School Board Votes To Uphold Superintendent's Decision

In stunned silence, a crowd of 25 to 30 interested students, parents and community members, watched and listened as the Groom Independent School District Board unanimously voted to uphold Superintendent Ben Ingham's decision to suspend Counselor Debbie Addy's duties as counselor as well as her other extra curricular sponsorships.

Addy is a 19 year veteran of Groom ISD. She teaches Junior High English, is the School Counselor and sponsors many other school activities for both high school and junior high.

The Level III grievance is the result of an event that occurred in September in which Ms. Addy sent a school memo to all secondary teachers via the teachers mail boxes in the teachers lounge. The memo was to inform teachers that some students still needed to pass part of the TAAS exit level tests. The memo was as follows:

"September 17, 1998

Teachers:

All of our seniors have passed the TAAS tests which is great news. However, we still have several juniors who have not passed all sections of their tests. The TAAS tests will be given again in October for these juniors. If you have these students, please encourage them to do their best on these upcoming tests. Some still do not realize the importance of the tests. The students and the

tests they must take are as follows:

[This is where the names of the students and what part of the tests they needed to take were listed].

Thank you for all you do for each and every student in this school. Without your hard work and dedication, we would not have the high success rate that we do. I know that the students appreciate all of you.

On October 21, 1998, Ben Ingham sent Ms. Addy a letter citing the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) as the basis for her suspension and possible non-renewal of her contract.

Date: October 21, 1998
It has come to my attention that on September 17, 1998, you placed a letter in the boxes of secondary teachers. The letter listed the students, currently classified as juniors, who had not passed the EXIT TAAS.

Under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA"), personally identifiable student information should not be disclosed in this manner unless the "agency has determined that legitimate educational interests are present." In this case, Groom Independent School District, the agency did not make the determination that a disclosure should be

made concerning EXIT TAAS results.

EXIT TAAS results and students' names are personally identifiable information. Further, this is confidential student information and this manner of disclosure did not serve professional purposes. Therefore, FERPA, school policy, and the Code of Ethics and Standard Practices for Texas Educators may have been violated.

I believe that the failure to maintain this information in a confidential and appropriate manner is a failure to comply with Board Policies and a failure to comply with District standards of professional conduct. Please note that each of these are reasons for nonrenewal.

Because of your actions, and the seriousness of this situation, I have determined that you are suspended with pay from your job assignment as school counselor. This suspension will remain in place through the end of the current semester. In addition, please be advised that all supplemental duties which have previously been assigned to you, including your supplemental duty as cheerleader sponsor, have been terminated. You have no further responsibility or authority with regard to supplemental duties. If you have any documents or school property in your possession which relates, in any way, to your supplemental duties, you should deliver these

items to my office as soon as possible.

During the term of this suspension, it is my expectation and recommendation that you will concentrate on your classroom teaching duties and focus on maintaining effective working relationships and good rapport with faculty, student body and administration. Because this is a professional matter, I am confident you will treat it as such and there will be no disruptive or derisive activities. I would recommend and direct you to continue to remain in your classroom when students are assigned to you and that the classroom activities of other instructors not be interrupted. Finally, I would recommend and direct that the first period time slot now be used for classroom teaching purposes and/or professional development. The productivity of this time should be maximized by such work being done at your home room, work room for copying, or other productive undertakings, or at any other location for which you would request my advance approval.

Please be advised that any additional violation of school policy and the actions cited in this memorandum may be additionally used as a basis for nonrenewal of contract. In addition, please be advised that any of these future activities can be used as a basis for nonrenewal or

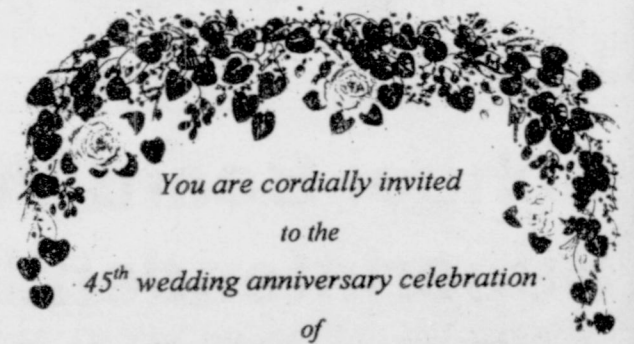



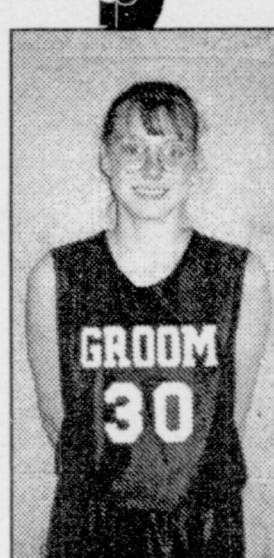

Letter To The Editor

Regarding Groom Grocery and other local businesses.

Groom is an ideal place to live and raise a family. We would never leave here if given the choice. Without the support of the community, local businesses would not be able to survive. We would like to sincerely thank all of our loyal customers who buy the bulk of their groceries at Groom Grocery. We could never tell you how much you are appreciated. For every one else who shops in Amarillo and Pampa, we have a few things to say to you. We would love to list officials and other pillars of the community who do not patronize their local businesses. However, we do not feel this is necessary. You know who you are.

