

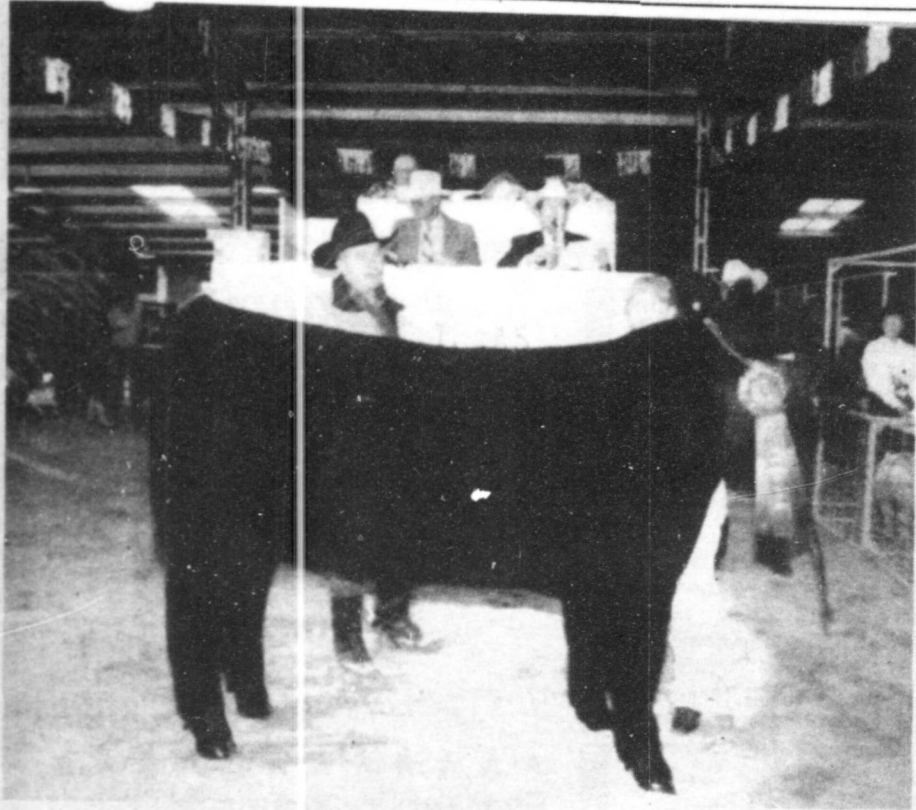

School Board Rejects All Bids

Groom School Board met in regular session last week with one member, Gary Friemel, absent.

The board opened sealed bids concerning a 1975 Dodge Van. Those bids were: Joe Balderas \$210.00, R&E Buses \$159.97; Elroys Misc. Sales \$289.00; and Jay Paul \$800.00. The board voted to reject all bids.

Bids were opened on the '74 - 48 passenger bus. Those bids were: Joe Balderas \$260.00; R&E Buses \$189.97; and Elroys Misc. Sales \$289.00. All bids were rejected.

The board instead adopted a resolution to swap buses with the Alanreed School District.

Groom will purchase Alanreed's 1987 - 24 passenger Chevrolet for the sum of \$7,900.00 while Alanreed will buy the 1975 Dodge Van from Groom ISD for \$900.00.

Joyce Hutsell was offered employment for 93-94 at step 9. (Ken Burger abstained for nepotism laws).

A request for waiver of two student days to implement two teacher in service days was approved. The days would be used regarding technology and site based management.

The request will be forwarded to the Texas Education Agency.

The board also discussed the school financial legislative bills now being talked about in Austin. No action was taken.

They approved the paying of the bills and adjourned with no further business.

