The Tigerettes are 4-0 in district and 18-3 overall.

2, 8-8; Samnorwood 2-2, 10-8; Kelton 0-4, 1-13; and Lefors is 0-4, 2-9.

The varsity teams played Lefors Monday night to make up for the game that was cancelled due to bad weather.

The boys were victorious with a 73-47 win. Wes Hall led the scoring with 22; Bo Burgin had 15, while teammates Corkey Hickey had 14, Paul McLaughlin had 8, Bryan Crowell and Matt Fields had 6 points each, and Rhett Patterson

Antique Car Officials Visit Groom To Set Up Fall Rally

The News was visited by some pretty important people in the car rally world last week. Will de Hek of Holland and Helmut Lehmann of Germany are finalizing details of an international classic car rally to be held this coming fall. Approximately 250 classic and antique cars are expected to travel from Washington D.C. to Los Angeles, Ca.

Lehmann and de Hek are the presidents of the national chapters of the international organization known as the "Club of Ancient Automobiles and Rallies".

The classic cars will be shipped to the U.S. from Europe. They will include mostly European makes of autos, but many vintage American made vehicles, as well. If this reporter understood his thick German accent correctly, he will be driving the Limo that once belonged to Mamie Eisenhower back in the 40's. de Hek stated that the participants are responsible for their own expenses. Shipping the cars to the states, as well as lodging, gasoline, or petrol as he put it, as well as the usual items such as food and souvenirs.

As previously stated the tour begins in Washington D. C., traveling Interstate 66 to Chicago. There the entourage will participate in the Steuben Parade. This parade is to honor a general of the American Revolution.

They then plan to leave Chicago on September 26 and travel Old Route 66

from Chicago to L.A.

Lehmann and de Hek are in the process of traveling the route and making arrangements for lodging and camping sites, as well as, doing a little pre-publicity for the group.

Since 1987 the organization has been having these rallies on a yearly basis. They have toured routes from Paris to Moscow, Amsterdam to Moscow, all of the Baltic States and France to Acadien, Norway.

Lehmann said that approximately 600 people

will accompany the 250 cars.

In this area, most plan to spend the night at Lake McClellan, however he did say that some preferred to stay in motels. A local motel manager told the News that they had booked the entire motel for that night.

The flyer they send out to their members was very interesting. Featuring the Route 66 sign, it also includes a picture of a 1948 Buick and a cowboy hat. The group is expected to be in this area on Sept 30 -

