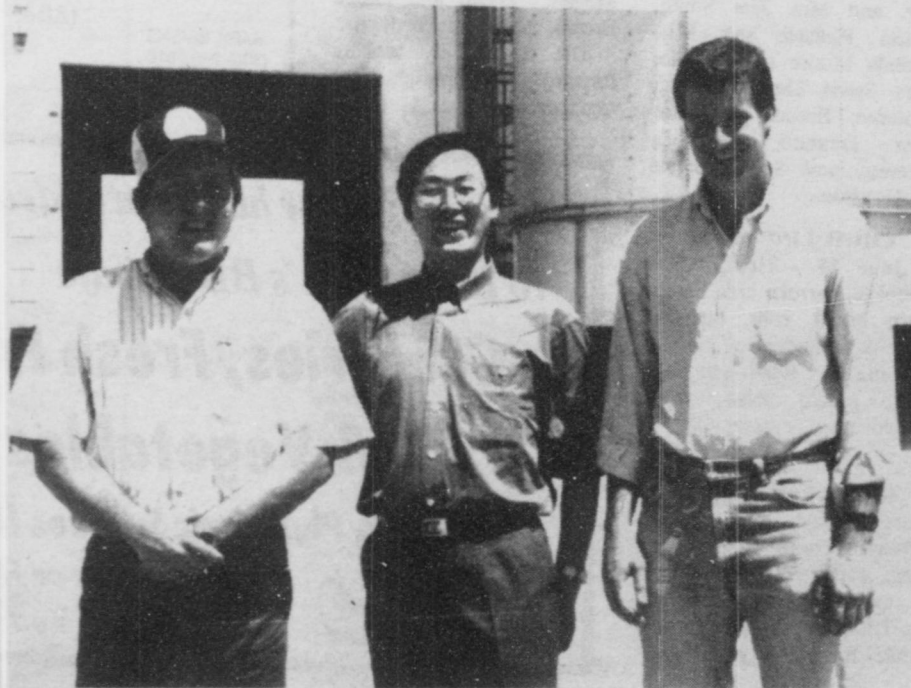
Metzger's hobbies include golf, basketball, and reading.

RGM Ag Hosts Foreign Visitor From China For A Day

R.G.M. had some special visitors this week. Xubo Yu of Beijing, China and Peter Grady of Minneapolis, Minnesota. The pair are working together as part of a joint venture between their home companies, Cer Oil Food Import Export Company of China and Continental - COF Company of New York. Yu is learning more about grain merchandising and how things are done differently in the Texas Panhandle.

Xubo Yu comes from the Shandong Province in China. It is an 18 hour train ride from his home village to Beijing. His family

owns a small farm of 2 or 3 acres. They have other jobs and raise only food for their own personal use.

Yu has been very impressed with many aspects of the Agri-business in the Texas Panhandle. Some of the most outstanding to him are our transportation systems such as rail lines and trucking lines and our grain storage facilities.

Yu said "In China we don't have as much ability to store grain, not many upright facilities."

He was also impressed by the vastness of our country. Both he and Mr. Grady visited the Robert Kuehler farm and rode in his

combine. Some of the things Yu wants to learn more about are futures trading, traditional area market trends, the accounting involved, logistics of transportation and the differences in Boards of Trade.

Xubo Yu is a big fan of western movies and country western music. He was very excited to pass his Texas Drivers License test. "It is very hard to get around with out a car here," he said.

Mr. Grady stated, "Yu has a wonderful sense of humor, we have heard a lot of the Yankee and Foreigner jokes."

Board Hires Four, Sets School Opening For August 26

The Board of Trustees of Groom School met last Tuesday in their regular monthly meeting. All members were present as well as visitors Greg and Dena Lambert, Jimmy Branch, Nila Burgin, Brenda Homen, Donna Burton, Eddie Hogan, Mary Treadwell, Marcia Conrad, Debra Addy and Anita Childress.

In the superintendent's report, Kenneth Sweatt recommended that Frances Payton be hired as summer Special Education Bus Driver. Groom currently has one student that will attend summer courses in Panhandle and another that the administration is recommending for this program.

Also up for debate was the school calendar. Although, approved at an earlier meeting, revisions were necessary after recent legislation that increased the number of days that students attend classes and decreases the number of in service days for teachers. The board voted to leave the current calendar in place adding 5 days to the beginning of the year, making school start on August the 26th.

Vacancies in personnel was the next item on the agenda. Discussing the

open elementary position first, the board unanimously voted to hire Rilda Perry. Ms. Perry taught at Shamrock last and has a second degree in special education.

The opening for junior high coach and political science teacher had many applicants. All of the applicants with the exception of one did not have the political science background that the board was looking for. After much discussion the board voted to hire Mark Lance. Mr. Lance is a recent graduate with no coaching experience. He is certified to teach political science classes. The board agreed to offer him state base plus \$700.00 bachelor degree increment as well as a \$3,000.00 coaching increment plus a house to live in. The decision was unanimous.

