Mayor Proclaims Sat., Nov. 1 as 'Trick or Treat' Night In Groom

Mayor Joe Homer with the unanimous support of the Groom City Council proclaimed Saturday, November 1 as Trick or Treat Day. The reason the Council felt compelled to change the children's holiday was due to Homecoming falling on Oct. 31, the day trick or treat is usually celebrated. The Council asked for and received input from parents of children who normally trick or treat as to what to do about the unusual amount of activities scheduled for this day.

"The consensus, of the parents that expressed a preference, was that Trick or Treat be held on Saturday evening," stated Mayor Homer.

Residents who wish to participate in the annual event are asked to leave their porch light on. Children should not go to homes if the light is not on.

In other business, the council corrected minutes of the previous special called meeting to include the amounts of the insurance bids let in the last meeting. The correction stands as follows:

The insurance bid from

Brumley Insurance for 1997-98 was 6,866.00. The bid from the Texas Municipal League was \$8,348.00. The cost of insurance purchased for 1996-97 was \$10,992.00.

Amendments to the 1996-97 budgets were made as follows: Salaries were changed from \$19,000. to \$20,295.13. Operating from \$5,000 to \$5,121.39; and waterworks salaries from \$37,000 to \$37,321.68.

The Council unanimously agreed to purchase one cellular phone from Rodney Bohr representing CellularOne of Pampa. The plan selected was the \$19.95 plan with detailed billing.

Forrest McLaughlin met with the council to discuss the possibility of renting the City owned property that is now housed by The Copy Shop, which is in the process of vacating the premises. McLaughlin plans to look over the building to get in mind what kind of work needs to be done, and come back to the Council with a proposal.

Groom's practice game with Miami's JV was just what the doctor ordered for The Groom Tigers. With Groom having an open date next week, Coach Larry Reid was pleased to have the opportunity for the team to get in some very good practice.

"It gave us a chance to try some new things, hone our practical skills and let some of our younger players get in some actual game time," he stated. "It was a good opportunity for our players to also try out some different positions. This will sure help us down the road as far as

versatility and staying sharp."

The Tigers racked up 11 first downs to Miami's 4 and 222 yards rushing to Miami's 88. In the passing game, Groom completed 5 of 12 attempts for 100 yards and 2 touchdowns. Miami completed 3 of 6 for 79 yards, 1 TD and 2 interceptions. Miami punts averaged 24.25.

Junior Dean Fields had a great night culminating 3 TD's on 7 rushes for 83 yards. He also had 1 quarterback sack, and 13 unassisted tackles.

Toby Burgin made 2 touchdowns for the Tigers on 10 rushing

attempts for 62 yards. He also had 4 unassisted tackles.

DeWayne Gray had a touchdown and rushed 3 times for 35 yards. He had one unassisted tackle.

Wade Ritter had 7 rushes for 41 yards. He had one punt return for 11 yards and 2 unassisted tackles.

Russell Conrad earned 3 rushes and 1 yard for the Tigers. He completed a run on the point after attempt.

Conrad also had 1 kick-off return for 17 yards and 3 unassisted tackles.

Quarterback Josh Evenson threw 12 passes, connecting on 5 of them for 100 yards and 2 touchdowns. He earned 2

extra points for Groom. Evenson had 1 punt return for 11 yards, and

2 interceptions for 21 yards. He had 1 unassisted tackle.

Wyatt Weinheimer was the leading receiver of the night. He caught 3 passes, for 51 yards and 1 touchdown. He had one quarterback sack and 7 unassisted tackles.

Chris Ollinger connected with 1 pass for 32 yards and a touchdown. He returned a kick-off for 36 yards. He also recovered a fumble for Groom and had 7 unassisted tackles.

Jamie Shuck caught 1 pass for 17 yards and had 6 unassisted tackles.

Dusty Crump had 1

kick-off return for 6 yards. He also had a fumble recovery and 5 unassisted tackles.

