"We will handcarry the applications, and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders," said Wolf. "We will present a complete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements and appraisals. If necessary, we will make a commitment to work with the lender to do an interest buydown. We will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by committing to guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 percent."

"I was raised in the res aurant business," he said. 'It was a small town eating joint, but not a greasy spoon. "By the time I was 6 years old, I stood on a tomato crate to turn pancakes in the morning. I came back from school at noon to work the lunch break."
When he moved to Bethany in 1963 to attend college, Cooper learned "more elegant cooking," he said. "I began working for the Captain's Table as a waiter and went to assistant manager.'
For the next several years, Cooper worked in some of the Oklahoma City area's better restaurants as he

He also learned to prepare flaming dishes such as cherries jubilee, to make specialties such as Caesar salad, and to use meats other than the old standards of beef and chicken, such as lamb and fish.

In 1980, he left Baptist Medical Center to assume the position as food service director in Woodward, where he helped plan the food service area for the new hospital. While these duties often keep him out of the kitchen, he lands a hand there if needed.
Cooper still dons his chef's hat for catered functions such as wedding receptions and company parties held at the hospital cafeteria. He will prepare the flaming items, the salads, the special entrees or the bearnaise sauce.
"I once cooked a ninecourse French dinner for a party here," he said.
Such a party requires tablecloths, linen napkins, china, crystal and a waiter or waitress who "presents the meal," he said. This aimosphere of elegant dining is unavailable
locally.
"It's a very new idea to come to the hospital to eat a banquet," he said.
Cooper also teaches an eight-week gourmet cooking class at the High Plains Vo-Tech School in Woodward.
Students do all the preparation in class. The emphasis is on meats, salads and vegetables since mosi desserts take longer than the class," he said
class," he said.
The classes have an international flavor. Each week Cooper uses food from a different country-Germany, England, France, China and the Soviet Union among others.
"They learn to use and prepare food with garlic, basics on French knives, how to cook with wine, how to use a wok," he said.
"They recently made chi-
cken Kiev from scratch.
Television chefs have
complete staff that help off camera for their classes, but if we mess up in class, we either eat it or it goes down the disposal," Cooper said of the hospital kitchen.

While cherries jubilee and chicken Kiev probably won't be offered to hospital patients in the near future, Jay Cooper-the man behind the kitchen-believes good food does belong on those trays.