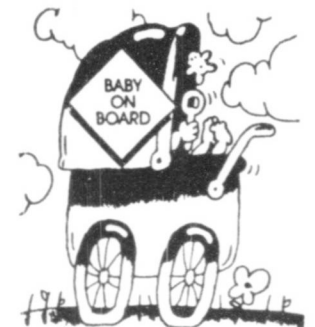

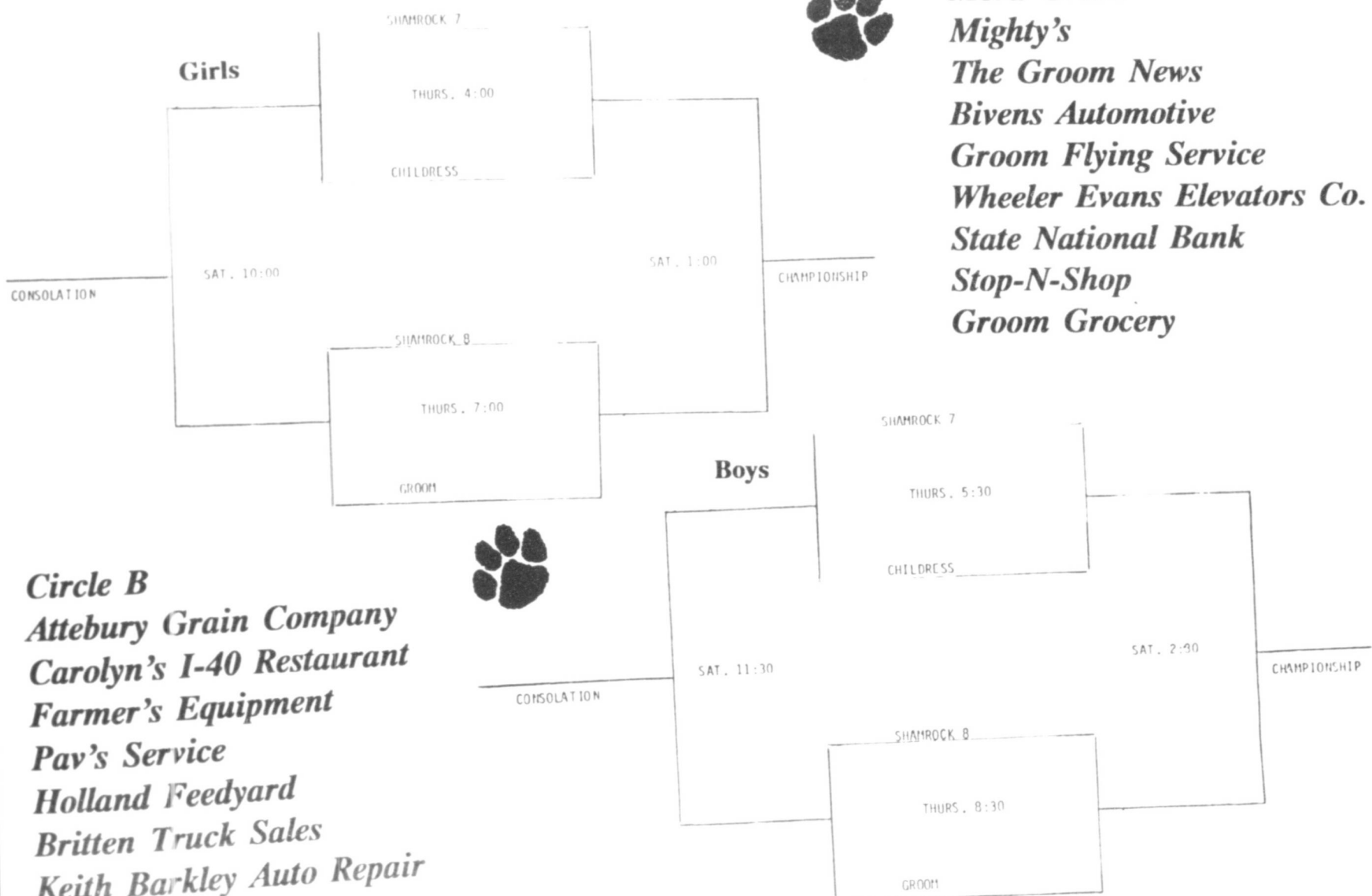

Carson County Sheriff's Report

During District Court sessions in Panhandle this past week, one defendant entered a plea to the charge of Arson, one to Felony DWI and Possession of Stolen Property (motor vehicle). The subject driving a stolen vehicle from Oklahoma plead guilty and was assessed restitution to Carson County for the costs of his prosecution in addition to his sentence.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department is currently investigating a drive-by shooting which occurred at a Skellytown residence. Officers are also investigating an shooting incident the following day which involved gunshot damage to a motor vehicle. It is unknown at this time if the incidents were related.

Deputies investigated a complaint of assault in Groom and a domestic dispute in Skellytown. The Sheriff's Department is continuing to investigate a series of residential burglaries on the west side of the county. Witness information has given us potential suspects to pursue.

A Mexican National, arrested by the Panhandle Police Department, was turned over to the U.S. Border Patrol for deportation. The Police Department had found the subject after he was spotted catching a ride on a passing train.

The Sheriff's Department has received several phone calls regarding dog packs chasing and attacking cattle. Our only alternative when we receive these calls is to locate the dogs and destroy them. It is the duty of the owners to control and contain the dogs. Owners of the dogs can be held criminally and civilly liable for the damage they do.

Tax Delayed By One Day

The usual January 31 deadline for payment of Carson County Appraisal District taxes without incurring interest has been moved back a day this year because January 31 falls on a Sunday.

Taxes can be paid until 5 p.m. February 1, at the Carson County Appraisal District tax office, 102 Main Street or P.O. Box 970, Pampa, Texas 79068 without incurring interest.

Payments by mail must be postmarked no later than midnight February 1.

Taxes paid after February 1 will incur a 7 percent penalty and interest. The penalty and interest will climb to 9 percent after February 28; 11 percent after March 31; 13 percent after April 30; and 14 percent after May 31.

On July 1, the penalty and interest will hit 18 percent, an additional 15 percent assessment will be added for attorney collection fees.

Groom Administration Reminds Students and Parents About Parking Policy

The Groom School Administration would like to remind parents and students of the school policy regarding parking. The following policy was passed after parents identified the problem and brought it to the attention of the School Board. This excerpt from the 1988 minutes gives a brief description.