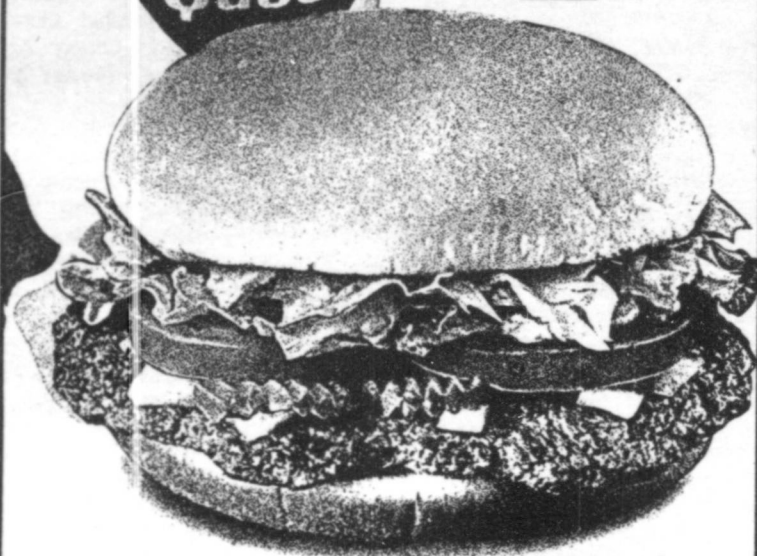

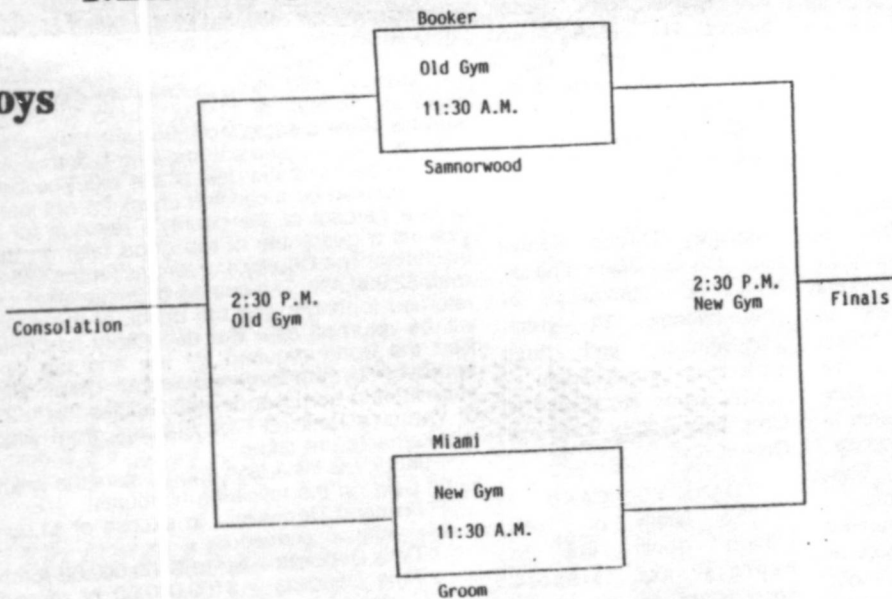

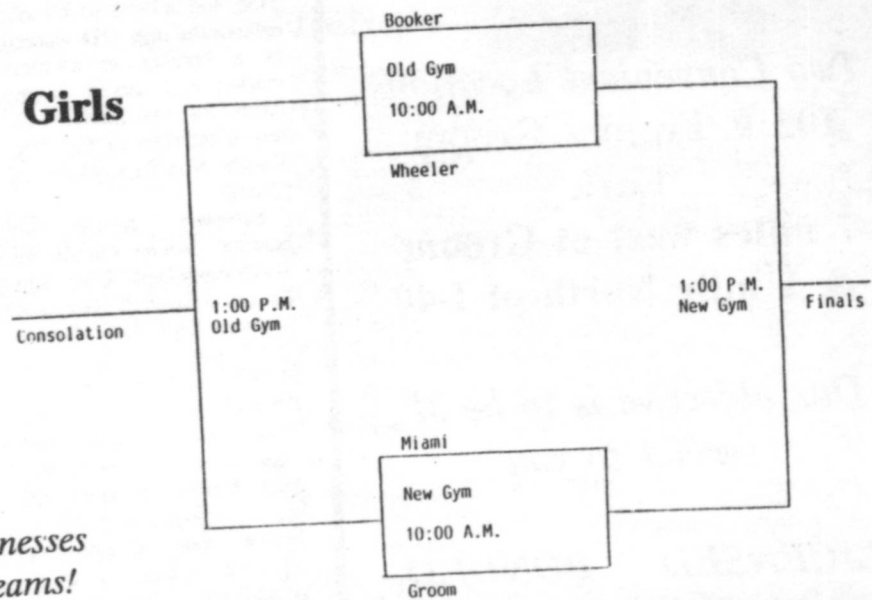

SHERIFF'S REPORT

This past week we have had persons booked into the Carson County Jail for the following charges: (1) DPS Warrants, (1) Traffic

Charges, (1) Possession of Stolen Property, (4) DWI, (1) Indecency w/Child, and (1) Possession of Marijuana.

