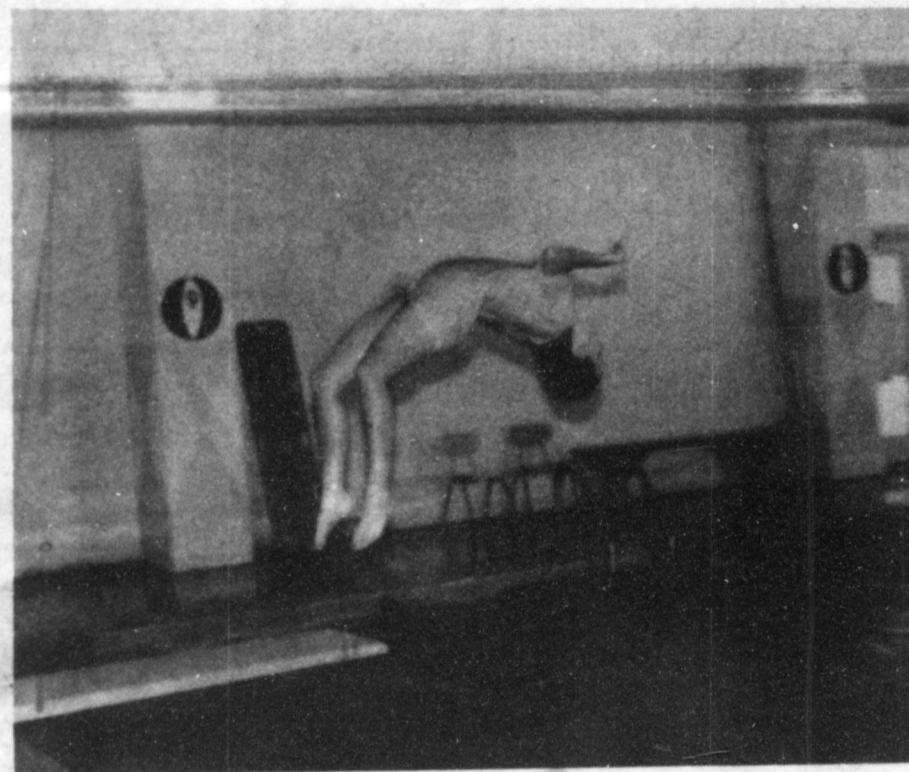

Groom Basketball Camps, Grades 2-9 Planned

For the sixth year in a row, Groom basketball coaches will host a basketball camp for the area youth.

Targeted for enthusiasts from second grade through ninth grade, campers will learn fundamentals of the game as well as participate in fun contests and competitions.

Some of the topics to be covered are: Offensive and defensive fundamentals; shooting instruction; team offense and defense; and man-to-man basics. The coaches are also

planning a free throw contest; hot shot shooting contests; lay up competition and team competition.

The girls camp, hosted by Shirley Fields will be July 19 - 23. Girls in the second through fifth grade will attend the Fundamentals Clinic from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm. Fee for the camp will be \$20.00. Each camper will receive a camp t-shirt and their own personal basketball.

Girls in sixth - ninth grades will attend the Team Clinic from 1:00 - 5:00 p.m., July 19 - 23. They will also

Farmers "Back In The Saddle" After Rains

The grain trucks and combines were rolling with a fury this weekend as warm temperatures and wind soon dried up the rain from late last week. Although spotty showers dumped ½" to 1" of rain in the Grandview and Hoover areas Saturday morning just about every one else was able to get back in the field Saturday.

The moisture termed "A Million Dollar Rain", by bank president, Bobby Babcock fell at just the right time.

"Even most of the farmers that were in the middle of harvest were glad to see the moisture," stated Babcock. "It was badly needed for the corn and milo crops."

To the best of our knowledge, Joe Homer brought in the first load of wheat on June 8th to the Wheeler Evans Elevators in Groom. Harry Haiduk

brought the first load into The Corners location on June 11th.

Terrell Britten brought the first load into Groom's Attebury Grain on June 14.

"Yields are running about half of what they were last year for the majority of farmers," said Nadine Thornton of Wheeler Evans Elevators in Groom.

Attebury Grain's Tony Treadwell stated that they have also experienced some erratic yields.

"Dryland wheat has been producing anywhere from 8 to 30 bushels per acre while irrigated crops are yielding between 10 and 50," Treadwell said. "We had one Sunday that a hot dry wind blew out of the south just as most of this wheat was maturing. That hurt some, and some fields really could have used one more rain."

No Firework Discharging In Groom

As the July 4th celebration nears fire cracker enthusiasts are reminded of the safety rules and city ordinances that will help keep the fun in safe boundaries.

Section 12 - 1 & 12 - 2 of the City Code says, that it is unlawful to sell or keep in stock fire crackers, or to discharge them with in the city limits of Groom.