If you added up your gas money and all the extras you buy, that you don't need, are you really saving enough to justify the grocery store closing here. Because that is exactly what is going to happen. We do not have enough business to keep the doors open. In the last two months we have gone into debt trying to stock the store with everything you might need. We have tried everything we know to get your business back. Now we are facing the possibility of not being able to meet our indebtedness for lack of support from our community. We realize we can not carry everything that the big grocery stores do, but we try to get what you ask

for. If you were to compare prices you would find we are higher on some items, but we are lower on some, too. We are doing our best to keep prices competitive for your benefit. We, personally, do some shopping out of town, for things we can not get in Groom, and that is understandable. We are a small community but there is a hardware store, service station, gift shop, feed store, video store, mechanic shops, insurance company and restaurants that we are sure share our feelings. None of us can survive without your support. Without the local businesses, the community has nothing to offer to young families wanting a safe place to raise their children, not to mention the people living here now. How can we be a proud community when we have nothing to be proud of.

Ms. Addy, along with her attorney and TEA Representative Sharon Carman, asked the Board, represented by Attorney Allan Rhodes to reinstate Addy's duties and remove the letter or reprimand from her personnel file.

The following is an excerpt of Ms. Addy's answer to the "Breaking of Student Confidentiality" allegation: "... Let me address the issue of TASAS confidentiality - when I was accused, I looked to see what other Texas schools were doing to let teachers know those students who might need help or reminding that they needed to retake the TAAS. Without exception, I found that other schools from the smallest classification to the largest, notify teachers in writing; some supply lists of all students who need to retake the TAAS in

memos that are placed in faculty boxes. Further, I was told by the counseling department of a large 5-A high school that such notification does not break any rules of confidentiality regarding the TAAS. The intent of the law/guidelines of TAAS says that a professional (usually the counselor) can communicate names or other information about the TAAS to another professional (usually classroom teachers) as long as the information does not affect the student's TAAS scores - like teaching part of the test or deliberately hindering a student from his/her best performance. The communique does not have to be in a sealed envelope - it only has to be between one professional and another. At no time was I advised that the Groom administration wished TAAS information to be

communicated differently than what my office had done during the years that I had been counselor. As a member of the Groom staff that cares and supports kids, I would have used the new guidelines had I been given them.

And, so I am also here tonight to tell you what I stand for. I stand for kids. I always have and will continue to be a child advocate. I want students who leave this school to know that teachers care, that I care and I want them to remember that this Groom teacher believed in them for who they were and are and have yet to become.

So, I feel that it is time for the board to look at the good of our educational village, don't hide behind rumors or gossip. The reality is that we have a great school. Every member of out staff cares about and supports the students in our school. My letter regarding TAAS was to

reach out for that support for the TAAS retake students - thus allowing our village to help ensure success for every student. I am a good teacher, I have been good for the students at Groom and I will continue to be pro education, pro kids, and pro active to give the school village where I am the best that I have to contribute."

Board President, Dennis Babcock, allowed everyone who wished, a chance to speak during the open forum.

Several co-workers spoke in her behalf.

"... It was her (Addy's) trustworthiness and her concern for the welfare of the child that compelled her to request the aid of the staff. . . To suggest that Ms. Addy would do anything to betray the students of this school is absurd. . ." stated colleague Leslie Crowell.

"... She has always put the welfare of the child first. . ." commented Business Teacher Georgann Hinson.

Lynn Britten, a parent of three children, two who have already graduated from Groom ISD stated, "How is a person supposed to know that something is wrong with the way they have done something for years, unless you tell them. . . All my kids loved and respected Ms. Addy. . . She attends everything this school has. . . look what has been done and what our achievements are. . ."

Student Jodi Homen also spoke to the Board. " . . . She has been a great influence on my life. . ."

Misty Homen said "She is a mentor and confidant. She is the backbone of my education. I still call her and ask for advice. She always has time for me."

Allan Rhodes, the school's attorney questioned each Board member asking a series of questions concerning their background, training and family. He also asked each Board member if they had discussed the matter at hand with their children.

Each answered no, or that the child had asked about the matter, but the Board member chose not to discuss it with them.

He also asked each of them if they could be fair and impartial. They each answered a firm "yes."

After the lengthy opening the Board went into "Executive Session" to deliberate. After an hour and 10 minutes the Board returned to the open session.

The Board was given five options.

Option 1: Grant the Grievance and reinstate Ms. Addy.

Option 2: Deny the Grievance.

Option 3: Grant the

Grievance in part, deny it in part.

Option 4: No decision at this time.

Option 5: Postpone action until the next meeting.

Board member Barry Fields made the motion, "Based on past and present information, I move we uphold the administrations decision in this matter."

Brad Rogers seconded the motion. The decision was unanimous as already stated.

Other items on the agenda were as follows: Staffing for the 1999-2000 school year was discussed in executive session. No action taken.

No action was taken concerning Policy Update #59.

The Principal's Report and the Financial Report were given by Ben

Ingham due to the illness in Principal Donnie Carroll's family and Joyce Hutsell, Business Manager was also ill, herself.

A special meeting is planned for December 21 to hear the audit report and approval by the Board.
