Legislative Update. by Rep. Dick Waterfield
The education issue is starting to heat up in Austin. Last week I sat in on Laecial Task Force on Education meeting.

The staff presented a a complete reform organization plan which calls for many chan which calis for resembles a corporate plan in business such as having CEO for such as having a also sets up a new type of also sets up a new type of egislative Education the egisla up of the Speaker, It. nade up of the Speaker, Lt bers of the Iegislature. Thi rganization reform looks to rganization reform looks to me like a way to go around Education. Remer ducation. Remember some people would still like an appointed
Education.
The following is an outlin f the lowing is an outline of the Texas Research League Education PLAN. Plan-A zero-sum plan with increases in some loca taxes with no new state
taxes.
B. Financing-Redistribute the current $\$ 4.8$ billion of state aid and $\$ 5.2$ billion of local property taxes. State aid is the difference between the enlarged foundation program level and county. wide tax levy.
C. Changes-Assigns the Local Fund Assigment to the county level by creating countywide tax bases instead of allowing districts to tax only the property in their borders. Districts would then pool their taxable wealth. State funds would be used to increase local revenues to a guaranteed amount for districts with less than the average with less than the average statewide tax base. Higher imposed on property in rich imposed on property in rich
districts to "equalize" redistricts to "equalize" reLocal districts could supplement their funding by plement their funding by levying an optional local enrichment tax up to 10 cents per $\$ 100$. Debt service taxes would be levied by local school districts for capital outlay.
This plan probably will not fly in the special session. However, as before certain components of this paln could show up in another plan.
I have been working with the area superintendents
and school boards channeling information back and forth. They have been a great help and I do apprecigre the input we have been
eceiving from the district. Please feel free to contact me with questions or comments.

1988 DPS STATE-WIDE REPORT

This is the second part on the DPS and this week we take a look at the Highway Patrol Service. There are iwo patrol districts per region for a total of 12 statewide and each is commanded by a captain. The Patrol service is responsible for patrolling and supervising traffic along the
rural highways of Texas to
rural highways of Texas to ensure safe and expeditious travel. Patrol strategies are designed to reduce traffic accidents, with enforcement priorities on excessive speed, seat belt violations and intoxicated drivers.
With more than 200,720 miles of rural highways to patrol and an authorized strength of only 1,554 Troopers (including supervisors), the Highway Patrol strives to deter violators by the visual presence of marked units.Rural highway enforcement responsibility per Trooper average 129 miles.
Highway Patrol Troopers made 1,572,242 total arrests during the year and investigated 47,557 motor vehicle accidents, including 1,402 fatal accidents in which 1,645 people were killed. DWI and speeding continu ed to be a major factor in traffic deaths. Alcohol was involved in 40 percent of the fatalities while 24 percent of the deaths were speed related. During the year highway patrol troopers issued 853,048 speeding citations and apprehended 42,066 DWI's. During 1988, 77.3 percent of the people killed in passenger cars trucks and buses were no wearing seat belts. Expert now believe that 50 percen or more of all motor vehicle deaths would be eliminated by proper use of seat belts. Highway patrol troopers issued 153,405 citations fo not wearing seat belts in 1988.

Total revenue from fines collected as a result of all Highway Patrol cases filed in 1988 was $\$ 68.870 .730$ These monies were placed into county coffers and the state treasury.
