## **Review Board Hearing Less Complaints**

The Carson County Review Board was to meet on Wednesday, July 1 to hear taxpayers complaints on appraised values.

"So far we have less persons requesting to appear before the ARB than a year ago," said Dianne Lavake, chief appraiser for Carson County. "We have received no written requests from any taxpayer in Groom wishing to protest their appraised property values." Mrs. Lavake says that

many times prior to the hearings taxpayers come to her office questioning appraisals. Most of the time, we can settle the appraisal problems before the hearings. Most questions conand can be re-evaluated and corrected, according to Mrs.

The Appraisal office did the appraisals themselves this year without the aide of outside appraisers that helped with earlier appraisals. "We spent two days in Groom recently looking

inside houses and were able to change some values The appraisals across the state of Texas are based on market value of land and property and sometimes it takes an on site inspection to insure the proper value.

Mrs. Lavake says, "The closer to market value our people we expect to protest." appraisals are, the more

After the ARB meets and valuations are settled, local entities will be informed of their values and tax rates will then be set by school and city governments. Mrs. Lavake said, "that no one has indicated they plan to raise tax rates to fund budgets in 1988, though many will be dipping into surplus funds to maintain present tax rates."

The appraisal office estimates that values in Groom will be between 25 to 30 percent less than a year ago. Other Carson County entities will also feel 30 percent reductions in values mostly See ARB, Page 12





## Memorial Services Held For Dr. Evelyn Reed Of Baton Rouge

Memorial services for Dr. Evelyn Reed, 58, of Baton Rouge, La. will be held at 7:00 p.m. today (July 2, 1987) at Southwest Church of Christ in Amarillo. Mrs. Reed donated her body to Texas Tech School of Medicine.

She died Sunday, June 28 in Amarillo at St. Anthony's Hospital Hospice.

Dr. Reed was born in Donley County and was a 1947 graduate of Groom High School. She retired in 1985 from Louisiana State University where she had been a psychology professor for 15 years. She attended West Texas State College and received her bachelor's degree in psychology and her master's degree in social work from the University of Oklahoma at Norman. She worked at Children's Hospital in Oklahoma City for two years as counselor for doctors and medical students,

working with families of abused children. She also worked at Veteran's Administration Hospital in Oklahoma City.

For two years she was in the Peace Corps in Honduras, where she worked in the neuro-psychiatric hospital. She enrolled in the doctoral program in social work at the University of California at Berkeley. She left the doctoral program when called by the Peace Corps to work as an evaluator of Peace Corps programs. She lived at Washington D.C., and made two six-week trips to various countries, including Morocco, Paraguay, Ecuador and most Central American countries. She earned her doctorate degree in social work at Berkeley after her work with the Peace

Survivors include a sister, Jean Heisler of Amarillo; and three brothers, John of Amarillo, Tom of Groom and Bob of Seattle, Wash.





## **GEDC Hears Report** From WTSU Professor

Dr. Winston D. Stahlecker, head of the Business Administration department at West Texas State University was in Groom Saturday to meet with members of the community and the Groom Economic Development Corporation. His evaluations will give the GEDC a direction to work and allow use of expertiese from Dr. Stahlecker's department to continue to fine tune studies to help the GEDC in their endeavors.

## **Ambulance Service Has** New 800 Number

Recently, Charles Milam announced that he is resigning his position as night dispatcher for McLean. Stella Lee will continue to dispatch calls during the day but McLean residents should be aware that a new system has been set up and should be used starting immediately. It includes a new 800 number for all emergency medical calls.

Up to now, people requiring assistance from the Ambulance Service have either called 779-2226 or have called the appropriate per-sonnel at home. According to Bill Thomas, president of the Ambulance Service, when paramedics or EMTs are called at home, they have to go down to the amublance barn, set off the pagers and wait for the ambulance staff to respond.


Weatherman Sam Havnes tells us that the McLean area received 3.48 inches of rain during the month of June. This raises our yearly total to 16.33 inches.





#### Post Office Burglaries A Problem

Texas and Oklahoma continue to be the target of post office burglars, according to Postal Inspector in Charge D.C. Strader, Fort Worth. Strader, whose area of responsibility includes the northern half of Texas (north of Austin) and all of Okla-

homa, said that over 50 burglaries will occur within the boundaries of the Fort Worth Division this year if the current trend continues.

Most of the burglaries have occured at post offices that are located in rural communities that have limited or no local law enforcement available for routine patrols at night.

"A majority of the bur-glaries do not involve the loss of postal funds, because very little money is kept overnight in post offices and postal stations. Safes and security containers are used to secure the money and blank money orders which are kept overnight," stated Strader. "In addition to burglary-resistant security containers, we are continually adding and updating existing alarm systems where appropriate. However, we need for the residents of each city, town, and community to help us protect their post offices and stations from burglaries and vandalism.'

