Groom High School and Jr. High Track-sters braved the elements last weekend to attend a track meet at Miami. With an entire spectrum of weather conditions, from hot and dusty to cold and rainy the meet was truly an endurance test for all concerned.

Some of the schools participating were Groom Miami, Wheeler, Shamrock, White Deer, Highland Park, Memphis, Claude, Valley, Ft. Elliott, Higgins, Lefors, Channing, Follett, McLean, Hartley, Silverton, Adrian, and Hedley.

The Groom boys placed fifth in the two day meet scoring a total of 71 points.

Nick Ashford tied with Gaddis of Valley for third place in the High Jump.

Seth Ritter placed third in the pole vault.

Justin Ritter placed first in the 800 meter run.

Bart Britten placed third in the 400 meter dash.

Bo Burgin placed third in the 300 meter hurdles.

The Junior High Boys placed sixth with 42½ points.

The 1600 meter relay team place fourth. Members are Daniel Treadwell, Josh Evenson, Alberto Vega, and Marcus Miller.

Daniel Treadwell also placed second in the 100 meter hurdles, second in the shot and third in the high jump.

Alberto Vega placed first in the 800 meter run and second in the 2400 meter.

Kade Brown Has "Dream Come True" Experience

Lonny Kade Brown fulfilled every child's fantasy recently at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo: He rode in a red fire truck in the Grand Entry at the Houston Rodeo while dressed as a rodeo clown and was then interviewed by cable television for nationwide broadcast via satellite. Born on Halloween day in 1988, Kade was nicknamed "Spook" and every Halloween since then he has dressed as a rodeo clown because that is what he dreams of becoming. Kade is the son of Lonny and Susan Brown of Groom.

The Brown family was in Houston for the world's largest rodeo, and daughter Kori Brown was showing cattle at the Stock show when the opportunity, (thanks to a friend of the family, Paul Sterling) arose for Kade to accompany the rodeo clowns in his first-

ever Grand Entry. Luckily, "Spook" had his clown costume with him in Houston, complete with baggy pants and suspenders, and the real rodeo clowns made up his face in clown make-up. Over the years of attending the rodeos and entering clown contests Kade has become friends with several of the clowns who are on the Professional rodeo circuit, including the renowned Quail Dobbs, Leon Coffee and Rick Chapman. Because of Kade's sprightly and impish nature, these clowns embellished his nickname and refer to him as

"Smokin' Spook" Brown.

Following his ride in the entry, Kade's interview for cable television was conducted behind the bull riding chutes by Sharon Camarillo. When asked what he might be when he grows up, Kade replied that he wanted to be "Just like my Daddy" - a high compliment for the elder Brown who, incidentally does not engage in rodeo clowning. Whether he ranches or clowns (or maybe does both!), Kade is obviously enthusiastic and courageous. Little "Smokin'

The months of March and April are the time of year when several important reporting deadlines take place for Social Security beneficiaries and workers.

In 1994 if you received Social Security benefits while working and earning above the annual limit, you need to report your earnings to Social Security no later than April 17, 1995. The 1994 limits were \$8,040 for people under 65 and \$11,160 for people 65-69.

If you were age 70 for the entire year, the earnings limits do not apply to you.

If you are self-employed, it is time for you to report your earnings and pay Social Security tax with your income tax return. If you operate a trade, business, or profession, either by your self or as a partner, and have actual net earnings of \$400 or more this year, you must report your earnings on Schedule SE. The deadline for filing your income tax return is April 17, 1995.

Brand Attends Crime Seminar

Carson County Sheriff Loren Brand attended a training seminar in Arlington last week on Financial Investigative Techniques. The seminar was presented by the Bureau of Justice Assistance and the U.S. Department of Justice.

The seminar was co-sponsored by the Dallas Police Department Intelligence Unit, Dallas County Sheriff's Department, Tarrant County District Attorney's Office, Texas Narcotics Control Program and the Regional Organized Crime Information Center (ROIC). The Carson County Sheriff's Department is a member of ROIC.

Instructors from the Internal Revenue Service, Texas Attorney General's Office and the Economic Crime Section of the Tucson, Arizona Police Department presented the material. Topics of instruction were: location and detection of hidden criminal assets, seizure and forfeiture of assets and presentation of evidence in court.

The seminar was attended by 150 law enforcement investigators from across the state.

