

Students Score Highest On

Groom students scored 95.5 percent on TEAMS tests last year, which was the highest of surrounding schools. Amarillo had 75 percent passing; Clarendon, 84.9 percent, Claude, 76.5 percent; Lefors 73.7 percent, Miami, 88.6 percent, Pampa 78.1 percent, Panhandle 84.6 percent and White Deer 88.9 percent.

In the 1987-88 school year, Groom had a 98.6 percent passing rate giving the district a 3.1 percent drop for 1988-89.

TEAMS tests are taken by odd number grades. First graders, who will no longer take the TEAMS test, are the youngest to take this test. Juniors are the oldest, and they must pass the test to graduate. Their test was given the last of October and results were not available at press time.

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
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Groom Lost To Miami



Oral History Project Feature Available At Square House

An oral history project, featuring well known area pioneers, is an on going activity of the Carson County Square House Museum and Berneta Communications of Amarillo. Just released are two videos on the history of the oil and gas development in the Panhandle of Texas. The first, a twenty-eight minute film, features Lawrence Hagy and is titled 'Lawrence Hagy: An Era, A Vision." The second, a scholarly discussion on the development of the natural gas industry features Charles Hinton, A.D. Weatherly and Irene Wischer.

Currently underway is a new series titled "Native Sons". This series will feature five natives of the Panhandle, the youngest seventy-seven and the oldest one hundred years old. These unique stories are captured live on film. Funding for each film requires from \$1000.00 to \$35000. In addition to the filming amounts in the range of \$7500 to \$10,000 are required to produce each video. To date, majoring funding has been by the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation, The Cabot Foundation, M.K. Brown Foundation, Dodge-Jones Foundation and Amarillo Area

To capture these stories, time is of the greatest importance as each person must be able to speak clearly and communicate with the audience.

The films are produced with Berneta Communications making a contribution, and the editing and project directing and photographs supplied by the staff at the Square House Museum. There is no profit to the Museum in this project and it is developed as a public service. Schools, PBS, organizations throughout the State and even as distant as New York City have used the video programs. The only cost to the viewer is postage for delivery of the tapes. Organizations and individuals may keep the tapes for one week.

This is a list of the 1989-90 Texas Panhandle hunting seasons as reported by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Aoudad Sheep-November 4- January 21. Armstrong, Briscoe, Donley, Floyd, Hall, Motley, Randall and Swisher counties. Bag limit

Archery-October 7-November 5. Turkeys, whitetailed and mule deer where permitted.

Ducks-November January 7 in the High Plains Area(Pan-Management handle), and November 18-26 and December 9-January 7 for other parts of the state. Daily bag limit is three ducks, which may include two mallards, but not more than one hen; two wood ducks, one redhead, one mottled duck, one hooded merganser and one pintail. Canvasback season closed.

Geese-October 21-January 21 in Western area, including Panhandle. Nov-ember 11-Feburary 18 in Eastern area for snow and blue geese, and November 11-January 21 in Eastern are for dark geese, which are specklebellies and Canadas. ber 1-November 9. North Zone. Bag limit 12 per day, possession 24. Mule Deer-November 18- Joy Snyder Celebrates

December 3. White-tailed deer season for Hartley, Moore, Oldham and Potter counties. Bag limit one buck unless antlerless permits issued.

Pheasants-December 9-24 Bagg limit two per day, possession four.

Quail-November 4-Feburary 25. Bag limit 15 per day, possession 45.

Sandhill Cranes-November 11-Feburary 11 in Zone A(Panhandle); December 2-Feburary 11 in Zone B: January 6-Feburary 11 in Zone C. Daily bag limit is three crane, six in posses-

Turkey (Fall)-November 4-January 7. Except Bailey. Castro, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Hale, Hansford, Lamb, Parmer and Sherman Counties. Bag limit two, either sex.

White-Tailed Deer-November 4-January 7. Except Hartley, Moore, Oldham and Potter counties (Nov. 18-Dec. 3), and 9 counties with no season, Bailey, Castro, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Hale, Hansford, Lamb, Parmer and Sherman. Bag limit one buck, unless antierless permits issued.


Former Coach

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

Eggs Now Contain 25% Less Cholesterol Than Previously Thought

If you've been avoiding eating eggs because of their cholesterol content, you can still enjoy them in moder-

Latest research data reported from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Nutrition Composition Laboratory shows the average large egg contains 25 percent less cholesterol then previously thought.

Research indicates the average large egg contains 213 mg of cholesterol, not the 274 mg as previously thought. Eggs also are an important source of protein, Vitamin A, Riboflavin, Vitamin B-12, iron, zinc and phosphorus.

Dr. Gary Beecher, chief of the USDA nutrition laboratory, said the nurtient composition change has resulted from better testing methods and changes in the

egg industry feed, husbandry and breeding practices.

What does this mean to consumers? High blood cholesterol is a risk factor for heart disease. However, it is important to understand that blood cholesterol and dietary cholesterol are two different things. 80 percent of the cholesterol in the body is made by the body. Concerning dietary factors, the primary determinant of blood cholesterol is the type of fat in the diet, not dietary cholesterol. Too much saturated fatty acids in the diet can elevate blood cholestero. These fatty acids are found in animal products and coconut and palm oils. Diets that replace saturated fatty acids with polyunsaturated fats such as vegetable, soy or sunflower oil may actually lower blood cholest-



YOUR SCHOOL By: Jerry Don Cook

As you probably know, McLean ISD has recently completed the State accreditation monitoring process by staff members of the Texas Education Agency. There are two areas of our daily class schedule that need to be changed ..

The first area is the length of the school day for kindergarten through the third grade. Our buses arrive by 8:00 each morning to give students the opportunity to eat breakfast in the cafeteria and attend tutorials which are scheduled from 8:05 to 8:30 every day. The after-noon buses depart after 4:00 p.m. the main concern is that the young students were required to stay at school an extra hour waiting for the buses to run.

On November 20, at the beginning of the third six weeks grading period, we will reduce the length of the school day for all grades. Tutorials for grades one through twelve will be from 8:00 to 8:25 every day. Regular classes for grades K through 8 will begin at 8:25. Regular classes for grades 9 through 12 will begin at 8:30. Grades K through 8 will be dismissed at 3:20 and Grades 9 through 12 will be dismissed at 3:21. The buses will leave school between 3:25 and 3:30. The new dismissal times will require that grades 7 through 12 move from an eight period day to a seven period day.

The second problem with the present schedule is some classes in grades 6 through 12 have only boys or only girls enrolled. According to federal guidelines, Athletics is the only course that can be sex segregated. We must schedule classes so that both male and female students have an opportunity to be in the classes together, This rule includes physical edu-





The new daily class schedule has been constructed so that no student will lose credit in any class in which the student is currently enrolled. Every attempt has been and will continue to be made to implement these nee led changes as smoothly