Local postmaster Frank Simpson emphasized the need for citizen involvement. "Even though postal funds are secured in a safe, burglars who are unsuccessful in attempting to break into a safe will sometimes steal mail left in customers' post office boxes. Even

when they don't steal mail, they somtimes just cause malicious vandalism. In either event, it does cost the Postal Service money to repair the damage incurred and for the Postal Inspectors to conduct an investigation. Our local tax money is also spent by our local law enforcement officers who incur expenses, because they are usually the first agency to respond, and they also provide valuable assistance in the investigations to the Postal Inspectors.

"But the most important reason for citizen involvement is because it causes a hardship to those whose mail is stolen or destroyed as the result of a burglary or a senseless act of vandalism," said Postmaster Simpson.

Residents can help reduce burglaries and vandalism by reporting suspicious activity at or around the postal facilities which occurs after business hours. This activity would include such things as automobiles or trucks with license plates from outside the local area, unfamiliar people asking suspicious questions about the post office or amount of law

enforcement patrol at night, or loitering in the post office box lobby or around the post office by groups of young people at night and on weekends when the post office is closed. This information should be reported to the local law enforcement agencies and to the postmaster or station manager.

the Postal Inspector in Charge in Forth Worth is 817-885-1111. Postal Inspectors are also located in Dallas and Lubbock in Texas and at Oklahoma City and Tulsa.

## Sales Tax Collections Still Down In McLean

The State Comptroller's office recently sent checks totaling \$52.6 million in local sales tax to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Payments to date in 1987 were down 6% compared to payments to date made in June last year.

The monthly check to the City of McLean was for \$1,007.98 compared to a

payment of \$1,006.51 in a comparable period last year. Payments to date for 1987 total \$8,687.02 compared to \$10,207.18 for 1986. This represents a loss of 14.89%.

Payments to date for Lefors and Pampa reflected declines of 32.88% and 16.69% respectively. County-wide, there was a decline of 16.75% compared to county totals for 1986.

## Social Security Office Reminds Beneficiaries To Check Earnings

People in the Panhandle area who receive Social Security checks and who also work should take time to check their earnings.

Those who earlier estimated that in 1937 earnings would not exceed the annual limit should check to make sure they have not earned more than they anticipated. The 1987 annual limit is \$8,160 for people 65 through 69 and \$6,000 for people under 65 all of 1987.

If a person's annual earnings exceed the limit, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the limit. A person will have to repay all benefits that were incorrectly paid.

If a person finds that he or she is earning more or less than expected, he or she should notify Social Security right away so that benefits can be adjusted and an overpayment avoided.

If a person's earrings are less than expected, benefits may be restarted if they have been stopped.

More information about the annual earnings test can be obtained at the Pampa Social Security Office, located at 125 S. Gillespie. The telephone number is 806-669-1018.

## Pampa Hospital To Host Fair

Coronado Hospital in Pampa is hosting a Maternity Fair for expectant parents at the hospital July 18 from 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. The free fair will feature exhibits, free classes and a tour of the maternity areas of the hospital.

The highlight of the Fair will be a tour of the hospital, which begins at 3:30, conducted by the Pampa physicians who deliver babies. A physician will be stationed at the Acuson (sonogram) unit, the delivery room, labor room and the nursery to answer the expecting parents questions about what happens in the hospital.

From 1 p.m. to 2 p.m., expecting parents may visit special displays to see exhibits of educational toys, baby clothes and baby furniture. They will also receive information about Lamaze, the LaLeche League and good nutrition for the new mother and baby.

At 2 p.m., a free infant CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) class is planned to teach parents how to help a choking infant.

Parents may also attend a brief session that will help them plan the financial side of having a baby.

### Telephone Subscriber Line Charge To Increase

In accordance with recent Federal Communication Commission action, all single line business and residential telephone customers across the nation, including those served by General Telephone, will be subject to an increase in their interstate Subscriber Line Charge from the current

\$2.00 per month to a \$2.60 per month charge.

The 60c increase in the interstate subscriber line charge is effective July 1, 1987, and is the third phase of a federally mandated process that is intended to gradually eliminate the practice of charging customers more for long-distance service in order to keep local rates artificially low.

Business customers with more than one line have been paying a \$6 interstate subscriber line charge since May 1984. This interstate subscriber line charge will not change.

Under Communications Commission plan for implementation of the interstate subscriber line charges, the total revenues of the local telephone companies will not increase since the FCC in turn will reduce by an equivalent amount charges to long-distance carriers for use of local facilities and equipment. It is the intent of the FCC that this decrease in long-distance carriers' expense will be passed through to consumers in the

form of reduced interstate long-distance rates. Some interexchange carriers have already announced plans to reduce interstate long-distance rates.

General Telephone officials said the interstate subscriber line charges are designed to shift from longdistance users to local customers, a larger portion of the actual costs of providing the line from their residence or business to the telephone switching equipment. It was pointed out that longdistance rates have been artificially high to pay a portion of these costs, thus benefitting local exchange access rates by keeping them artificially low.

Depending on the amount of interstate long-distance calling, the reductions for interstate rates could offset the \$2.60 interstate fee for many customers, especially high volume users.

The \$2.60 interstate subscriber line charge applies to all residential and single line business customers of all exchange telephone companies providing local exchange service.




