

A 1,282 sq. ft. addition

would house would house an art class-room suitable for 30 students, a dark room and students, a dark room and storage room. The new addition would be located between the cafeteria and existing classrooms. The area now used as a student lounge could easily be converted to useful storage or classroom space with minor alterations said Packard. Cost of the classroom addition was estimated at between \$35 to \$39 per sq. ft., "depending," said Packard, "on the extent of finish work required in the project. work required in the project. Renovation in the gym

ing capacity of 505 per-sons could be obtained according to Sebring, by rais-ing bleachers 8' and addi-tionally create room for dressing rooms, ticket counter and concession stand underneath. With further renovation to existing dressing rooms, both home and visitor teams would have ade-

Packard quoted a "Guessing" price tag of \$75,000 depending on the amount of structural problems encountered during the renovation process.

Packard also suggested that he preferred using local contractors whenever possible. 

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

Amend Rule 7 to add spacing requirements of wells as follows— Size of Pump (inside dia-meter of column pipe) 2", 3".

Minimum Distance (From nearest well or authorized well site) 100 yards, 150

Distance from Property

Line 50 yards, 75 yards.
Rule 26 requires open or uncovered wells to be closed or capped safely and securely with a covering capable of sustaining weight of at least 400 pounds.
Rule 27 establishes the

proper procedure for drilling completing and plugging all water wells, including water wells, including domestic, industrial, irrigation and public water

uniquion and public water supply wells.

These amendments and rules will become effective on the 27th day of February, 1986.

Hutsell then reported that tax collections were running 85.59 percent collected. Last 85.59 percent collected. Last year at this same time, collections were 92 percent complete. Of the \$114,174.99 uncollected, she expects seven percent to be lost revenues due to bankruptacies. She explained the school had collected enough tax to complete the year and said in had collected enough tax to complete the year and said in the future, the school could operate another year before having to consider dipping into surplus funds to operate. She also noted that the board might consider going, "down with the tax rate to compensate for reappraisals." The reappraisals required by law will greatly effect taxes paid by Groom homeowners and most sales made on residential real extate have bevalued 20 percent below their ed 20 percent below their selling price.
