## Ambulance Receives \$5,681 Grant To Purchase Medical Equipment

The Groom Ambulance Department has received another grant. The Texas Department of Health has approved a \$5,681.00 grant to be used for the purchase of equipment for the new ambulance. While specifics and/or limitations of the grant are not yet known, the department is hoping to purchase a defibrillator, radios and a gurney. They are in hopes that some of these items can be

purchased with the grant money.

A long awaited goal has been achieved by the Groom Ambulance Service with the purchase of a 1996 Type 7 Moduvan ambulance from Wheeled Coach of Dallas.

The re-occurring mechanical problems with the 1985 Ford Type III Ambulance, caused the volunteer service to seek funding to purchase a new

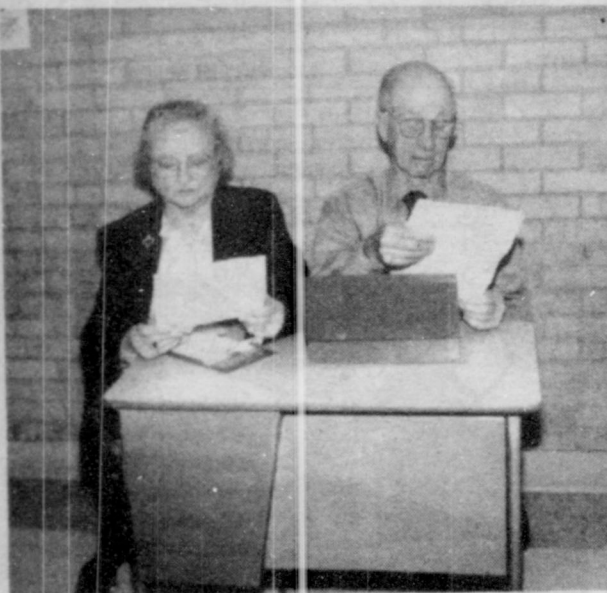
ambulance.

Groom Ambulance Service volunteers set out to raise matching funds to obtain a grant from the Meadows Foundation. Their goal of \$25,000 was a graspable reality with \$8,736 raised at a barbecue dinner prepared and served by volunteers and supporters. The City of Groom donated \$10,000.00 to encourage and show their support.

Raffle tickets for a beef were sold to net their total income of \$33,178.12. Two grant requests were then filed to help finance the remaining \$21,725.00 for a new ambulance.

The Meadows Foundation notified the Groom Ambulance Service of their grant approval in the amount of \$21,725.00 for a new ambulance on September 22, 1995.

The Groom Marching Band attended the Regional meet at Lubbock last week.

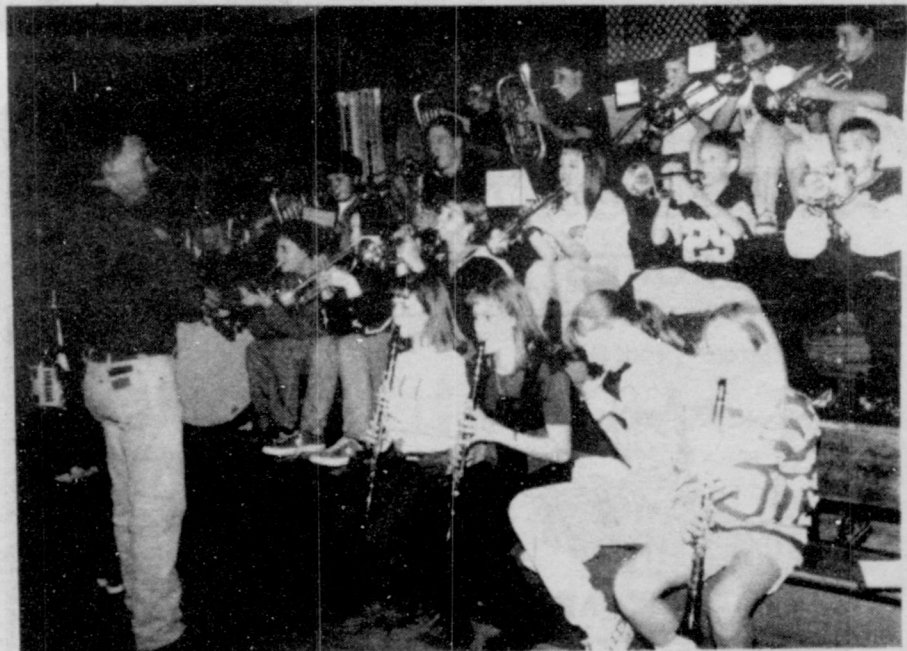
They competed against bands from Marfa, Whiteface, Jayton, Sudan, Plains, Sanderson, Rankin, Wink and Wheeler.

## Carson County Cemeteries Researched By Commission

The Carson County Historical Commission is continuing its research on cemeteries in Carson County.

In 1995, several county cemeteries have been surveyed or updated. The Panhandle Cemetery and the Sacred Heart Cemetery in White Deer have been updated. A survey of the White Deer Cemetery was received by the Carson County Historical Commission from an interested individual. The two cemeteries in Groom are being surveyed. A survey of the Liberty Cemetery was made in 1992. These are the only known cemeteries in Carson County.

Although the surveys are being made, a great deal of history can be found in

cemeteries. The historical commission would welcome any information, family history or interesting stories concerning the county cemeteries.

Cemeteries give a directory of early residents and show varying family patterns. They reveal information about historic events, religions, life styles, epidemics and genealogy.

