McLean Library Receives Grant

McLean Lovett Memorial Library has received a grant from the Texas Book Festival for a total of \$25,000., the highest amount you can receive. The grant was

founded to bring out the importance of public libraries in Texas.

The sessions are held at the state capitol in Austin. Laura Bush is the Honorary Chairperson for this event, which gave out grants to 107 public libraries for a total of \$256,910.

"I'm really excited about receiving this grant," stated McLean librarian Ellen Malone. The money will be used to buy new fiction in large and regular print.





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

Arts & Crafts, Area Rodeo To Be Held In Pampa

A weekend of family fun will come alive on Saturday and Sunday, May 1 and 2, 1999, when the Top O' Texas Rodeo Association hosts its Sixth Annual Arts and Crafts Show, Third Annual Bar-b-que cook-off and Amateur Team Penning at the National Guard Armory and Top O' Texas Rodeo Arena in Pampa.

An arts and crafts show will be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday at the National Guard Armory. Indoor and outdoor booth space may be rented on a first come, first served basis by contacting the rodeo office. Indoor pavilion space is \$25.00 and limited. Outdoor space is \$15.00 per space.

No food or drink vendors are allowed. No livestock will be permitted and vendors are required to furnish their own equipment and tables. Vendors may begin booth set up after 4 p.m. on Friday.

Trophies will be awarded to the top three places in each event. Cooks must furnish their own equipment and all meat must be cooked on the premises. Sample plates will be sold to the public following the judging with the proceeds going to a local charity. The Bar-b-que Cook-off is sponsored by McDonalds Restaurants of Pampa and Perryton, Holmes Gift Shop and Sports Center, and Perryton Printing.

The Third Annual Amateur Team Penning will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, May 1, 1999 at the Top O' Texas Rodeo Arena. Books will open at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, May 1 and close at the start of each class. Classes and their entry fees are as follows: Amateur-Novice - \$60.00 per team, Mixed - \$60.00 per team, and Youth \$21.00 per team. Each rider is limited to 3 rides. Q. Where Do The Dead Go?
First, a correction: The first sentence from the second paragraph of last week's article should have read as follows: "We must remember that simply manifesting some kind of "power or sign" does NOT mean that its origin is from God."
Some people believe that when someone dies they simply cease to exist. While we may think that only atheists would hold that view, even some religions teach "soul annihilation." However, the Scriptures teach the opposite.
In Luke 16:19-31, Jesus tells the story of the rich man and Lazarus. At his death, Lazarus "was carried away by the angels to Abraham's bosom." Verse 25 makes it clear that Lazarus is in a place of comfort. The rich man died and went to Hades, a place of torment. He speaks of being in agony because of the flame. He desires relief, but none can be given. It is too late. From Jesus' teaching, the dead, both righteous and unrighteous, are in a place which precedes the final judgement day, but they are already aware of their final destiny.
Paul offers words of comfort to the Thessalonian Christians in 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18. He encourages them not to grieve for those who have died in Christ as if they had no hope. When Jesus returns, the dead in Christ shall rise first and be caught up in the clouds with Jesus. Then those Christians who remain will join them with Jesus in the clouds.
Our concern must not be with death but with life! How we live will determine where we go when we die. Please search the Scriptures to insure your salvation!

