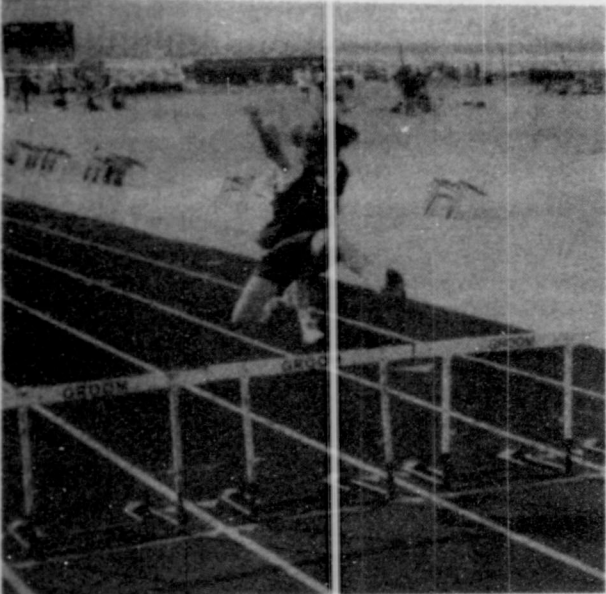

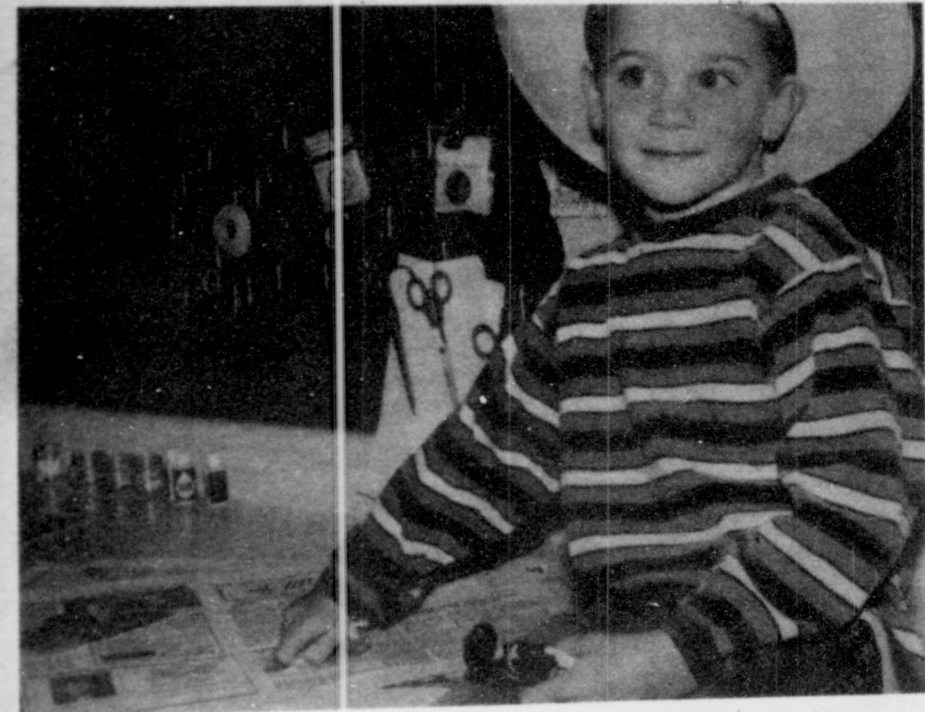
## High School Boys & Jr. High Win District
