Bob Downs has been chosen as the new interim superintendent. He has committed to at least a year and a half here in McLean and at the end of that time a new evaluation will be conducted.

Bob has been in the school system for 20 years. He worked in Ft. Elliott for 17 of those years, starting as a teacher then principal and finishing as superintendent. He left Ft. Elliott in 1995. He then moved to Reydon, OK where he was superintendent for four years. Mr. Downs retired in 1999. Before accepting the job here he was living in Vinson, OK where he has a small farm and runs a few

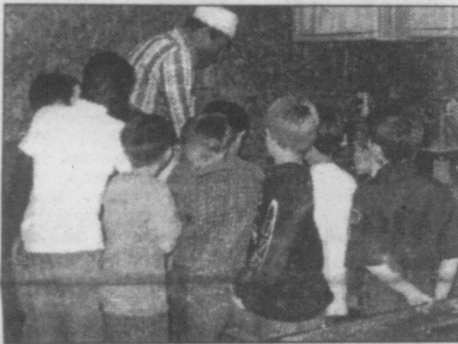
head of cattle. He is living here in McLean and going back to Oklahoma on the weekends. He is single with one son, 25 years old.

Council Discusses Audit, Sewer Plant

The City Council of McLean met in regular session Monday, January 14, 2002, in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and opened with an invocation by Joe Billingsley at 6:00 p.m. with the following members present: Joe Creed Lamb, Doyle Lee, Joe Billingsley, Bob Martin, LaVon Watson, and Jim McDonald.

Others present: Steve Bowlin, Toni Bohlar, Mindy Reeves, Bill Anderson, Jim Adams, Allen Mixon, and Gordon Maddox.

The minutes of the December meeting were approved.

Steve Bowlin informed the council that the landfill had covered the pit in clay and were waiting for compaction tests to be done and were also waiting for the engineers to close the other pits which would decrease our financial assurance for next year.

The council decided to table the animal

ordinance until next month.

Gordon Maddox presented the 2000-2001 financial audits for the City and the McLean Economic Development Corp. to the council members. The council voted to accept and approved the audits as presented.

The council voted to approve Resolution #282 which states: "A Resolution of the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas, approving the articles of dissolution of McLean Economic Development Corporation; authorizing and directing the execution and filing of such articles by the Mayor and City Secretary."

The council voted to approve the 4B By-Laws with the following changes: Page 9 Section 7:02, add 2nd paragraph: Any expenditure exceeding 15% of the monthly EDC income derived from sales tax, which was not

outlined in the annual budget must have approval of the City Council.

Page 10 Section 7:03, add 3rd paragraph: The EDC board shall not enter into any contracts without the City Council's approval which relates to Real Estate, either bought, sold or received as a gift.

Steve Bowlin informed the council that the dozer was in need of repair and the cost with new parts would be approximately \$14,000.00 or with used parts \$8,500.00 plus \$1,500 labor, with no warranty on either the new or used parts. The council voted to go with the used parts.

Discussion was held concerning the high nitrates in the City's water. After discussing

several options the council decided to let Steve check with an engineer on drilling test wells and he and Bob would do some research

into grants for new wells.

Discussion was held by the council concerning the sewer plant. TNRC had written the City up with several violations on their last inspection. Steve informed the council that we could correct all of them except the one that called for an engineers study to determine if current treatment and disposal methods are appropriate. Steve thought that the problem stemmed from the permit that the City has that states that the City of McLean has a flow amount of 280,000 gallons per day of wastewater which is incorrect. He said he thought that if we got the permit changed to a more realistic figure that it would possibly correct the situation. The council decided that Steve and an engineer should go to Amarillo and meet with TNRC and discuss the situation. A motion was passed to pay all bills.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Donna,
The results of the annual audit of the McLean ISD are in. While the taxpayers are not privy to the complete report, some of the findings were included in the Jan. 10, 2001 issue of this paper.

Some of the deficiencies found which had not been corrected since the July '01 financial surprise are commented on below: Adequate checks and balances not in place for school purchases. No current inventory of fixed assets. Salaries continue to be paid outside the regular payroll. The auditors said this should be changed because of tax considerations!

The complete audit report should be considered a public record and published. Although the three items listed above have a significant potential for fraud, the local board

was of the opinion that the audit report was not negative! It would be interesting to see how the auditors carried some \$40,000.00 in missing band instruments in their report or how the local district carries them in any inventory.

The recent win by the Elementary School at an UIL meet is commendable. We as a community are fortunate to have capable, focused and dedicated teachers in our Elementary and High Schools. They deserve our ongoing support. Mr. Ron Gregory, superintendent, stated that "winning academically is very important." I doubt many would disagree with that.

The recent weaknesses in our school system have not involved our teachers and the excellent results they are achieving; sometimes under difficult circumstances. The weaknesses are and have been administrative, often through the benign neglect.

The sum of the parts of the local school board is far greater than the sum of the whole. This will work in some situations provided there is a commensurate distribution of the individual contributions to the sum of the parts. Sometimes the less things change, the more they remain the same.

We have a new year, pay your school taxes with the hope they will receive more care this year.

The livestock show and sale season is here. A visit to the bank and a small donation to help further the activities of these involved students. It would be most appropriate and appreciated by them.

