poured out Saturday to launch the opening of the Devil's Rope Museum and the Texas Old Route 66 Display.

Literally hundreds of hours have been spent by Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Trew and other volunteers to turn an old vacant building into a thriving center for the community.

Onie Sims, formerly of Mobeetie and currently a Whittier, Calif. resident, said, "All of us barbed wire collectors are looking for a place to put our own collections for people to seem them. This is a good place."

Edwin Sims, of Richardson, said, "I've seen a lot of collections, but this is something else."

Ed and Sonja Ditmer, a Duarte, Calif. couple, attended the grand opening as one stop on an Old Route 66 bus tour that began in Chicago March 16 and ends in Santa Monica, Calif. March 29.

Enthusiasts of the legendary highway which runs through their hometown, they gave the exhibit a thumbs-up approval, describing it as "outstanding."

"So many people are interested in Route 66, it's a part of their lives," said Ed Ditmer, who first traveled the highway in 1955.

A 1-1/2 year effort to establish a national barbed wire museum and to provide exhibit space for the Texas Old Route 66 Association culminated Saturday afternoon with ribbon-cutting ceremonies. The complex was established entirely with donated labor and money.

He commended the Trews by naming them "Honorary Citizens of McLean," and congratulated community members and everyone else associated with the establishment of the museum complex.

The museum features "the largest collection of fencing tools and rare barbed wire tools anywhere," the history of the XIT, JA, RO and Frying Pan Ranches, collections of barbed wire, and a historical display of Old Route 66 memorabilia.It also includes a mercantile gift shop offering for sale a wide variety of souvenirs including T-shirts, caps and small assortments of barbed wire; McLean's Lone Star Theater showing a video tape of interviews conducted along Route 66; a reference and research facility; childcare area, and a large community room for special events.

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McLean Troopers Stop Cocaine Hauling Vehicle, Three Indicted

Gray County grand jury handed down a total of 16 indictments and one no bill last Monday.

The most recent Interstate 40 arrests involved an estimated 11.5 pounds of cocaine carried in luggage in the trunk of a rental car on March 10. Three California occupants of the vehicle, stopped about two miles west of McLean for speeding, were arrested and each indicted Monday on charges of aggravated possession of a controlled substance-cocaine.

District Attorney Harold Comer said today that DPS Troopers Ron Shank and John Holland became suspicious of the three occupants because of "their demeanor and attitude," and the occupants of the 1991 Buick gave a consent to search. The trio was reported traveling from Los Angeles to Gary, Ind.

Indicted for the felony drug offense were Luis Garcia Cazares, 29; Jorge. Amador Rodriquez Montoya, 26, and Connie Lynn Stafko, 27, all of California. Stafko has been released on bond. Bond for Cazares and Montoya was set at \$100,000 each. They both remained in Gray County Jail this morning in lieu of bond.

Minimum punishment for conviction of the cocaine offense is 15 years in state prison. Maximum punishment is life in prison and a \$50,000 fine.

In an unrelated arrest on Feb. 16 on Interstate 40, william A. Data Jr., 30, of Dwight, Ill., was indicted for aggravated possession of marijuana, a first-degree

felony, punishable by a maximum life in prison with an increased maximum fine of \$50,000.

Data was reportedly driving a rental vehicle about five miles west of Alanreed when he was stopped by Trooper Ron Shank for speeding and failure to wear a seat belt.

After a consent to search the vehicle was given, the rooper recovered 99.68 pounds of marijuana in suit cases in the trunk of the vehicle. Data has been released on \$25,000 bond.

The third arrest by DPS roopers which resulted in wo indictments against a ransient was on Feb. 6. Marion Allen Douglas, 40, address unknown, was raveling on Interstate 40 when a trooper attempted to stop the westbound vehicle after he noticed defective headlamps.

Douglas refused to stop, made hand gestures at the rooper and led officials on a 28-mile chase. Numerous drivers on the interstate attempted to aid the officials in blocking Douglas and getting him to stop.

After an RV, a semi ractor-trailer and two DPS vehicles pinned Douglas' vehicle and forced him to stop, Douglas reportedly sttempted to fight with troopers and tried to get a un from one trooper, Comer said.

Douglas was indicted on two third-degree felonies of

peace officer and attempting to take a weapon from a peace officer. He remained in Gray County Jail this morning on the charges.

Thunder Junction Expects To Draw 190,000 Visitors Per Year

Thunder Junction, the Western heritage park Yesterday's planned by Children, can be profitable in its new location near Clarendon, according to Don Stewart, recreational consultant who conducted the original feasibility study for the group.

Although the size of the park will be smaller initially, is expected to draw 190,000 visitors and realize a profit of \$1.37 million the first year of operation, said Stewart, principal with Economic Consulting Services of Santa Monica, California, in his report to Yesterday's Children, which was released today.

Attendance projections were based on population totals of the surrounding 120-mile area, traffic counts on nearby highways 287, 70 and Interstate 40, and the number of annual visitors to Greenbelt Lake. Conservative estimates of the "capture rate" of each segment, based on the experience of similar facilities in other parts of the country, went into the projections, said Pat Kaiser, Yesterday's Children

president

Thunder Junction, which will benefit senior citizen services throughout the Panhandle, is expected to cost only \$8.5 million to build rather than the \$15.4 million originally estimated when a larger attraction was planned in Amarillo, said Kaiser. "And we hope to be able to build it for less than that!"

