OLD ROUTE 66

The "Grapes of Wrath" story told of a family down on their luck, fleeing to Calif. hoping it would just be better than where they came from. From the start until the end of The Mother Road, hardship and hard times were a continuing saga carried out each day.

Small town churches, had to form charity groups just to help the people get going again. It was a lot cheaper to help them move on than to have them stay. Most cases were legitimate, but there was always the dead beats. Most pastors became pretty adept at picking out the deadbeats.

All stations had old tires on hand, and gas cans were a must. Most hard luck travelers had an "Okie credit card," (small siphoning hose) in their trunk somewhere and enough tools to handle repairs.

One experience, I recall, happened in Bob Massey's Cafe one morning. Dad and I, Buck Henley, J.D. Fish, and others were having

coffee. An Old green Plymouth station wagon pulled up by the cafe. A man got out with a box, leaving a wife and two little boys in the car. He came in, approached each of our tables and offered to sell a box of little toy trains for some grocery money. They were hungry and he was trying to get to New Mexico where he had folks. The little boys and the wife were glued to the windows,

watching every move the man made.

I'm sure we were all thinking the same thing—that here were some real pros—they were good, and they had a new wrinkle, but the faces in the windows finally got to us. We all gave money, told him to keep the toys. He thanked us and left. Buck Henley told me to watch to see if he pulled into Pucketts. Well, he did, and bought food. So guess we did good, but the deadbeats were always on our minds back then.

National Grandparents Day, Sept 9

Special Day of Honor says, "Yes, We Remember" to America's Grandparents-Grandparents have always been valued for sentimental reasons. For most Americans, they are living symbols of cultural traditions, family history and moral values passed along through the centuries. But they're more than just symbols. Recent social changes are bringing today's grandparents back into the mainstream of life as workers, providers, child-rearers and political leaders.

National Grandparents Day, which will be celebrated September 9, gives Americans a chance to honor their grandparents for all of their contributions, both traditional and current.

National Grandparents Day has been an official national day of commemoration since 1978, but it hasn't yet achieved the public recognition of Mothers or Fathers Days. According to Texas Department of Aging spokesman Allen Baca, that is beginning to change.

"A special day for grandparents is an idea that appeals to nearly everyone," Baca said. "We began promoting the holiday heavily when we first heard about it five years ago, and the response to a special day for grandparents just took off like crazy.

"I've noticed that a lot of greeting card sections, which is really gratifying to us."

Baca said the recognition is overdue for older men and women whose contributions to society continue long after retirement and their children's establishment of their own families.

"Grandparents are more important than ever to their families, and to society. Many of them are taking care of grandchildren for their working children. A significant number of grandparents end up with custody of grandchildren after their children's marriages dissolve."

The role of seniors in the economy and workforce has also changed in recent years, Baca noted.

"It takes an increasing amount of family income to maintain a decent standard of living these days, so a lot of grandparents are rejoining or staying in the work force after they turn 65. They do it to supplement their own income, or to help support their adult children, or sometimes both.

"The truth is, most grandparents are far from the burden on their families they're sometimes thought to be. Their contributions are important and often essential to their families' economic survival."

Most people, though, would probably say their grandparents' greatest contributions are gifts of themselves like good advice, love, emotional support and a sense of family identity.

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed an application with the Texas Public Utility Commission to introduce new optional services - Call Control Options. The initial service areas will be Laredo, McAllen and Austin. Expansion into other service areas will be based on availability. Customers in other areas will be notified when these services become available.

Call Control Options include six new services - Call Blocker, Call Cue, Call Return, Priority Call, Call Trace and Selective Call Forwarding. The features will be available to single-line residence and business customers.

Call Blocker - enables the customer to block incoming calls from a maximum of three specified telephone numbers and/or to block the last incoming call.

Call Cue - enables the customer to automatically redial the last outgoing telephone number dialed. If the recalled number is busy, equipment will monitor the line for a maximum of 30 minutes and will let the customer know when the call can go through.

Call Return - enables the customer to automatically redial the telephone number of the most recent incoming call. If the number is busy, Call Return will continue to dial the number for up to 30 minutes, or until it completes the call.

