

for 79 yards and a touchdown. Thane Barkley accounted for seven touchdowns on the night.





British Unknown Soldier was buried in Westminster Abbey. the burial place of kings and queens; that same year a French Unknown Soldier

was interred at the Arc de Triomphe in Paris, where a perpetual flame burns. In 1921, the American Unknown Soldier. symbolizing all the unknown dead, was chosen in an unusual way. Six soldiers of the American Army of Occupation in selected were from different sectors to act as pallbearers. They met at

When the sergeant was ready to perform his solemn duty, he received a bouquet of white roses with instructions to proceed into the City Hall at Chalons, where the four caskets stood. Sergeant Younger realized fully the grave importance of his action; and after bowing his head, he walked around the coffins three times. On the

Next year there is a possibility of district changes and Groom could compete in the northern






