Teachers Welcome 216 Students To First Day

Tuesday morning brought smiles to many parents and students alike, as the school bell rang for classes to begin. 216 students were greeted by their new principal, Judy Babcock. Mrs. Babcock may have a new title, but is not new to the students or faculty. She has taught at Groom Independent School for 15 years. She has served as an administrative assistant for the past 5 years. She first received her bachelor degree from East Texas State University and her masters from West Texas State University. She will continue to teach Economics and Home Economics and Spanish II as she has done in the past.

The only new faculty member is Charles Burk and that maybe a question of wording. Mr. Burk taught for 13 years at Groom ISD. He retired in 1979, to spend more time farming and ranching and raising show cattle. Burk received his bachelor degree from Texas Tech and his masters from Sul Ross. Groom has been Burk's only teaching assignment since receiving his degree.

DPS Predicts 34 To Die On Highways

The traffic death count for the Labor Day weekend could go as high as 34 persons, the Department of Public Safety has estimated.

"This may scare you, but you need to know that, as many as 34 people could die in traffic accidents in Texas this Labor Day weekend," DPS Director Col. Joe Milner said.

In 1988, 30 persons died in traffic accidents during the 78-hour Labor Day period. Two critically-injured persons died later, for a total of 32 fatalities. This year's Labor Day period also is 78 hours, beginning at 6 p.m. Friday, September 1 and continuing through midnight, Monday, September 4.

"The Department of Public Safety will be doing everything it can to ensure you have a safe holiday, but we need your help," Col. Milner said. "Please, don't drink and drive, stay within

the speed limit, and wear your safety belt."

Last year 21 persons died in DWI or speed-related accidents during the Labor Day period. That amounts to 66 percent of all the deaths. Also last year, of the 23 persons killed as occupants of cars, trucks or buses, 18-or 78 percent-had not been wearing safety belts.

"We believe safety awareness does make a difference," Col. Milner said. "So far, no traffic fatality has been reported anywhere in Texas for June 13. If this holds up, it will be the first time since 1977 we have had a day with no traffic deaths in Texas. Let's make it happen again this Labor Day."

During the Labor Day period, all available DPS Troopers will be patrolling the state's roadways. Periodic reports on the number of traffic fatalities will be issued to remind motorists of the need for safe driving.

Labor Day Weekend Suggests Summer Weather Ending

The Labor Day Weekend is a sure sign of things to come. Among them is the fact that another summer is about to pass. It also represents the last three day weekend before cooler wea-

ther for many Texans, which has both local and state police safety officials concerned.

Elected County Officials Listen To Citizen's Opinions

A public hearing allowing 20 Panhandle residents to comment on Carson County's proposed 1990 budget was held at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, August 28, in the Commissioners' Courtroom at the Court-

house. Prior to the meeting the public was informed by the news that the proposal called for a tax increase to allow salary increases of 8 percent for the judge, 7 percent for the sheriff and five percent for other elected officials except the commissioners who would each be allotted an additional \$100 monthly car allowance.

State law permits the Commissioner's Court to raise taxes without publishing public notices to the effect as long as the effective tax rate is not raised over 1.03 percent. The 1990 proposal was held below that figure.

A question and answer period was held for an hour, at this time a question was voiced from the floor to Commissioner Lockridge and Commissioner Britten concerning their vote during the August 14 meeting. At the August 14 meeting a split vote was recorded concerning the raise increase for county elected officials. Strawn and Smith voted in favor of the raise and Lockridge and Britten were against. Judge Roselius made the deciding vote in favor of the proposal. Lockridge commented that he

was elected to serve his precinct (White Deer) and the people it's made up of and he did not feel they supported the increase. When Britten was asked the same question he stated he agreed with Lockridge.

Following the public hearing Commissioners' Court approved a five percent salary increase for all elected officials, except commissioners which remained the same as first proposed.

The county tax rate was set at .103 above the effective rate of 1989. The figures break down to .2174-General Fund, .0336-Lateral Road Fund, .0507-Special Road Fund and a total of .3017.

The court was notified that the amount to purchase without a bid has been changed from \$5,000 to \$15,000.00. The purchase must be of public record.

Approval was voiced con-

cerning the installation of a communication line for Precinct 4, east of White Deer. A used belly dump trailer was approved for purchase for Precinct 1.

A discussion was held concerning the sharing of equipment between precincts.

Commissioner Smith reported the completion of four miles of road rebuilding in Precinct 2, with the addition of a waterway to drain the road rightaway.

Judge Roselius informed the Court that the water district did not want to inspect the private sewer disposals in rural areas. The inspection will have to revert back to the state, which could result in higher inspection rates for residents.

The court will select two members to serve on the appraisal board at their September 11 meeting.

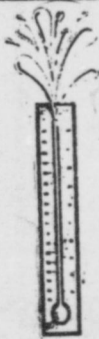

Steele said working with only elementary aged children is easy for him, since they are roughly the same age as his grandchildren.

"We have a family of five and all of them are educators, he said. Not all of them are necessarily teaching right now but they have degrees in education. I hear and see what they need in their own kids and I can remember what we needed from our kids."

"We had a faculty meeting and what I told my teachers is that we have a lot of responsibility in the guidelines of these kids. The parents are working or busy. We know the teacher has them a lot more over nine months than the parents do.



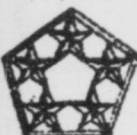

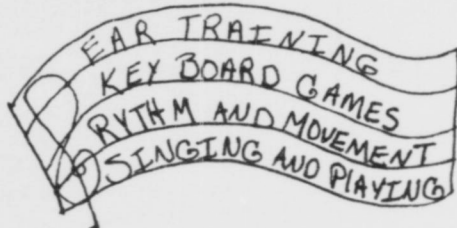

Worldwide study on heart attack victims indicates that the combination of streptokinase, given immediately after the attack, and aspirin, taken daily for a month, substantially reduces heart attack deaths.