Priority Call - provides the customer with a distinctive alerting signal, ring or Call Waiting Tone (if the customer has subscribed to Call Waiting), when the customer is called from a maximum of three preselected telephone numbers.*

Call Trace - enables the customer to initiate a trace of the last incoming call received. The number, date and time will be recorded by Southwestern Bell Telephone so that the call's origin can be identified.

Selective Call Forwarding - enables the customer to forward incoming calls from specified telephone numbers (maximum of three) to another telephone number.

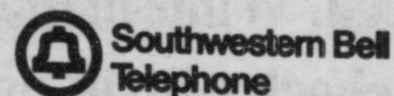

The GRANDVIEW-HOPKINS INDEPENDENT School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program and Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Children may buy lunch for .35 and breakfast for .15. Meals are also available free or at a reduced price.

If you or your child get Food Stamps or AFDC for any of your children, then your child can get free meals.

If you or your child's household income is at or below the amounts on the Income Chart, your children can get free or reduced-price meals for .20 cents for lunch and .15 cents for breakfast.

If you have a foster child, that child may be eligible for benefits regardless of your household income.

CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you give on the application will be used only to allow your children to get free or reduced-price meals and to verify eligibility.

REPLICATION: You may apply for free and reduced price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, such as a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, fill out an application then.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

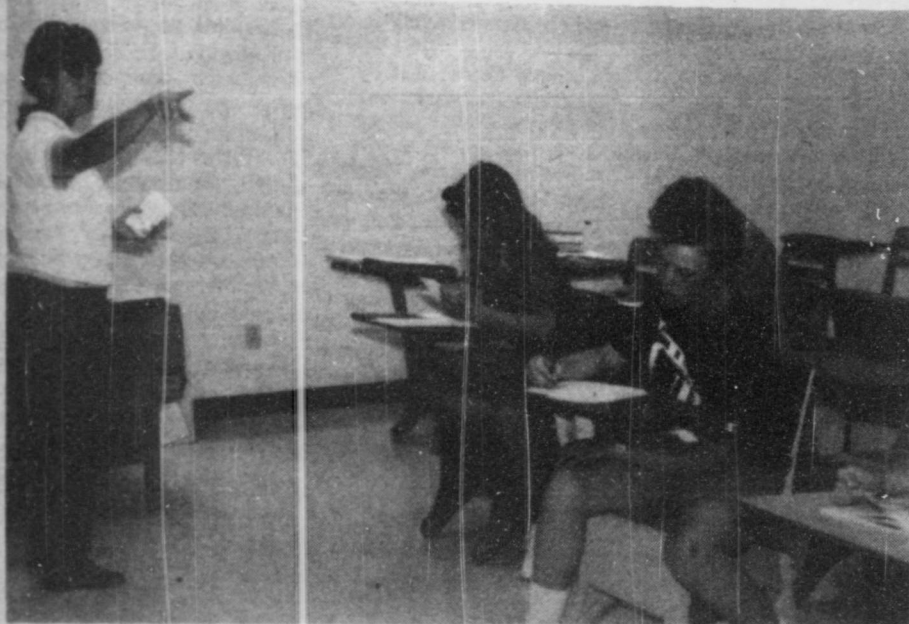

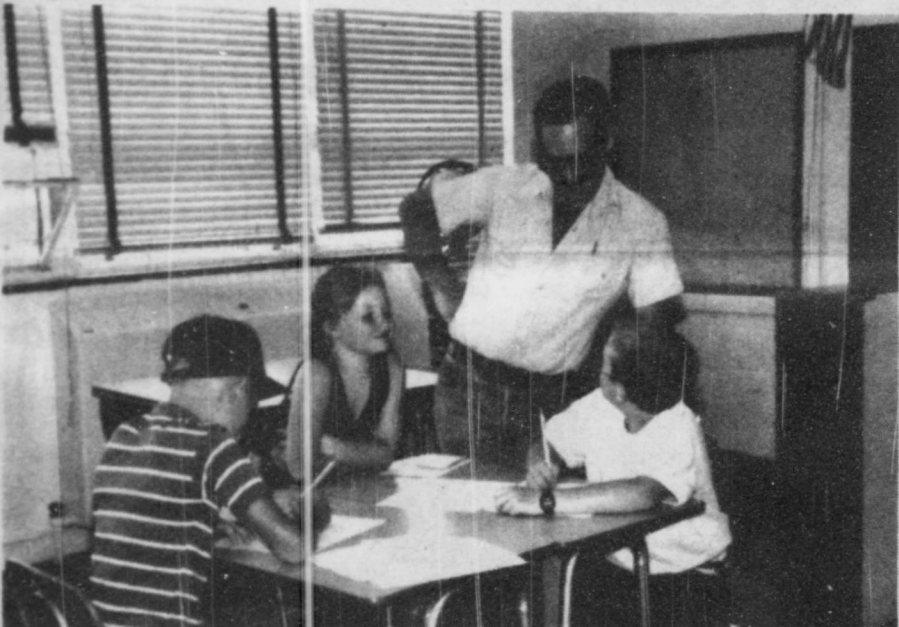

From

OLD ROUTE 66

by D. Trew

The "Grapes of Wrath" story told of a family down on their luck, fleeing to Calif. hoping it would just be better than where they came from. From the start until the end of The Mother Road, hardship and hard times were a continuing saga carried out each day.

Small town churches, had to form charity groups just to help the people get going again. It was a lot cheaper to help them move on than to have them stay. Most cases were legitimate, but there was always the dead beats. Most pastors became pretty adept at picking out the deadbeats.

All stations had old tires on hand, and gas cans were a must. Most hard luck travelers had an "Okie credit card," (small siphoning hose) in their trunk somewhere and enough tools to handle repairs.

One experience, I recall, happened in Bob Massey's Cafe one morning. Dad and I, Buck Henley, J.D. Fish, and others were having

coffee. An Old green Plymouth station wagon pulled up by the cafe. A man got out with a box, leaving a wife and two little boys in the car. He came in, approached each of our tables and offered to sell a box of little toy trains for some grocery money. They were hungry and he was trying to get to New Mexico where he had folks. The little boys and the wife were glued to the windows,

watching every move the man made.

