

Crop Reports Good As Harvest Begins



Harvest got in full swing this past week. Grain trucks were spotted through out the county hauling milo or corn. Wheeler-Evan's Manager Nadine Thornton reported the average test weight to be 58 and the moisture ranging from 13 on up to 20. Keith

Fields brought in the first load of corn on September 19 and Barry Fields brought in the first load of milo on September 30. At the corner elevator Roy B. Hodges and son, David, brought in the first load of milo on September 27.

"Harvest is looking good so far, if the freeze will hold off," said Thornton.

Kelvin Ollinger brought in the first load of milo on September 28, to RGM Elevator. Tony Treadwell reported that test weight averaged around 58. Kelvin

Ollinger reported a yield of 8500 pound on up to 9000 pounds.

Bob Byrd at Attebury Grain reported the Babcock brothers to have brought in the first load and test-weight averaged 59 1/2.

Texas FFA Chapter President Speaks To Groom Student Body

Jeff Rash, president of the Texas FFA Chapter was in Groom this past Friday to speak to the student body of Groom High School.

All fifty high school students and teachers were kept laughing throughout Jeff's speech. He told of his days in Gilmer, Texas where he grew up, as a preacher kid and elaborated on his time spent on the Gilmer Buckeye Football Team.

Jeff will spend 330 days on the road traveling to schools in Texas promoting FFA. He will drive the car furnished to him approximately 50 to 60 thousand miles. His hard work will not go unrewarded. Jeff commented that he will be able to complete his college edu-

cation on scholarships awarded to him through FFA.

The Texas Chapter of FFA has a membership of 55 thousands. Those members are eligible for scholarships totaling 535 thousand dollars.

He closed his speech with three points to the students; "set a goal in life" and through FFA you can obtain that goal through leadership, citizenship and cooperation.

Jeff commented how impressed he was with the students of GHS. He said in all his traveling this was the first school where he heard the "Lord's Prayer" recited before a meeting.








(left to right) Theresa Wills, Mary Britten, Pearl Banks and Delores Prather enjoy a friendly game of cards at Senior Citizens Friday.