"Upon the presentation of the results of the P-TO parking plan as implemented in April 1987 for the safety of elementary student pickup, Mr. Babcock moved and Mr. Britten seconded to adopt the plan on a permanent basis as follows: No parking in the row immediately south of the main

gymnasium between the hours of 2:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. on school days, with the no-parking zone to extend from the lightpole east of the gymnasium entrance to the lightpole west of the gymnasium entrance, with parking to be

allowed in the parking lane immediately north and adjacent to Third Street. The motion carried."

The area described above is designated for parent parking when picking up students from school. Students are asked to walk in front of cars and not behind them. Parents are asked to back out, as opposed to pulling forward to keep the range of vision clear.

Conducted on Hokkaido and Honshu, the purpose of the exercise was to increase combat readiness of both nations through training in joint air, ground, and sea operations.

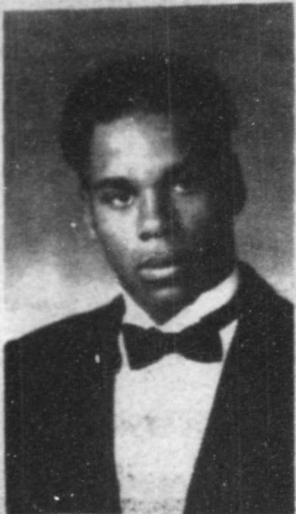
The soldier is an infantry team leader at Fort Wainwright, Fairbanks, Alaska.

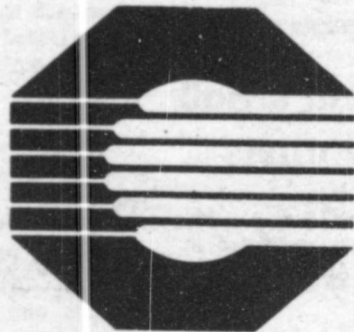

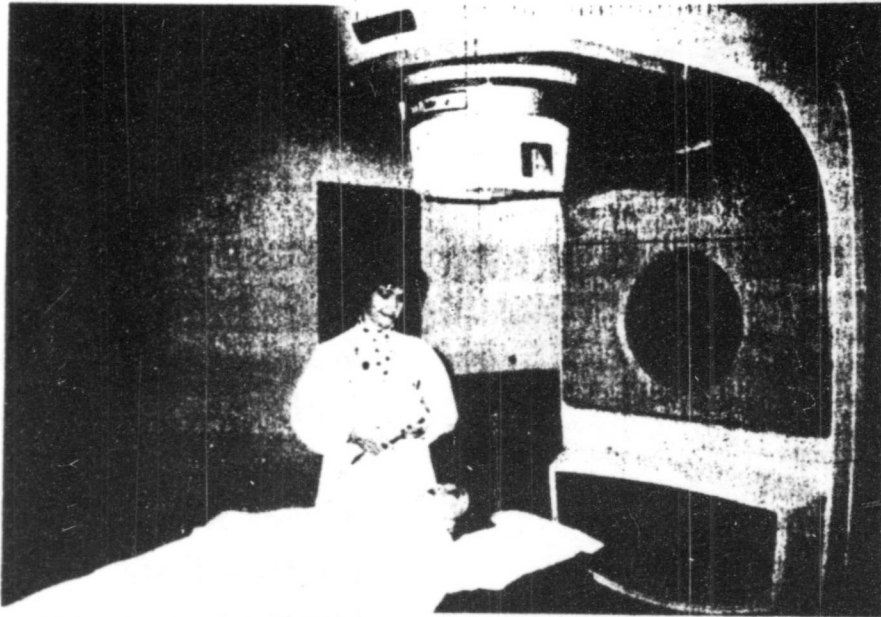

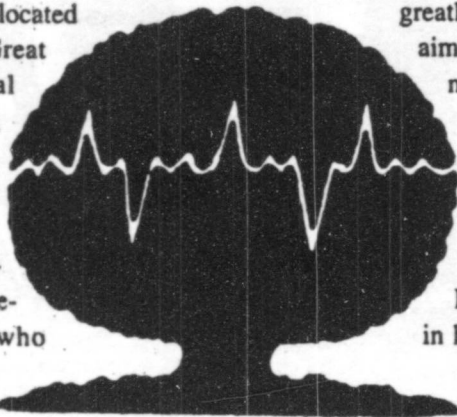
