Carson County Boasts One Of States Largest Voter Turnouts

The last ballot was counted and all that was left of the election was to remove political signs from yards around town. Now is the time for politically minded residents to reflect on what the recent election will mean for the next four years.

For the first time in history, a Republican will soon take up the reins to lead Carson County into the new millennium. Local voters turned out in force to decide whether to keep the current county judge or vote for a new one. Approximately 54% of the registered voters went to the polls according to County Clerk Barbara White.

"We were one of the highest counties (in regard to voter turnout) in the state of Texas," she said. "We have

4,596 registered voters in Carson County and approximately 2,423 ballots were cast."

Approximately 538 registered voters cast their ballots early, either in person or by mail. This number has steadily increased over the last few elections. Many elderly people and college students use this method in case they cannot get to the polls on election day due to weather or being out of town. Others use this method for fear they may forget, come election day, to go to the polls.

Candidate Powers won in every precinct in Carson County including the early voting tabulations that are cast at the courthouse in Panhandle. Powers was credited with 262 early votes and Roselius had 255.

Voters in the Groom precinct cast 154 votes for Republican candidate Powers, while 100 voted for Democrat incumbent Roselius.

In Panhandle and its surrounding precincts Powers received 486 votes to 411 cast for Roselius. Powers carried White Deer with 306 to Roselius' 141. Skellytown and Fritch cast 137 and 63 votes for Powers, respectively, while Roselius earned 52 and 25.

Carson County voted pretty much like the rest of Texas in all the other races, electing Governor George W. Bush for another term of office and providing Texas with its first Republican Lt. Governor in the history of the state. So now...it can be said... "So votes Carson County... So votes Texas!"

[Editors Note: The following are some interesting facts concerning Carson County's political history as taken from the Texas Almanac.]

On November 3, 1998 Carson County voters elected the first republican county judge in the one hundred ten year history of the county.

Carson County was organized in 1838. The Democratic Party in Carson County is 110 years old. The Carson County Republican Party is only about 30 years old. It was organized in the mid nineteen sixties. The first republican primary was held at the home of Lynn O'Neal Gray in the sixties.

Julius Meaker Jr. served as the republican county chairman from the sixties until his death in 1980. Jerri Osborne served until George Eller was elected county chairman in 1980. He served until 1986 when Tam Terry took over for two years. Jerri Osborne was elected county chairman in 1988 and has served for the past ten years.

From 1888 until 1988 Carson County did not have one single republican in an elected office. The first republican ever to run for office in Carson County was J.T. Broadway who ran for county judge in 1980. C.E. Williams was the first person to run for commissioner as a republican. He ran in 1986. In 1988 Tam Terry ran for sheriff as a republican. In 1988 commissioner Jerry Strawn became the first republican ever elected to a county office. On November 3, 1998 history was made for Carson County. Lewis

Powers became the first republican county judge ever elected in the one hundred ten (110) year history of the county.

Ten years ago Carson County had four democrat county commissioners and a democrat judge. The county now has a