Jerry Crowell was hired as band director. Although Crowell is not certified to teach elementary band he was hired on the condition that he will continue his education for his elementary certification. He will be teaching on an emergency permit. Salary set at Step 6, \$700.00 for B.A. plus \$700.00 in lieu of housing.

Lengthy discussion was held about the applicants

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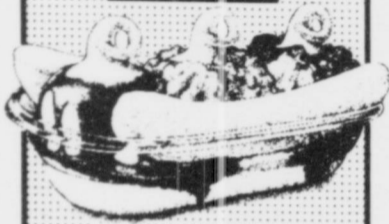

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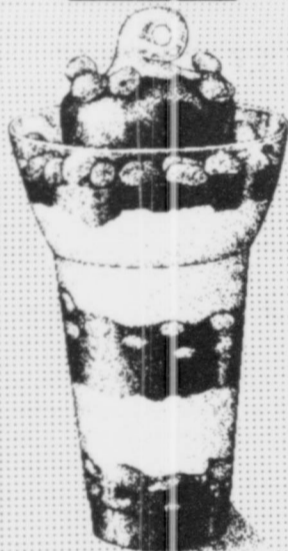
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**Groom Girl Scouts

The Carson County Historical Commission received the Distinguished Service Award for its Program of Work in 1990 at the recent Texas Preservation Conference in Beaumont.

Thirty-three counties in Texas received the award. Carson County submitted sections on County Commission Structure, Folklife Preservation, and Historic Photographs. Other activities during the year included cemetery

TOWN HALL MEETING

With the conclusion of the 72th Legislative Session leaving Texas lawmakers preparing for a special session scheduled for July, Senator Teel Bivins will hold a Town Hall Meeting in Panhandle to give citizens an overview of the legislative agenda just completed in Austin.

The meeting will begin at 3:00 p.m. Thursday, June 20 at the Education Building in

Panhandle. The public is encouraged to attend and visit with Senator Bivins.

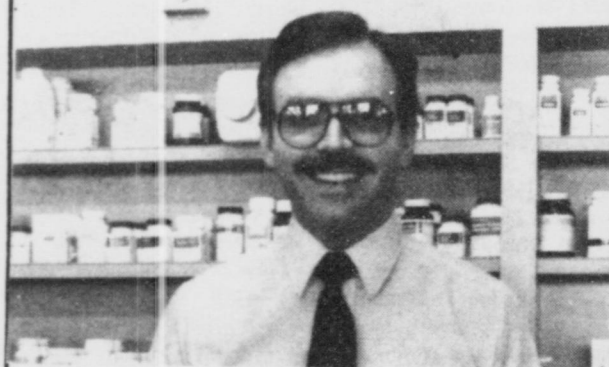
The trip beginning in Friona that morning will be Bivins' third round of Town Hall meetings since the regular legislative session ended on May 27. Bivins is scheduling Town Hall meetings within Senate District 31 to explain issues that impact the Crown of Texas through lawmaking decisions made in the recent legislative session. In the meeting, Bivins will discuss such issues as the new education bill, legislative and congressional redistricting, ethics reform and the state budget.

Staff members from Bivins' district office in Amarillo will be accompanying him.

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Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for residence Custom Calling Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for certain residence Custom Calling Services.

The Custom Calling Services affected by the Company's application are optional telephone service arrangements that provide the following features: Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three Way Calling, Speed Calling 8 and Speed Calling 30.

The Company's proposal would increase the monthly rate for the individual Call Waiting feature from \$2.10 to \$3.10 for residence customers. Also, the rates for certain combinations of Custom Calling Features (Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three-Way Calling and Speed Calling-8) would increase or decrease depending upon the combination of features. In addition, the company proposes to obsolete the optional Custom Calling Service feature Speed Calling 30 for residence customers except for existing customers at their existing locations. Following are the feature combinations and their current and proposed rates.

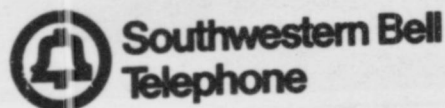

Most of the Company's residence customers in Texas who subscribe to one or more of the Custom Calling Service features will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring. It is expected that the proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.9 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. The restructuring will result in an increase in the Custom Calling Services rates for approximately 2.5 million residence customers and rate decreases for approximately 15,000 residence customers. Also, the obsolescence of the optional feature Speed Calling 30 will affect approximately 156,000 residence customers.