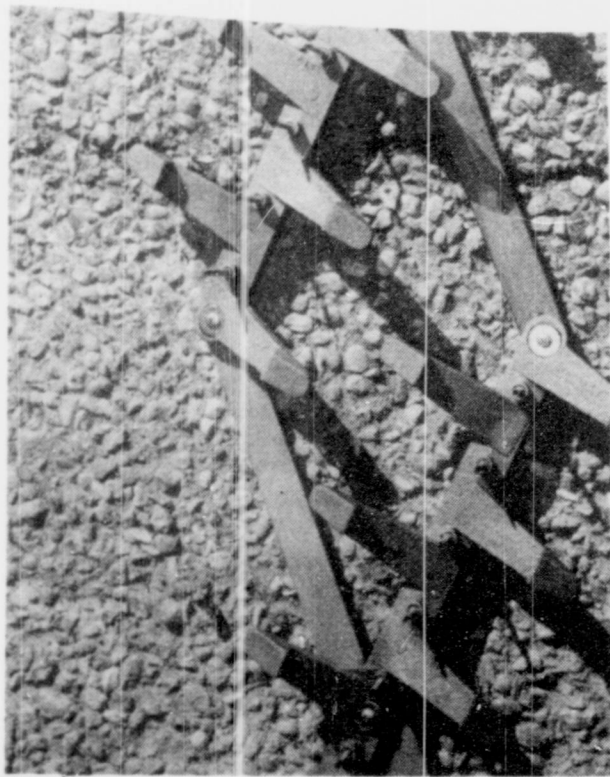

Sheriff's Department Purchases Stingers To Stop Car Chase Dangers

There are currently ten persons incarcerated in the Carson County Jail.

The Sheriff's Department assisted the Texas Highway Patrol last Friday in a targeted effort to reduce criminal activity. The 24-hour operation concentrated officers along Interstate 40 in Carson County.

Sheriff's deputies were kept busy at the scene of a large grass fire by the Pantex facility last Wednesday. Smoke from the fire created traffic hazards along U.S. 60 and traffic had to be detoured to minimize risks to motorists and firefighters.

Deputies also assisted at the scene of a fire in White Deer on Friday. Structures were destroyed as a result of the White Deer fire.

Chief Deputy Lovell Kennard inadvertently went "topless" Wednesday when the pickup topper on his county vehicle was torn from his pickup by high winds. The bolts attaching the topper had been stripped by the force of the winds and the topper was thrown against the highway causing extensive damage to the covering.

The Carson County Commissioner's Court

approved the purchase of five sets of Stinger Spikes for sheriff department vehicles. Due to the number of felony pursuit situations in our county, the Commissioner's Court agreed to the purchase of the Stinger Spikes in an effort to reduce hazards to the officers, citizens and even the suspects. The Stinger Spikes are a tire deflating tool which can be deployed by officers in a matter of seconds to insert surgically sharp, hollow stainless steel spikes into the tires of evading vehicles. The Stingers are a device which can be thrown across one lane of traffic in front of the vehicle which refuses to stop. When the suspect vehicle runs over the Stingers the rocking arm action of the frame pushes the spikes into the tires causing the tires to deflate completely within 25-30 seconds from the time of insertion. The Stinger Spikes can withstand speeds up to 115 miles per hour. All five of our cars are now equipped with the Stingers as are all Texas Highway Patrol cars in our area.

Sheriff's deputies assisted at the scene of a major traffic accident on U.S. 60 near the Pantex plant.

maintains a site specific water quality management plan (WQMP) through our District and has that plan certified by the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB), the farmer will be compliant with state water quality law and exempt from other state regulatory processes regarding nonpoint source discharge of pollutants," said David Bowers, Chairman of the Gray Co. SWCD Board.