Waxed dental floss is just as effective as unwaxed, according to a study reported in the American Journal of Dentistry. Most important, the dentists say, is that you floss at all.

Cocaine use may cause irreversible brain damage, say researchers at the National Institute of Mental Health.

Ultrasound treatment for glaucoma has been approved by the FDA. Painless procedure creates small pores in the eye to release fluid and also reduces its production.

Mothers who smoke are likely to aggravate the lung condition of their asthmatic children, say researchers at Children's Hospital in British Columbia, Canada. Their finding: the more the mothers smoked, the worse the children's asthma.

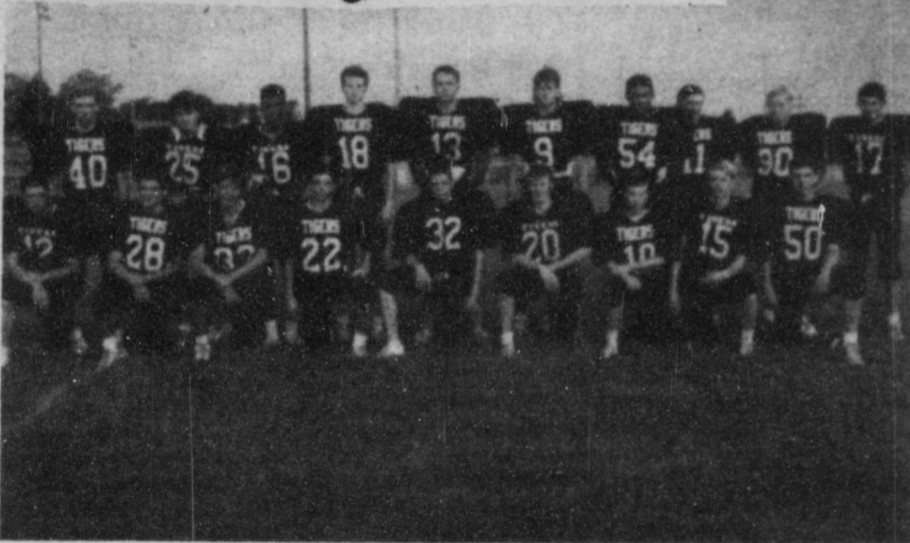

July 4 and flew to Helsinki, Finland and then to Warsaw, Poland, where they stayed for three days. Next they took a train across the Russian Border to Kiev, the Ukraine and Moscow.

The highlight of Haynes trip was a tour of the Young Pioneers Camp and a summer camp for children of Communist Party leaders. They wore uniforms with red scarves around their necks.

The American students brought bubble gum and little Texas pins as gifts to the children. The children there began giving things to the Americans, knowing they were quite valuable to them. One little girl tried to give me all her little silver rings, I wouldn't take them and she began to cry, so I took one which I wear now.

We were amazed by the fact they knew the concept of peace between the nations and they were only 8 to 9 years old.

While in Warsaw, the American tourist were able to see President George Bush speech to the Poles. They also got to meet Dan Rather.

We boarded a train for Russia from Warsaw in the evening, it was dark as we crossed the Soviet border. It was cold and misty, the train stopped and we had to get out then we noticed the barbed wire fence with the combed sand. It was combed so fine you couldn't see any footprints in it. There was also a pit underneath the

track. There was a Soviet soldier standing in the pit with a machine gun on his hip, he looked to see if anyone was riding underneath the train.

In Moscow the group was allowed some freedom. They could ride on public transportation at no charge. But again we were reminded where we were. We were standing around taking pictures and laughing and a soldier came and took the film out of the camera. He was polite, but you know how it is.

The Americans especially had to be tricky to go to

church, we ask to see Vladimir's Cathedral, once there we got lost for a hour and half. It was Russian Orthodox, so we couldn't understand it.

It was a real eye opener for me, she said, "For us, we're so used to openly letting people know we're Christians, for these people, they risk their prosperity to go to church."

In Warsaw the group came face to face with anti-Semitism. There was a group of Jewish kids touring concentration camps in Poland. The Polish wouldn't allow their parents to come

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to the country," she said. "They really hate Jews in Poland".

Russian food and American food are also world's apart, sliced cucumbers and fatty piece of meat and hard rolls. Their drink was water with a prune pit soaked in it.

Despite the contrasts Haynes witnessed during her visit, she wants to return someday. "I definitely want to go back, I don't know why but I just want to go back to see the changes, I want to see what happens," said Haynes.

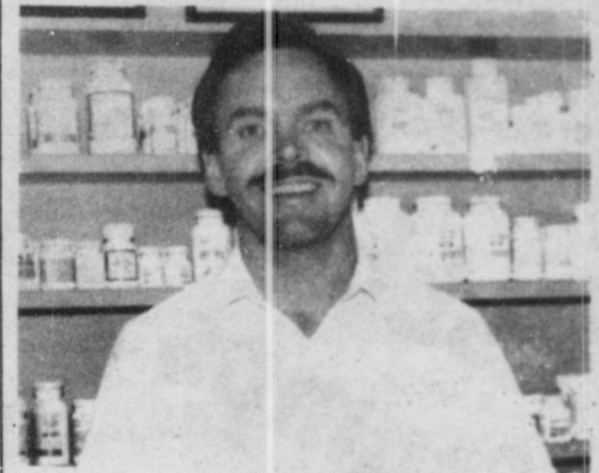