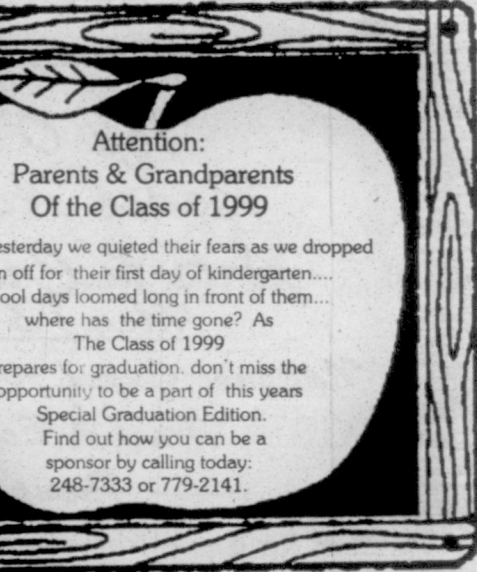

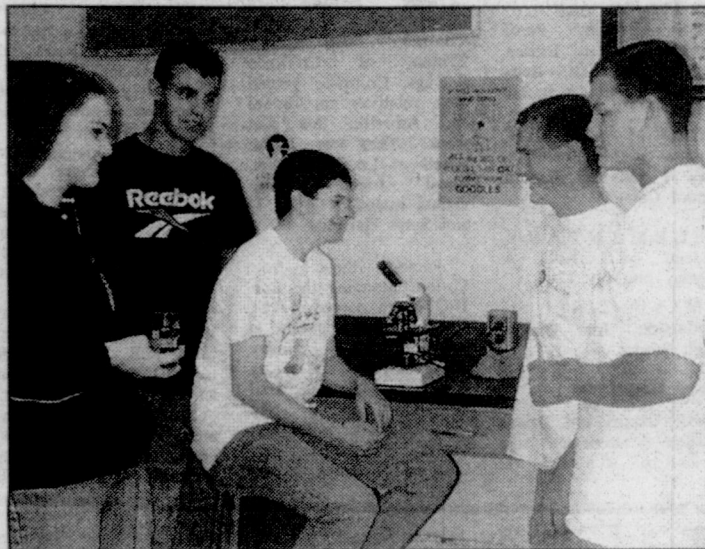
Commissioners Split Tobacco Funds Between Accounts



Legislature Has Budget On Hold

As we move into May, the school calendar is more full than ever. We will all experience a whirlwind of activity between now and May 21. TAAS tests are upcoming, and competition in athletics and literary events are still in progress. If we are lucky, we will survive banquet season without having to buy bigger clothes.

As many of you already know, the school has undertaken a project

to update the electrical equipment and heating/air conditioning systems for the building. After an extensive engineering study, it became obvious that Groom ISD would have to do an electrical retrofit project for safety reasons. We are currently looking at loans, grants, and other funding options for this portion of the project. In addition, the heating and air conditioning retrofit will be largely funded from energy savings resulting from the new

equipment. The most important thing is that our students will be able to learn in a safe, comfortable, well-lit environment. I would like to commend the board of trustees for their careful, forward thinking consideration on this difficult issue. 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Pets

Also your duty as a responsible pet owner, is to see that your pet is secure. The City of Groom has very strict

laws governing dogs running at large, the number of dogs a person can have on their property and other animal concerns.

You are breaking the law anytime your animal is not under your control and restricted in their ability to leave your property.

Dogs should always be on a leash when they are walking with you if you walk for exercise.

While it is bending the rules a bit to let a house dog out to use the bathroom, pet owners should keep them in sight and they should not leave the owner's property. Letting the dog out and not watching it can make you very unpopular with your neighbors as well as result in a stiff fine.

Animal control officer, Donna Burton, stated,

"While technical this is a violation, as long as the owner can be seen watching the dog on their own property, we would not file a complaint. However, if an owner is doing yard work or other activities that take their attention away from the animal and the pet wanders away or is left unattended we will consider this a violation."

The same is true if your dog resides in the back of your pick-up. Anytime the animal is un-restrained and wanders away you can be fined and are liable for damage caused by your pet. Responsible pet owners know where their animals are and what they are doing.

"All pets will get loose occasionally," stated Burton. "We try to

maintain an open mind and help the responsible pet owner find their animal and discover how it is getting out or what the problem may be. What we have little patience for is owners who do not try to correct the problem or are

careless about letting the animal run at large or bark incessantly and disturb the peace. These folks will be fined. The current fine is \$25.00 and increases \$25.00 for each offence. Court costs are also expensive when a ticket is issued. Currently they are \$38.25 per ticket.

Pet owners cannot have more than six animals (dog or cats) over 4 months of age. Groom does have a kennel licensing ordinance that allows for more than six but requires special zoning restrictions, periodic inspections and other special circumstances. Contact the Groom City Office if you think you may fall in this category. The City can also issue citations for this offense, as well.

Owning a pet is a big responsibility. Have your animal in control and vaccinated.

Be aware of your neighbors rights and inform animal control if you are having problems with your pet or someone else's.

"We want to help Groom have a happy, well cared for pet population," commented Burton, "not chase dogs all over town issuing tickets to people. The law applies to us all, friends, neighbors and relatives!"