However, the city does allow the use of fireworks at the baseball park south of the legion hall. They do ask that everyone clean up their own mess and not leave sparkler wire on the playing field.

Some other safety rules to follow are:

Always ignite fireworks in an open area, away from homes, dry wheat stubble or grass. A recently plowed field is always a good place, providing you have the owner's permission.

Follow the directions and find out what to expect from different types of fireworks. Some types go up in the air, while some spin or bounce along the ground.

Never try to relight fireworks that misfire or go out.

Ag Commissioner Addresses Texas Press Convention On The Need To Keep Ag Products Closer To Home For The Economy's Sake

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said Friday that the state must work harder to keep its agricultural products closer to home for processing to create jobs and boost the economy.

Mr. Perry spoke to the 114th summer convention of the Texas Press Convention held in San Antonio over the weekend.

The Commissioner urged Texas Press Association members to help generate support for a state ballot issue in November that would finance loans to businesses trying to get into value-added industries. Texas Press members

Also speaking at the convention were representatives of the Texas Attorney Generals' Office on Texas Open Meeting Laws and Open Records Act and newly elected Senator Kay Bailey Hutchinson.

White Deer Youth Killed In Accident Monday Evening

Curtis Lee Whitehead, 16, of White Deer, died June 28, 1993 in an accident on FM 749. Whitehead was northbound, lost control of his vehicle after he completed a curve, rolling the vehicle four times.

A passenger in the vehicle, John Keith Jernigan, 15, of Lefors was taken to Coronado Hospital with facial lacerations and a broken back.

Whitehead and Jernigan were not wearing seatbelts at the time of the accident.

Services for Whitehead were Wednesday at the First Baptist Church in White Deer.

Curtis was born on April 25, 1977 in Pampa. He was a resident of White Deer all his life. He attended White Deer High School and was active in FFA and 4-H. He had been nominated for "Who's Who Among American High School Students." He had been in the band for two years, and was a member of the First Baptist Church in White Deer.

Survivors include his parents, Rickey and Susie Whitehead of White Deer; a sister, Stacey Whitehead of White Deer; a maternal grandmother, Betty Bockmon of Pampa; a paternal grandfather, Harile Lee and Betty Whitehead of Pampa; a paternal grandmother, Edna and David Thompson of Ruidoso, N.M.; and several aunts and uncles.

Athletic physicals are required of all athletes prior to participation in any University Interscholastic League sport. 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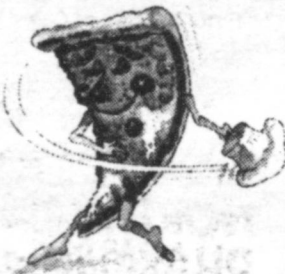

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Carson County Sheriff's Report

Persons recently booked into the Carson County Jail were charged with: DWI (3rd offense), Possession Of Marijuana (Misdemeanor), Possession of Marijuana (Felony), Probation Violation (Arizona), Theft by check (Randall County), DPS Warrants, Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle, Probation Violation (Texas), Failure to Identify to Police, Driving with Licensed Suspended and DWI (1st offense).

Of the fourteen person currently incarcerated in our jail, five are awaiting openings in the prison system for transfer to the Texas Department of Corrections and two are being held pending release to their counties.

On Thursday night, our department assisted the Texas Highway Patrol, the Armstrong County Sheriff's Department, the Potter County Sheriff's Department and the U.S. Marshal's Office in a search for a person impersonating a federal officer. Our dispatcher received a 9-1-1 call from person who had been stopped by a person identifying himself as a U.S. Deputy Marshal. The alleged officer told the witness that he was involved in a gun battle with two escaped federal prisoners and asked the witness to call other law officers for back-up. As the search progressed, the Amarillo Police Department received another call which indicated that the gun battle had

moved to the area of the Potter/Carson County line. The area was thoroughly searched by officers and no evidence of such a confrontation was encountered.

Further investigation by our department revealed the name and location of a person who is a witness to this incident. That information was relayed to the U.S. Marshal's office and the witness has agreed to assist in the apprehension of the suspect. It is our intention to prosecute the subject once he has been located.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department is investigating the theft of a camping trailer that was stolen at the rest area on Interstate 40. The owner was towing the trailer behind a Ryder rental truck and had stopped at the rest area to get some sleep before continuing the drive. While the driver was sleeping, the camper was disconnected and taken from the rest area. The driver didn't notice the trailer was missing until he reached Shamrock.

Our department is investigating allegations of assault and assault with a motor vehicle in Groom. The incident involved a conflict between an adult and a juvenile. We are also investigating a report of criminal mischief at a business in the Industrial Boulevard area of Borger (Carson County) and other reports of abandoned motor vehicles.

As The Interstate Turns . . .

On Sunday June 20th Trooper Chris Ray investigated an accident on I-40 one mile west of Groom. Investigation revealed that the driver had fallen asleep at the wheel. Alcohol was involved.