We have had a number of residential burglaries on the west end of the county near the Potter County line. These burglaries have taken place during the daylight hours, while the residents are at work and have all involved forced entry. Items taken during these burglaries include cash and jewelry as well as stereo equipment and VCR's. We are currently following up on leads which highlighted at least two suspects.

Thursday evening, Trooper Joe Longway of the Texas Highway Patrol, located and jailed a suspect who was found in possession of a stolen motor vehicle from Oklahoma. This suspect was booked into the Carson County Jail awaiting extradition to Oklahoma.

The following day we were notified by Oklahoma that they would not pick the suspect up and only wanted us to hold the car for the owner to pick up. Our options at this time were to release an alleged car thief in Carson County or to prosecute the suspect in Texas for being in possession of stolen property. Trooper Longway, District Attorney David McCoy and I registered complaints with authorities in Oklahoma and

with the National Crime Information Center in Washington, D.C. regarding the actions of Oklahoma authorities. It is our intention to prosecute the suspect in Carson County and to demand that he make restitution to Carson County for the costs and expenses incurred during prosecution. We do not feel that the taxpayers of Carson County should have to be responsible for the questionable law enforcement practices of an Oklahoma jurisdiction.

Our department is continuing to upgrade training and capabilities of the 9-1-1 Emergency System with the assistance of the Panhandle Planning Commission. In addition to our TDD system, which allows us to communicate with hearing disabled persons, we also have a translation system which allows our dispatchers to access translators to assist us in communications with callers of any language.

Ollinger Resigns As President Of Grandview ISD

The School Board of the Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D. held a regular meeting in the cafeteria of the school at 7:00 PM on Tuesday, 1/12/93. Vice President Troy Ritter called the meeting to order at approximately 7:15 PM.

At the request of the board, Mrs. Margie Gray, Gray County Tax Assessor-Collector, presented information on current tax collection procedures. Mrs. Gray's office collects taxes for the Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D., and her office will continue in that capacity for the present.

Also on the agenda was the opening of bids for a new nineteen passenger school bus. The board rejected the only bid received, and directed the superintendent to re-bid the bus. In other financial business, the board approved payment of all bills presented and approved

a single budget amendment.

The superintendent gave reports on tax collection, performance of the Lone Star Investment Pool, and the recent Transportation Monitoring visit by the TEA, and completion of the installation of a new water tank for the school.

Acting on a request from a resident of the school district, the board voted to approve access to the district's natural gas line. The resident must notify the school when he plans to have the connection made, complete the tie on at no expense to the school district, and agree that all repairs to the line will be shared on a pro rata basis according to volume of gas used.

In other business, the board accepted the resignation of member and board President Kelvin Ollinger. Mr. Ollinger is no

ELIGIBLE FOR DRAFT

Young men who will turn 26 in 1993 will be reaching an important milestone according to the Selective Service System.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 1993, men who were born in 1967 and were required to register with Selective Service in 1985, will be turning 26 and will no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstated.

Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service officials warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain programs such as federal student aid, job training and most federal employment, in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon. Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state-supported colleges and universities, state employment and permission to practice law.

