
Aimee Lyles Is Nominated For Woman Of The Year At WTAMU

Block Schedule Planned At GHS For '97 - '98

Students in Groom Junior High and High School will experience a new scheduling program in the 1997-98 school year. The new "block" schedule has been put into place to give students a few options when the new, more stringent credit requirements for graduation are put into place.

"When the new credit requirements go into effect," stated Principal Danny Chisum, "With the current schedule students would have four elective classes for all of their high school years. That would mean that students couldn't participate in athletics and band, or ag and athletics, etc. They could only participate in one event per year."

The way the partial block schedule will work is this: The first two classes each Monday through Thursday will be for 90 minutes. First and third periods will meet Monday and Wednesday. Second and fourth periods will meet on Tuesday and Thursday. The rest of the classes on these days will be as usual.

On Fridays, all classes will meet with a slightly shortened class period. A student schedule might look like the following.

Monday & Wednesday: Math, Science, Tutorial, Athletics, Spanish, History, Computers.

Tuesday & Thursday: English, Government, Tutorial, Athletics, Spanish, History, Computers.
