Carson County Receives \$99,810 Grant Money

Emergency Management plans and procedures topped the Commissioners' Court agenda Monday, Oct. 28.

In reference to marking county roads for emergency response, it was decided that each commissioner will mark the locations of residences and businesses outside city limits and within a designated area. After this task is complete, mapping of the entire county will begin.

Judge Roselius said that Carson County has officially signed an agreement for \$99,810 in funds from the Department of Energy and the State of Texas Energy office.

"These funds were obtained by an agreement between the County Emergency Management office, the County Judge's office and the Federal and State governments," he said. "Revenue will be used in the County Emergency Management program for emergency preparedness for its residents".

"Carson County received approximately \$110,000 last year for communication equipment for the EM program. A total of \$200,000 has been obtained to date.

"We are very fortunate to receive these funds. It will enhance our emergency preparedness countywide with little or no expense to our local residents".

Commissioners also reviewed the activity of the Panhandle Regional Narcotics Trafficking Task Force, noting that the task force has been working with local law enforcement officials within the County. During the past two months, task force members participated in several cases within the top 26-county area of the Texas Panhandle.

The Court was informed of the repair of most all of the Santa Fe Railroad crossings from Kingsmill to just west of Lee Switch.

Groom Tigers In "Must Win" Situation Friday Against Follett

Cold weather and snowy conditions did nothing to slow down the Tigers at Friday nights last home game of the season.

The Warriors held a brief lead in the first quarter after a 30 yard pass completed for a touchdown and extra points were good. Brian Baker began the scoring with a run for 8 yards, the first of four t.d.'s. Paul McLaughlin put Groom ahead with an outstanding 28 yard run in the second quarter. Kirk Webb connected with the extra point to bring the

halftime score to 22-16.

Groom came back after half time like they were on fire. Baker ran in two more touchdowns from the 7 and the 1 yard lines.

The third quarter found Bruce Britten refining his passing game to connect with two t.d. passes, the first sailed 27 yards to find Kirk Webb, the second was a quick rabbit pass for five yards to Corkey Hickey.

Brian Baker scored his fourth touchdown on a 6 yard run.

Statistically the Tigers just plain outperformed the Warriors.

Groom tallied 17 first downs while Miami had only 12. Yards rushing showed Groom at 188 while Miami

had 140. The real difference came in the passing game where Groom passed for 189 while Miami had only 50 yards. Those passing plays are proving to truly make the difference in yards gains as one can see by the 277 yards to 190 yards difference.

The Warriors also seemed plagued by fumbles, turning the ball over four times to Groom. The final score told the tale with

Groom winning 56 to 24.

Coach O'Dell praised the boys performance by saying "they played a good game. The weather conditions didn't seem to be a factor."

When asked about injuries, he said "Everyone is healthy except Shannon Miller who was injured at the game against Lefors." Miller will know later this week if he is out for the rest of the season.

O'Dell added that the Junior High and Junior Varsity games that were cancelled due to the weather last week will not be rescheduled.

Winners of County Medals in specific interests must turn in a complete record book of their activities in their field to qualify for the award.

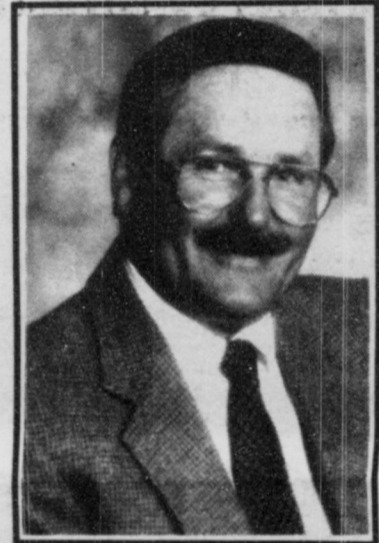

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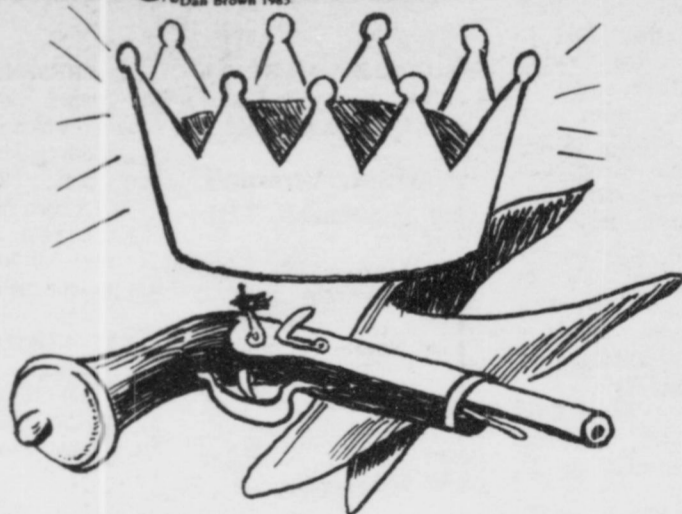