Stewart, who as worked on such large projects as disney world in Florida, Circus Circus in Las Vegas and worlds of fun in Kansas City, looked at several possible sites for the park January 29-30, when visited Clarendon. He identified two near Greenbelt Lake with frontage on Highway 70 as having the highest potential for attracting visitors.

Arthur E. Vaughan, project architect, will travel to California April, where he and Don Stewart will visit with officials and look at the design and infrastructure of several parks in that area, including Disneyland and Knott's Berry Farm.

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

PLEXAR-Custom is a central office-based service which provides switched voice and/or data communications similar to a customer-premises PBX. PLEXAR-Custom service is currently being provided on an individual customer-specific basis via Southwestern Bell's Customer Specific Pricing Plan Tariff for central office-based telecommunications systems of 200 stations or more. If Southwestern Bell's application is approved, the PLEXAR-Custom service tariff will be revised to also include central office-based telecommunications systems which require between 75 and 200 stations.

Centrex and Plexar-II services are currently priced according to a standard tariff regardless of the customer's geographic location in the state. If this application is approved, customers needing 75 to 200 stations will be able to obtain this service priced on an individual customerspecific basis rather than under a standard tariffed rate.

McLean Pre 1951 School Teachers Continued

Sue Cubine-Mrs. Cubine taught 4th grade in 1928-29 and 1929-30. Her salary was \$90.00 per month. She was single at the time and paid \$20.00 a month for room and board. She and some of the other teachers walked to work. Possibly this is why one frequent expense she remembers was getting new taps put on the heels of her shoes.

Mrs. Cubine recalls a number of a nusing things in conjunction with her teaching. A stipulation in her contract was that she would refrain from dancing although at that time she notes this was indeed cause for no little concern.

Remembering how much she loved her pupils, Mrs. Cubine says that as 4th graders they were still young enough to also love their teacher. One little boy wrote her a letter saying "You learned me more than any other teacher."Those were when the Great Depression was beginning. and times were becoming hard. A note she has saved from the father of one pupil attests to the conditions that prevailed. This little boy says you insist that he write on

only one side of the pa Per. You notice that it is ruled for use on both sides."

In those days, Mrs. Cubine remembers it was often said that teaching school was for young ladies just a stepping stone to matrimony. For her, she notes this did not prove the case She was married o N May 24, 1930, the day after school dismissed for the summer. She did not return to teaching thereafter, but the two years she did teach provided her many fond memories.

Isabel Cousins-Mrs. Cousins had two stints of teaching school in McLean. The first was 1929 to 1934, when she taught the second grade. The next was 1944 to 1946 when she taught the third and fourth grades. She was barely twenty years old when she began teaching On opening day here assembly at the high school an occasion memorable concern. All students and all teachers in all grades were there. Mrs. Cousins recalls as well as most of the student's parents or so it seemed. The first thing that

happened at the assembly was that the superintendent, a Mr. Tummins, called on her to lead in prayer. This was something she had never done in public, and Mrs. Cousins was stunned. A nudge from a fellow teacher, Frances Noel (now Kennedy), however prompted her to begin, although Mrs. Cousins thinks that she probably had no idea what she was saying.

Mrs. Cousins felt that her pupils were the dearest children she had ever seen. As a result, when the first report cards came out almost all students received straight A's with the remainder being awarded B+'s. Such precious children, she felt, deserved no less. The next day, though, she came to conclude that the principal did not entirely share this feeling and the number of pupils receiving such high marks was accordingly thereafter considerable less, this in spite of the regret Mrs. Cousins experienced as a consequence.

of the Like others McLean teachers who taught during depression years, Mrs. Cousins was sometimes paid in vouchers which she recalls would be cashed by merchants at a discount so teachers would have money enough to live. And also like other of the local depression era teachers, Mrs. Cousins (nee Isabel Baker) was required to resign when she married (in 1934), because one could not continue to teach if her or his spouse was gainfully employed. S. D. Cousins was...at \$50.00 a month!

This requirement had been dropped when Mrs. Cousins taught again from 1944-46, while Mr. Cousins was in the armed forces in World War II. After his return she did not again teach regularly, but occasionally served as a substitute.

Our community owes a great deal to it, early teachers, just as it does to those who taught later, and one teaching now. Numerous adults now residing in McLean were taught to read and write, or were provided other basic skills or knowledge by the teachers who were recognized at the high school assembly. Texas Public Schools Week was a fitting time to again say thanks to its early educators. The articles are reflections relating to the teaching careers of the educators honored at the assembly.

YOUR SCHOOL

Rex Peeples I'm sure that you are aware of my resignation as your superintendent as of June 30. It was not done without apprehension and sadness, for we have made so many friends that we must now leave. The school system, our church, and the community have treated us very graciously.

Over the past two years

we have made forward strides toward excellence in our school, and I'm positive that this momentum will continue. Two major areas that I feel must be paramount: (1) Technology-we have done exceptionally well in this area but we must continue to adapt to new innovations in the future; (2) Parental Involvement--We haven't done as well as I would have liked in this area. 

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ranchers, and timber growers with a way to lower their property taxes, known as productivity appraisal.

If you qualify, your agricultural land will be taxed on its capacity to produce crops, livestock, or timber, instead of its value on the real estate market. Productivity appraisal can lower the taxable value you to. If an annual application is of your land, and lower your required, the appraisal district will property taxes as a result.

If your land has never received apply to the appraisal district no cation forms, contact the appraisal district office at the address shown later than Tuesday, April 30, to get below:

Texas law provides farmers and tax benefits for 1991. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district

> If your land already receives agricultural or timber appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires notify you by mail.
