

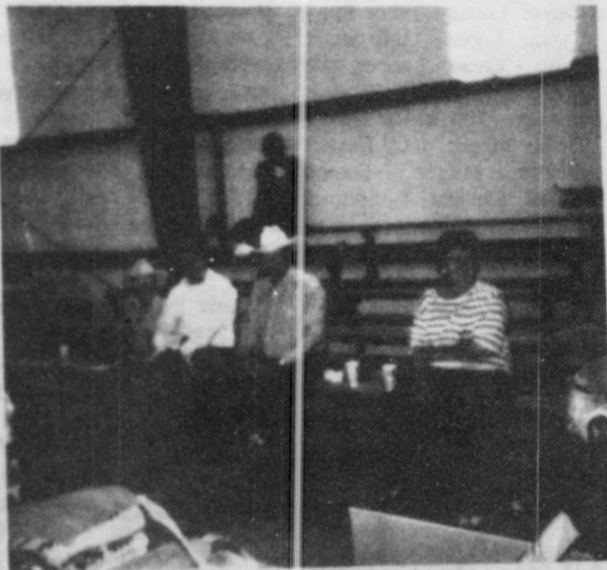

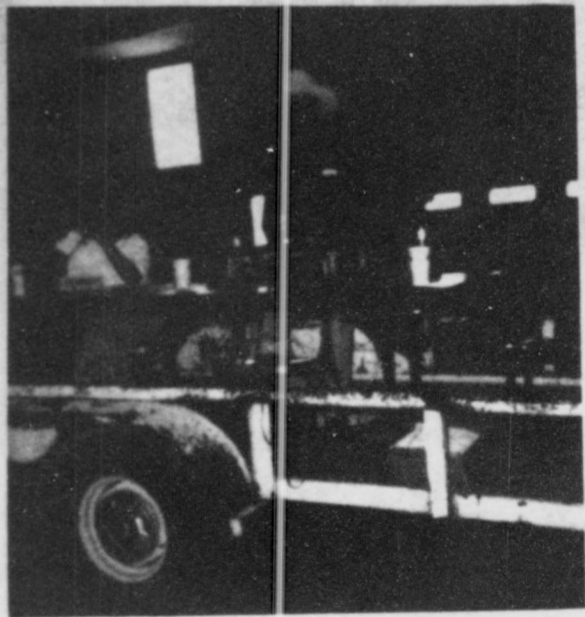

McLean Voters Have Choice In Saturday's City, School Election

The School and City election will be held at the Lovett Memorial Library. This is the first time the election has been held in the same place, so be sure and come out and vote from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Sam Haynes, Mayor, is running uncontested. Mr. Haynes said "I hope to continue to make McLean a better place to live and as attractive as possible to potential citizens as well as to attract tourism to our city".

Running for office of Alderman are Joe Billingsley, Ann Pierce and Jessie Nell Allen.

Joe Billingsley has two years experience on the City Council. He knows the people and realizes their needs for a better community. There are projects we have started that he would like to see fulfilled. Joe would appreciate your vote on May 4th.

Jessie Nell Allen, also running for City Council, is a new comer and feels that promotion of McLean should be the top priority.

Ann Pierce, running for City Council, is currently working at the Bank of Commerce. If elected she hopes to help keep down the rising costs, such as utilities, etc, promote

McLean whenever and wherever possible. Ann would appreciate your vote.

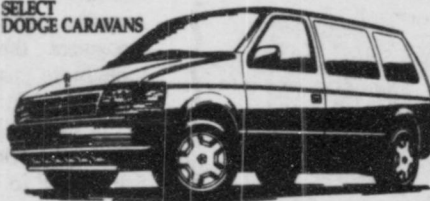

In 1958, Hugh O'Brian was inspired by Dr. Albert Schweitzer to establish the Youth Foundation believing that America's most valuable resource is its youth and the most important thing in education is to make young people think for themselves. Today there are over 84 seminars in 11 countries to recognize the outstanding sophomore students and to bring them together with community and business leaders to discuss present and future issues, using an informal question and answer format. Media, agriculture, medicine, entrepreneurship, volunteerism and politics are examples of the areas in which students will face a panel of professionals in their respective fields and have the chance to share one-on-one critical and current issues, insights to their professions, and ideas often not learned from a book.

The outstanding sophomore student from Groom High School is Amy Brown. Helping with the seminar from Groom is Heather Patterson serving as junior counselor.

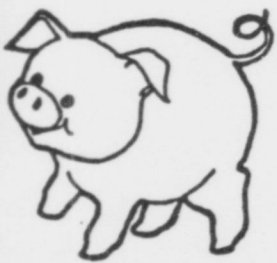

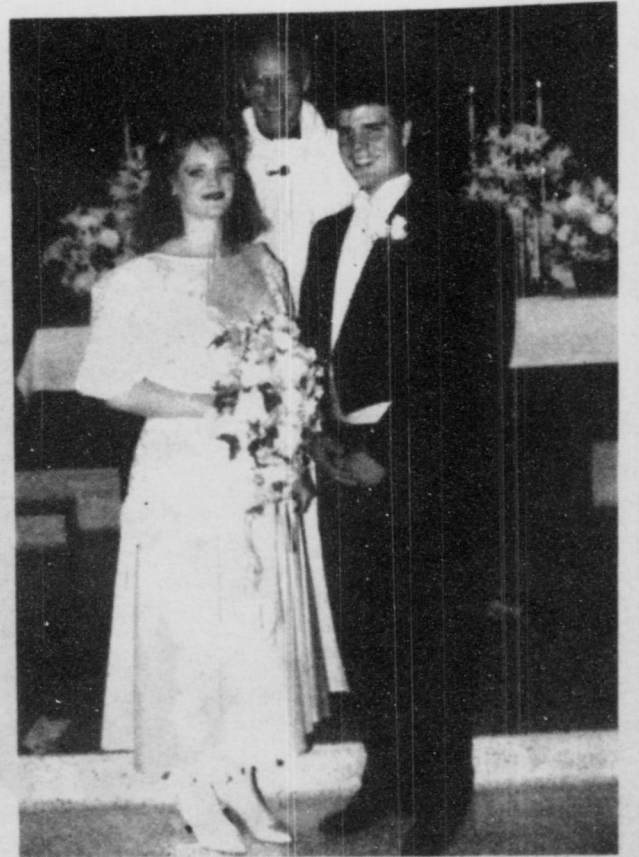