Appointed a Dutch tax collector he was accused of embezzlement and fled with a price on his head. Appearing in Texas in 1805, he helped shape Anglo Colonization of the state. Technology

PUBLIC NOTICE

On April 16, 1991, GTE Corporation ("GTE") and Contel Corporation ("Contel") filed a joint petition for declaratory relief with respect to the obligations or requirements of GTE or Contel and/or any of its subsidiaries relating to the merger of GTE and Contel. GTE and Contel have requested a ruling from the Public Utility Commission of Texas that neither GTE nor Contel is required to report the merger of GTE and Contel pursuant to Section 63 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act ("PURA"), TEX. REV. CIV. STAT. ANN. art. 1446c (Vernon Supp. 1991), that no investigation of the merger by the Commission is required. In the alternative, GTE and Contel seek a determination that the merger is consistent with the public interest.

The Commission is investigating the merger between GTE and Contel Corporations to determine whether the merger is consistent with the public interest. In reaching its determination, the Commission shall take into consideration the reasonable value of the property, facilities or securities to be acquired, disposed of, merged or consolidated. If the Commission finds that the merger is not in the public interest, the Commission shall take the effect of the transaction into consideration in GTE Southwest Incorporated's and Contel of Texas, Inc.'s next rate-making proceeding and disallow the effect of such transaction if it will unreasonably affect rates or services.

This filing has been assigned Docket No. 10212. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. 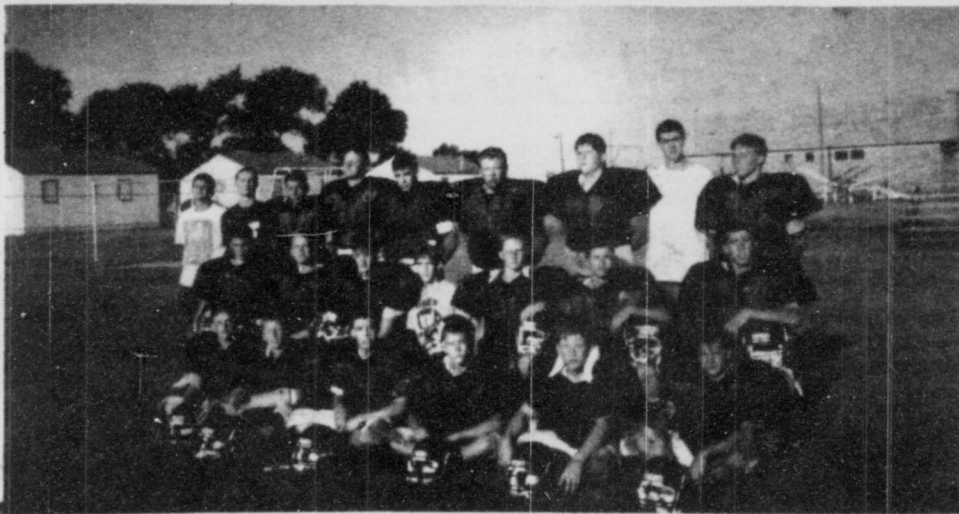
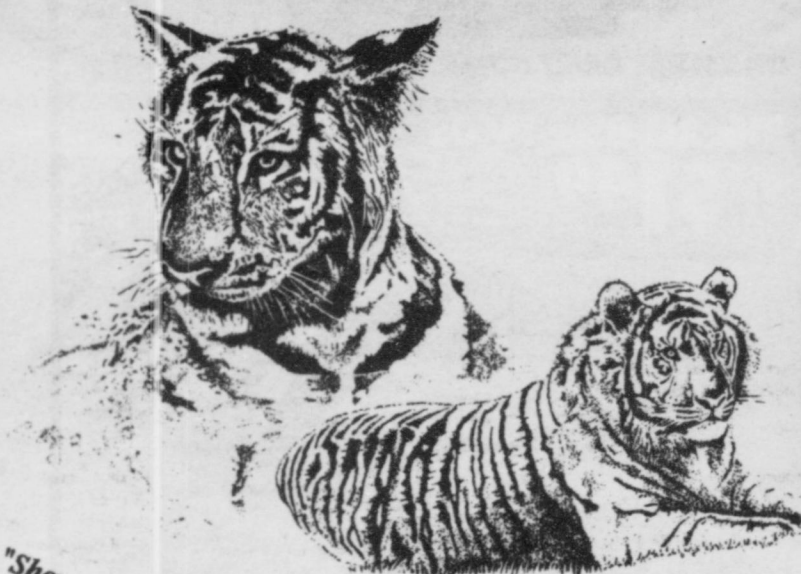

