Operation Assist is a new effort by FmHA to help-farmers obtain guaranteed operating loans. County Sup-ervisors for FmHA will take completed farm credit appli-cations to local banks or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

"We will handcarry the we will handcarry the applications, and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders," said Wolf. "We will present a Wolf. "We will present a complete loan package, in-cluding cash flows, financial statements and appraisals. If necessary, we will make a commitment to work with the lander to do an interest lender to do an interest buydown. We will do every-thing we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by committing to guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 percent."

While direct operating loan funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for the guarantee program.
County FmHA officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under ating credit available u the guarantee, with most of the paperwork done before-hand by FmHA.

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



Valuation Notices Being Sent By Appraisal Board

Certain property owners will be receiving valuation notices from the Gray County Appraisal District on the proposed value of their property. Charles Buzzard, chief appraiser for the district, said that only certain propery owners will be recei these notices because of one of three occurrences which took place in the last year.

First, if the property owner rendered his or her property. the appraisal district is re-quired to send a notice of the proposed value placed on the property. Buzzard stated most of the renditions received by his office were on business personal property. Property owners have the on of rendering their real estate. Rendition is a means for a property owner to record an opinion of the property's value.

Second, if the property

owner remodeled his property or built any new structure, that property owner will receive a valuation notice. Buzzard said a notice will be sent if the proposed value is one thousand dollars or more than last year's value,

Finally, a property owner will receive a notice if the property is new in the dis-

trict Valuation notices are sent to new businesses or mobile homes moved into the

Buzzard said that a taxpayer who wants to lodge a protest of a proposed value must file a written "notice of protest" with the appraisal review board. The property owner must file the protest by June 30. Protest hearings by the appraisal review board begin on July 7. Official forms for a notice

of protest are available at the appraisal office. "But a letter from the property owner is also acceptable as a notice," the chief appraiser said, long as it identifies the property owner and the propproperty owner and the property which is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office."

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

"I consider our food excellent. It's the same for cellent. It's the same for employees and guests (in the hospital cafeteria). We're always trying new things. Right now we have a marvelous taco salad on Thursday for only \$2.50."

Cooking comes naturally for Cooper.

"I was raised in the restaurant business," he said. "It was a small town eating joint, but not a greasy spoon

"By the time I was 6 years old, I stood on a tomato crate to turn pancakes in the morning. I came back from school at noon to work the lunch break."

When he moved to Bethany in 1963 to attend college, Cooper learned "more elegant cooking," he said. "I began working for the Captain's Table as a waiter and went to assistant manager."

For the next several years, Cooper worked in some of the Oklahoma City area's better restaurants as he

earned college degrees in psychology, business admin-istration and hospital and istration and hospital and nursing home administra-

flaming dishes such as cherries jubilee, to make specialties such as Caesar salad, and to use meats other than the old standards of beef and chicken, such as

In 1980, he left Baptist Medical Center to assume the position as food service director in Woodward, where he helped plan the food service area for the new hospital. While these duties often keep him out of the kitchen, he lands a hand there if needed.

Cooper still dons his chef's hat for catered functions such as wedding receptions and company parties held at the hospital cafeteria. He will prepare the flaming items, the salads, the special entrees or the bearnaise

"I once cooked a nine-"I once cooked a nine-course French dinner for a party here," he said. Such a party requires tablecloths, linen napkins,

china, crystal and a waiter or waitress who "presents the meal," he said. This atmosphere of elegant dining is unavailable elsewhere

locally.

"It's a very new idea to come to the hospital to eat a

come to the nospital to eat a banquet," he said. Cooper also teaches an eight-week gourmet cooking class at the High Plains Vo-Tech School in Wood-

ward.
Students do all the preparation in class. The
emphasis is on meats, salads
and vegetables since "most
desserts take longer than the
three hours we have in
class," he said.
The classes have an inter-

The classes have an inter-national flavor. Each week Cooper uses food from a different country—Germany, England, France, China and the Soviet Union among

others.
"They learn to use and with garlic, prepare food with garlic, basics on French knives, how to cook with wine, how to use a wok," he said. "They recently made chi-cken Kiev from scratch." Television chefs have a

complete staff that help offcamera for their classes, but "if we mess up in class, we either eat it or it goes down the disposal," Cooper said of the hospital kitchen. While cherries jubilee and

chicken Kiev probably won't be offered to hospital pa-tients in the near future, Jay Cooper—the man behind the kitchen—believes good food does belong on those trays.
