Until 1854, all metal used in wire was iron. This was usually poor grade, which broke easily and rusted very fast. So, for a good fence to be built, a better grade of iron was needed. In England, Henry Bessemer perfected a process that converted iron to steel. This 1854 process reached America in 1870 and was used in wire drawing, thereby giving the materials the quality that was needed.

George Bedson of England, developed a process for continuous rod rolling and wire galvanizing. Ichabod Washburn, in America, developed improved wire drawing, annealing and a tempering process. Now, we finally had all the things invented, and in place, for further development of fencing.

From 1865 until 1974, several types of fence were invented using sharp projections attached to the wire-sharp pieces of metal and nails were used, along with twisted pieces of wire. Henry Rose even used small

blocks of wood with points of wire projecting and attached this to a wire. These various types of wire fencing did work on livestock, and were forerunners of Barbed Wire, but they had one thing in common, they were handmade and were not adaptable to quantity manufacturing.

At this time, it was generally proved that the new wire material would not rust, was harder to break, a smaller wire could be used, and most important, sharp projections attached to it would deter livestock. It did not catch the wind, was fairly cheap, and by galvanizing it remained durable for a long period of time.

So into the picture, came Joseph Farwell Glidden, of DeKalb, Illinois, a farmer, well educated, and a staunch citizen of the area. Next week, The Glidden Winner.

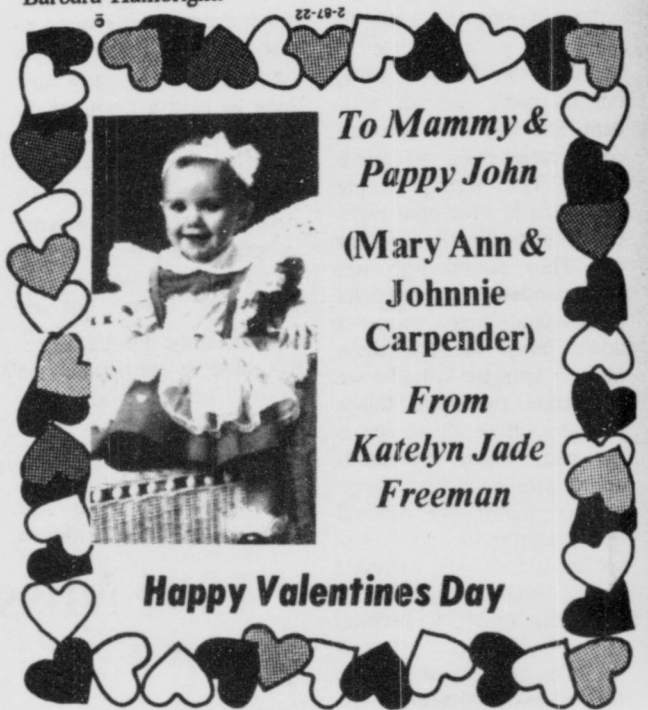

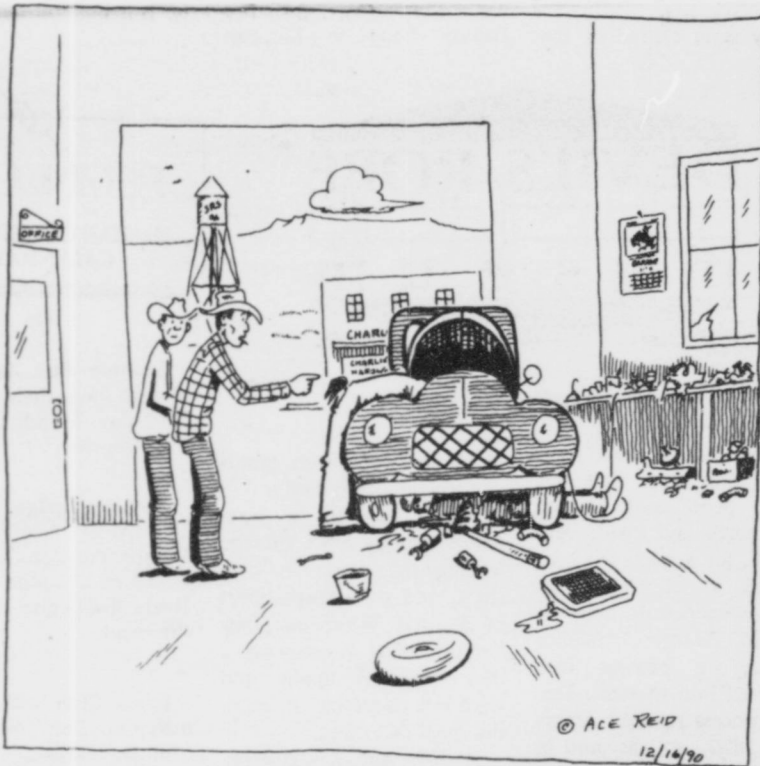

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to introduce new optional services, Personalized RingSM and ComCallSM, beginning March 18, 1991.*

Personalized RingSM is an optional service that provides single-line customers the ability to manage incoming calls by allowing up to three directory numbers to share the same line. One of the numbers is called the "master" number; the others are called the "dependent" numbers. A regular ring is provided for the master number and unique distinctive rings are provided for up to two dependents.