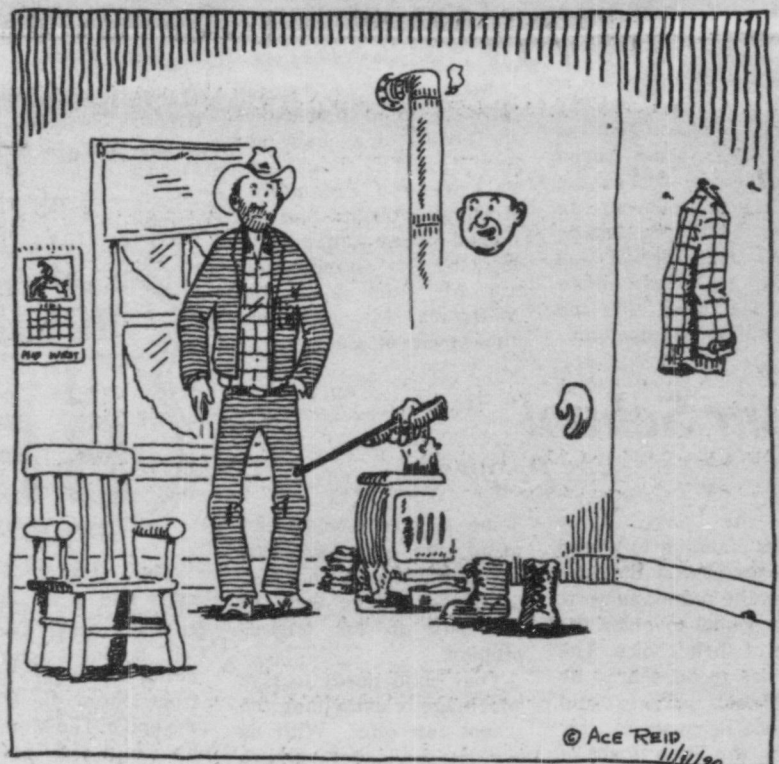

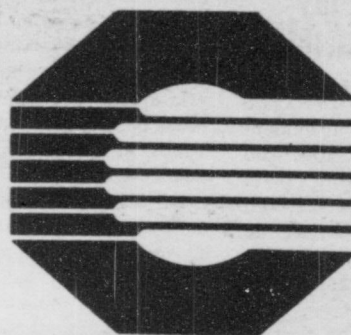

National Grandparents Day, Sept 9

Special Day of Honor says, "Yes, We Remember" to America's Grandparents-Grandparents have always been valued for sentimental reasons. For most Americans, they are living symbols of cultural traditions, family history and moral values passed along through the centuries. But they're more than just symbols. Recent social changes are bringing today's grandparents back into the mainstream of life as workers, providers, child-rearers and political leaders.

National Grandparents Day, which will be celebrated September 9, gives Americans a chance to honor their grandparents for all of their contributions, both traditional and current.

National Grandparents Day has been an official national day of commemoration since 1978, but it hasn't yet achieved the public recognition of Mothers or Fathers Days. According to Texas Department of Aging spokesman Allen Baca, that is beginning to change.

"A special day for grandparents is an idea that appeals to nearly everyone," Baca said. "We began promoting the holiday heavily when we first heard about it five years ago, and the response to a special day for grandparents just took off like crazy.

"I've noticed that a lot of greeting card sections, which is really gratifying to us."

Baca said the recognition is overdue for older men and women whose contributions to society continue long after retirement and their children's establishment of their own families.

"Grandparents are more important than ever to their families, and to society. Many of them are taking care of grandchildren for their working children. A significant number of grandparents end up with custody of grandchildren after their children's marriages dissolve."

The role of seniors in the economy and workforce has also changed in recent years, Baca noted.

"It takes an increasing amount of family income to maintain a decent standard of living these days, so a lot of grandparents are rejoining or staying in the work force after they turn 65. They do it to supplement their own income, or to help support their adult children, or sometimes both.

"The truth is, most grandparents are far from the burden on their families they're sometimes thought to be. Their contributions are important and often essential to their families' economic survival."

Most people, though, would probably say their grandparents' greatest contributions are gifts of themselves like good advice, love, emotional support and a sense of family identity.

Call Trace - enables the customer to initiate a trace of the last incoming call received. The number, date and time will be recorded by Southwestern Bell Telephone so that the call's origin can be identified.

Selective Call Forwarding - enables the customer to forward incoming calls from specified telephone numbers (maximum of three) to another telephone number.

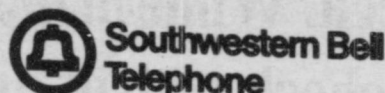

Mrs. Roslyn Watson has withdrawn her name from the Republican ticket as a candidate for the unexpired term of Carson County Tax Assessor-Collector. Texas Election Code states that... "a person who voted at a primary election... is ineligible for a place on the ballot for the succeeding general election for state or county officer as... the nominee of a political party other than the party holding the primary in which the person voted..." (Sec. 162.015.)

Mrs. Watson will seek the office of County Tax-Assessor-Collector as a write-in candidate.

Carson County Commissioners' Court appointed

as County Tax Assessor-Collector until the end of 1990, after the death of C.L. (Lloyd) Sterling, the incumbent candidate. Mrs. Watson has worked in the tax office for 17 years, 5 of those as chief deputy. The Carson County Republican Party Executive Committee nominated Mrs. Watson as its candidate after the Democratic Executive Committee failed to nominate her as its candidate for the November election.

Republican County Chairman Jeri Osborne had discussed the procedures and qualifications for nominating Mrs. Watson with a Secretary of State staff attorney prior to the Republican nomination, and was told that her nomination would qualify.

Mrs. Osborne stated that she regrets Mrs. Watson was forced to resign as the Republican Party candidate, but is pleased that she will be a candidate by write-in.