Groom will next face Higgins for Groom's

Homecoming on October 31. Game time will be at 7:30. Other activities will precede the game so be sure to attend!

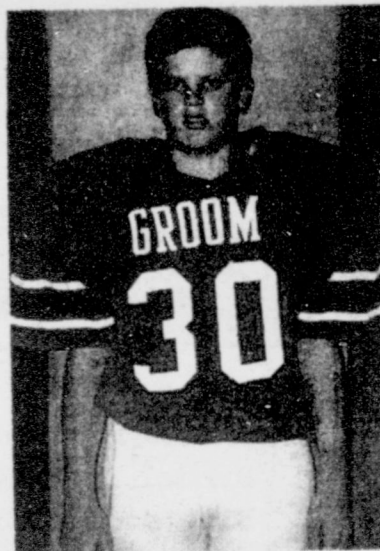

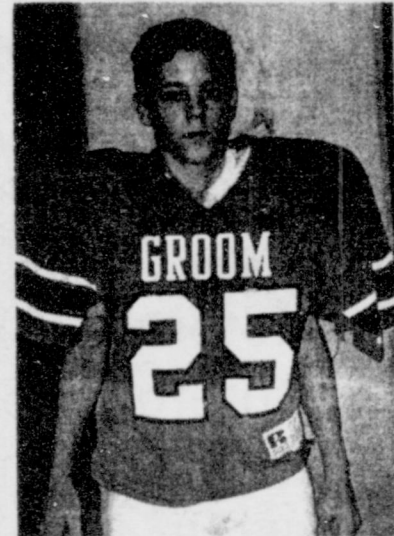

City Council Discusses Free Water Policy

Appraisal District Board member.

The Council agreed to enter into an inter-local agreement with Carson County concerning mutual aid that will allow the City and the County to assist with projects from time to time. According to Council members, there has always been an understanding with the county, but it was never in writing before.

The question of the Groom City Council joining a GTE Franchise Cities Steering Committee by signing a resolution encouraging competition in the delivery of local and long distance telecommunications services was tabled until more information can be

obtained.

A lengthy discussion was held concerning the cost of the water in the vending machine

compared to the cost of water piped to a home. No action was taken on this matter.

A unanimous decision upheld the policy of retired employees and free water. It had been suggested that the "free water" policy be extended to spouses of retired employees should the former employee pass away.

The policy of the City disposing of unwanted animals was voted to remain a policy, rather than become part of the ordinance concerning animal control. The

policy was changed to raise the fee for this service from \$5.00 to \$10.00.

In executive session, the city council discussed the six month evaluation of new city secretary, Mary Sue Lyles. It was voted to raise her salary \$164.00 per month, and she will be re-evaluated in 6 months.

With no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Gray County SWCD Elects 1997-98 Directors

Neal Stovall of Pampa was elected to the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District's Board of Directors on October 9, 1997. Stovall represents Zone Five of the District.

The purpose of the Gray Co. SWCD, with headquarters in Pampa is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the District. In addition, the District serves as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The Board of Directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has the authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental

agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

The five members serving on the District Board of Directors are responsible for District policies and procedure for carrying out the District program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law. The five Directors currently serving on the Gray Co. SWCD Board include L.H. Webb, Chairman; David Bowers, Vice-Chairman; Troy Ritter, Secretary; Jim Shaw, Member; and Neal Stovall, Member.

Stovall is currently active in farming, and previously served as a Gray County District Director from 1979 to '83.

In Texas, there are 216 oil and water

conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have power of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the District are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

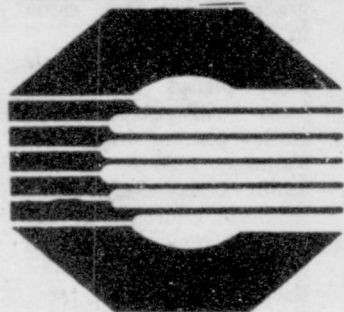
