Council Plans For Decorating

The Groom City Council met in regular session last week with all members attending.

Current Christmas decorations for the city were discussed. Bill Homer, also a member of Groom Economic Development Corporation, reported that GEDC is working with the city to improve the appearance of down town for the holiday season. All old decorations were refurbished for this year. Next year several new ideas will be put in motion to improve on what the city already has. Of Symbols And Souvenirs:

The Far Travels Of Dad's Groom Letterman Jacket

Forty-one years ago, along the wind-swept plains of West Texas, my father, Kenneth Gene Hall, graduated from Groom High School with his letterman's jacket in tow. Naturally, I wasn't there to see the event, but the red wool jacket bearing the familiar Groom "G" and adorned with the coveted football and stripes that has hung in my parents closet these many years has provided my brother and me a small and enduring glimpse of Dad's grinning youth.

The jacket has travelled with my father, or Blondie as he was better-known in 1950, through a college career at Texas A&M, through years in the service that took him to Heidelberg, Germany, across state lines to California where he met and married my mother, Shirley Hall, from the home that I was too young to recall, to the home of my earliest memories, and lastly, to the home where I spent my adolescence and where my father and mother still live in Santa Ana, CA.

Through the years, the jacket has appeared - pulled from among souvenir Hawaiian shirts, wide-lapelled jackets, and Dad's annually worn Christmas vest - as the consummate item of apparel for costume parties, high school dances, and Dad's thirty-fifth high school reunion (1985). It has been protection from the cold. It has been a symbol of achievement and status. It has been a fashion statement and a

cultural icon. It has been a lovely reminder of a time in life that, for most, is filled with the hope and earnestness of dreams unfolding.

For more than 700 people who attended a Fifties prom-theme, fund-raising dinner hosted by Dick Clark and held at the famed Palladium in Hollywood, CA, on November 8, 1991, the jacket became a symbol of purpose. Pictured on the cover of the event's souvenir program amid a couple of 45s, a corsage and other bits of Fifties prom night memorabilia, the Groom "G" was intended to represent Geffen Records, a sponsor of the event and one of the most prominent names in the music industry with an artist roster that includes Cher, Peter Gabriel, Guns N' Roses, Aerosmith, Edie Brickell & New Bohemians, and Joni Mitchell.

Advertising revenue generated through the souvenir program which proudly bore the Geffen/Groom "G", was included in the evening's final tally of over \$1.2 million raised to benefit the T.J. Martell Foundation's Neil Bogart Memorial Laboratories in their research to help children with cancer, leukemia and AIDS.

While I've always believed Dad's jacket to be the ultimate period piece, it wasn't by mere coincidence that it was discovered by Hollywood. He wasn't spotted strolling down

Sunset Blvd. or sitting at a trendy outdoor cafe with the jacket draped across his back. As sr. advertising copywriter for Geffen Records, I knew it would make the perfect prop for the photograph we were arranging. So, Dad ventured into the depths of the closet once again and lent a bit of his past to the future.

I attended the "Prom" at the Palladium that night, ten years after my own Senior Prom, and surely better dressed in an aqua taffeta and lace, off-the-shoulder gown, authentic 1950's red letterman's jacket and souvenir program to match. "Do you remember when your life was on the edge of a dream?" the first page of the program asked. Yes, and for me, those memories bring with them the faint safekeeping scent of mothballs.

- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

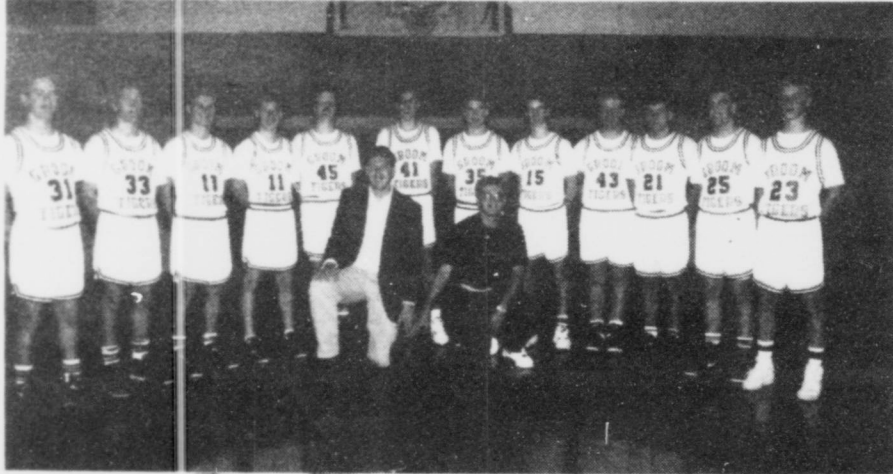

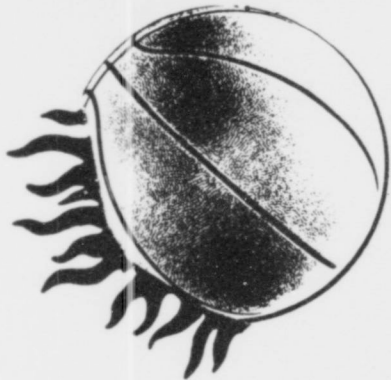

McLean, Alanreed School To Vote On Consolidation Issues ... Again

McLean and Alanreed Independent School District residents formally filed petitions Monday with Gray County Judge Carl Kennedy asking that an election be called to consider the consolidation of the two school districts.

Voters in McLean, Alanreed and Lefors considered the consolidation of the three districts on Nov. 5 during the general election with voters in McLean voting for the consolidation and voters in

Alanreed and Lefors voting against the consolidation. The measure failed because it had to pass in each of the three districts to become effective.

Kennedy said that the consolidation election date for McLean and Alanreed will be set on Thursday by the Gray County Commissioners Court during a special meeting. He said the next uniform election day is Jan. 18.

The petitions, which were turned over to the county

clerk's office, ask that an election be called to consider the question of whether the two school districts should consolidate into the "McLean-Alanreed Consolidated Independent School District."

McLean ISD resident James Hefley, Jr. presented the petition on behalf of the McLean ISD voters and Alanreed ISD resident James Shaw presented the petition on behalf of Alanreed ISD voters.

McLean-Alanreed Should Join Forces

Voters of the McLean and Alanreed School Districts have petitioned the county judges of Gray, Donley, Wheeler and Collingsworth counties to call an election on January 18, 1992, for the purpose of consolidating the two school districts. It appears that statewide, both large and small schools are suffering from severe funding shortfalls, and due to statewide economic conditions and court mandates on the method of financing the Texas public schools, there seems to be no relief available to schools in the foreseeable future. The initiators of the petitions calling for consolidation of McLean and Alanreed have a sincere interest in both the education of children and the preservation of our communities. It is their belief that by joining forces we can hopefully maintain a school system in this area for a long while in the future, and retain the identities and uniqueness of our communities.

Statewide, the prevailing thought for education seems to be: "Bigger is better". However, we in this area do not believe that it is. We love the small school concept where each child is an individual as well as a part of a group, and we do not want economics to force us into sending our children to a large system where he or she becomes just a face in the crowd. Also, in our

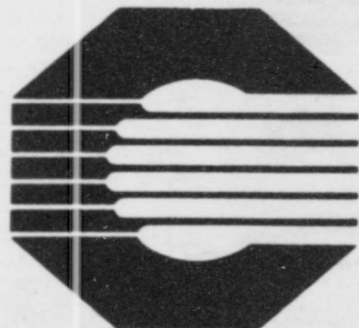