On Monday June 21st Corporal Roland McGill investigated an accident on I-40 7 miles east of Amarillo when a Claude woman had an insulin reaction losing control of her car. No citations were issued.

On Tuesday June 22nd a Arizona youth was arrested for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. The youth was taken before Justice of the Peace Bill Hinson where he pled guilty and paid a \$200.00 fine. Later that afternoon a Indiana man was arrested on I-40, 4 miles west of Groom for failing to pay child support. The man was taken to the Carson County Sheriff's Office until he could post a \$2,500. bond.

On Thursday, June 24th a McAllen, TX man was arrested for \$867.00 in unpaid DPS tickets. Later that afternoon Trooper Chris Ray arrested a Texas youth for Possession of

Alcoholic beverages. The next traffic stop resulted in an Amarillo man giving a false name to Trooper Ray. The man was arrested and placed in the Carson Co. Jail.

On Friday, June 25th, Trooper Chris Ray arrested an Amarillo man for unpaid Amarillo Police Department warrants on US 60. The man was taken to Carson Co. Jail until APD could pick him up.

On Saturday, June 26th, an Illinois youth was arrested on I-40, 3 miles West of Conway for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Later that afternoon an accident was investigated on I-40, 12 miles east of Groom when an Amarillo woman lost control of her suburban and travel trailer. Trooper Chris Ray, Mark Bivens, and McLean rescue units assisted at the scene.

In the early morning hours of June 27th, Corporal McGill arrested a man on US 60 just west of Panhandle for Driving While Intoxicated.

Housing For The Qualified Applicants

Rural residents who are homeless or inadequately-housed families may now have a choice to become homeowners under a plan being adopted by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), August H. Hesse, III, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Under the plan, special emphasis will be given to homes that have been in FmHA's inventory at least 18 months.

Inventory homes will be offered to public bodies, including housing authorities and nonprofit community-based organizations, for rent to the homeless, or in some

cases, FmHA will rent directly to the individuals, Hesse said. In addition, homes which were recently acquired by FmHA into inventory but have not yet been repaired will also be offered for lease to the homeless.

The families who obtain the housing from the public bodies or nonprofit organizations may apply to buy the house at any time during the lease. Those who rent directly from FmHA will pay rent based on their income and will be given the opportunity to buy the house they rent, Hesse said that many homeless people work and have incomes.

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Workman's Compensation Commission Urges Insurance Co. To Lower Rates

The executive director of the Texas Workers' Compensation Commission on Monday urged commercial insurance companies to lower the rates they charge employers for workers' compensation insurance coverage.

Todd K. Brown said financial data released this week by the Texas Workers' Compensation Insurance Facility proved "beyond a shadow of a doubt" that costs for insurers have fallen dramatically since the state's new workers' compensation law went into effect in 1991. "It's high time that insurance companies passed on those savings to employers," he said.

The Facility, the insurer of last resort for many Texas employers, ended both 1991 and 1992 with budget surpluses - only the second and third times that's happened since the Facility was established in 1953. The Facility said it had a budget surplus of about \$154 million in 1991 and expected a surplus of at least \$203 million in 1992. The only other surplus was recorded in 1980.

"The Facility's performance is a barometer of the workers'

compensation system's overall performance," Brown said. "If the Facility can have a budget surplus while insuring the state's highest-risk employers, you can be sure that commercial carriers are seeing lower costs in the voluntary market as well."

Brown said insurance companies that have refused to lower their rates, despite data that shows their costs have fallen, "are like bettors at a race track who keep putting money on a Volkswagen when there's a Corvette in the pole position."

"The first year after the new law, commercial carriers came in and requested rate increases because they said their data on the new law was incomplete. Then they admitted that their workers' compensation costs had fallen, but they said they weren't sure if the trend would hold up. Many carriers have continued to ask for the maximum rate increase allowed by law," Brown said.

He said insurance companies that haven't lowered their rates are "sending out an awful message."

"They know the new law is working, but despite that knowledge, they continue to raise their rates or hold them exorbitantly high. It says to me that insurance companies want to talk about workers' compensation reform on the one hand but don't really want to follow through on it. It destroys their credibility to talk about the need for reform."

Brown said national insurance companies may also be hurting their cause in other states. "When other states look at us in Texas and see how successful our new system has been in lowering costs, but see how reluctant the insurance companies have been to lower their rates in response, I would imagine they'd think twice about going through the painful legislative battles that passing reform legislation usually requires." Texas passed its reform law in 1989, after an exhaustive two-year study of the old system and two special legislative sessions. The law was passed in part to lower overall system costs and to ensure that workers received fair and timely benefits.

"It's amazing that the Facility, the insurer of last resort for Texas employers can show such dramatic cuts in claims costs, but commercial insurance companies who can pick and choose their clients can't," Brown said.