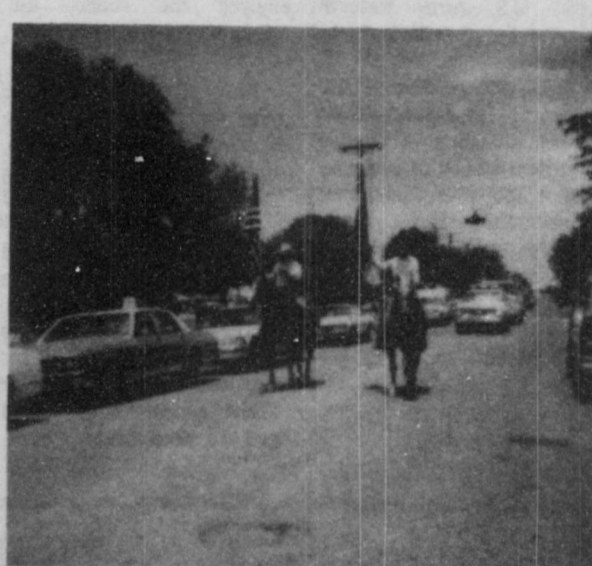

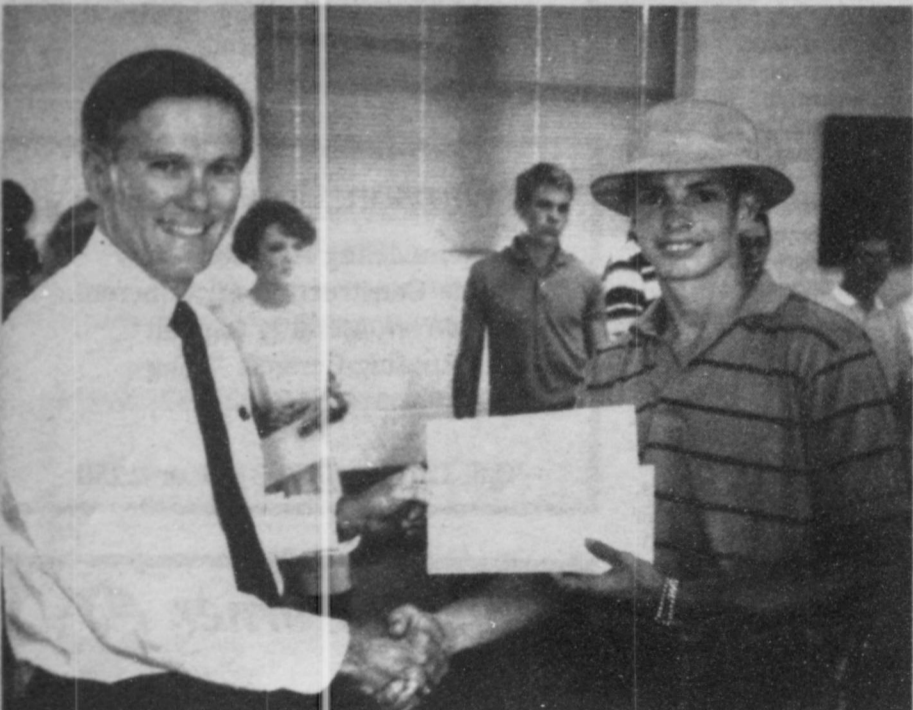

Dr. Jerry Kirk

Funeral services for Dr. Jerry Kirk were conducted June 7.

Jerry Robert Kirk was born October 19, 1917 in Elmer, Oklahoma and died at the age of 73.

Jerry graduated from Berlin High School. He was married to Juanita Mayhough on December 24, 1940 in Mangum. He served for three years as an elementary principal at Muleshoe, Texas and as high school principal for three years and was superintendent for eight years.

DEAR EDITOR:

Hey, who is trying to "kick out Pantex?" Not those of us who live around the Pantex plant. Those people, who are so paranoid when questions about safety of Pantex and contamination of our agricultural production arise, seem to be as uninformed about Pantex as they are about our area agricultural industry.

According to Texas Agriculture Extension Service in cooperation with the city of Amarillo, Amarillo Economic Development Corp. and Southwestern Public Service Co., area agriculture is an industry worth more than \$3 billion. Cash receipts from crop production totaled \$591 million, and value-added livestock sales brought \$1.848 billion to the area. Seventy-six percent of fed beef in Texas comes from this area. More than one million irrigated acres grow more than 20 different crops commercially. These figures would be greater if wheat were \$3.45 per bushel, as a letter writer in the June 10th *Amarillo Globe News* stated, instead of the present \$2.52 per bushel.

Farmers and ranchers are the largest consumers of the trade area. They buy tractors, trucks, fuel, and insurance, as well as groceries, clothing, automobiles, houses, and much more. They pay utilities, property taxes to support schools and

city governments, and income taxes that pay the salaries and build facilities at Pantex. They even pay one-half percent sales tax to the city of Amarillo that used the tax to pay \$50,000 from the Amarillo Economic Development Corp. and the \$80,000 from the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce for the Panhandle 2000 proposal. They also pay a one percent sales tax the city used in producing the proposal to expand Pantex.

Pantex's annual pay roll of \$115.6 million, even if tripled as Mr. Madden says could happen (Notice the could. Advocates of the proposal use lots of could's, if's, etc., but few facts.), pales in comparison to the annual \$3 billion that agriculture adds to

the area economy. If the turnover of wealth is four times, those so quickly to sign on to the expansion of Pantex should be very cautious with the possibility of severe damage to the agricultural industry which employs one out of every four workers.

Think about it.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."