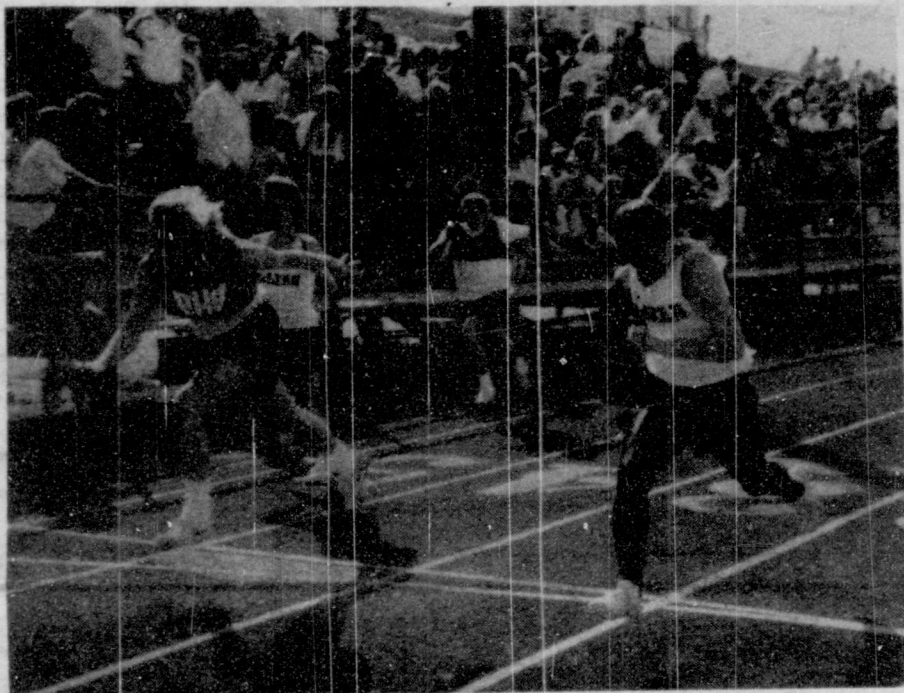

ALANREED - Erin Lenore Terbush, 86, a former Alanreed resident, died Friday, March 24, 1995, in Amarillo.

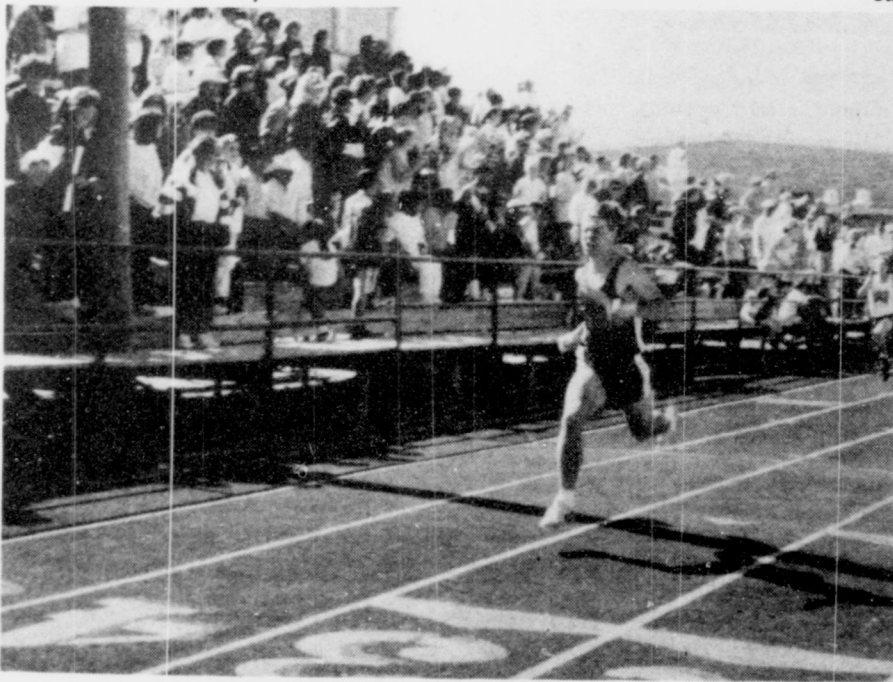

In helping others deal with grief she mentioned the three "H's", hush, hug and hang around. Sandy emphasized that each person progresses through grief at their own time frame.





Advertisement Misleading On Social Security

"Social Security wouldn't even cover his burial costs."

That is the remark a widow makes to one of her friends in a television advertising campaign for a life insurance company.

It is a clever ad - but it is also a very misleading one. Here's why.

Social Security is not like life insurance policies that may pay out \$40,000 to the beneficiary when the policy holder dies.

Social Security provides a monthly annuity to eligible survivors when an insured worker dies. For a young worker with average earnings who dies at age 25, that monthly payment could be as much as \$1,574 for a surviving spouse and two children and would be worth as much as \$333,000. And the monthly benefits increase annually with changes in cost of living.

In fairness, the television advertiser might say that they are actually referring to what Social Security calls a 'lump sum death benefit.' This lump-sum death benefit is a one-time payment of \$255 - and it is paid in addition to any monthly survivors insurance benefits that are due. The lump-sum death payment was intended to be "only a modest amount to help meet the special expenses connected with the worker's last illness and death."

The lump-sum death payment has, in fact, become a sort of "odddity" in the Social Security program - and in this case has become a hook for clever advertisers to hang an argument on.

When viewers hear the complaint about Social Security and funeral expenses, they should remember that the average lifetime annuity paid by Social Security to survivors is worth much more than the value of most individual life insurance policies. That is something to think about.

House, Senate Consider Changes

AUSTIN - Senator John Whitmire (D-Houston), Chairman of the Senate Committee on Criminal Justice and Senator Mario Gallegos (D-Houston) will introduce an amendment to Senate Bill 1 to modify the State's No-Pass, No-Play Rule. Whitmire and Gallegos will offer the amendment at the Wednesday, March 8 hearing of the Senate Education Committee.