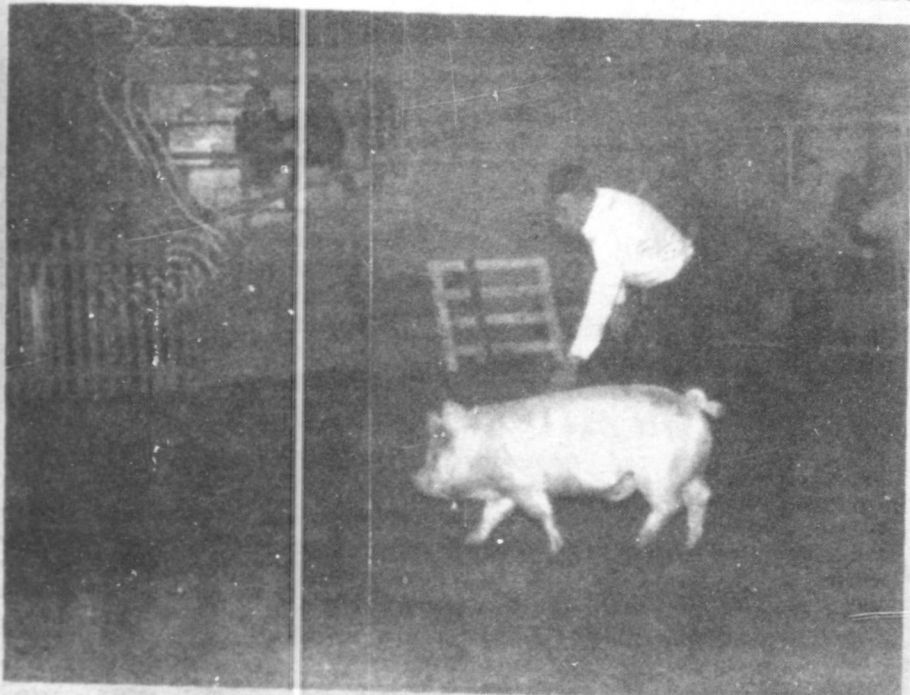

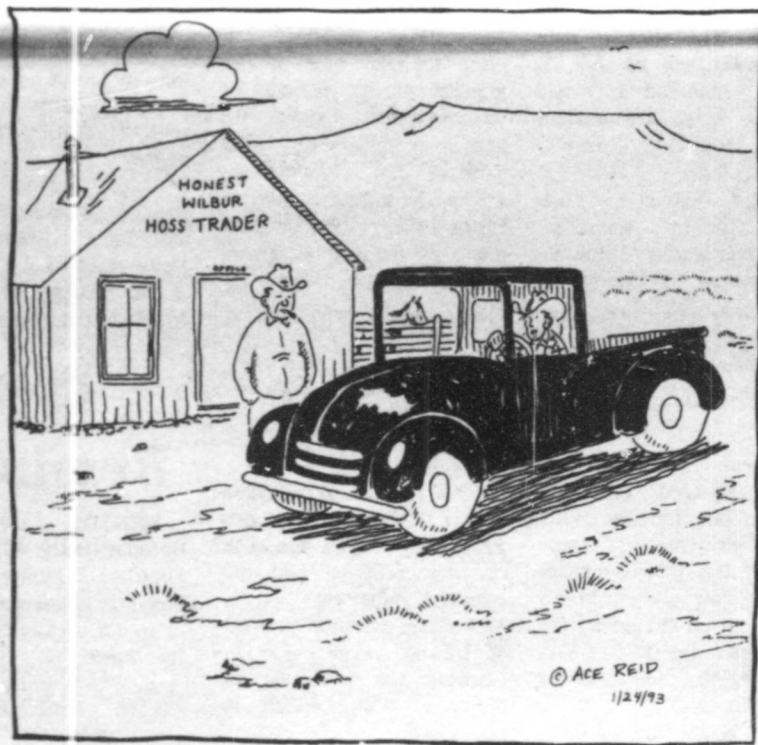

C.A.R.S. Unlimited To Add Route 66 And Transportation Museum To Complex

In 1988, C.A.R.S. Unlimited Car Club began the effort to add a Route 66 and transportation museum to the Old Town Museum Complex in Elk City. The proposal included a gas station, cabin-style motel rooms, a diner, an art gallery, and a library. There was an over-whelming response from parties wishing to donate or display vehicles and memorabilia.

Unfortunately, the poor economic climate put the project on hold.

