Brian Baker rushed for 133 yards on 22 carries. He tallied three touchdowns on an 18 yard run, a 60 yard interception return and a fumble recovery in the end zone.

The Tigers received four penalties for a total of 55 yards compared to the Bulldogs 25 yards.

CATTLE BARON...

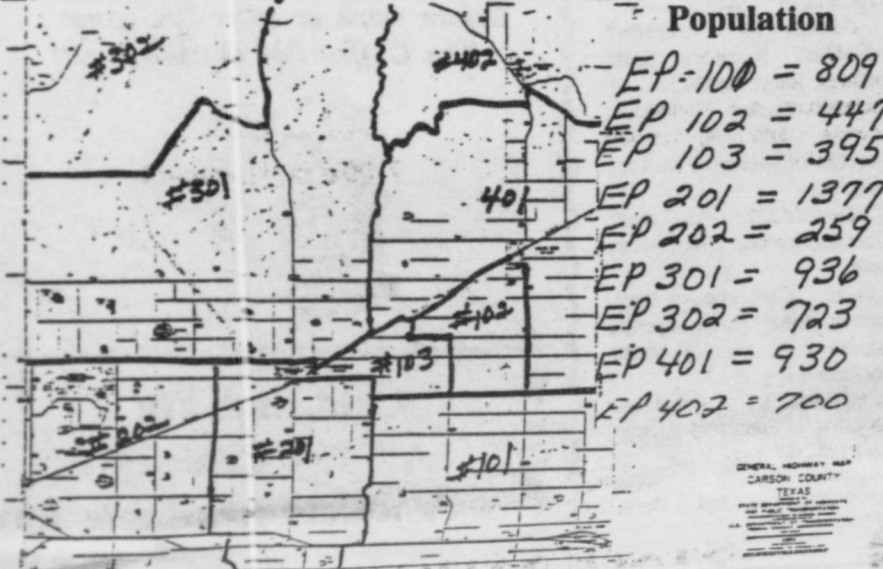

Order Adopting County Election Precincts

ORDER ADOPTING COUNTY ELECTION PRECINCTS

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Carson County is charged by Article 42.001 of the Texas Election code to divide the county into compact and contiguous election precincts; and

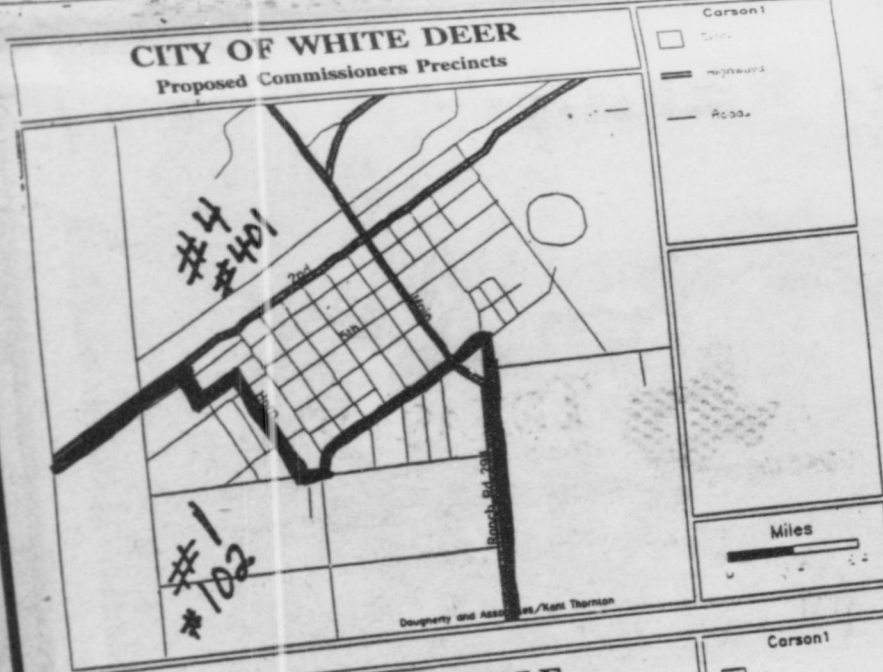
WHEREAS, it is necessary to change boundaries of County Election Precincts in Carson County to conform with new County Commissioner and Justice of the Peace Precincts; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner Court of Carson County, through a series of public hearings and meetings, has received and has considered oral and written testimony and evidence regarding the need for the alteration of certain Election Precincts.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Carson County that Carson County, Texas be divided into nine (9) County Election Precincts in accordance with Exhibit A attached to this Order, which is a description of the boundaries of each and every County Election Precinct in Carson County, Texas, and which is incorporated into and is made part of this Order.

