"I need to hear more discussion on the matter before I decide," he said.

With regard to future projects, he would like see more effort spent procuring some additional business for Groom.

Britten feels that the Ambulance Department is a very important issue

"I am not sure of the best solution for the ambulance service. I can see pros and cons on both sides. We need an ambulance serving Groom. We do not have the volunteers to man the service in the manner required. And to be honest, we do not make enough runs to justify keeping a full-time employee, until it is you or

your ramily member who needs the service. When one of our community members needs help, we do to not need to wait 30 minutes or more for help to arrive. I would have to look at the records of services similar to ours to see if other cities have been able to manage their ambulance services. The main problem I see is there would not be many cities our size that have a fulltime ambulance service that we could look to for comparison" comm ented

Britten would not like

to see the city taxes raised, but realizes that at some point they may have to be raised.

"We are proud of our city"s over all appearance. If you go to other small towns in our areas you will still find unpaved streets. The cost of maintaining our city services is rising along with everything else," she continued.

"I have lived most of my adult life in and around Groom. I have not taken an active part in our city government before now. I do realize through that if we live in a community then we also have a responsibility to take part in its government and I am willing to do my part. I

will listen to the concerns of the citizens of groom and do may best to represent them on the city council. I am not a member of another council or organization and will have only the community's best interest as my top priority," commented Sharon Jones Britten.