Cemeteries are protected under Texas Law (Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, Title 26 - Article 912a-10 and 912a-11) which states that property dedicated as a cemetery cannot be disturbed unless the District Court for the area has formally removed its purpose of dedication. An enclosed tract and evidence of burials are two criteria

that constitute dedication of land for a cemetery. Intentional desecration of a burial site is punished as a Class A Misdemeanor, to be administered by local law officials, city or county.

The cemeteries of Carson County are well maintained by local associations. Some work has been done on older stones which have been damaged by age and weather. Some vandalism has occurred in the past.

Kay Case, a Senior at Groom High School, was recently selected by a faculty committee for the DAR (Daughters of the American Revolution) Good Citizen Award.

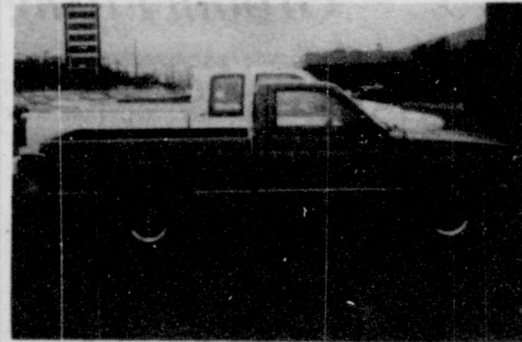
To be eligible for this award, students, male or female, must be in the Senior class and must exhibit good citizenship.

Marvin Murl Morrow, 72, died Friday, October 27, 1995.

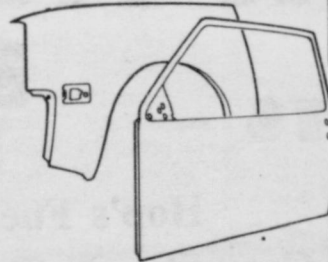

### County Sheriff's Report

The Carson County Jail is currently holding eight prisoners.

Our department took custody of a man wanted in Carson County for Credit Card Fraud after he waived extradition and agreed to be transported back to Texas from Virginia to face trial.

Sheriff's Department assisted the Panhandle Police Department at the scene of a two vehicle accident Friday night. One person was transported to Amarillo by ambulance for treatment.

Chief Deputy Lovell Kennard is investigating the theft of jewelry from a Groom truck stop. Chief Kennard also recovered property stolen from a grain elevator near Groom.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department assisted deputies from Hutchinson County at an apparent suicide attempt outside of the Fritch city limits. A female at the residence told officers that she had taken an overdose of prescription medications in an attempt to kill herself. Two minor children were taken into protective

custody and the investigating officers contacted Children's Protective Services because

of the danger to the children and the unsanitary conditions of the home.

Our department was called to investigate two unrelated reports of child abuse. We will be working with Children's Protective Services offices in Pampa and Amarillo on these cases.

Deputy Larry Mendez completed training in Investigative Hypnosis at Collin County Community College in McKinney last week. After completing a written test with the Texas Commission On Law Enforcement Standards and Education, Deputy Mendez will be able to practice investigative hypnosis in cases where potential witnesses are unable to recall specific events regarding crimes. Sheriff Loren Brand is also certified by TCLEOSE as a Forensic Hypnotist.

The Sheriff's Department and State Fire Marshal's Office have reopened the investigation of a suspicious fire after new evidence was discovered in the case.

Headquarters. A representative of the Pantex Plant will be discussing the amount of the payment with the Carson County Tax Assessor and Collector's office.

"This is the most encouraging news we have received concerning P.I.L.T. payments," Roselius said. "We certainly look forward to working with DOE on this matter, and hopefully recapture lost taxes on the property which the Atomic Energy Commission acquired in the early 40's."

Roselius also told the Court that the 100th District Juvenile Probation Department has recently employed Jones Hedrick as an officer for the five-county district. He will begin his duties on November 1, 1995.

Roselius also said that he had been contacted by a representative of the Texas Highway Department in reference to recycled asphalt material that might be available for county use.

Safekeeping receipts in the amount of \$525,000 was released as requested by the First National Bank of Panhandle. The bank will issue \$550,000 per U.S. Treasury notes to replace the receipts.

Commissioners discussed and agreed to sell surplus equipment at auction. The equipment will be from Precincts 1, 3 and 4. A list of items to be sold is to be turned in to the County Auditor.

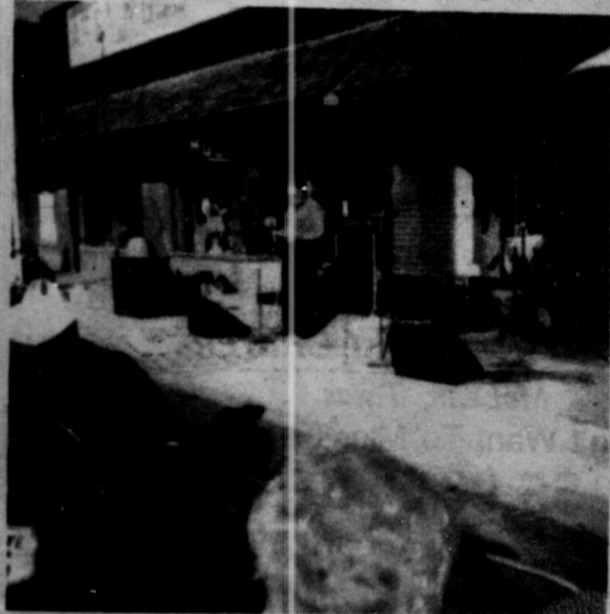