Through the years, interest has remained high. Recently, grant money for just such a project has become available. 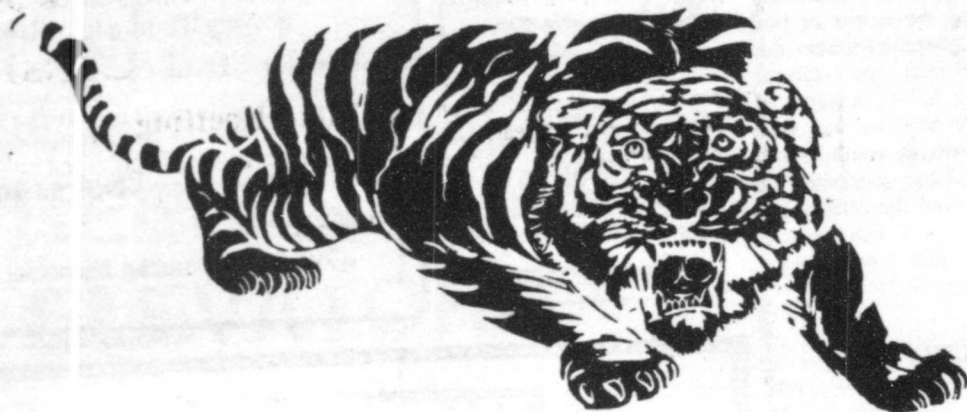

Prison Litigation Ends

Financially, it had become a bottomless pit for Texas state government. A bottomless pit of litigation costs. A bottomless pit of expensive conveniences and accommodations for the benefit of criminals.

With the settlement of the Ruiz prison lawsuit, we have finally sealed this pit. Texas taxpayers should feel relief, if not joy, that it is over.

More than 20 years of litigation and negotiations ended on December 11 when U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice accepted and signed the settlement negotiated by the Office of Attorney General and lawyers for Texas prison inmates.

What did the original lawsuit and the ensuing two decades of litigation accomplish? A good deal for Texas prison inmates. And, what did the settlement accomplish? A good deal for the citizens of Texas and a more responsive criminal justice system.

There is no question that 20 years ago Texas was

operating an unconstitutional prison system. The prisons were overcrowded. Certain inmates were asked to maintain order in their cellblocks, which invited brutality and other abuses.

There was no segregation of violent inmates from non-violent inmates, and career criminals from first-timers. Medical, recreational and educational facilities and programs were lacking.

The need for reform was obvious.

State leaders responded to those needs. Changes were made and the state began operating a constitutional prison system.

By signing the settlement, Judge Justice has acknowledged that the state's prisons now meet constitutional standards. Texas prisons are free from control of federal courts. State officials can finally run our prisons as they see fit, with the only limitation being the U.S. Constitution's prohibition against: cruel and unusual punishment.

We have every intention of continuing to meet that constitutional standard.

However, we cannot comply with constitutional requirements without also paying additional millions of dollars in legal fees to lawyers for the convicts. Restrictive limits on prison population have been lifted, allowing more inmates into existing and future facilities, and eliminating the necessity of some construction costs. Alternative housing, such as tents, may now be used in special circumstances. Other restrictions and requirements have been lifted or modified, especially in regard to staffing, which may allow savings of more than \$100 million.

Just as important as reducing the financial cost to taxpayers, is the opportunity this settlement provides to shift our focus and resources to the larger public issue - one of public safety.

The Ruiz lawsuit forced Texas leaders to spend enormous amounts of time and money to ensure the welfare of convicted criminals. Now we can begin to shift more resources toward the welfare of law-abiding citizens and victims of crimes. We must focus on improving conditions outside of prisons, not in them. Prisons are a poor investment for taxpayers.

What makes the most sense, and what we must do, is to invest in our children. The \$20,000 a year that we spend to incarcerate a hardened felon could send an underprivileged youngster to one of the finest universities in the land. That money could help an at-risk child learn the skills to become a doctor, engineer or scientist.

We cannot afford to continue losing our children to crime. Criminals represent the errors of our past. Children represent the promise of the future. Investing in our children is the only way we will slow the growth in youth crime, the rocketing recidivism of inmates, and the consequent burden on overcrowded county jails and state prisons.

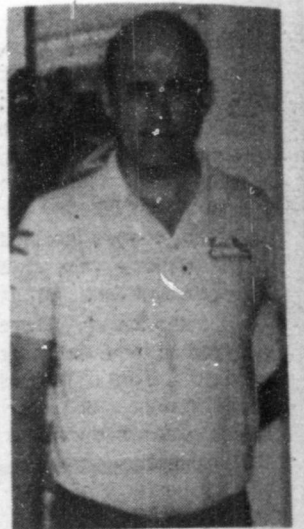
The final was 27-Groom, 23-Highland Park. The girls won the third place title.