The County Election Precincts ordered herein shall be effective January 1, 1992. BE IT SO ORDERED.

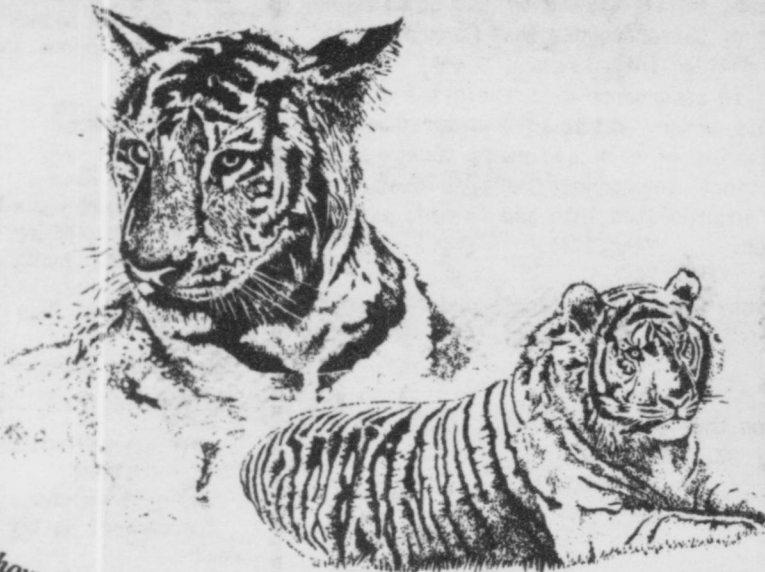

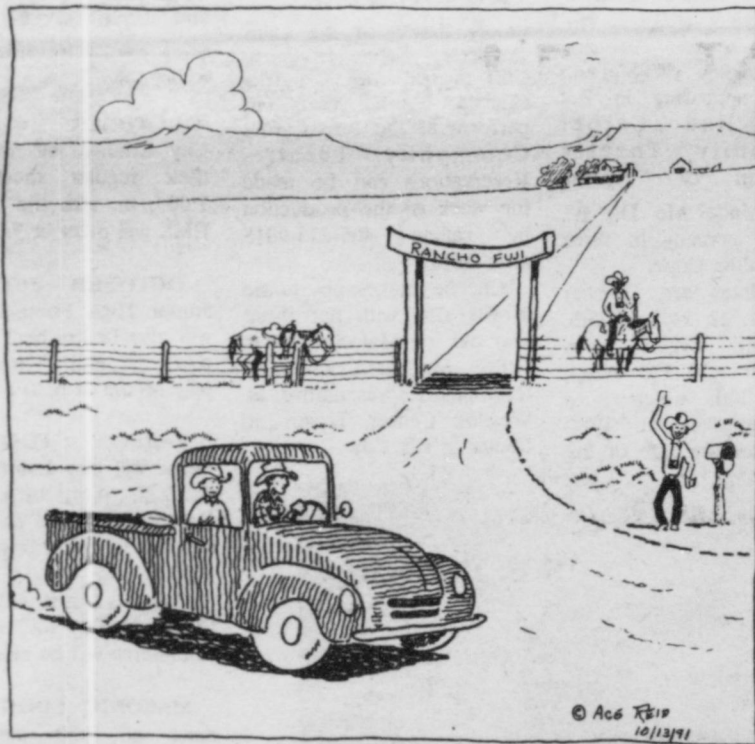

**PUBLIC NOTICE CITY OF McLEAN
"SAFE DRINKING WATER ACT"**

The City of McLean has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceed the following maximum constituent level for Nitrate specified by the Department "Drinking Water Standards" which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (U.S.). The limit is set at 10 milligrams of Nitrate (as nitrogen) per liter of water. The amount of Nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water to be 11.73 milligrams per liter. Adults and children over the age of 6 months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of 6 months may reduce its available oxygen supply and possibly produce "blue baby" symptoms. Parents are advised to find other sources of drinking water such as bottled water, for their infants under 6 months of age. All doctors and hospitals in the area have been notified of this situation. The city will offer to provide bottled water of acceptable quality to pregnant women and to infants under 6 months of age for cooking and drinking purposes.
