Tragedy has struck Claude again. evening, February 12, 1995 five Claude teenagers were. killed 4½ miles west of town. The teenagers were returning home after visiting

a hospitalized Sunday school teacher and attending a The accident occurred around 7:15 p.m. just about the time sleet had begun to fall.

A spokesperson for the Department of Public Safety said the 1987 Jeep Cherokee crossed the median on Highway 287, went into a skid and hit a semi-truck from Michigan

The five were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Jackie Cartwright. The dead are Macy Thomas, 16 years old, son of Mark and Carol Thomas; Anna Doyle, 15, daughter of Chris and Johnny Doyle; Cheryl Campbell, 16, daughter of Cindy Campbell and Jerry Campbell; Jake Jones, 15, son of Orville and Armstrong County Sheriff Carmella Jones; and Brad Stewart, 15, son of Nancy Stewart and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. James Owens of Clarendon.

Carson Co. To Receive **Funds For New Deputy**

By Loren Brand, Sheriff The Carson County Sheriff's Department was one of fifteen law enforcement agencies in the Texas Panhandle chosen to receive funds for the hiring of an additional officer to supplement current staffing. Carson County will receive \$54,758.25 which will cover 75% of the salary and benefits of a deputy sheriff for three years. Carson County will be responsible for the remaining 25%

The Cops Fast program

is designed to supply quick federal grants to communities of less than 50,000 population. The grants will supply 7,105 new officers for law enforcement agencies across the nation. The \$434 million program is part of the crime bill passed by Congress last year.

IRS OFFERS FREE TAX HELP

Dallas - If you need help filing your Federal income tax return, Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) sites are now open through April 17, 1995, to help you.

"This program is part of our continuing effort to ease the task of filing federal income tax returns, and foster voluntary compliance with the tax laws," said Bobby E. Scott, Dallas District Director. Last year, volunteers provided free tax assistance to nearly 47,000 north Texas residents at almost 200 locations. The IRS VITA program is entering its 25th year of providing free tax help to older persons, non-English speaking, and others with special needs. The VITA sites are located in local schools, churches, libraries, shopping centers, and community centers. Mr. Scott urges taxpayers to take advantage of this free tax assistance.

The IRS is establishing on-site VITA centers for large employers as well. Bo Pilgrim, an east Texas employer, has IRS volunteers providing free tax assistance to Pilgrim's employees. Volunteers will provide tax assistance during all shifts at several plant locations.

Free on-site electronic filing will also be offered at these locations to eligible employees. Bobby Scott, IRS Director, said, "I encourage other large employers to set up VITA sites."

> **Check Social Security** Number on W-2 Form

Social Security is urging workers to check their Social Security numbers on the W-2 forms (statement of earnings) employers are required to give employees before the end of January. You should compare the number with the number on your Social Security card. If a discrepancy is found in the name or number, be sure to contact your employer and the Social Security office. The name and number on your W-2 form must match your Social Security record in order for your earnings to be credited to the correct Social Security record. The earnings records are the basis on which retirement, survivors and disability benefits are paid. Uncredited earnings could affect your future eligibility for benefits and/or the amount of your benefits.







Tax Law Burden Reduced For Household Employers

DALLAS, TX - The lax law burden for household employers has been drastically reduced by new legislation. "This new law means that many employers who previously were required to file quarterly reports with the IRS will no longer have to report employment taxes for their household employees", said Bobby E. Scott, Dall as District Director of the Internal Revenue Service. The quarterly filing and payment requirements have been eliminated by the new law, and the \$50 per quarter threshold has been raised to \$1,000 per year (an amount that will be indexed for inflation beginning in 1996).

Household employers and their employees are eligible for refunds if they paid Social Security and Medicare taxes on 1994 employee wages of less than Employers can \$1000. obtain their refunds with interest by filing Form 843, "Claim for Refund and Request Abatement." Alternatively, employers who file a fourth quarter Form 942, "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees" can reduce their liability on that return by the amount of any overpaid household employment taxes. In December, the fourth quarter Form 942 package was mailed to employers; this package contained special instructions and a simplified version of the Form 843 for

Employees who are affected by this change should request reimbursement from their employers for any Social Security and Medicare taxes withheld from their pay. However, employees who are unable to obtain refunds of these taxes from their employers can receive them by filing the Form 843 and attaching a copy of their Form W-2, "Wage and Tax Statement." A simplified version of the Form 843 will be available after January 1 calling 1-800-TAX-FORM. Also, Publication 926, "Employment Taxes for Household Employers," and Publication 553, "Highlights of 1994 Tax Changes," will employees can file for their refunds.

Employees who receive refunds will nevertheless receive Social Security wage For more information credits on their 1994 wages. To ensure proper posting of these credits, the new law requires employers, for 1994 only, to issue a Form W-2 household employees who were paid more than \$50 in any quarter. The fourth-quarter Form 942 package and Publication 926 will contain special instructions for preparing these Form W-2s.

Another provision of the law, beginning in 1995, exempts household employees under 18 from Social Security and Medicare taxes, regardless of how much they earn, unless household employment is the worker's principal occupation.

For the 1995 tax year, household employers are no longer required to file Form 942. Instead, they will use their 1040 income tax returns to report Social Security, Medicare, and Federal unemployment (FUTA) taxes along with any income taxes withheld from their household employees.

Even though the new law simplifies the reporting and payment of household FUTA tax by allowing it to reported on the employers 1995 Form 1040, it does not affect the wage threshold for FUTA liability. Mr. Scott warns "This new law does not directly affect any state unemployment tax filing requirements. Household employers may still be subject to quarterly filing requirements for these state taxes."

Finally, under the new law, household employers are not required to make household employee Social Security, Medicare, and FUTA tax payments throughout the year until 1998. Mr. Scott encourages household employers to

either increase their withholding or make estimated payments to avoid payments must be sufficient to cover these taxes. if not, these underpayments could be subject to estimated tax penalties.

Seventh grader Dee Dee Floyd scored 10 points for the Ladies, and Vanessa Glass scored 9.