Part 2 - FOSTER CHILD: A FOSTER CHILD is the legal responsibility of the welfare agency or court. Complete a separate application for each foster child. **DO NOT COMPLETE THIS PART AND PART 4. DO NOT COMPLETE PART 3A OR PART 3B.**

1. FOSTER CHILD: Put a checkmark () in the box if you are applying for a foster child.

2. INCOME: Write the child's personal use income and how often it is received (such as weekly, or any two weeks, twice a month or monthly). Write "0" if the child has no income. Personal use income is (a) money given by the foster parent identified by category for the child's personal use, such as for clothing, school fees and allowances; and (b) if other money the child gets, such as money from another family or money from full-time or regular part-time jobs.

3. SIGNATURE: An adult household member must sign the application in Part 4.

Part 3A - HOUSEHOLDS NOW GETTING FOOD STAMPS OR AFDC FOR THEIR CHILDREN: COMPLETE THIS PART AND PART 4. In addition, complete Part 3B if there is any child in your household for whom you do not get food stamps or AFDC.

1. CASE NUMBER: Write your Food Stamp or AFDC Case Number.

2. NAMES: If you do not get food stamps or AFDC for all your children, write the names of the children for whom you do NOT get these benefits and complete Part 3B.

3. SIGNATURE: An adult must sign the application.

Part 3B - ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS: IF YOU DID NOT GET A FOOD STAMP/AFDC CASE NUMBER FOR ALL YOUR CHILDREN, COMPLETE THIS PART AND PART 4.

1. HOUSEHOLD NAMES: Write the names of everyone in your household. Include yourself and the children listed above, your spouse, all other children, grandparents, other relatives and unrelated persons in your household. Use a separate sheet of paper if you do not have enough space.

2. CURRENT INCOME: Write the amount of income each person now gets on the same line as their name, how often the person gets it (such as weekly, every two weeks, twice a month or monthly) and where it comes from, such as Earnings, Welfare, Pensions or Other. Income is all money before taxes or anything else is taken out. If the amount received most recently is higher or lower than usual, write in that person's usual income.

3. SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER: Write the name and social security number of either the parent/guardian who is the primary wage earner or the adult household member who signs the form. Write the word "none" if neither adult household member has a social security number.

4. SIGNATURE: An adult household member must sign the application in Part 4.

Part 4 - SIGNATURE: An application must be signed by an adult household member or the application cannot be approved.

Part 5 - RACIAL/ETHNIC IDENTITY: Put a checkmark () next to the racial/ethnic group of your children. We need this information to be sure everyone gets benefits on a fair basis. You do not have to answer this question to get free or reduced price meals.

The GRANDVIEW-HOPKINS INDEPENDENT School/District takes part in the National School Lunch Program. The National School Lunch Program, meals are served every school day. Children may buy lunch for .35 and breakfast for .15. Meals are also available free or at a reduced price.

• If you have your child's name on the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) for any of your children, those children can get free meals.

• If your total household income is at or below the amounts on the Income Chart, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals for .20 cents for lunch and .15 cents for breakfast.

HOW TO APPLY:

To get free or reduced-price meals for your children, carefully complete the application and return it to the school. If you now get food stamps or AFDC for any children, the application must have the children's names, your food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature of an adult household member. If you do not get a food stamp or AFDC case number for all your children, the application must have the names of everyone in the household, the amount of income each household member now gets, where it comes from and how often it is received, the social security number of either the primary wage earner or the household member who signs the application or the word "none" if the member does not have a social security number and the signature of an adult household member. An application that is not complete cannot be approved.

OTHER INFORMATION:

• **VERIFICATION:** Your eligibility may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year. You may be asked to send information to prove that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

• **FAIR HEARING:** If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. You can do this by calling or writing the following official:

• **REPORTING CHANGES:** If your children get meals based on income information, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals based on AFDC/food stamp information, you must advise the school if you no longer get AFDC or food stamps for your children.

• **CONFIDENTIALITY:** The information you give on the application will be used only to allow your children to get free or reduced-price meals and to verify eligibility.

• **REAPPLICATION:** You may apply for free and reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, such as a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, or become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, fill out an application then.

• **In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.**

You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.