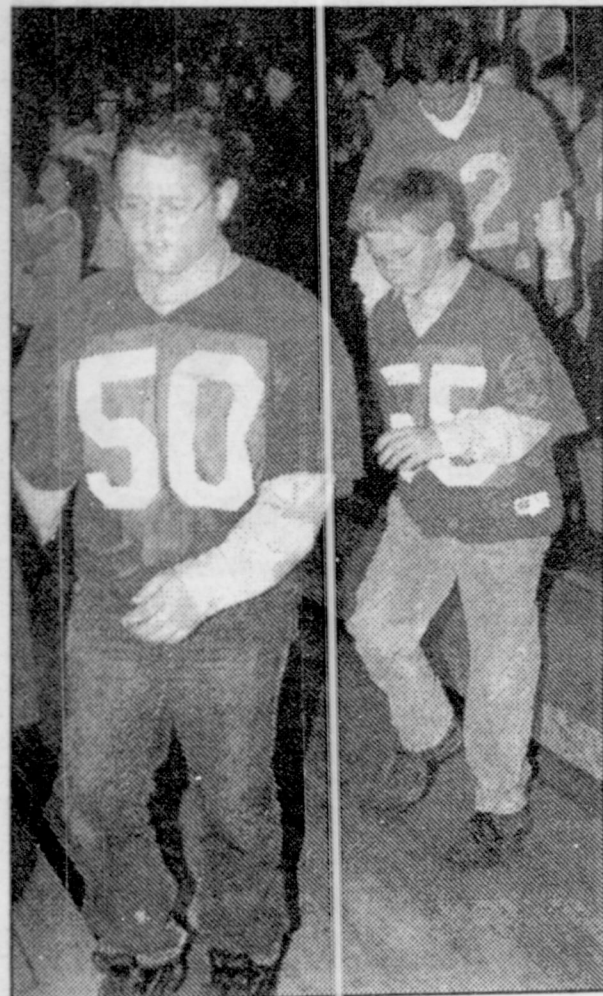

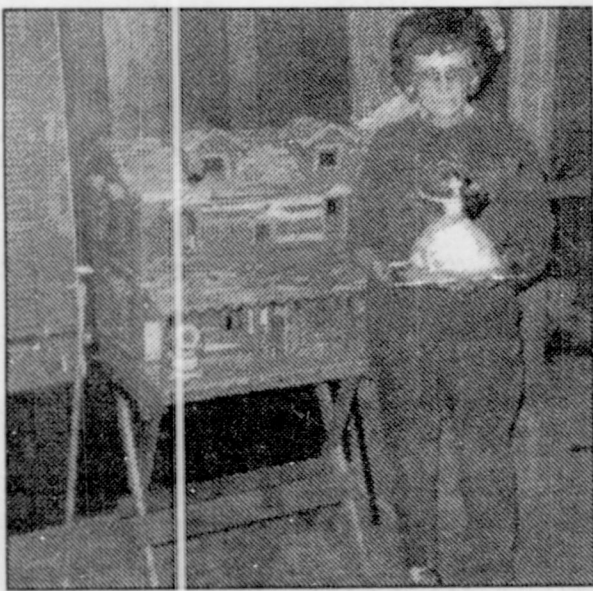

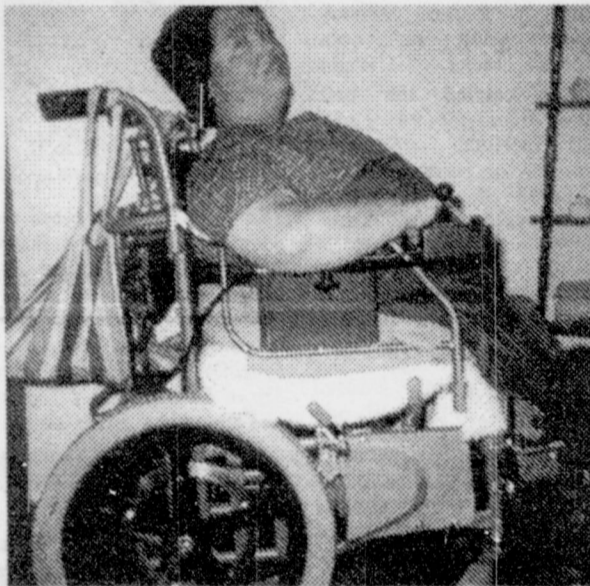

1998 Tigers End Regular Season Undefeated, Ranked Number 8

The Groom Tigers ended District play as champions, undefeated. They are one of only three teams statewide playing 6-man football with a perfect record. Their win against Higgins, 46-0, gives them the District title outright.

The District title had been theirs for two weeks by default due to outcomes of games played by other teams in the district. "The team showed a lot more enthusiasm and emotion in the match-up with Higgins. They

dominated the game and showed, once again, a real team effort," stated Coach Larry Reid.

Groom had eleven first downs to Higgins' one. Groom rushed a total of 16 times for 167 yards while the Coyotes lost 12 yards on 14 carries.

