Block Schedule Planned At GHS For '97-98 Students in Groom Junior High and High School wil experience a new schedulin? program in the 1997-93 school year. The ner "block" schedule has been put into place to give students a few options when the new, more stringen credit requirements fo: graduation are put into place.
"When the new credit requirements go into effect,' stated Principal Danny Chisum, "With the curren schedule students would have four elective classes for all of their high school years. That would mean that students couldn't participate in athletics and band, or ag and athletics, etc. They could only participate in one event per year."
The way the partial block schedule will work is this: The first two classes each Monday through Thursday will be for 90 minutes. First and third periods will meet Monday and Wednesday.