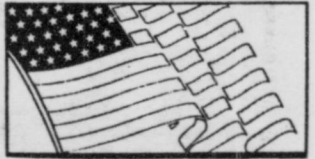
Did they never think

Attending the conference were Troy Ritter and David Bowers.

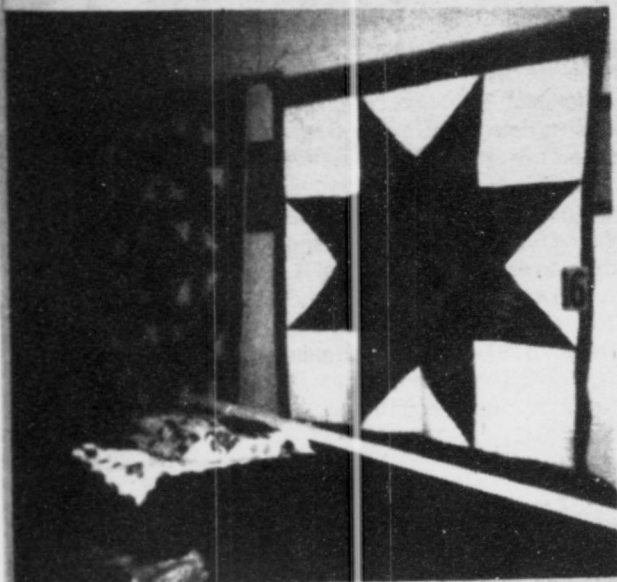
Featured speakers on the program included James Owen, President, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association; Robert Sherbee, President, National Association of

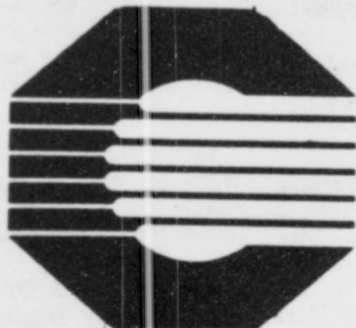

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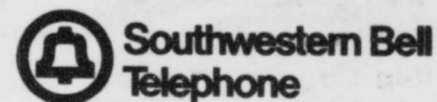

On October 18, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to add a new optional service offering called SmartTrunk™ Service. The application has been assigned Tariff Control No. 10687.

SmartTrunk Service provides access between the customer's premises and the serving Southwestern Bell central office for circuit-switched voice and data communications. This communication capability is provided where facilities are available using Integrated Services Digital Network architecture. ISDN services available with SmartTrunk Service use Primary Rate Interface (PRI) technology. SmartTrunk Service requires PRI ISDN compatible Private Branch Exchange (PBX) customer provided equipment registered under FCC Part 68 Rules. SmartTrunk Service employs a 1.544 Mbps facility (denoted as SmartTrunk Interface) typically divided into twenty-three B channels and one D channel. B channels are used for voice and data communications while the D channel provides out-of-band signaling.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for each SmartTrunk Interface facility will be \$1,110 per month under a 36-month service contract or \$1,010 per month under a 60-month service contract. The proposed rate for the use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each B channel depending on the rate group classification which is determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.8 million from this offering during the first year.


Public Notice

On July 1, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas that proposes to delete Paragraph 3.4(G) from Section 3 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff, which concerns credits where a customer uses Switched Access Service to furnish a service which has been defined to be an exchange service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10463.

Because Southwestern Bell is not aware of any customers who presently use switched access service to furnish an exchange service, Southwestern Bell does not believe its revenues will be affected. However, certain interexchange carrier customers of switched access service have made claims under the aforementioned tariff. Such customers, but only to the extent they provide an exchange service using switched access, would be affected by this application. Based on claims made for credits (assuming such credits were allowable), Southwestern Bell's revenues would be affected by no more than \$1,168,962 annually, which is .037 percent of the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1990. It is not possible to know how many interexchange carriers might believe themselves entitled to credits, but 189 carriers have registered with the Commission pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule 23.61.

The tariff, after suspension, is proposed to be effective May 1, 1992.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but no later than November 15, 1991.