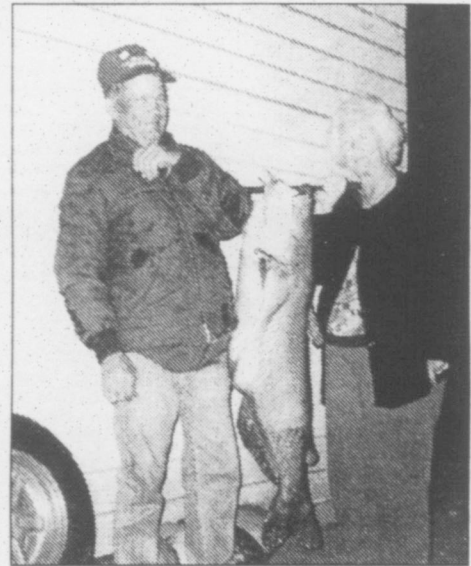

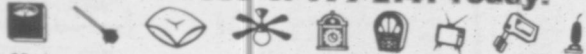

Groom Area fines Top \$184,000 for 2001, First Fatal Accident of the Year Occurs

Groom DPS and law enforcement officials have been very busy in the new year. In the Groom Justice of the Peace, Bill Hinson's office alone, fines and court costs exceeded \$184,000 in the last calendar year.

Trooper Tony Rocha was called to Highway 60 east of Panhandle on January 9th to work the first fatality of the year 2002.

Katherine Sherrill, 35, of Amarillo was killed when she lost control of the SUV that she was driving. She was accompanied by her

brother, Mark Stine, whose injuries were not serious. Stine was, however, wearing a seatbelt, while Sherrill was not.

Trooper Rocha felt that Ms. Sherrill fell asleep at the wheel, then awoke and overcorrected.

Trooper Rocha also made a drug arrest after stopping Charles Hunting of Kentucky for speeding, 88 mph in a 70 mph zone. During the course of his investigation, Rocha had reason to ask for a consent to search. He found 8 grams of meth-amphetamine in the

subjects vehicle, which is a 2nd degree felony.

County law enforcement has also been busy. Arrests were made as follows:

Javier Lugo, age 27 of Panhandle, TX-Driving while intoxicated-1st and illegal alien.

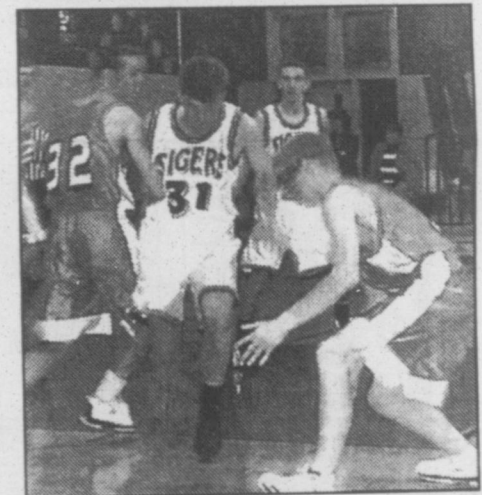

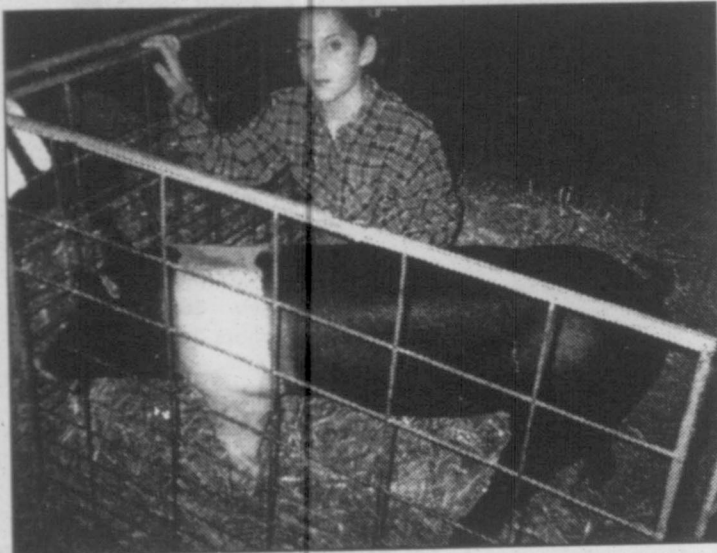
The minutes of the December 11 meeting were presented and were approved as written.

A VARIETY OF HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS COULD LOWER YOUR PROPERTY TAXES

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

WHO QUALIFIES FOR AN EXEMPTION? Anyone who owned a home on January 1 (and used it as a primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes this year... and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

ARE OTHER EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE? If you're disabled - or if you're 65 years old or older - you are entitled to additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

DO I HAVE TO APPLY EACH YEAR? No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2001, you won't need to reapply for 2002 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home - or if you moved to a new home - you'll need to file for an exemption for 2002. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled during 2001, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

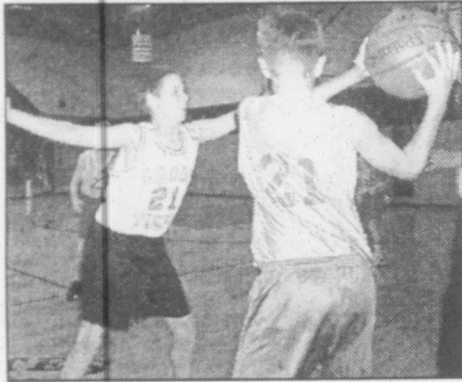