ComCallSM is an optional service that provides single-line customers the ability to set up internal intercom communications among multiple telephone extensions. A distinctive ring is heard to alert all extension users of an intercom call. Customers must subscribe to the optional service Three-way Calling for ComCallSM to function. (The monthly rate for Three-way Calling is \$2.10 for residence customers and \$2.65 for business customers.)

Personalized RingSM and ComCallSM are intended for use by both residence and business customers. Personalized RingSM is expected to generate first-year revenues of \$1.8 million. ComCallSM projects first-year revenues of \$53,000.

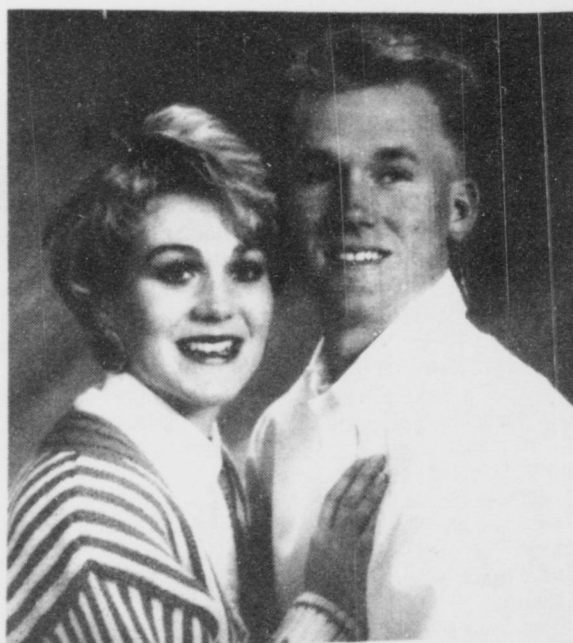

City Council Looks Into Texas Capital Economic Development Fund

Groom City Council met last Tuesday, Feb. 5th in regular session. All members were present. Visitors to the meeting were Johnny Brumley, Tony Treadwell and Donna Burton.

Perma Strickland of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission met with the council to discuss the Texas Capital Economic Development Fund. These funds are made available through the Texas Department of Commerce. The use of these funds are for economic development whereby funds are granted to the city to loan to a business for land, buildings, equipment, etc. Money can also be loaned to the city for infrastructure such as water and sewer lines for businesses that hire persons in the moderate to low income range. Minimum amount loaned is \$50,000., the maximum is \$500,000. Pre-application must be made with the Texas Department of Commerce to see if the project is the type funded. One of the requirements is that applicant must have 50% of the total allocation from another source with a 5% cash equity.

Tax abatement was discussed at length, in terms of offering no taxes for a specific length of time, to new business that might come to Groom.

All taxing entities within a county must agree to forego taxes in order to have complete tax abatement. A city could, however, initiate the tax abatement and the school and county could choose not to participate in the abatement. No decision could be reached. Greg Lamb moved and Jimmy Britten seconded to table further discussion at a later time. All members were in favor.

In other business the council adopted a city ordinance regarding application for connections and meter deposits.

The council discussed violations of City Code, Chapter 11 and 16 concerning junk, rubbish and junked vehicles. The council empowered the mayor to look into the matter and take the appropriate action.

Another new ordinance that was approved, deals with the location and height of fences, structure and other obstructions.

David Britten was named as a voting delegate to Panhandle Emergency Management Service.

The city election was ordered for May 5, 1991.

Upkeep of the city park was discussed. A regular scheduled upkeep program has been adopted: Grass will be mowed weekly, and trimmed after each mowing, followed by watering.

Stops

Fleeing Felon

A 28-mile chase on Interstate 40 Wednesday evening resulted in the arrest of a man driving a vehicle with Michigan license tags, said Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper John Holland.

Holland said today that Marion Allen Douglas, 39, no address listed, was arrested on Interstate 40 on charges of aggravated assault with a motor vehicle and resisting arrest, following the chase.

The trooper said the vehicle was traveling westbound on Interstate 40 when he noticed the late model Dodge had defective headlamps.

"I attempted to stop him east of McLean, about a mile and a half, around 8:20 p.m.," Holland said. "After pursuing him, he refused to stop and started throwing something out of the window and was making hand gestures."

The trooper said the suspect tried to run him and other vehicles off the road numerous times during the chase. He said other vehicles on the interstate tried to assist the trooper in blocking the Dodge vehicle in, but the Dodge then went into the ditch to get away, traveling 65 to 80 mph.

Shortly before the suspect was apprehended, Holland said, Douglas drove the Dodge vehicle into the median and was about to hit a semi tractor-trailer, traveling eastbound, head-on.

DPS Trooper Gary Davis of Groom got in between the Dodge vehicle and other traffic and forced him back into the westbound lane of traffic, and with the aid of other vehicles, the suspect's vehicle was pinned.

There was a "scuffle" during the attempt to arrest Douglas, Holland said.

DPS Trooper Jay Hickman out of Borger also assisted in the chase and Cpl. Johnny Carter of Pampa assisted with radio traffic, Holland said.