The offered amendment provides a three week suspension for a student who fails one class, as opposed to the current six-week standard suspension. A student who fails any classes thereafter faces suspension for the full six weeks. Under the offered amendment, a student suspended under the no-pass, no-play rule may be permitted to practice or rehearse with other students for an extracurricular activity but may not participate in a competition or other public performance. A school district that suspends a student under this section is encouraged to provide tutoring to the student in each subject in which the student received a grade lower than the equivalent of 70 on a scale of 100.

"I think everyone agrees no-pass, no-play is a good idea and has served the state well," said Whitmire. "I continue to believe in the underlying reason behind the rule but ten years later

an unintended result has occurred. We are seeing literally hundreds of young people across the state, particularly inner city kids, cut off from their first line of support and discipline. Football, track and band are a savior for them. It makes little sense to remove that positive influence from a kid, leaving gangs their only alternative."

According to the Texas Education Agency report on At-Risk Students, campus

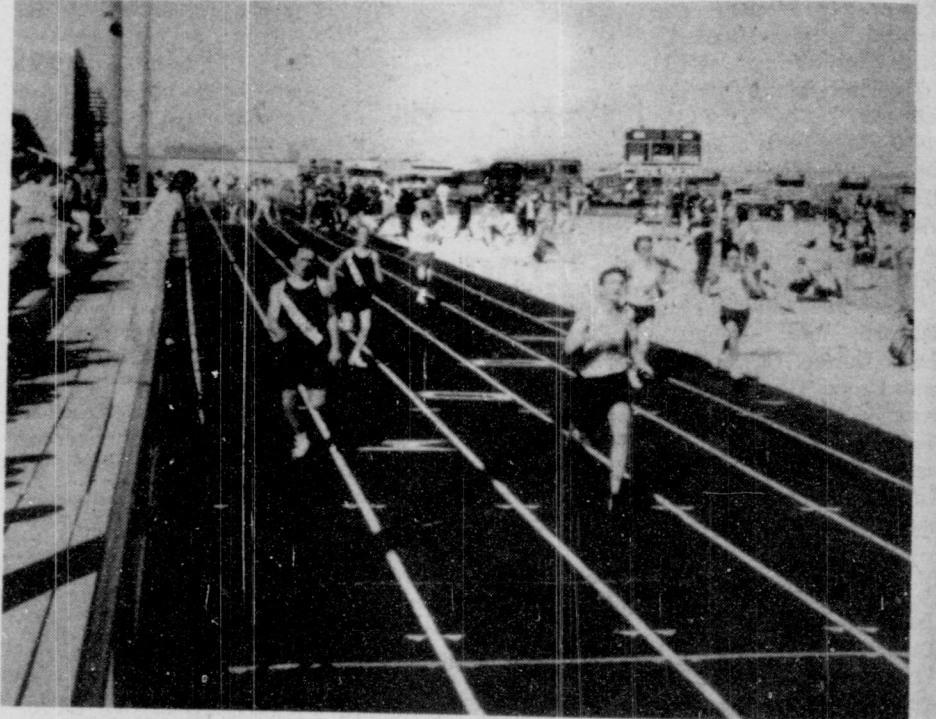
administrators have been increasingly concerned with a potential connection between current no-pass, no-play policy and gang recruitment. This connection was brought to the forefront by the compelling testimony by HPD officer Robin Kirk before the Senate Committee on Criminal Justice.

"For a lot of these kids, their only opportunity to have a positive life

experience is through band and football," concluded Whitmire. "A three-week suspension is a hard call but I believe it is the right call."

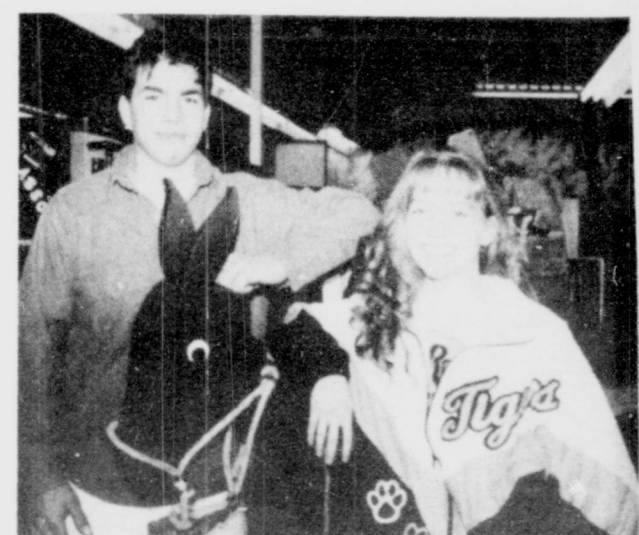
