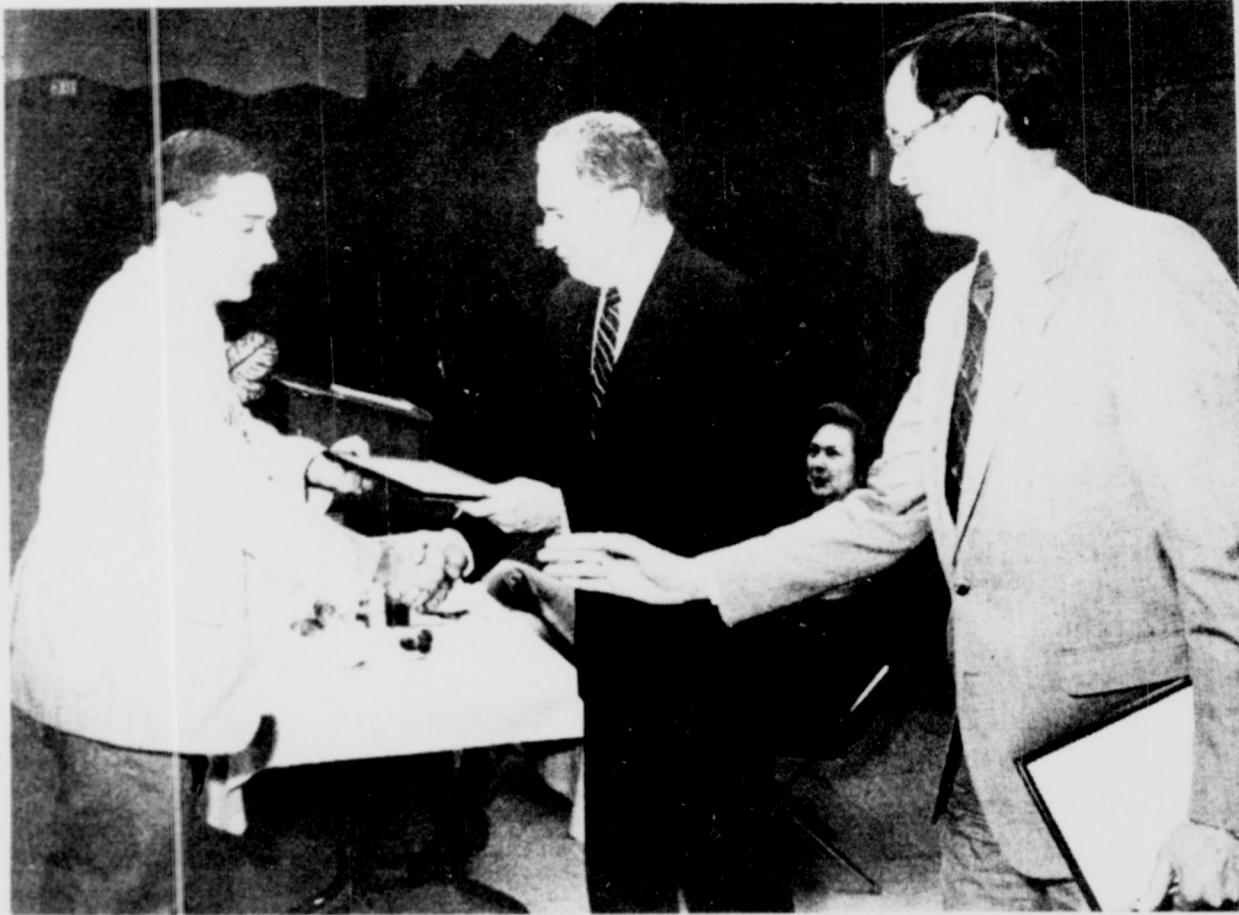

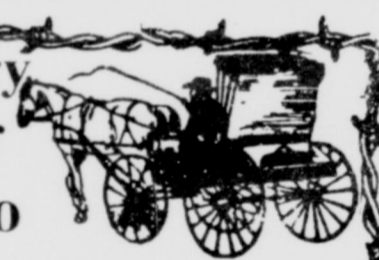

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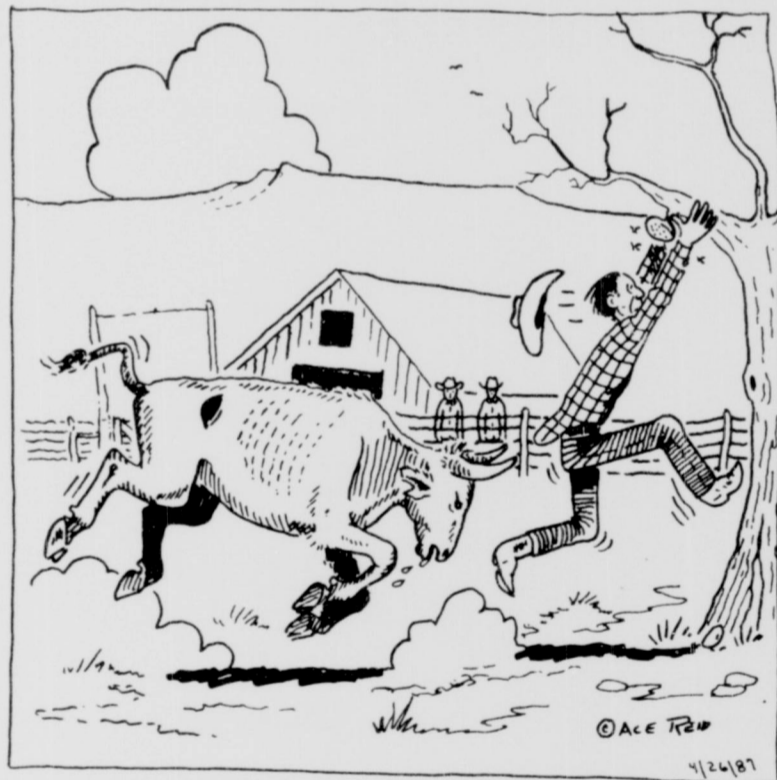

Through the prompt efforts of the entire Navy rescue team, over 75 Philipinoes were rescued in spite of the U.S. Navy not learning of the disaster until 24 hours after it had occurred.

Dr. and Mrs. Petty have four children and expect another soon. Dr. Petty was recently selected to continue his medical training in Anesthesiology and will begin that residency in July, 1987 at the U. S. Naval Hospital in Bethesda, Maryland.

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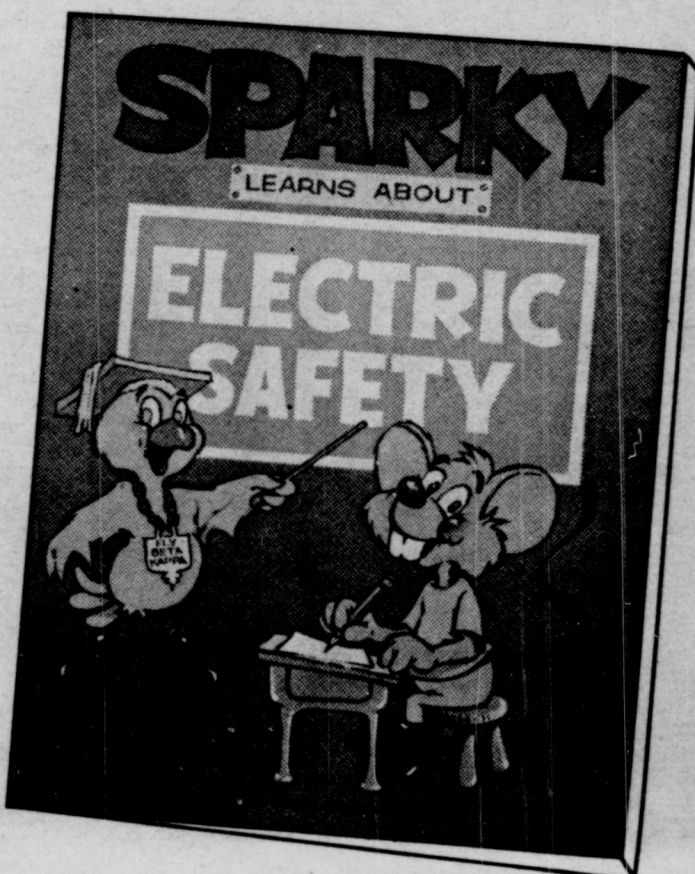

with some decision or action of the appraisal office."

Each protesting taxpayer may offer evidence or argument either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Taxpayers should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing unit spending and will not hear protests of those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the schedule appearance date. Lavake said that protest hearings will be held for one day and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on July 1, 1987. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20.

After the ARB approves the records, it can hear a protest only if an error substantially affects the owner's tax liability.

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities" available at the Carson County Appraisal District office, which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB. For a copy, contact the appraisal district staff at 102 Main, P.O. Box 970, Panhandle or call 537-3569.


