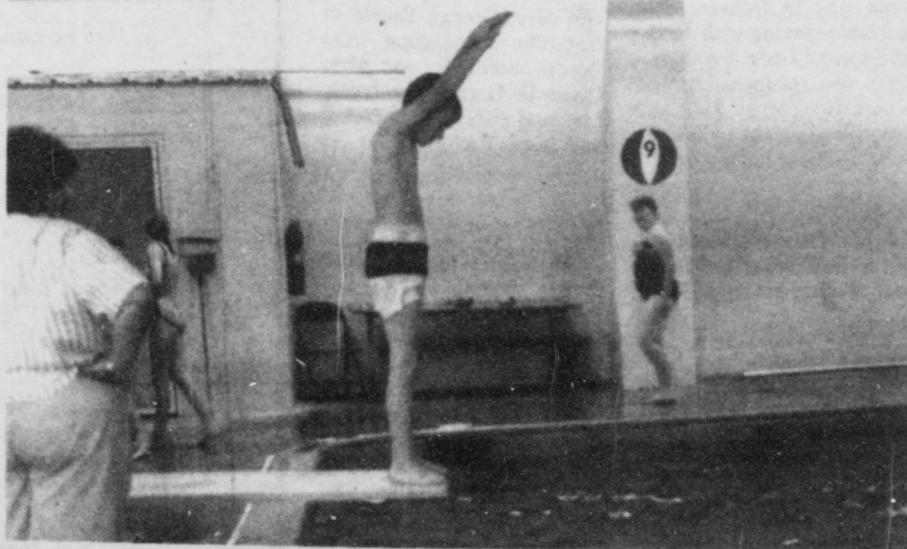

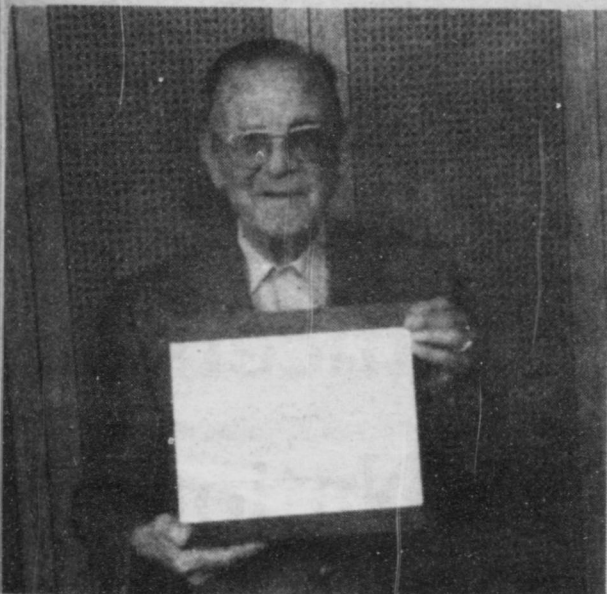

## Culver Recipient Of 50-Year Award

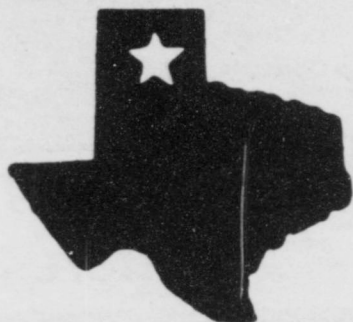

## Top O' Texas Kennel Club

Top O' Texas Kennel Club was first organized in June 1987. Sandy Burns, animal control officer and Mona Wheat, groomer and kennel breeder, saw a need in Pampa and set out to fill that need.

The main goal of the club is to educate the public about responsible pet ownership. Cynthia McDowell, a McLean pet breeder and treasurer of the club, says the club's purpose is also to promote quality dogs, not one to "love when it's a puppy, and hate when it's a dog."

Top O' Texas Kennel Club's operation is based on the rigorous standards set by the American Kennel Club (AKC). Membership in the club is \$25.00 per year for a family or \$15.00 per individual. Meetings are scheduled for the second Monday of the month in the Nona Payne Room at the

Pampa Community Building. Guest speakers and demonstrations on all phases of pet maintenance are included.

Club officers are San Talley, president; Vickie Nite, vice-president; Laura Wesese, secretary; and Cindy McDowell, treasurer.

In serving the community, the club sponsors obedience classes taught by Frankie Wallis, owner of a boarding kennel. Nite is the obedience class teacher for 4-H students.

Another public service provided by the club is a dog dip in the summer for pet owners. This year's project is scheduled for June 3 in Central Park. For a fee of \$5.00, regardless of size, dogs can be dipped for protection against fleas and ticks.

Fun matches are held twice a year. A fun match is operated just like a profes-

sional all-breed show to prepare pet owners for competition in obedience and confirmation classes.

AKC sets high standards for each breed of dog based on many traits, including temperament, height, weight, coat texture, gait, expression, size of ears, animation and skeletal values.

Each breed of dog has its own history dating back to sometimes centuries worth of breeding. Each pet owner can proudly relate the heritage of his or her own pet.

Breeds of dogs represented in the club are varied. AKC recognizes 138 different breed of dogs. Among the most unusual to this area are Pembroke Welsh Corgis, Bichon Frises, West Highland White Terrier (Westie), and Bull Mastiffs.

McDowell raises Pembroke Welsh Corgis. Corgis have their origin in Pembroke, Wales. These dogs are descended from ones introduced to Wales

when Henry I brought Flemish weavers to the royal looms.

For the first three weeks of obedience training, owners and dogs learn "heel on lead with automatic sit."

Next comes "sit and stay" and "down stay" then "recall" and "stand for examination." The last two weeks of class is devoted to concentrated practice in preparation for graduation.

Top O' Texas Kennel Club now has about 22 members with about 30 different breeds represented. Anyone wishing more information about the club or these animals may contact any member.