The Tigers connected on 4 of 7 passes to gain 59 yards and two touchdowns. Higgins hit 5 of 13 passes for 10 yards and one interception. Higgins also had three punts for 24.33 yards.

Daniel Treadwell scored first for Groom on a 27 yard pass from Josh Evenson. Jamie Shuck kicked the point after attempt for another 2. Daniel carried the ball two times for a total of seven yards and another T.D. in the second quarter. He also had one unassisted tackle.

Wade Ritter made his first touchdown on a 35 yard run. His second came at the beginning of the second quarter on a three yard run. Shuck made good on both P.A.T. kicks. Wade Ritter carried the ball five times for 94 yards. He received one pass gaining 14 yards.

Jamie Shuck caught a five yard pass from Evenson to score a T.D. He also made good the P.A.T. kick. He totaled an extra 10 points through the P.A.T.'s greatly assisting Groom to victory. He had one

unassisted tackle.

Dean Fields earned Groom their final T.D. on a seven yard run. Dean carried the ball four times for a total of 47 yards. He also intercepted the ball and gained 17 yards. He had three unassisted tackles.

Josh Evenson, Groom's quarterback, passed for 59 yards, connecting on four of seven passes for two T.D.'s. He also returned a punt for 25 yards.

Chris Ollinger and Evan Crowell were big standouts defensively.

Ollinger had eight unassisted tackles and sacked Higgins' quarterback twice.

Evan Crowell had

seven unassisted tackles.

Wyatt Weinheimer also sacked the quarterback and he had four unassisted tackles as did Dusty Crump.

Alberto Vega completed three unassisted tackles. Clay Ritter had two and Russell Conrad had one.

The Groom Tigers will begin their playoff bid this week at Clarendon as they play McLean for the Bi-District Championship. The game is slated to begin at 7:30 p.m., Friday, November 13.

"We will be playing a different McLean team this time," stated Coach Reid. "The first time we played them they had some injuries and we

caught them at a vulnerable moment. I think we should expect a much different McLean."

With the Bi-District Championship at stake this will prove to be a game you just won't want to miss! So drive to Clarendon and show your support.

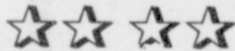
☆☆ Election Charges & Counter-Charges ☆☆

 Greek philosopher Aristotle said over 2,000 years ago, "The One's Who Can... Do, The Rest Just Criticize." That is still true today. Last year I made the decision to work for a change and bring responsible, accountable, conservative government to Carson County. If you are going to make a difference you must be willing to take a stand for what you believe in. I researched and printed accurate facts. I have never knowingly printed anything untrue in this county election. It has been alleged that I printed untrue facts in a letter to the editor in a county newspaper five days before last weeks election. I owe it to my family, friends, and myself to expose these false accusations which implied that I had lied. Three days before the election a group of democrats from the courthouse clique signed their names to a number of false statements about my article. They called me by name three times. The letter with these signatures was photo copied and this material was passed out door to

door, in restaurants, and other locations around the county. The Carson County democratic party paid for the untrue, libelous, slanderous, printed material. Next it was implied that I lied about having a copy of the county budget. I have turned over copies of checks and the deposit slip where I purchased the county budget last

About the salaries: One employee does get over the \$31,000 I stated. I have the budget to prove it. About the judge's salary: Here is what the budget says on page 14. Base salary \$32,125, state salary \$5,000, retirement \$4,966, health insurance \$3,953, dental insurance \$403, worker's compensation \$183, unemployment compensation \$66, conference education \$1,600, school fees \$100, juvenile board salary \$1,800, car allowance \$4,800, meals \$1,200. Salaries and benefits from this total is \$56,196 for the judge. On top of that the county pays \$4,555 for social security listed under the judge appropriation. You people who said that I lied have good reason to be very nervous. You may find out what your signature and endorsement is really worth. I'll say again to you gossip mongers, people who don't know what you are talking about,

make an appointment and I will show you the facts and figures. I did tell the truth and nothing but the truth.
